Explanatory Note

When regulations noting the above new name for the Sports Strategy Committee were published (Gazette, 9 December 2010, p285), references to the committee in several other regulations were overlooked. CORRECTION TO BE MADE UNDER THE **SLIP RULE**

Explanatory Note

(1) Voting on changes to Congregation Regulations 1 of 2002: Membership of Congregation

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Humanities

Divisional Board, reflect the renaming of the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art as the Ruskin School of Art. This change of name reflects more broadly that it is an "Art School" that covers all facets of art from drawing and painting through to sculpturing, film-making and performing.

Text of Regulations

In Congregation Regulations 1 of 2002, concerning membership of Congregation, delete existing regulation 1(8) and substitute (deleted text scored through):

'(8) the Tutors in Fine Art at the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art,'.

Regulations to be made by Council if the Regulations are approved

1 In Council Regulations 2 of 2004, concerning other University Bodies, delete existing Part 7 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'Part 7: Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art

- 7.1. There shall be a Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art consisting of:
 - (1), (2) two persons appointed by the Humanities Board, one of whom shall chair the committee:
 - (3) the Ruskin Master of Drawing;
 - (4)-(7) four other persons holding teaching posts in the Ruskin School, who shall be elected by all those holding such posts except the Ruskin Master of Drawing under arrangements as per Council Regulation 19 of 2002, regulations 3136-3944;
 - (8) a person appointed by the Committee of Senior Tutors.
- 7.2. (1) The committee may co-opt not more than five persons as additional members.
 - (2) The period of office for appointed, elected, and co-opted members shall be three years, and no appointed, elected or co-opted member shall serve more than two consecutive full terms of office. Casual terms of office shall not count towards this limit.
 - (3) Notwithstanding regulation (2) above, in the case of appointed and coopted members the General Purposes Committee of Council may determine that one further consecutive period is permitted in an individual case.
- 7.3. The committee shall have the function and powers of a board of a faculty as defined in Council Regulations 19 of 2002,

- regulation 2, in respect of the Ruskin School and the Study of Fine Art in the University.
- 7.4. Student members shall be represented at meetings of the committee by:
 - (1) the chairman of the Ruskin School Joint Consultative Committee;
 - (2) a person appointed by the Ruskin School Joint Consultative Committee from among its own members.
- 7.5. The student members shall:
 - (1) serve for one year, and shall be eligible for re-election if they remain members of the Ruskin School Joint Consultative Committee;
 - (2) be entitled to speak at meetings of the committee but not to vote;
 - (3) respect the conventions of the committee as set out in its standing orders.
- 7.6. (1) No student member shall be present for the discussion of reserved business as defined in regulation 78 of the Regulations for Council.
 - (2) The student members shall receive the full committee agenda paper but not the papers or minutes relating to reserved business.'
- **2** In Council Regulations 16 of 2002, concerning divisions, delete regulation 1(3) and substitute (deleted text scored through):
 - '(3) Drawing and Fine Art (Ruskin School);'.
- **3** In Council Regulations 17 of 2002, concerning divisional boards, delete regulation 8(2)-(11) and substitute (deleted text scored through):
 - '(2)-(11) the chair of faculty board for each of the nine constituent faculties of the Division and the Head of the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art *ex officio*;'.
- **4** In Section III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning statutory professorships, delete regulation §63 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'**§63.** Ruskin Master of Drawing

1. The Ruskin Master of Drawing (who shall be regarded as a professor for the purposes of any statute or regulation) shall lecture and give instruction in drawing and other aspects of Fine Art on such conditions and with such other duties as Council shall from time to time determine. Subject to the supervision of the Committee for the

Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art, he or she shall be responsible for the teaching and other necessary arrangements for the degrees in Fine Art, and for the general instruction in Fine Art of members of the University.

- 2. The Ruskin Master shall be appointed by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;
 - (2) the head of the college to which the Ruskin Mastership shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any decree in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;
 - (4) a person appointed by Council;
 - (5) a person appointed by the Humanities Board;
 - (6), (7) two persons appointed by the Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art;
 - (8) a person appointed by the Visitors of the Ashmolean Museum;
 - (9) one person appointed by the Committee for the History of Art.
- 3. The interest on the capital sum accepted by the University from the late John Ruskin under the Deed of Declaration of Trust 1875 for the endowment of a Mastership of Drawing shall be used towards defraying the stipend of the Ruskin Master.'
- **5** Ibid, in regulation §132 concerning the Professor of the History of Art delete existing paragraph 2(9) and substitute (deleted text scored through):
 - '(9) a person elected by the Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art.'
- **6** In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, in §175 concerning the Hussey Lectures delete existing paragraph 2(5) and substitute (deleted text scored through):
 - '(5) one person elected by the Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art.'
- **7** Ibid, in §299 concerning the Rhoades Commemorative Fund delete existing paragraph 3 and substitute (deleted text scored through):

'3. The Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art shall be the board of management of the fund, and shall determine the conditions under which the bursaries shall be awarded.'

(3) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Scatcherd Scholarships

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal brings the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be citizens of) a number of European countries.

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Scatcherd Scholarships, NOWTHE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In the Schedule to the Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002, pp133–59), after Part 72 insert the following new Part 73¹ (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

$`\$ \textbf{316.} \, \underline{\textbf{Part 73}} : \textit{Scatcherd Scholarships}$

- 73.1. The University has received with gratitude a legacy from Mrs Jane Ledig-Rowohlt to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Scatcherd Scholarship Fund ("the Fund").
- 73.2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets (if any) in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to

be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").

- 73.3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards: (i) awarding scholarships to students of Oxford University of British citizenship allowing them to engage in study or research in other countries; and (ii) awarding scholarships to citizens of with preference being given to students ordinarily resident in a nation of continental Europe from the Atlantic to the Urals with the exception of Turkey.
- 73.4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income and capital, shall be the responsibility of the board of management of the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Fund.
- 73.5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 73.6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Scholarship.
- 73.7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 73.8. Regulations Sections 73.1-73.10 shall be deemed to be trust Regulations provisions under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 73.9. Subject to regulation section 73.10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 73.10. Any amendment to regulation section 73.3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both

by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

Regulations to be made by Council if the Statute is approved by Her Majesty in Council

- **2** This regulation shall be effective from the date on which the Statute approved by Congregation on [date] is approved by Her Majesty in Council.

A revised legislative proposal, bringing the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring candidates be from, which implies and has historically be construed as citizens of) a number of European countries, is being submitted to Congregation in response to comments from the Charity Commission and discussion with the Privy Council Office.

(5) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Scatcherd Science Scholarships

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal amends the name and the board of management of the Scatcherd Science Scholarships and brings the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring candidates be from, which implies and has historically be construed as citizens of) a number of European countries.

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Scatcherd Scholarships, NOW THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In the Schedule to the Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002, pp133-59), after Part 71 insert the following new Part 72¹ (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'**§317.** Part 72: Scatcherd Science Scholarships

72.1. The University accepts from the Trustee of the Campaign for Oxford Trust Fund the sum of £621,000, made possible by an extremely generous benefaction from Mrs Jane Ledig-Rowohlt, to establish a fund, the net income of which shall be applied in the funding of Scatcherd Science Scholarships for the support of graduate study in science.

- 72.2. The fund shall be administered by the International Committee: The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the board of management of the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Fund.
- 72.3. The scholarships shall be awarded to persons from any European country (other than the U.K. or Turkey but including Russia and all other countries to the west of the Urals) to enable themstudents to study for a graduate degree of the University in a science subject (including mathematics and medicine). The committee shall endeavour to ensure that at any one time one of the scholarships shall be held by a person from a country outside the European Union. <u>Preference will be given to candidates</u> ordinarily resident in any European country (other than the UK or Turkey but including Russia and all other countries to the west of the Urals).
- <u>72.</u>4. Any income not spent in any year shall be carried forward for expenditure in subsequent years.
- 72.5. Council shall have power to alter this decree Part from time to time, provided that the main object of the fund, as defined in clause 1 section 72.1 above, is always kept in view.

Regulations to be made by Council if the Statute is approved by Her Majesty in Council

- **2** This regulation shall be effective from the date on which the Statute approved by Congregation on [date] is approved by Her Majesty in Council.

(6) Withdrawal of Legislative Proposal: Griffiths Memorial Studentship

In exercise of its powers under Regulation 2.20 of Congregation Regulations 2 of 2002, Council has withdrawn this legislative proposal (for explanatory note and text of legislation see *Gazette* No 4983, 15 March 2012, p382). A revised legislative proposal, bringing the restriction on

candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be citizens of) the United Kingdom, is being submitted to Congregation in response to comments from the Charity Commission and discussion with the Privy Council Office.

(7) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal amends the nature of and selection committee for the studentship, and brings the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be citizens of) the United Kingdom.

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund, NOW THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In the Schedule to the Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002, pp133–59), after Part 78 insert the following new Part 79¹ (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'§138. Part 79: Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund

- 79.1. The University accepts with gratitude from Mr and Mrs John Griffiths a gift of assets to establish a fund in memory of their son, to be known as the Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund.
- <u>79.</u>2. The board of management for the fund shall be the Board of the Faculty of English Language and Literature, which shall make regulations concerning the award of the studentship.
- <u>79.</u>3. The net income of the fund shall be used, if there is a suitable candidate, to provide a studentship to a citizen of the United Kingdom to study for a taught graduate degree in a field relating to the history of the book in the British Isles before 1625 1550. Preference will be given to candidates ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom.
- <u>79.</u>4. The selection committee for the studentship shall consist of

(1) the Director of Graduate Studies of the Board of the Faculty of English Language and Literature;

(2) the Reader in Bibliography and Textual Criticism;

(3) the University Lecturer in Palaeography;

(4) the J.R.R. Tolkien Professor of English Literature and Language or his or her nominee:

(5), (6) two persons appointed by the Governing Body of St John's College.

Selection of the studentship recipient will be in line with Faculty graduate admissions procedures in consultation with the J.R.R. Tolkien Professor of English Literature and Language, the Jeremy Griffiths Professor of Medieval English Palaeography and St Hilda's College, as necessary.

<u>79.</u>5. The studentship shall be tenable at St John's Hilda's College.

79.6. The studentship shall normally be awarded for a period of two one years but and may be renewed for not more than one further year for a student continuing to the MPhil English.

79.7. Holders of the studentship shall be required to submit an annual report to the board of management, and continued tenure of the award shall depend upon satisfactory progress towards completion of the graduate degree concerned.

<u>79.</u>8. Income not expended in any year shall be carried forward for expenditure in subsequent years.

79.9. Council shall have power to amend this decree <u>Part</u> from time to time, provided that the purposes of the fund, as defined in ell. <u>sections 79.1</u>, <u>and 79.3</u>, and 5 above, shall always be kept in view.'

Regulations to be made by Council if the Statute is approved by Her Majesty in Council

(8) Withdrawal of Legislative Proposal: Prendergast Fund

In exercise of its powers under Regulation 2.20 of Congregation Regulations 2 of 2002, Council has withdrawn this legislative proposal (for explanatory note and text

of legislation see *Gazette* No 4997, 19 July 2012, p643). A revised legislative proposal, bringing the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by removing criteria which can only be met by Roman Catholic men and by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be born in, with parents who are citizens of) the Republic of Ireland, is being submitted to Congregation in response to comments from the Charity Commission and discussion with the Privy Council Office.

(9) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Prendergast Fund

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal brings the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by removing criteria which can only be met by Roman Catholic men and by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be born in, with parents who are citizens of) the Republic of Ireland

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Prendergast Fund, NOWTHE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In Part 47 of the Schedule to the University Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002) delete section 47.1 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'47.1. The bequest of the residue of the estate of Dr J.S. Prendergast shall be used:

(1) for the creation of two bursaries to be held by members of the Order of St Benedict belonging to Glenstal Abbey, Murroe, County Limerick, while they pursue their studies at St Benet's Hall, the maximum value of such bursaries to be set by the board of management for the bequest at its discretion; and

(2) to assist <u>students</u> persons born in the Republic of Ireland whose parents are citizens of the Republic of Ireland to proceed to the University for the purpose of either taking their degrees or undergoing postgraduate courses. <u>Preference will be given to candidates ordinarily resident in the Republic of Ireland.'</u>

(10) Voting on Resolution authorising the allocation of the Mathematical Institute building (Building 177) on St Giles'

Explanatory Note

On 24 March 2009, Congregation authorised the allocation of a site on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter for the construction of a new Mathematical Institute building. The Mathematical Institute relocated to the new building in September 2013.

The relocation of the Mathematical Institute frees up three properties, including its former main building (Building 177) on St Giles'. Council (on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee and its Buildings and Estates Subcommittee) proposes that this building be allocated to the Department of Statistics. This allocation will create a hub for Statistics in Oxford, consolidating activity that is currently split across three buildings, and provide space for planned growth. Statistics will continue to have one small satellite site (within the Henry Wellcome Building for Gene Function).

Text of Resolution

That, following the relocation of the Mathematical Institute to the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter, the Mathematical Institute building (Building 177) on St Giles' (approximately 1,895 sq m net usable area) be allocated to the Department of Statistics.

(11) Voting on Resolution authorising the allocation of space at the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter

Explanatory Note

The University's Museums all have need of space to house those artefacts for which there is insufficient space within their main buildings. For the long term, consideration is being given to the development of a Joint Museums' Collections Study Centre which would bring together all such artefacts on a single site. In the meantime, these needs are being met by various space allocations in and around Oxford. The Ashmolean Museum has, since 2005, used space in the Harkness Building on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter for this purpose. Congregation is asked to authorise the extended use of that space.

As the Harkness Building is marked for demolition in delivery of the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter Masterplan, only a temporary allocation is proposed.

Text of Resolution

That 919 sq m net usable area in the Harkness building be allocated to the Ashmolean Museum on a temporary basis until 31 December 2018, or, if earlier, until a Joint Museums' Collections Study Centre (or alternative long-term solution to the museums' need to accommodate their reserve collections) is available for use.

Planning and Resource Allocation and Education Committees

(1) OXFORD BURSARIES AND TUITION FEE REDUCTIONS

Explanatory Note

The following changes amend and update the existing regulations governing Oxford bursaries and tuition fee reductions, by providing for the following:

- addition of the new degree of MMathPhys (4-year course only) to the list of eligible courses
- ensuring consistent use of the term 'tuition fee reduction' throughout the appendix
- reflecting the name change from 'Student Finance Services European Team' to 'Student Finance Services Non UK Team'
- providing additional clarity on the appeals process
- including details of how continuing-year EU students can be financially assessed for the first time
- clarifying eligibility to fee reductions of graduate entry medicine students who do not receive fee support from the National Health Service/Student Loans Company
- providing further clarification of which PGCE students are eligible to be assessed for an Oxford Bursary.

New text has been underlined; deleted text has been struck through.

Text of Regulations

With immediate effect

In Examination Regulations 2013, delete from p1152, l1 to p1156, l13 and substitute:

'§6. Regulations for Oxford Bursaries and Tuition Fee Reductions

1. The arrangements described in this section apply to members of the University, entitled, in accordance with the Special Appendix to §5, to be charged fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, who are working in Oxford:

(i) for the Degree of BA or the Degree of MBiochem or the Degree of MChem or the Degree of MChem or the Degree of MMathCompSci or the Degree of MEarthSc or the Degree of MEng or the Degree of MMath or the Degree of MCompSci or the Degree of MCompPhil or the Degree of MPhys or the Degree of MPhysPhil or the Degree of MMathPhil, or the degree of MMathPhys (4-year course only), or the degree of BTh (full-time mode only);

- (ii) for the degree of BFA;
- (iii) for the First Examination for the Degree of BM;
- (iv) for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine:
- (v) for the Second Examination for the degree of BM;
- (vi) for the full-time Certificate or Diploma in Theological and Pastoral Studies:
- (vii) for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education.
- 2. All students described in cl1 above, who are entitled to receive support from a funding agency as described in cl6 below, will be eligible to be assessed for an Oxford bursary, subject to cl4. Bursary levels will be at the rates determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee. Bursary amounts are set out on the University website. Members of the University described in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) who are in their first year of study will be eligible to be assessed for an additional start-up bursary. Special regulations for $members \, of \, the \, University \, described \, in \, cl1$ (iv), (v), (vi) and (vii) are set out in cll1211 to 1514.

- 3. All students described in cl1, who are entitled to receive support from a funding agency as described in cl6 below, who commenced their programme of study on or after 1 September 2012, and who would otherwise be liable for the full University composition fee as described in §5, hereafter referred to as 'tuition fee', will be eligible to be assessed for a reduction in their tuition fee, subject to cl4. The level of the tuition fee reduction will be at the rates determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee. The levels of tuition fee reductions are set out on the University website. Special regulations for members of the University described in cl1 (iv), (v), (vi) and (vii) are set out in cll 1211 to 1514. Students will not be entitled to a cash equivalent of a tuition fee reduction.
- 4. If a student who is eligible to be charged the University composition tuition fee at the 'home' (and EU) rate is not entitled to means-tested maintenance support from his or her funding agency, he or she will not be eligible to be assessed for a bursary or tuition fee reduction in that academic year. Students who are entitled to be assessed by the Student Finance Services European Non UK Team, and who are entitled, in accordance with the Special Appendix to §5, to be charged fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, are eligible to be assessed for a bursary or tuition fee reduction, subject to the conditions referred to in paragraph 10.
- 5. Students who are repeating a year of their studies at Oxford will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction subject to cl4. Students repeating their first year or transferring to year one of a new course described in cl1 will not be eligible for any start-up bursary, and will receive a <u>tuition</u> fee reduction at the level received by eligible students after their first year.
- 6. Requirements for the assessment of <u>a</u> student's household income are as follows:
 - (i) A member of the University as described in cl1 can only be considered for a bursary or tuition fee reduction if he or she is first financially assessed by his or her funding agency and if consent has been given for the University to access this information. Financial assessments will only be accepted from Student Finance England, Student Finance Northern Ireland, Student Finance Wales, the Student Awards Agency for Scotland, the Student Finance Services European Non UK Team, the Student Loans Company (SLC) or the National Health Service (NHS). The University

- will only base a student's bursary and/ or tuition fee reduction upon income information provided to it via the SLC above agencies;
- (ii) Special regulations for financial assessments apply to members of the University who are working in Oxford for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine and Second Examination for the degree of BM. These are set out in cll1211 and 1312;
- (iii) 'Home' students are obliged to accept any maintenance grant they become eligible for as a result of financial assessment by their funding agency in order to be eligible to be assessed for a bursary and/or a tuition fee reduction. They 'Home' (and EU) students are not required by the University to take out a maintenance loan or tuition fee loan from their funding agency to be eligible to be assessed for a bursary or for a tuition fee reduction respectively.
- 7. The annual deadlines for the assessment of bursaries and tuition fee reductions shall be as follows:
 - (i) To be assessed for an Oxford bursary and/or tuition fee reduction students must comply with the application deadlines set by their funding agency. Students who fail to comply with requests to provide information to their agency will not be assessed by the University after the deadlines listed in el7 (ii) and (iii) below;
 - (ii) To be assessed, or reassessed, for an Oxford bursary students must ensure that they have provided all information to their funding agency in time to ensure their assessment is complete and available to the University from the SLC or other approved agency by 30 May of the academic year in which they wish to be considered for a bursary;
 - (iii) To be assessed, or reassessed, for a tuition fee reduction students must ensure that they have provided all information to their funding agency in time to ensure their assessment is complete and available to the University from the SLC or other approved agency by 20 December of the academic year in which they wish to be considered for a tuition fee reduction:
 - (iv) Any student who wishes to be considered for a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction, or a change in their bursary and/or tuition fee reduction after the dates listed in cl 7 (ii) and (iii) must submit their case for a reassessment to the Student Financial

- Support section (Examination Schools, Oxford OX1 4BG) by 30 May of that academic year. The request must detail when the student applied for funding, what difficulties he or she had in being assessed correctly, and what action he or she took to rectify this. It must also contain the final financial notification for that year, if available, and any evidence of the difficulties which he or she has experienced. If the final financial notification received by the student from the funding agency for that academic year is still not available to the University by 30 May of that academic year, the student will have until 20 December of the following academic year to submit the final financial notification for a re-assessment to be completed by the University.
- (iv) Any student who wishes to be considered for a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction, or for a change in their bursary and/or tuition fee reduction after the dates listed in (ii) and (iii) above must submit a case to the Student Financial Support section (Examination Schools, Oxford OX1 4BG) detailing the delay relating to their financial assessment by 30 May of that academic year. The student must confirm when he or she applied for funding, what difficulties he or she had in being assessed correctly, the action he or she took to rectify this, and provide any corresponding evidence. The student will be expected to respond in a timely manner to any requests for further information from Student Financial Support. The student must also provide the final financial notification for that year as soon as it is available and no later than 20 December of the following academic year. If the student is in their final year of study the deadline for submission of the financial support notification is Friday of Week 9 of Trinity term of that year.
- 8. The arrangements for adjustments to bursaries during an academic year are as follows:
 - (i) Each of the regulations in this section <u>clause</u> will be subject to the dates and regulations listed in cl7;
 - (ii) Students who have received an overpayment of their bursary following a revised household income assessment will not be asked to repay any funds, unless the bursary was obtained due to incorrect information being knowingly submitted to the student's funding agency by the student or his or her sponsor;

- (iii) If a student's revised household income assessment results in an increased bursary entitlement, subsequent bursary payments will be adjusted upwards to reflect the student's increased entitlement for the whole year. The increased bursary payments will be calculated as if the student had been eligible for that level from the start of the academic year;
- (iv) If a student fails to provide information requested by their funding agency, as a result of which the financial assessment is withdrawn, the University will suspend bursary payments until the student's assessment has been completed by the funding agency, at which point their bursary entitlement will be re-assessed;
- (v) The amount paid per term will be one third of the total annual bursary to which they are the student is eligible. Students will be expected to repay their bursary for any term where they have suspended or withdrawn before the Monday of Week 2 bursary payment date, currently Week 4 in Michaelmas term and Week 2 in Hilary and Trinity terms.
- 9. The arrangements for adjustments to fee liability and tuition fee reductions during an academic year are as follows:
 - (i) Each of the regulations in this section clause will be subject to the dates and regulations listed in cl7;
 - (ii) Students whose revised household income assessment has increased will not be liable for an increased tuition fee, unless the initial tuition fee reduction was obtained due to incorrect information being knowingly submitted to the student's funding agency by the student or his or her sponsor;
 - (iii) If a student's revised household income assessment has reduced, resulting in an entitlement to a larger tuition fee reduction, he or she will receive an additional tuition fee reduction. The level of the <u>tuition</u> fee reduction will calculated as if the student had been eligible for that level from the start of the academic year.
- 10. Household income will be assessed in the first year of study only for students who are entitled to be financially assessed by the Student Finance European team, and who are entitled, in accordance with the Special Appendix to §5, to be charged fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate. These students will not be automatically re-assessed each year. Students who wish

- to have their household income reassessed must submit a request to the Student Financial Support section, Examination Schools, Oxford, OX1 4BG.
- H10. The arrangements for changes to bursary and tuition fee reduction entitlement between years are as follows:
 - (i) Students entitled, in accordance with the Special Appendix to §5, to be charged fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, and who are entitled to be financially assessed by Student Finance England, Student Finance Northern Ireland, Student Finance Scotland Wales, the Student Awards Agency for Scotland, the Student Loans Company or the National Health Service, are required by these funding agencies to apply for financial support each year if they wish to access means-tested support. The assessment of their household income by their funding agency may change from year to year, and consequently their entitlement to a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction is subject to change each year. Special regulations are set out in cll1211 and 1312 for financial assessments for members of the University working for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine (Part II) and Bachelor of Medicine (Second Examination);
 - (ii) Students entitled, in accordance with the Special Appendix to §5, to be charged fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, and who are entitled to be financially assessed by the Student Finance Services Non UK Team may have their household income assessed in the first year of study only. Students who wish to have their household income reassessed or continuing year students who wish to be financially assessed for the first time must submit a request to the Student Financial Support section, Examination Schools, Oxford, OX14BG.
 - (ii)(iii) Students will only be eligible to be assessed for a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction for the period in which they are entitled, in accordance with the Special Appendix to §5, to be charged tuition fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate.
- 1211. Special regulations apply for members of the University who are working in Oxford for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine (Part II) and Bachelor of Medicine (Second Examination) where these students were admitted on the accelerated four-year course. These are as follows:
 - (i) The household income of students in years two to four of their course will be

- estimated on the basis of the financial assessment of their household income in year one of their course or from their latest NHS (or corresponding authority) bursary assessment as evidenced by the student;
- (ii) Students will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction in the first year of their course. Those students not eligible for fee support from the NHS/SLC because their funding agency does not provide fee support for this course will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction in all years of their course where household income will be estimated on the basis of the financial assessment of their household income in year one of their course. A tuition fee reduction is not available to those students who are eligible for fee support from the NHS/SLC after the first year of their course. The level of the tuition fee reduction will correspond to the reduction available to students described in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) after their first year of studies;
- (iii) Students will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary for all years of the course. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) in their first year of study.
- 1312. Special regulations apply for members of the University who are working in Oxford for the Bachelor of Medicine (Second Examination) in years four to six of the six-year medicine course:
 - (i) The household income of students in years five and six of the six-year medicine course will be estimated on the basis of the financial assessment of their household income in year four of their course or from their latest NHS (or corresponding authority) bursary assessment as evidenced by the student;
 - (ii) Students in year four of the course will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction. The level of the <u>tuition</u> fee reduction will correspond to the reduction available to those eligible students described in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) after their first year of studies;
 - (iii) Students will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary for all years of the course. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) in their first year of study.
- 1413. Special regulations apply for members of the University who are working in Oxford

for the Certificate or Diploma in Theological and Pastoral Studies:

(i) Students will be eligible to be assessed for the tuition fee reductions advertised on the Faculty of Theology and Religion website, and determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;

(ii) Students will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary for all years of the course. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) in their first year of study.

1514. Members of the University working in Oxford for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee. The level of the fee reduction will correspond to the reduction available to those eligible students described in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) after their first year of studies. They will only be eligible to be assessed for an Oxford bursary if they do not receive a Training and Development Agency (TDA) bursary. their full entitlement to government maintenance support (including a government teacher training bursary or affiliated scholarship) amounts to less than £9,000. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1 (i), (ii) and (iii) in their first year of study.

1615. Students who have completed the part-time Foundation Certificate in History or English Language and Literature at Oxford with the Department for Continuing Education and who progress directly to the second year of the BA in History or the BA in English Language and Literature are eligible to be assessed for any start-up bursary and/ or enhanced tuition fee reduction that is normally available to students described in cl1(i), (ii) and (iii) in their first year.

1716. If a student believes that his or her bursary or <u>tuition</u> fee reduction has not been processed according to these regulations and/or the bursary and tuition fee reduction rates approved by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, he or she should contact the Student Financial Support section, Examination Schools, Oxford OX1 4BG. Any question of doubt or difficulty relating to the eligibility of individual students for tuition fee reductions and/or Oxford bursaries shall be determined by the Fees Panel, as described in §5, cl13 (d) and (e).'

(2) CONTINUATION CHARGE

Explanatory Note

In 2010, Council agreed to introduce a University continuation charge, to be paid by research students who start their programme of study in or after September 2011, and who exceed the standard period of University fee liability: details are given at: www.ox.ac.uk/feesandfunding/fees/ information/maxlib/pgrccfaq.

The process by which payment of the continuation charge should be made is now in place, and the following changes make provision for this. It also clarifies that the level of termly charge for part-time students will be half the termly rate payable by full-time students. New text has been underlined.

Text of Regulations

With immediate effect

In Examination Regulations 2013, p1156, delete ll26-7 and substitute:

'The continuation charge will first become payable in 2013-14, and the level of the charge in that year will be £400 per term for full-time students. The termly charge for part-time students will be half of the termly rate payable by full-time students. The continuation charge is payable on or before the seventh day of each Full Term or by the date of submission of the thesis, whichever is earlier, by any student who fulfils the criteria defined in this section. The full termly charge is payable regardless of the point in term at which the thesis is submitted. A thesis submitted other than during Full Term shall be deemed to have been submitted during the previous term.

This change of name reflects more broadly that it is an "Art School" that covers all facets of art from drawing and painting through to sculpturing, film-making and performing.

'Part 7: Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art

- 7.1. There shall be a Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art consisting of:
 - (1), (2) two persons appointed by the Humanities Board, one of whom shall chair the committee:
 - (3) the Ruskin Master of Drawing:
 - (4)-(7) four other persons holding teaching posts in the Ruskin School, who shall be elected by all those holding such posts except the Ruskin Master of Drawing under arrangements as per Council Regulation 19 of 2002, regulations 3136-3944;
 - (8) a person appointed by the Committee of Senior Tutors.
- 7.2. (1) The committee may co-opt not more than five persons as additional members.
 - (2) The period of office for appointed, elected, and co-opted members shall be three years, and no appointed, elected or co-opted member shall serve more than two consecutive full terms of office. Casual terms of office shall not count towards this limit.

- (5) a person appointed by the Humanities Board;
- (6), (7) two persons appointed by the Committee for the Ruskin School of Drawing and Fine Art;
- (8) a person appointed by the Visitors of the Ashmolean Museum;
- (9) one person appointed by the Committee for the History of Art.
- 3. The interest on the capital sum accepted by the University from the late John Ruskin under the Deed of Declaration of Trust 1875 for the endowment of a Mastership of Drawing shall be used towards defraying the stipend of the Ruskin Master.'

'§316. Part 73: Scatcherd Scholarships

- 73.1. The University has received with gratitude a legacy from Mrs Jane Ledig-Rowohlt to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Scatcherd Scholarship Fund ("the Fund").
- 73.2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets (if any) in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 73.3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards: (i) awarding scholarships to students of Oxford University of British citizenship allowing them to engage in

- study or research in other countries; and (ii) awarding scholarships to citizens of with preference being given to students ordinarily resident in a nation of continental Europe from the Atlantic to the Urals with the exception of Turkey.
- 73.4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income and capital, shall be the responsibility of the board of management of the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Fund.
- 73.5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 73.6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Scholarship.
- 73.7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 73.8. Regulations Sections 73.1-73.10 shall be deemed to be trust Regulations provisions under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 73.9. Subject to regulation section 73.10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 73.10. Any amendment to regulation section 73.3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

'§317. Part 72: Scatcherd <u>Science</u> Scholarships

72.1. The University accepts from the Trustee of the Campaign for Oxford Trust Fund the sum of £621,000, made possible by an extremely generous benefaction from Mrs Jane Ledig-Rowohlt, to establish a fund, the net income of which shall be applied in the funding of Scatcherd Science

Scholarships for the support of graduate study in science.

72.2. The fund shall be administered by the International Committee. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the board of management of the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Fund.

72.3. The scholarships shall be awarded to persons from any European country (other than the U.K. or Turkey but including Russia and all other countries to the west of the Urals) to enable themstudents to study for a graduate degree of the University in a science subject (including mathematics and medicine). The committee shall endeavour to ensure that at any one time one of the scholarships shall be held by a person from a country outside the European Union. Preference will be given to candidates ordinarily resident in any European country (other than the UK or Turkey but including Russia and all other countries to the west of the Urals).

72.4. Any income not spent in any year shall be carried forward for expenditure in subsequent years.

<u>72.</u>5. Council shall have power to alter this decree <u>Part</u> from time to time, provided that the main object of the fund, as defined in <u>clause1 section 72.1</u> above, is always kept in view.'

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund, NOW THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In the Schedule to the Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002, pp133–59), after Part 78 insert the following new Part 79¹ (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'§138. Part 79: Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund

<u>79.</u>1. The University accepts with gratitude from Mr and Mrs John Griffiths a gift of assets to establish a fund in memory of their son, to be known as the Jeremy Griffiths Memorial Studentship Fund.

<u>79.</u>2. The board of management for the fund shall be the Board of the Faculty of English Language and Literature, which shall make regulations concerning the award of the studentship.

79.3. The net income of the fund shall be used, if there is a suitable candidate, to provide a studentship to a citizen of the United Kingdom to study for a taught graduate degree in a field relating to the history of the book in the British Isles before 1625 1550. Preference will be given to candidates ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom.

<u>79.</u>4. The selection committee for the studentship shall consist of

Selection of the studentship recipient will be in line with Faculty graduate admissions procedures in consultation with the J.R.R. Tolkien Professor of English Literature and Language, the Jeremy Griffiths Professor of Medieval English Palaeography and St Hilda's College, as necessary.

<u>79.</u>5. The studentship shall be tenable at St John's <u>Hilda's</u> College.

79.6. The studentship shall normally be awarded for a period of two one years but and may be renewed for not more than one further year for a student continuing to the MPhil English.

79.7. Holders of the studentship shall be required to submit an annual report to the board of management, and continued tenure of the award shall depend upon satisfactory progress towards completion of the graduate degree concerned.

<u>79.</u>8. Income not expended in any year shall be carried forward for expenditure in subsequent years.

79.9. Council shall have power to amend this decree Part from time to time, provided that the purposes of the fund, as defined in ell: sections 79.1, and 79.3, and 5 above, shall always be kept in view.'

Regulations to be made by Council if the Statute is approved by Her Majesty in Council

1 In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, delete §138 and renumber existing §§139–394 as §§138–393.

2 This regulation shall be effective from the date on which the Statute approved by Congregation on [date] is approved by Her Majesty in Council.

(8) Withdrawal of Legislative Proposal: Prendergast Fund

In exercise of its powers under Regulation 2.20 of Congregation Regulations 2 of 2002, Council has withdrawn this legislative proposal (for explanatory note and text of legislation see *Gazette* No 4997, 19 July 2012, p643). A revised legislative proposal, bringing the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by removing criteria which can only be met by Roman Catholic men and by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be born in, with parents who are citizens of) the Republic of Ireland, is being submitted

to Congregation in response to comments from the Charity Commission and discussion with the Privy Council Office.

(9) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Prendergast Fund

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal brings the restriction on candidates in line with the Equality Act 2010 by removing criteria which can only be met by Roman Catholic men and by giving preference to persons who are ordinarily resident in (rather than requiring that candidates be born in, with parents who are citizens of) the Republic of Ireland.

WHEREAS it is expedient to change the existing provisions governing the Prendergast Fund, NOW THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923, and of all other powers enabling it, ENACTS, subject to the approval of Her Majesty in Council, AS FOLLOWS.

In Part 47 of the Schedule to the University Statutes (Supplement (1) to *Gazette* No 4633, 9 October 2002) delete section 47.1 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'47.1. The bequest of the residue of the estate of Dr J.S. Prendergast shall be used:

(1) for the creation of two bursaries to be held by members of the Order of St Benedict belonging to Glenstal Abbey, Murroe, County Limerick, while they pursue their studies at St Benet's Hall, the maximum value of such bursaries to be set by the board of management for the bequest at its discretion; and

(2) to assist <u>students</u> persons born in the Republic of Ireland whose parents are citizens of the Republic of Ireland to proceed to the University for the purpose of either taking their degrees or undergoing postgraduate courses. <u>Preference will be given to candidates ordinarily resident in the Republic of Ireland.'</u>

(10) Voting on Resolution authorising the allocation of the Mathematical Institute building (Building 177) on St Giles'

Explanatory Note

On 24 March 2009, Congregation authorised the allocation of a site on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter for the construction of a new Mathematical Institute building. The Mathematical Institute relocated to the new building in September 2013.

The relocation of the Mathematical Institute frees up three properties, including its former main building (Building 177) on St Giles'. Council (on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee and its Buildings and Estates Subcommittee) proposes that this building be allocated to the Department of Statistics. This allocation will create a hub for Statistics in Oxford, consolidating activity that is currently split across three buildings, and provide space for planned growth. Statistics will continue to have one small satellite site (within the Henry Wellcome Building for Gene Function).

Text of Resolution

That, following the relocation of the Mathematical Institute to the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter, the Mathematical Institute building (Building 177) on St Giles' (approximately 1,895 sq m net usable area) be allocated to the Department of Statistics.

(11) Voting on Resolution authorising the allocation of space at the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter

Explanatory Note

The University's Museums all have need of space to house those artefacts for which there is insufficient space within their main buildings. For the long term, consideration is being given to the development of a Joint Museums' Collections Study Centre which would bring together all such artefacts on a single site. In the meantime, these needs are being met by various space allocations in and around Oxford. The Ashmolean Museum has, since 2005, used space in the Harkness Building on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter for this purpose. Congregation is asked to authorise the extended use of that space.

As the Harkness Building is marked for demolition in delivery of the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter Masterplan, only a temporary allocation is proposed.

 ${\it Text of Resolution}$

That 919 sq m net usable area in the Harkness building be allocated to the Ashmolean Museum on a temporary basis until 31 December 2018, or, if earlier, until a Joint Museums' Collections Study Centre (or alternative long-term solution to the museums' need to accommodate their reserve collections) is available for use.

Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XI: University Discipline

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal amends the legislation relating to student disciplinary procedures. The amendments will enable the Student Disciplinary Panel to dismiss insubstantial appeals against immediate fines imposed by the Proctors (eg for antisocial behaviour following University examinations), and to allow the Proctors to implement a fines escalator for non-payment of fines. The aim is to improve the operation of the procedures, while safeguarding equity and the principles of natural justice. The opportunity is also being taken to clarify an existing provision and update an obsolete reference.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend Statute XI concerning University discipline, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

- **1** In Statute XI concerning University Discipline delete existing section 11(1) and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '11.(1) The Student Disciplinary
 Panel shall also have the function of
 hearingdetermining, in accordance with the
 procedures set out in the regulations made
 under section 20 of this statute, appeals
 made by student members under sections
 27, 34 (2) and 41 (5).'
- **2** Ibid, delete existing section 13 and substitute (new text underlined):
- '13. If a student member is aggrieved by a decision of the Student Disciplinary Panel he or she may <u>apply for permission to</u> appeal to the Student Appeal Panel.'
- **3** Ibid, delete existing section 29(1) and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- If the Student Disciplinary Panel, the Student Appeal Panel, or the Proctors in the course of proceedings or an investigation

- under this statute has or have reasonable grounds for believing that a student member is suffering from a serious problem arising from ill-health the Panel concerned or the Proctors shall refer the student to the University's Occupational Health Service Fitness to Study Panel in accordance with the procedures set out in Part B of Statute XIII.
- **4** Ibid, delete existing section 40 and substitute (new text underlined):
- '40.(1) Where a fine is imposed upon a student member, or an order is made requiring a student member to pay compensation, under the provisions of this statute, the fine or compensation shall be paid within seven days (or two days, in the case of immediate fines imposed under section 23) whether or not an application for permission to appeal or an appeal is pending, unless the person or body which imposed the fine or compensation, or the Panel to which any application for permission to appeal or appeal is made, makes an order, in accordance with procedure set out in regulations made under section 20 of this statute, suspending or deferring payment.
 - (2) If the fine or compensation is not paid in time the Panel which imposed it (or, in the case of a fine, escalated fine or compensation imposed by the Proctors, the Student Disciplinary Panel) may rusticate the student member for such period as it thinks fit, in accordance with procedure set out in regulations made under section 20 of this statute.
 - (3) Any fine or compensation imposed by any Panel or by the Proctors shall be paid through the Clerk to the Proctors.'

Changes in Regulations to be made by Council if the changes to Statute XI are approved

- 1 In Council Regulations 3 of 2006 concerning Regulations for the Student Disciplinary Panel, insert new regulation 4.2 as follows and renumber subsequent regulations accordingly:
- '4.2 (1) When, under Statute XI, Part C, section 23 (3), the appeal relates to the imposition of an "immediate fine", permission to appeal must first be sought, in writing and through the Secretary, from the Chairman or a Vice-Chairman of the Student Disciplinary Panel within seven days of the imposition of the fine.
 - (2) The Secretary shall then refer the Application for Permission to Appeal to the Proctors within three working days.

- (3) The Proctors must then make any response to the Application to the Secretary within seven days.
- (4) The Secretary shall then refer both the Application and the Proctors' response to it to the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman within three working days.
- (5) The Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or a Vice-Chairman may request the applicant and/or the Proctors to provide any further information relevant to the proposed appeal which he or she may require in determining whether permission to appeal should be granted.
- (6) The application shall be determined without a hearing on the basis of the documents submitted unless the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or a Vice-Chairman considers that, in the interests of justice, a hearing should take place.
- (7)(i) The relevant Student Disciplinary
 Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman
 shall, following receipt of all relevant
 papers, make a decision as to whether
 the application will be allowed or
 not allowed, unless he or she decides
 in accordance with (6) above that a
 hearing should take place.
 - (ii) If the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman decides that a hearing should take place he or she will communicate that decision to the Secretary who will inform the applicant and the Proctors of the date and time when and the place in Oxford at which the application will be heard.
 - (iii) The application will be heard by the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman sitting alone.
- (8) In deciding whether to give permission to appeal the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall have regard to all the circumstances of the case including:
 - (i) the importance of the case to the appellant; and
 - (ii) whether the proposed appeal has reasonable prospects of success.
- (9) The Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall within seven days of receipt of all papers or of any hearing, if later, send his or her decision with reasons in writing to the applicant and the Proctors via the

Secretary of the Student Disciplinary Panel.

(10) If the Permission to Appeal is granted, then the Secretary shall convene a hearing of the Student Disciplinary Panel in accordance with Part 4 of these regulations.

(11) If the Permission to Appeal is refused, then the applicant shall have the right to make an Application for Permission to Appeal to the Student Appeal Panel, in accordance with Part 8 of these regulations.'

2 Ibid, delete existing regulation 6.1 and substitute (new text underlined):

'6.1. If a student who is ordered to pay a fine or compensation by the Proctors, the Disciplinary Panel, or the Appeal Panel under the provisions of Statute XI or any regulations made under it fails to do so within the time for making payment, the Proctors shall (subject to the provisions of regulation 6.2 below) prepare and deliver to the Secretary a notice of hearing stating:

- (1) the date on which the order for payment was made;
- (2) the amount of the payment;
- (3) the date or dates by which payment should have been made;
- (4) the amounts (if any) which have been paid and the date of payment; and
- (5) the amount due.'

3 Ibid, insert new regulation 6.2 as follows and renumber subsequent regulations accordingly:

'6.2. If a student who is ordered to pay a fine by the Proctors (including an "immediate fine") under the provisions of Statute XI, or any regulation made under it, fails to do so within the time limit for making the payment, then the fine may increase in accordance with Council Regulations 6 of 2006. In such cases the Proctors shall not refer the matter to the Student Disciplinary Panel unless the fine remains unpaid at the end of the maximum escalation period.'

- **4** In Council Regulations 6 of 2006, concerning Regulations for Fines and Compensation imposed under Statute XI, delete existing regulation 2 and substitute as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '2. (a) If a fine or compensation order imposed under section 25 (3) (a) of Statute XI is not paid before the specified deadline for payment and no order allowing deferral of payment

pending an appeal has been granted (in circumstances where there is provision for such an order to be made), the student member concerned shall be liable to pay the original fine or compensation order together with:

(i) an additional fine of £25 for the first seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding;

(ii) a further additional fine of £25 for the subsequent seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding; and

(iii) after fourteen calendar days, a further additional fine of £25 for the subsequent seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding.

(b) The Proctors shall refer to the Student Disciplinary Panel the case of any student member who fails to pay a fine or compensation order within twenty-one calendar days of the original deadline for payment.

23. The maximum laid down in regulation 1 above, and the additional fines for non-payment specified in regulation 2 (a) above, shall be reviewed annually by the Proctors.'

Renaming of the Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer Professorship of Commercial Law

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Social Sciences Division and the Faculty of Law, rename the Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer Professorship of Commercial Law to reflect recent changes to the new agreement between the Law Faculty and the law firm Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer LLP.

Text of Regulations

1 In Schedule A of Council Regulations 3 of 2004, concerning statutory professorships, delete 'Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer Professorship of Commercial Law' and substitute 'Freshfields Professorship of Commercial Law'.

2 In Council Regulations 19 of 2002, Schedule of Professors and Readers, delete 'Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer Professorship of Commercial Law' and substitute 'Freshfields Professorship of Commercial Law'.

3 In Sect III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, delete §176 and substitute (deleted text struck through):

'§176. Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer Professor of Commercial Law

- 1. The Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer Professor of Commercial Law shall lecture and give instruction in Commercial Law.
- 2. The Professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council; (2) the head of the college to which the Professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any regulation in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;

(4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;

(6) a person appointed by the Social Sciences Divisional Board;

(7)-(9) three persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Law.

3. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.'

Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XI: University Discipline

Explanatory Note

The following legislative proposal amends the legislation relating to student disciplinary procedures. The amendments will enable the Student Disciplinary Panel to dismiss insubstantial appeals against immediate fines imposed by the Proctors (eg for antisocial behaviour following University examinations), and to allow the Proctors to implement a fines escalator for non-payment of fines. The aim is to improve the operation of the procedures, while safeguarding equity and the principles of natural justice. The opportunity is also being taken to clarify an existing provision and update an obsolete reference.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend Statute XI concerning University discipline, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

- **1** In Statute XI, concerning University Discipline, delete existing section 11(1) and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '11.(1) The Student Disciplinary
 Panel shall also have the function of
 hearingdetermining, in accordance with the
 procedures set out in the regulations made
 under section 20 of this statute, appeals
 made by student members under sections
 27, 34 (2) and 41 (5).'
- **2** Ibid, delete existing section 13 and substitute (new text underlined):
- '13. If a student member is aggrieved by a decision of the Student Disciplinary Panel he or she may apply for permission to appeal to the Student Appeal Panel.'
- **3** Ibid, delete existing section 29(1) and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '29.(1) If the Student Disciplinary Panel, the Student Appeal Panel, or the Proctors in the course of proceedings or an investigation under this statute has or have reasonable grounds for believing that a student member is suffering from a serious problem arising from ill-health the Panel concerned or the Proctors shall refer the student to the University's Occupational Health Service Fitness to Study Panel in accordance with the procedures set out in Part B of Statute XIII.'
- **4** Ibid, delete existing section 40 and substitute (new text underlined):
- '40.(1) Where a fine is imposed upon a student member, or an order is made requiring a student member to pay

- compensation, under the provisions of this statute, the fine or compensation shall be paid within seven days (or two days, in the case of immediate fines imposed under section 23) whether or not an application for permission to appeal or an appeal is pending, unless the person or body which imposed the fine or compensation, or the Panel to which any application for permission to appeal or appeal is made, makes an order, in accordance with procedure set out in regulations made under section 20 of this statute, suspending or deferring payment.
- (2) If the fine or compensation is not paid in time the Panel which imposed it (or, in the case of a fine, escalated fine or compensation imposed by the Proctors, the Student Disciplinary Panel) may rusticate the student member for such period as it thinks fit, in accordance with procedure set out in regulations made under section 20 of this statute.
- (3) Any fine or compensation imposed by any Panel or by the Proctors shall be paid through the Clerk to the Proctors.'

Changes in Regulations to be made by Council if the changes to Statute XI are approved

- 1 In Council Regulations 3 of 2006, concerning Regulations for the Student Disciplinary Panel, insert new regulation 4.2 as follows and renumber subsequent regulations accordingly:
- '4.2 (1) When, under Statute XI, Part C, section 23 (3), the appeal relates to the imposition of an "immediate fine", permission to appeal must first be sought, in writing and through the Secretary, from the Chairman or a Vice-Chairman of the Student Disciplinary Panel within seven days of the imposition of the fine.
 - (2) The Secretary shall then refer the Application for Permission to Appeal to the Proctors within three working days.
 - (3) The Proctors must then make any response to the Application to the Secretary within seven days.
 - (4) The Secretary shall then refer both the Application and the Proctors' response to it to the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman within three working days.
 - (5) The Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or a Vice-Chairman may request the applicant and/or the Proctors to provide any further information relevant to the proposed appeal which

- he or she may require in determining whether permission to appeal should be granted.
- (6) The application shall be determined without a hearing on the basis of the documents submitted unless the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or a Vice-Chairman considers that, in the interests of justice, a hearing should take place.
- (7)(i) The relevant Student Disciplinary
 Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman
 shall, following receipt of all relevant
 papers, make a decision as to whether
 the application will be allowed or
 not allowed, unless he or she decides
 in accordance with (6) above that a
 hearing should take place.
 - (ii) If the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman decides that a hearing should take place he or she will communicate that decision to the Secretary who will inform the applicant and the Proctors of the date and time when and the place in Oxford at which the application will be heard.
 - (iii) The application will be heard by the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman sitting alone.
- (8) In deciding whether to give permission to appeal the Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall have regard to all the circumstances of the case including:
 - (i) the importance of the case to the appellant; and
 - (ii) whether the proposed appeal has reasonable prospects of success.
- (9) The Student Disciplinary Panel Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall within seven days of receipt of all papers or of any hearing, if later, send his or her decision with reasons in writing to the applicant and the Proctors via the Secretary of the Student Disciplinary Panel.
- (10) If the Permission to Appeal is granted, then the Secretary shall convene a hearing of the Student Disciplinary Panel in accordance with Part 4 of these regulations.
- (11) If the Permission to Appeal is refused, then the applicant shall have the right to make an Application for Permission to Appeal to the Student Appeal Panel, in accordance with Part 8 of these regulations.'

- **2** Ibid, delete existing regulation 6.1 and substitute (new text underlined):
- '6.1. If a student who is ordered to pay a fine or compensation by the Proctors, the Disciplinary Panel, or the Appeal Panel under the provisions of Statute XI or any regulations made under it fails to do so within the time for making payment, the Proctors shall (subject to the provisions of regulation 6.2 below) prepare and deliver to the Secretary a notice of hearing stating:
 - (1) the date on which the order for payment was made;
 - (2) the amount of the payment;
 - (3) the date or dates by which payment should have been made;
 - (4) the amounts (if any) which have been paid and the date of payment; and
 - (5) the amount due.'
- **3** Ibid, insert new regulation 6.2 as follows and renumber subsequent regulations accordingly:
- '6.2. If a student who is ordered to pay a fine by the Proctors (including an "immediate fine") under the provisions of Statute XI, or any regulation made under it, fails to do so within the time limit for making the payment, then the fine may increase in accordance with Council Regulations 6 of 2006. In such cases the Proctors shall not refer the matter to the Student Disciplinary Panel unless the fine remains unpaid at the end of the maximum escalation period.'
- **4** In Council Regulations 6 of 2006, concerning Regulations for Fines and Compensation imposed under Statute XI, delete existing regulation 2 and substitute as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '2. (a) If a fine or compensation order imposed under section 25 (3) (a) of Statute XI is not paid before the specified deadline for payment and no order allowing deferral of payment pending an appeal has been granted (in circumstances where there is provision for such an order to be made), the student member concerned shall be liable to pay the original fine or compensation order together with:

(i) an additional fine of £25 for the first seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding:

(ii) a further additional fine of £25 for the subsequent seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding; and

- (iii) after fourteen calendar days, a further additional fine of £25 for the subsequent seven calendar days or part thereof during which the payment is outstanding.
- (b) The Proctors shall refer to the Student Disciplinary Panel the case of any student member who fails to pay a fine or compensation order within twenty-one calendar days of the original deadline for payment.
- 23. The maximum laid down in regulation 1 above, and the additional fines for non-payment specified in regulation 2 (a) above, shall be reviewed annually by the Proctors.'

WADHAM COLLEGE: REVISED STATUTES

The Committee on Statutes before the Privy Council, acting under authority delegated to it by Council, is minded to give consent on behalf of the University to the revised statutes of Wadham College, approved by the Governing Body on 23 May 2013, in so far as such consent is required by section 7(2) of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act. 1923. The consent of the committee to the amendments to the statutes will be effective 11 days after publication of this notice unless written notice of a resolution, signed by at least 20 members of Congregation and calling upon Council to withhold that consent, has been given to the Registrar by noon on Monday, 21 October.

The effect of the amendments is to (i) delete all references to a prescribed retirement age for the Warden and Fellows following the decision of the college to introduce an Employer Justified Retirement Age (details of which set out in the college's by-laws); (ii) delete the age restriction on the elections to Emeritus Fellowships; and (iii) introduce a new statute to clarify the Governing Body's powers of delegation.

Oration by the Vice-Chancellor

Colleagues, Members of Congregation, thank you for joining me in Convocation House today. On previous occasions when I have stood here to deliver the annual oration of the Vice-Chancellor to the University, my focus has been pretty remorselessly outward looking. And rightly so, I would argue, given the scale and rate of the changes that have swept through the world of higher education in this country and beyond.

But today I want to do something a little different. I want to turn the lens round and focus more on ourselves. To hold a mirror up, if you will, to the University and see what emerges; to take a calm, reflective look - neither vain nor cynical - at how we are doing; at how we can protect, preserve and nourish where appropriate - but also develop and change, where both opportunity and necessity point.

As we know, we never see ourselves in the mirror as others see us. But that doesn't mean that we are rendered incapable of sound or self-judgement. Calm, intelligent scrutiny of the evidence is one of the defining hallmarks of outstanding scholarship, the kind of scholarship that has stood this ancient institution in such good stead for so many centuries, and continues to do so today.

My intention to hold up a mirror to Oxford is not, you will be pleased to hear, a random nor, I hope, a quixotic one. Though I am alive to the admonition of Jean Cocteau that 'mirrors should think longer before they reflect'.

No, my intention corresponds to the moment in which we find ourselves. While it would be fatuous to claim that the winds of change in higher education have faded to a dead calm, they have certainly not changed direction radically in recent months. Whatever you may think of the way in which higher education is now being funded in this country, it seems highly unlikely that any government is going to tear it all up in the foreseeable future and start again. We are still more than 18 months away from a general election in which, whatever the prevailing political rhetoric, the state of the economy will continue to dictate some hard facts. In that sense the higher education policy landscape is set for the time being. The right moment, I would contend, to take a breather and get out that mirror.

I also have a more personal reason for choosing this moment for a little institutional self-scrutiny. I am today embarking on my fifth year as Vice-Chancellor and, while you will never hear me claim that I know all about the University of Oxford, I hope I have enough accumulated knowledge, and certainly enough real affection, for my thoughts to have a modicum of substance.

In one sense, of course, the University has been engaged in a process of self-scrutiny for some months, with the careful development of our newly published strategic plan. It is a document that provides an important guide both to where we are and where we wish to be. Rather than rehearse it here I want to focus on three key areas. These are Funding Oxford, Diversifying Oxford, and Digitising Oxford.

First let me focus on funding. I've already mentioned that most contentious aspect of HE finance: the funding of undergraduate education. Oxford's approach is pretty straightforward: to provide the most talented students, regardless of personal circumstance, with the best education – teaching and facilities, study and support – anywhere in the world.

So how are we doing? Well, our students are outstanding and the education we provide is recognised to be world class. What do not compute for Oxford are the finances. Like most universities in the country – old and new, small and large – we have set tuition charges at the maximum permissible: £9,000 a year.

I have read that some universities are doing very nicely, thank you, on that basis: comfortably covering the cost of what they provide to their students. That may or may not be the case for them, but one thing I am quite sure about is that it doesn't add up for Oxford, where the new regime of increased tuition charges for students, but greatly reduced government spending on teaching, have done little to change the basic financial equation.

How can they, when the real cost of an Oxford education is at least £16,000 per undergraduate every year? That represents a funding shortfall of more than £7,000 a year per student. Or put another way, a University-wide gap – more of a chasm really – of over £70m a year that Oxford has to plug.

Is that possible? In one sense yes, or we wouldn't be here today. Is it sustainable? That is a critical question.

The generosity of our benefactors remains vital, and we have been blessed in that regard by visionary programmes like the Moritz-Heyman scholarships. Certainly, endowments and other gifts matter a great deal. But that should not obscure the painful fact that money which the collegiate University spends on subsidising undergraduate education is money that can't be spent in other places. Places where it is badly needed: on our physical infrastructure, on stronger support for graduate students, on educational resources and renewal, and the many other things required to sustain a world-leading centre of learning and research in the 21st century.

Of course, an observer peering at the image in our Oxford mirror might say, well, cut deeper into your cost base. Narrow the gap that way. Do you really need that labour-intensive tutorial system and all those colleges? Get rid of some of the books and sell off the historic collections? In other words, make Oxford something other than Oxford. Well, perhaps I exaggerate. And we certainly do need to be sure that we are using our resources to maximum effect in the service of that deceptively simple formula: the best possible education for the most talented young minds.

As others have observed, excellence in most walks of life does not come cheap. And unless we can offer the best we can't expect to get the best. Oxford has an outstanding reputation but that will not endure over time unless it continues to be underpinned by outstanding quality.

At the time of the Browne Review of Higher Education Funding three years ago, Oxford put forward a proposal that a university should be able to vary tuition charges over time in order to bring them closer to the real cost of the education it was providing for its students – always with the absolute proviso of robust arrangements to ensure student affordability. It is not a new idea, but it is one whose time will surely come.

It seems increasingly inevitable that government – any government in future – is going to have to evolve a more sophisticated and indeed variegated approach to the

challenges of student funding. The idea of a market (and that is what is ostensibly being created) in which every item, virtually regardless of content and quality, is the same price seems, well, a little odd. On the other hand, given the great diversity of the institutions in our higher education system, the notion of different universities charging significantly different amounts doesn't feel inherently unnatural. It is the current situation that seems out of kilter.

What matters surely is that an institution's charges are clearly aligned with what it offers and that they are demonstrably not a barrier to student access. In other words, that robust and generous financial support remains readily available for students who most need it and, where that involves loans, that they remain repayable only *after* graduation and only in proportion to the *ability* to pay.

As we know, Oxford's own track record on student support is already exceptional, thanks to the most generous financial package for low-income undergraduates of any university in the country.

Of course, it is understandable that so much attention is focused on a student's financial circumstances *before* university, but what happens *after* is also crucially important. And certainly, so far as Oxford is concerned, all the evidence indicates that the quality of the education a student receives here is overwhelmingly his or her best investment for the future. This surely is part of what we mean when we talk about the transformational potential of education, both for the individual and for their capacity to contribute to wider society. And that in turn means that support for our students in the form of loans from the public purse is also a pretty sound investment.

So a system of tuition charges more closely related to the true cost of the education provided, but with the strongest guarantees that price can be no impediment to talent and that loan repayment is pegged to financial capacity, is something that I believe in the longer run will have to be considered.

Let me turn now more briefly to postgraduate funding. Oxford has been at the forefront of efforts to increase public awareness and government action about the serious consequences of the chronic underfunding of graduate study in this country. There are big issues here for both social mobility and for the country's future competitiveness. So it is welcome to see that our repeated warnings are being heeded, with government at least beginning to grasp the nettle. A downsized National Scholarship Programme will, in future, be targeted entirely at postgraduate students from poorer backgrounds. It isn't enough, but it is a start. And, quite rightly, we are doing all that we can, as with undergraduate funding, to address the issue ourselves. So when it comes to the financial conditions for prospective graduate students they now need only to show that they have funds sufficient to cover their fees for their first year, and provide assurances

that living costs and fees can be met during the whole course.

For our own part, we are strengthening in every way that we can the support we offer graduate students; and yes, that includes the provision of affordable purpose-built housing in Oxford. Last year we launched the Oxford Graduate Student Matched Fund, which supports graduate scholarships for students from around the world. It has made an excellent start. Benefactors have already committed more than £21m, with matching funds of more than £14m from the University, creating approximately 50 scholarships. Our aim, through the scheme, is to create student funds equivalent to an endowment of £100m, supporting in the region of 130 graduate scholarships in perpetuity. Just a few weeks ago we were able to celebrate the magnificent gift of £75m from the McCall MacBain Foundation to support the prestigious Rhodes scholarship programme.

Of course, there is much more to funding a university like Oxford than students, vital though they are. There is also the huge task of maintaining and developing our infrastructure: the libraries, IT systems, seminar rooms, laboratories, research equipment and facilities that are essential to the conduct of our teaching, learning and research. Oxford's greatest asset is its people. But good people need, deserve, and increasingly expect, good facilities. We have to be able to provide them. And that is becoming more and more challenging. Again, philanthropy makes an important contribution. Major projects like the refurbishment of the New Bodleian as the Weston Library have been made possible by hugely generous gifts.

But there is a good deal of necessary work that the University needs to look after itself. In this context, we have been very fortunate in recent years that Oxford University Press has continued, as a result of its highly successful educational publishing mission round the world, to make major transfers of capital from its operating surplus. These transfers have been invaluable to the rest of the University and long may they continue. There is no reason to suppose they won't but it would be foolhardy to take them for granted and it is surely sensible in any event that the major part of the transfer now goes straight into endowment.

In the past the University has also received substantial grants to support core infrastructure through the Higher Education Funding Council, HEFCE. But in the last few years things have changed dramatically, with Oxford's grant being reduced by two-thirds: from more than £36m to around £12m.

Changes to the funding process make it much harder to plan and build strategically. But that is something we are determined to do, and that is why we are developing a long-term strategy for the renewal of Oxford's world-class facilities in a ten-year capital investment programme. This programme aims to support outstanding research and teaching in a manner that is both sustainable and responsive to future developments, and is driven by the academic plans of our divisions.

As always, we need to ensure that we are using all the funds we receive, regardless of their source, effectively and efficiently. But that is never going to provide the full financial answer, which is why we are looking carefully at the operating surpluses the University might generate. In 2011/12 the figure was 5% of income, which we calculate to be the minimum required to sustain the current infrastructure of the University. That should be our baseline for a sustainable future for Oxford. But it is not sufficient to finance new capital investments in the longer term; the kinds of investment that are necessary to maintain our position as one of the world's leading universities.

Many, indeed most, of our peer organisations internationally - confronted by broadly similar challenges - have opted to borrow. The favoured way of doing so has been to issue a bond. So, for example, if one looks at the latest Times Higher World University Rankings, we are the only one in the top seven not to have issued a bond. Most university bond issues are in the United States, but they're certainly not unknown on this side of the Atlantic: Cambridge, de Montfort and, most recently, Manchester have gone down this route. None of this means that such a course of action is necessarily right for Oxford and any substantial policy of borrowing - whether as a bond or some other form of loan - would require careful reflection and planning in order to establish clarity about priorities and processes, including how interest payments would be structured and met.

Enough, for now at least, on funding the University. Let me turn to my second topic: Diversifying Oxford.

Over the course of 2014, we will be marking a significant anniversary: 40 years since women were first admitted to previously all-male undergraduate colleges. In 1974 a group of five colleges – Brasenose, Hertford, Jesus, St Catherine's and Wadham – opened their doors to women, a process of co-education which was completed in 2008 when St Hilda's admitted its first male undergraduates. Now 45% of our students are women – double the proportion of 1974 – a significant advance which will be marked in a series of special events and programmes over the coming year.

But that is not to say that there isn't more to do on all fronts. The gender balance among our student population may be reflected at overall University staff level – in fact, our last published figures show slightly more women than men on the payroll. However, if one focuses specifically on academics, a different picture emerges: women account for 25% of academic staff and just 18% of professorial staff.

We are serious about meeting the challenge of increasing the diversity of our staff. The University currently holds an Athena SWAN institutional Bronze Award, indicating our strong commitment to addressing the underrepresentation of women. Our published equality objectives and the new Strategic Plan include specific undertakings. I was delighted last term to announce a new £1m initiative – the Vice-Chancellor's Diversity Fund – to promote

diversity among academic and research staff at Oxford

As I said when the fund was announced, it is only by having a fully diverse workforce, where people are appointed and promoted solely according to their merits, that the University can achieve the very best in teaching and research.

Gender is not the only area of underrepresentation that Oxford, like many other universities and institutions, has to grapple with in order to improve our overall diversity. Ethnicity is also a key area for attention and action.

At staff level, we are piloting a black and ethnic minority peer-mentoring project to support individual development, and have began work on a recruitment initiative to increase the proportion of BME staff in professional and support posts.

Overall, more than 20% of our students are from an ethnic minority background, and the proportion of our UK undergraduates from ethnic minorities compares favourably to other selective Russell Group universities. So we are a much more diverse community than you may be encouraged to believe from media stereotypes.

But I do not claim that this deals with the challenge of under-representation in the context of student ethnicity. We are currently looking closely at our undergraduate admissions data.

In general terms this indicates that white applicants with similar exam grades tend to fare better than non-white applicants. Why is this? Candidly, we aren't sure. But what we do know is that the more one delves into the detail, the less clear-cut the situation appears.

The devil may be in the detail, but the danger is in the generalisation. It was Alexandre Dumas, *père*, who remarked: 'All generalisations are dangerous - even this one.' Salutary words.

So in some subjects non-white students do better in terms of the offer of a place than white students. In addition, application rates from different ethnic groups vary widely with subject choice, with those from some underrepresented groups more likely to apply for the most competitive courses. Sometimes the numbers involved are small, so any variation can throw up eye-catching but misleading disparities in success rates. And the picture shifts from year to year. Factors like these make hard and fast conclusions both extremely difficult and potentially dangerous.

But you know, as do I, that Oxford is totally committed to selecting the very best students, regardless of ethnicity or any other factor. It is entirely right that this should be the case and also entirely necessary for our own future as a world-leading centre of academic excellence. That is simply undeliverable unless we are doing everything possible to attract and nurture the most able students and staff.

I have deliberately focused in the last few minutes on Oxford student applications, but of course widening *access* to Oxford - encouraging

and equipping able students to apply in the first place – is also something to which we devote immense time, effort and money. I do not propose today to say very much about this, other than to commend the continuing impact of initiatives such as the UNIQ summer schools, which offer promising students from state schools with a limited history of successful applications to Oxford a real taste of the University. Of the 749 students who participated in UNIQ in 2012, 491 went on to apply to Oxford and 197 have been made conditional offers: a success rate of 40%, which is double the success rate for Oxford applicants overall.

I want to focus today on widening access in a broader sense and in the context of the third of my themes: Digitising Oxford.

I spoke earlier about the challenges of sustained capital investment in our University infrastructure. In the past, infrastructure generally meant physical infrastructure. But that too has changed. In a digital age, our virtual infrastructure is of massive importance and can only become more so.

Like any ancient institution, Oxford's has been a profoundly print-based culture. Important strands of the long history of the book are woven into the fabric of this University and its spectacular collections. This is a matter of pride, celebration, and - most importantly - of enormous scholarly benefit and advantage. I speak as a scientist, but the thrill of being able to access the first edition of a seminal work, or to admire a world-famous manuscript or other priceless artefact in our museums and collections, is a very special experience indeed.

But for all its antiquity, Oxford is also a place of profound innovation. Indeed, it is Oxford's restless spirit of enquiry and exploration that explains the longevity of the institution and of its pre-eminence. So the new can hold few fears for us, especially when, as with the digital revolution, it is viewed not as the enemy of what has gone before but its ally and partner.

It is a revolution that affects not just how we record and store what we do, but is also increasingly central to our core academic life and mission, whether teaching, study or research.

Inevitably, virtual infrastructure has entirely tangible costs, and these too must be funded. So overseeing the University's digital investment has necessarily become a significant feature of how we now approach planning and resource allocation. A new IT Committee reports directly to Council, an indication of the priority being accorded to this area and a recognition of the importance of the digital challenge - especially in an institutional culture as decentralised and varied as ours.

We need to find ways of developing our IT provision that are efficient, effective and coherent, while respecting the creative diversity and autonomy of the constituent parts of our institution. It is a familiar challenge for Oxford and, as always when faced with such challenges, we need to find a way forward that works best for us.

That is true for the use of digital technology to ensure that core University operations and services run smoothly and well. But is also true when we consider how digital technology affects the way we make our academic riches more widely accessible. It was this I had in mind a little earlier when I spoke of 'access in a broader sense'.

It is a highly topical subject, especially with the intense – at times feverish – attention being devoted in the world of higher education to MOOCs, or massive open online courses. You can get a hint of this intensity from the fact that the *New York Times* described 2012 as the 'Year of the MOOC'. And the acronym has now scaled the august heights of the *Oxford English Dictionary*, no less. Yet the exact nature of this phenomenon remains somewhat elusive. The term is used to describe everything from pedagogical material made freely available online to fully fledged online courses offering academic credits to registered fee-paying students.

So where is Oxford in the great MOOC debate? Well, we are certainly not rushing to judgement. Not least because the first and obvious point to make is that, as you would expect of a University whose alumni include the man credited with inventing the World Wide Web, we have a long and impressive record of sharing widely our rich and diverse academic capital. Let me offer a few examples.

Our Department for Continuing Education can trace its history back over 130 years to a movement called Oxford Extension. Today the department provides more than 800 courses a year, 80 of which are online, offering study across a range of disciplines from archaeology to electronic engineering.

Most are short courses of five to ten weeks in duration. Some longer courses result in Oxford qualifications at the undergraduate, advanced diploma and postgraduate levels, while others are designed to help in acquiring and updating skills for professional development.

In a less structured way, online users can also access a vast amount of Oxford scholarly material through a variety of digital platforms. For example, the University's iTunes U site, which features more than 4,000 free audio and video podcasts, has seen over 20m downloads worldwide in just five years.

Digitisation has also opened up mass public access to our collections and treasures. The Bodleian Libraries, which have been digitising content for over 20 years, made a high-profile addition to their online collections in April 2013: a digital facsimile of their Shakespeare First Folio, a rarity as the volume has not been rebound or restored since it was first received by the library in 1623.

As a department of the University, Oxford University Press has a mission to further the shared objective of excellence in research, scholarship and education by publishing worldwide. It does so in more than 40 languages and in a variety of formats; increasingly these are digital. The number of downloads of online articles across OUP's 300 journals has reached one billion, its online academic products receive tens of millions of hits each year, while Oxford Scholarly Editions Online, a major digital publishing initiative which launched a year ago, brings its prestigious range of scholarly editions to audiences through a digital interface, breathing new life into important texts. OUP is currently working with our Education Committee to explore forms of online teaching and assessment, including English as a second language. It's a collaboration likely to grow.

So whatever the future and fate of MOOCs, it is clear that Oxford will continue to have a great deal to offer online audiences of all types. Our challenge is to find the best way to build on it, to link more of it together, to improve its accessibility, and increasingly, I suspect, to make sure it fits the needs of very different types of users with very different needs and expectations about their engagement with academia.

One more thing: it must be true to Oxford. By which I mean we have a highly distinctive, and highly regarded teaching method in this University. It is called the tutorial system, and, though it has evolved over time to meet the needs of a changing curriculum, its essence - the close personal academic supervision of an individual student by a highly qualified academic - remains unaltered.

I'm not a great one for predictions. As Winston Churchill remarked: 'I always avoid prophesying beforehand because it is much better to prophesy after the event has already taken place.' However, I don't think I'm sticking my neck out too far ahead of the great man's cautionary words by saying that I don't see our commitment to personal education changing greatly. Nor do I see us setting up a sort of parallel Open University. The current one does an excellent job.

So overall, when I look at digital Oxford in the mirror, I see a figure beginning to take shape that must and will be recognisably our

In conclusion, and as I hope I have illustrated, whether we are talking about Funding Oxford, Diversifying Oxford or Digitising Oxford the key lies in being true to the core academic values and standards that have shaped this University's long history. To do that we need to look into the mirror, as we have been doing a little today, and measure what we see calmly and without complacency against what we expect to see. It isn't a perfect fit – it never will be. But by the very act of doing it, we can be a little better prepared to face the world and the high expectations it rightly has of us.

As we all know, a University is as strong as the people who make up its community and in that regard, as in so many others, Oxford has been and remains blessed by excellence. That excellence has received external recognition in a number of ways over the past year. Professors Harry Anderson, Judith Armitage, Gideon Henderson, Christopher Schofield, Andrew Wilkie and Julia Yeomans have been elected as Fellows of the Royal Society; Professors Mary

Dalrymple, John Gardner, Vincent Gillespie, John Hawthorne, Julia Lee-Thorp, Colin Mayer, Kevin O'Rourke and Jenny Ozga have been elected as Fellows of the British Academy; Professor Zhanfeng Cui has been elected as a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering; and the Academy of Medical Sciences has elected as Fellows Professors Barbara Casadei, Michael English. Russell Foster. Keith Hawton. Paul Klenerman, Xin Lu and Lionel Tarassenko. Since this time last year, Her Majesty The Queen has made the following awards to members of the University: knighthoods for Mr Andrew Dilnot and Professor Hew Strachan; DBEs for Professors Hermione Lee and Carol Robinson: CBEs for Professors Terence Cave, David Clark, Raymond Dwek, Judith Freedman, Anthony Heath and Les Iversen: OBEs for Professors Peter Dobson and Alison Noble; and an MBE for Dr Lucy Carpenter, In addition, Michael Moritz. whose Moritz-Heyman scholarship programme

Other recognition has been received by Professor Sir Walter Bodmer, who has been awarded a Royal Society Medal for his seminal contributions to population genetics, gene mapping and understanding of familial genetic disease; by Professor Douglas Higgs, who was awarded the Royal Society's Buchanan Medal for his outstanding work on the regulation of the human alpha-globin gene cluster; by Professor Frank Close, OBE, who was the winner of the Royal Society's Michael Faraday Prize and Lecture; by Professor Gero Miesenböck, who won the Brain Prize 2013; and by Professor Steven Balbus, Savilian Professor of Astronomy, who won the Shaw Prize for Astronomy.

I mentioned earlier in this Oration, received the

KBE for services to promoting British economic

interests and philanthropic work.

Two Heads of House who have made an enormous contribution to the life of the collegiate University, as well as to their own colleges, have retired within the last few months: Giles Henderson as Master of Pembroke and Sir Derek Morris as Provost of Oriel. I am immensely grateful to them both for their wise advice over the last four years. Dame Lynne Brindley has succeeded Mr Henderson and Ms Moira Wallace has succeeded Sir Derek. In addition, The Revd Dr Simon Gaine OP has become Regent of Blackfriars and The Revd Dr Michael Lloyd has become Principal of Wycliffe Hall.

Over the summer we bade farewell to Dr Sarah Thomas, whose six years as Bodley's Librarian have been utterly transformative, and whom we wish good luck in her new role of Vice-President of the Harvard Library. We wish good luck also to Mr Keith Zimmerman, Director of Student Administration and Services since 2008, who has left to join the Open University as its Director, Students. Mr Andrew Mackie has joined the University as Director of Legal Services and General Counsel.

Merit pay and titles for academics

Summary

In the light of the views expressed by members of Congregation (and University and college bodies) in an extensive consultation exercise in Hilary term, a clear majority of which supported the wider use of the title of professor and proposals for a new system of merit pay for academics, Council is proposing two resolutions to Congregation.

The **first resolutio**n is to introduce a new system of merit pay for academics (as detailed in para 12 below). This system would involve a permanent additional salary payment of £2,600 per annum from October 2014 to all of those in the main lecturer grades who have met the criteria for the conferment of the title of (full) professor, unless they already receive additional recruitment or retention payments at that level or above. Those in receipt of this additional payment would become eligible to apply for professorial distinction awards, alongside the substantive professors and readers who are already eligible to apply for such awards in exercises which are usually held every two or three years, under wellestablished procedures.

The additional payment is pitched roughly halfway between the joint maximum¹ and the professorial minimum, rewarding lecturers who meet the criteria for the conferment of the title of professor, while maintaining a differential with basic professorial salaries.

Implementation of the resolution would link the two scales for the salaries of senior academics at Oxford, creating for the first time a new, combined structure which is affordable and manageable and which would provide a route for all

lecturers through which progression is possible beyond the top of their University salary scale to the full range of additional professorial payments.

The additional payment would be made to all of those in the main lecturer grades who have already been awarded the title of professor, unless they already receive additional recruitment or retention payments at that level or above.

The next recognition of distinction exercise will be launched very shortly after Congregation's decisions on the two resolutions are reached, and the additional payment would also be made to all of those in the main lecturer grades who apply and who are deemed in that exercise to meet the criteria for the conferment of the title of professor, whether or not they actually wish to use that title.

A similar payment would also be made to all such lecturers who successfully apply in later recognition of distinction exercises: these will in future be held on an annual basis.

The second resolution is to rename the main lecturer grades 'Associate Professor' (as detailed in para 18 below). Save where, under the existing recognition of distinction arrangements, the title of (full) professor is conferred, future appointments to these grades would be made with the title of associate professor and existing lecturers in those grades would be able to use the title of associate professor if they so wished.

Implementation of this resolution would mean that in future there would be only two levels of title for those holding senior academic posts at Oxford, namely 'Associate Professor' and 'Professor' (save that existing lecturers and readers would be able to retain the current nomenclature if they wished).

Council believes that these measures (fuller details of which are set out below) would improve the University's arrangements for recruitment and retention for the main academic career grade in Oxford; would make an important contribution to the University's arrangements for the recognition and reward of its key academics as their careers progress; and, by making additional payments widely available to distinguished academics for reasons unconnected with acute recruitment or retention issues, would make the University's arrangements for academic salaries more equitable.

Background

1 A broad consultative exercise was held in Hilary term on

(a) a proposal that with effect from 2014–15 all non-medical lecturers (UL, CUF, faculty lecturers, ULNTFs) in post who have the title of full professor should receive an additional salary payment of £2,600 per annum (unless they already receive additional recruitment or retention payments at that level or above), and that they should all then become eligible for consideration in subsequent exercises for professorial distinction awards; and

(b) a suggestion that the grade of lecturer (university lecturer, university lecturer (medical), CUF lecturer, faculty lecturer, ULNTF) might in future become the grade of associate professor.

2 Proposal (a) reflected the University's reintroduction of arrangements for merit pay for all staff after a period of suspension due to financial constraints: this prompted a reconsideration of the unfunded proposals for merit pay for academics which had been developed by the Task Force on Academic Employment and accepted by

Congregation in 2010. Those proposals in turn reflected Congregation's approval of the introduction of the principle of differential pay for academics (following a postal vote in 2001), which had however in practice led to supplementary payments only being made on grounds of recruitment and retention, rather than for the reward of excellence in the absence of such grounds. The task force's 2010 model envisaged that only a subset of lecturers with the title of professor would receive merit pay, but on reflection the Personnel Committee and Council took the view that this would be invidious and that it would be preferable for all lecturers with the title of professor to receive a salary supplement and then to become eligible to apply for professorial distinction awards.

- **3** The principal arguments in favour of suggestion (*b*) were that the term 'lecturer' was poorly understood on the global stage, and that use of the title of associate professor would better reflect the general distinction of Oxford's senior academic staff, as well as helping recruitment, retention and external recognition.
- 4 Responses on these two issues were sought from individual members of Congregation, from all divisional boards, the Continuing Education Board, and the Academic Services and University Collections (ASUC), from all colleges and from the Conference of Colleges, and from the Joint Consultative Committee with the Oxford UCU. The full consultative document was issued as Supplement (1) to Gazette No 5012, and may be found via the section of the Personnel Services website that relates to the work of the Task Force on Academic Employment: www.admin. ox.ac.uk/personnel/staffinfo/academic/ taskforceonacademicemployment.
- **5** The consultation exercise had a deadline of 22 April and elicited a large number of responses (which have been published, where the authors so agreed, on the same website). Replies were received from 159 individuals, as well as from all divisional boards, ASUC, three departments in the Social Sciences, 14 colleges, the Standing Committee of the Senior Tutors' Committee, and the Oxford UCU. **Broadly speaking, about two-thirds of the views expressed were in favour of (a) and (b) above**.
- **6** The Personnel Committee and Council have now considered reports summarising the responses that were received. Noting that the responses from the divisions and the departments and the colleges were generally positive, and that about 68% of the views expressed by members of Congregation supported proposal (a),

and about 61% of the views expressed by members of Congregation supported suggestion (*b*), Council has agreed to invite Congregation to approve formal resolutions on both matters, against the background of the detailed, refined versions of the proposals that are set out below.

Merit pay

- **7** The majority view of the respondents was that it was entirely reasonable that all lecturers upon whom the title of professor is conferred should receive an additional payment. It was felt that this would be an appropriate and simple way to reward merit, and that the availability of such a system for salary progression would help recruitment and retention. The extra payment, combined with eligibility to apply for professorial distinction awards, would also provide a mechanism to rebalance the anomalies that have resulted from individual decisions to pay super-scale salaries in acute recruitment and retention cases. It was noted that lecturers are the only staff group at Oxford currently unable in practice to enjoy salary progression on grounds of merit alone, and that this position at Oxford is unique in the higher education sector. Respondents agreed that the new system proposed would be simpler and less invidious than the task force's 2010 model: it might also be seen as more egalitarian, since it would treat equally all lecturers who met the criteria for the conferment of the title of professor, would open up super-scale salaries on grounds of merit as well as 'market', and would give all those in the current lecturer grade a route for progression to the full professorial salary arrangements.
- **8** It was not the case that those respondents who opposed the new proposal favoured the task force's alternative (ie, following Congregation's acceptance of that alternative in 2010, the status quo - under which only a subset of lecturers, to be selected from those with the title of professor, would receive any merit pay). Those against the new proposal tended to oppose both of these forms of merit pay, and some regretted the use of any kind of differential pay. They felt that the new proposal would simply produce more anomalies, be divisive and therefore damage morale and even retention, and produce skewed incentives - for academics generally to focus on research, rather than on teaching and good citizenship.
- **9** Council originally put this proposal to consultation with its support, and the responses received in the consultation have

confirmed its view - particularly given the high level of support among the individual responses, the lack of support for the task force alternative, and the pressing need to introduce fairer arrangements for academic pay. Council is clear that the University will need to continue to use differential pay in order to engage with genuine market imperatives as it seeks to recruit and retain the best academics from around the world; alongside this, the new proposal would link the two scales for the salaries of senior academics at Oxford, creating for the first time a new, combined structure which is affordable and manageable and which would provide a route for all lecturers through which progression is possible beyond the top of their University salary scale to the full range of additional professorial payments. Council commends this proposal to Congregation.

- 10 Council has approved some adjustments to the detail of the proposal which have been put forward by the Personnel Committee in the light of views expressed in the consultation exercise. A number of respondents opposed limiting merit pay to those who wished to use the title of professor, and Council has agreed that it would indeed be appropriate for merit pay to be available to all applicants in the current lecturer grade who meet the relevant criteria, whether or not they wish to use a professorial title. This would mean that the additional salary would be payable from 1 October 2014 to:
 - (a) those existing lecturers who already have the title of professor;
 - (b) those existing lecturers who apply successfully for the title of professor in the next recognition of distinction exercise; and
 - (c) those existing lecturers who, although they do not wish to use the title of professor, apply in the next recognition of distinction exercise and are judged to meet the criteria for the conferment of the title
- 11 Noting other points made in the consultation responses, Council has also confirmed that careful consideration by the Personnel and Planning and Resource Allocation Committees and, in order to avoid conflicts of interest, by the external members of Council, has shown that the proposal is not only consonant with the reintroduction of merit pay for other University staff, and in line with Congregation's decision in 2001 to permit differential pay for lecturers, but also affordable across all of the academic

divisions, who are budgeting accordingly for 2014–15 and thereafter. Financial constraints will not affect individual decisions on the conferment of the title of professor; the expanded professorial distinction award exercises will be held regularly as resources allow, and will continue to be cash-limited; and all merit payments to academics will be equitably available across the divisions.

12 The Personnel Committee and Council have also clarified how the arrangements would apply to academics in colleges, and the detailed, refined proposal is as follows. With effect from 2014-15 all nonmedical lecturers (UL, CUF, faculty lecturers, ULNTFs) in post who have satisfied the conditions for the conferment of the full title of professor should receive from the University an additional salary payment of £2,600 per annum (unless they already receive additional recruitment or retention payments at that level or above); and should all then become eligible for consideration in subsequent exercises for professorial distinction awards, alongside substantive professors and readers (unless they already receive additional recruitment or retention payments in excess of the level of the relevant distinction award). The same would apply to keepers in ASUC who have satisfied the conditions for the conferment of the title of professor. The same would also apply to all titular CUF/ULs and supernumerary titular CUF/ULs who have satisfied the conditions for the conferment of the full title of professor. The £2,600 payment, which is roughly half of the difference between the joint maximum and the professorial minimum, will rise after 2014-15 in line with increases in other Oxford University salaries.

Titles

13 The clear balance of opinion amongst respondents was that the consultative paper had presented a cogent argument that Oxford's current use of the lecturer title for its main academic grade was often poorly understood in much of the rest of the world of higher education, and is a barrier to attracting the best international candidates and to retaining staff of the highest quality. The suggested use of the term 'Associate Professor' was generally felt to be a clear move in the right direction, having the potential to assist in alleviating genuine recruitment and retention difficulties that Oxford is currently facing in an increasingly competitive academic market nationally and, in particular, internationally. 'Lecturer' was felt to be generally understood internationally to be a junior academic position, with little if any independent

research element; it is the entry grade for academics in most other UK institutions, but the career grade at Oxford. Beyond assisting in recruitment and retention, it was thought that the general use of the title of associate professor would be better for Oxford's academics applying for awards and for research funding (not least in the US); it would be better for public profile of Oxford academics on national committees and the like, and for their esteem, fostering 'simple academic respect'; it would help students who seek the support of their tutors in job applications and so on.

14 Opposing views disputed that the current nomenclature had any effect on recruitment and retention, or on the global profile of the University or its academic staff, or on internal morale. They suggested that the wholesale use of professorial titles would unacceptably 'devalue the currency', and felt that adopting what appeared to be American titles would be misleading and confusing, since the University would not also be adopting the American systems of tenure and career progression.

15 Their discussion of the issues in the light of the responses has clarified the view of the Personnel Committee and Council about the general principle of retitling the lecturer grade; hitherto they had been content for this to be a suggestion upon which views should be sought, but they now believe that this is a measure that Council should positively commend to Congregation. Council has, however, agreed to adopt some amendments to the initial outline suggestion which the Personnel Committee has proposed in the light of the consultation responses: Council believes that these amendments strengthen the case for change.

16 Council has agreed that Oxford should not use the title of assistant professor. The consultative document had suggested that this might be appropriate for those at the current lecturer level who had not previously held a substantive academic appointment, but Council has now agreed that it would be wrong to give the impression that any of the career-grade academic posts at Oxford were of the junior nature that the term 'Assistant Professor' implies in its normal North American usage. This would mean that there would in future only be two levels of title for those holding senior academic posts at Oxford; namely 'Associate Professor' and 'Professor' (save that existing lecturers and readers would be free to retain the current nomenclature if they wished).

17 Council acknowledges the point

made in the consultation that in North American use 'Associate Professor' may have a connotation that the individual has not yet reached an expected career level; but Council does not believe that this would justify either withdrawing the suggestion that the title of professor be more widely used, or adjusting it, as some have proposed, so that the title of full professor is automatically used in all cases either on initial appointment or on reappointment to the retiring age. Council has, however, agreed that if the lecturer grade is retitled associate professor, posts should in future be *advertised* as 'Associate Professor or Professor'. This would generally reflect very well the range of the previous experience of those appointed to posts at Oxford, noting that the full title is already available on appointment in appropriate cases. Oxford's use of the grade of associate professor for most of its senior tenure-track appointments would be fully explained in further particulars (which would make it clear that Oxford has associate professors who are in their probationary period - as do other universities when they appoint external applicants directly to associate professorships - and other associate professors who have achieved tenure, and that there is a separate process that involves the conferment of the title of full professor at a stage of career progression that usually occurs after the tenure point). Council believes that these measures will ensure that the University attracts the fullest range of potential suitable candidates under the new arrangements, not putting off promising but less-experienced academics, nor discouraging established international academics for whom appointment as associate professor might at first sight seem a backward step.

18 The Personnel Committee and Council have also clarified how the arrangements would apply to academics in colleges and to university researchers, and the detailed, refined proposal is therefore as follows. The grade of lecturer (university lecturer, university lecturer (medical), CUF lecturer, faculty lecturer, ULNTF) will in future become the grade of associate professor. If they do not have the title of full professor, existing and new staff in those grades will automatically be able to use the title of associate professor. If they do not have the title of full professor, the following will also automatically be able to use the title of associate professor: titular CUF/ULs and supernumerary titular CUF/ULs; substantive readers (including clinical readers); researchers in the professorial-equivalent grade of RSIV; Wellcome Principal Research

Fellows; honorary consultant MRC directors; keepers in ASUC whose contractual duties include teaching and research; and all University researchers and ASUC staff currently holding the title of reader. All other employees of the University, and persons not employed by the University who are employed on a long-term basis by an Oxford college or by a Recognised Independent Centre or by the NHS and who are making a significant and sustained academic contribution to the University's work, may also be considered, on an individual basis, for the conferment of the title of professor (as now) or the title of associate professor, under revised arrangements for the recognition of distinction.

Arrangements for recognition of distinction

19 Council recognises that since, under the new arrangements, associate professors may wish to apply for the title of full professor, and, since those in the current lecturer grade who meet the criteria for the conferment of the title of full professor would in future receive additional pay, it will be particularly important that the criteria and procedures that will be used in future for the recognition of distinction are perceived as being as fair and transparent as possible, and involve fewer delays. Council has noted that the Personnel Committee has developed new, streamlined arrangements in this area. These are designed to ensure that those academics who have not achieved the title of full professor will be regularly and supportively mentored, with the intention that potential applicants have a full understanding of the standards that a successful application would need to satisfy. A particular focus in this connection in the next exercise will be lecturers who already have the title of reader: applicants with the title of reader had a significantly higher success rate among those applying for the title of professor in the last round, and the Personnel Committee hopes that many lecturers who currently have the title of reader will be able, in the next exercise, to qualify for the additional salary payment by demonstrating that they now meet the criteria for the conferment of the title of professor. There will in future be an annual recognition of distinction process, with divisional committees forwarding cases to the Senior Appointments Panel of the Personnel Committee for final decision. There will continue to be three separate thresholds for the conferment of the title of professor/the award of merit pay, relating

to research, teaching, and administration: all of these thresholds must be met. Those academics who have chosen not to apply in previous exercises can be assured that the standards to be applied in future rounds will be no higher than hitherto (and, as stated above, financial constraints will not affect individual decisions); and those who do not wish to use a professorial title may still apply for merit pay. The research criterion has been clarified, and an indicative list has been developed of the kinds of activities and outputs of which the University expects to see evidence in successful applications. Explicit provision is made for applicants to disclose any particular circumstances that may have had a substantial effect, over a considerable period of time, on their record of research.

Other issues

20 Council is fully aware that these proposals on merit pay and on titles do not in themselves deal with the whole range of major issues regarding arrangements for academics at Oxford. In particular, there is a pressing need for revised arrangements between the University and the colleges to develop a framework for variation of duties to support a rebalancing from time to time of the teaching, research, and administrative duties of joint appointment holders in order to address their aspirations at different stages of their careers. Discussions have been pursued throughout the last academic year, initially involving the Pro-Vice-Chancellors for Education and for Personnel and Equality and the heads of division, and then extending to the divisional contact groups with college representatives, and to the Conference of Colleges. There is considerable support for the introduction of a common framework under which the duties of academics may be varied for extended periods with the agreement of the individuals and their faculty boards/ departments and colleges. Where this involves a reduced teaching commitment, it will be essential that measures are put in place in each case to safeguard the quality of teaching in the subject and, in particular, to ensure that tutorial teaching and the individual academic care for undergraduates in their colleges are maintained through high-quality and properly resourced arrangements. The Personnel Committee, Education Committee, and the Conference of Colleges are developing such a framework with the aim of introducing it in time for the academic year 2014-15.

Conclusion

- **21** Council believes that the two resolutions now before Congregation would significantly support the University's pursuit of excellence in teaching and research, for which it relies on the distinction and dedication of its senior academics. Introducing arrangements for the financial reward of merit which are fair, simple and in practice available to a large number of academics, and modernising nomenclature, will improve the arrangements for the recruitment and retention of those academics, will better recognise and reward their career progression, and will alleviate problems that the current arrangements are causing from the point of view of equity and morale.
- **22** Noting the majority support that was evident on both matters in the consultation exercise, Council therefore *recommends* that Congregation approve resolutions, as glossed above, (1) to provide that from October 2014 all lecturers who have satisfied the conditions for the conferment of the full title of professor should receive a salary increment and become eligible to apply for professorial distinction awards in future exercises; and (2) to replace the main lecturer grades by the grade of associate professor.

The Right Honourable Lord Drayson

He then began his career as a science entrepreneur, founding Lambourn Food Company in 1987, leading its management buyout in 1989 and founding Genisys Development in 1991. In 1993 he co-founded and was Chairman and CEO of PowderJect, an Oxford University spin-out company that he led over ten years until the sale of the company in 2003. He was appointed to the House of Lords in 2004, was Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Defence Equipment and Support and Minister of State for Business and Regulatory Reform from 2005-7 and was Minister of State for Science and Innovation from 2008-10. He has been a member of the Privy Council since 2008. In 2007 he co-founded Drayson Racing Technologies LLP, a motorsport research and development business based near

Oxford airport, and he is currently Managing Partner. He has considerable motor-racing experience, including twice racing in the Le Mans 24-Hour. Lord Drayson was Science Entrepreneur in Residence at the Saïd Business School from 2003-5. He has been a member of the Advisory Board at Isis Innovation, Chairman of Oxford Children's Hospital Appeal and since 2010 has been President of the Motorsports Industry Association. He is a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering.

In 1993 he co-founded and was Chairman and CEO of PowderJect, an Oxford University spin-out company that he led over ten years until the sale of the company in 2003. He was appointed to the House of Lords in 2004, was Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Defence Equipment and Support and Minister of State for Business and Regulatory Reform from 2005-7 and was Minister of State for Science and Innovation from 2008-10. He has been a member of the Privy Council since 2008. In 2007 he co-founded Drayson Racing Technologies LLP, a motorsport research and development business based near Oxford airport, and he is currently Managing Partner. He has considerable motor-racing experience, including racing

twice in the Le Mans 24-Hour. Lord Drayson was Science Entrepreneur in Residence at the Saïd Business School from 2003-5. He has been a member of the Advisory Board at Isis Innovation, Chairman of Oxford Children's Hospital Appeal and since 2010 has been President of the Motorsports Industry Association. He is a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering.

REVIEW OF THE FACULTY OF MEDIEVAL AND MODERN LANGUAGES

The Humanities Divisional Board and the Education Committee will jointly conduct a review of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages as part of Council's programme of rolling reviews of faculties and departments. The review will take place on 12 and 13 February 2014.

The Review Committee's terms of reference are:

1 To review the quality of academic activities in the faculty, by reference to:

- international standards of excellence
- action taken since the last review of the faculty
- planning statements at faculty and divisional level, and in the context of the University's Mission Statement and Strategic Plan.

In particular:

(a) the quality of the research of the faculty, including its participation in interdepartmental, interdivisional and interdisciplinary activities, its research profile and strategy, and future challenges and opportunities;

(b) the quality of undergraduate and graduate programmes, and their delivery and related issues, including:

- access and admissions
- curriculum design and programme structure
- · teaching, learning and assessment
- the relationship between teaching and research
- academic and pastoral support and guidance
- the provision and use of learning resources (including staff resources)
- specific arrangements for the pursuit of graduate studies
- · relationships with colleges
- quality assurance mechanisms;

(c) the organisation of the faculty, its management structures, and the relationship between the faculty and the Humanities Division, including such matters as:

- strategic planning (including relationship to the divisional five-year plan and the University's Strategic Plan)
- academic and non-academic staffing and recruitment
- student number planning
- terms of appointment for academic staff, including career development and equal opportunities issues
- accommodation and future space needs
- fundraising;

(d) the relationship (structural and operational) between units within the faculty, and between the faculty and cognate subject areas, and colleges to which it is linked in teaching and research.

2 To consider the current and longterm financial position of, and funding arrangements for, the faculty, and its financial strategy.

Van Houten Fund

The Van Houten Bequest is a fund left by the late M Van Houten in the 1950s to be used 'for the benefit of the University in such ways as the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, and Council shall see fit'. The Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, Council and PRAC agreed in 2005 to delegate responsibility to the Registrar to approve grants subject to a regular report to be made to Council on the decisions taken.

Bids are now being invited for grants from this fund to be used to support projects that do not form part of the normal day-today operations of a department and which would not easily be funded from other regular sources. Recipients within the last year have included:

- 80,000 hours, a free advisory service for young people interested in ethical careers;
- Oxford Hub, the focal point for student social action and volunteering at the University.

Grants to internal applicants are usually in the region of £4,000-£15,000, either given as a one-off award, or spread over two or three years. Grants are also available to organisations external to the University; in such cases, the amounts awarded are usually lower and there is a cap on the total amount of funding provided to external organisations, which for the 2012–13 financial year was £50,000.

The most recent invitation to bid, in April 2013, attracted 32 applications and resulted in awards for four of those.

The guidelines by which bids are assessed are as follows:

- Bids for grants will be assessed according
 to the breadth of the benefit to the
 University offered by the project in
 question, the strategic importance of
 the project to the University, and the
 availability of funds. Only in exceptional
 circumstances will a grant be awarded
 in respect of a project which benefits a
 single department.
- Grants will not ordinarily be awarded for purposes for which other trust fund (or similar) support exists within the University, for example, the funding of academic scholarships, regardless of whether or not the alternative fund(s) in question are in a position to fund the expenditure proposed.
- Grants will not ordinarily be awarded in respect of costs for which a department might reasonably be expected to hold a budget.
- Grants will not ordinarily be agreed in respect of recurrent activities except to provide:
 - (a) seed funding to support an activity in its first one to three years; or
 - (b) bridging support for one year only where a source of funding is lost and the department/faculty in question is confident that an alternative can be found for the following year.
- Grants will not ordinarily cover the full cost of a project. Departments will be expected to make some contribution, or to use the grant secured by the Van Houten Fund to assist in securing other funding (including external funding).

The extent to which funds may be awarded to external organisations each financial year may be subject to an upper limit, to be set by the General Purposes Committee and reviewed on an annual basis.¹

Bids for funding should take the form of a written submission outlining the amount requested, how the grant would be used, the benefit that would be conferred to the University, approximate costings, timescales, details of any other funding secured and any further supporting information. Alternatively, an application form is available from the secretary. The bids will be considered by the Registrar as a gathered field. Applications should be sent, preferably as a Word document attached to an email, to the secretary of the fund, Mrs Adrienne Lingard, by **15 November**.

The proposed change reflects the views of the Nominating Committee which, during its deliberations leading to the appointment of the current Vice-Chancellor, considered that the appointment should be for a single term, and that a seven-year appointment is needed so that the potential field of candidates is not restricted and to enable a Vice-Chancellor to provide longer-term leadership. A period of office of five plus two years is not desirable as a Vice-Chancellor would be required to decide at the end of his or her third year whether to apply for the extension. The opportunity is also taken to update a reference to another regulation.

The changes also provide for the term of office of elected and appointed members on the Nominating Committee to be for a fixed term of seven years, to match the proposed term of office of the Vice-Chancellor, instead of five years at present. Consequently, it is proposed that elected and appointed members be ineligible for membership of the Nominating Committee, in elected or appointed positions, for a full term of seven years after completing a full seven-year term of membership. A further change is proposed to make clear that someone who has occupied a casual vacancy which comes to an end may be elected, or be appointed, to the same or a different position on the Nominating Committee for a full term, so long as the subsequent period of office on the committee is consecutive with the holding of the casual vacancy.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 21 of 2002, concerning the office of the Vice-Chancellor, amend regulations 2, 3 and 5 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'Vice-Chancellor

- 2. The Vice-Chancellor shall hold office for five <u>seven</u> years on initial appointment, which may be extended by reappointment for up to two further years, save that, when a Vice-Chancellor vacates the office before the expiry of his or her full term of office and at a time other than the end of the academic year, his or her successor's period shall consist of the remainder of that academic year and five <u>seven</u> further years, which may be extended by reappointment for up to two additional years.
- 3. Any person shall be eligible for appointment as Vice-Chancellor if he or she can serve the full period permitted under regulation 2 above before reaching the retiring age as prescribed by the Regulations for the Employment of University Staff Retirement Dates of University Employees.
- 4. Subject to the provisions of regulation 2 above, no person shall be appointed Vice-Chancellor a second time, save that, if a Vice-Chancellor vacates his or her office before the expiry of a full term of office, a person who has previously been Vice-Chancellor may be appointed Vice-Chancellor again for one year (or, if the retiring Vice-Chancellor vacates his or her office at a time other than the end of an academic year, for the remainder of that academic year and one further year), and the age-limit in regulation 3 above shall not apply to such a second appointment.
- 5. The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed or reappointed in accordance with the following procedure:
 - (1) Not less than one year before the initial period of office of a Vice-Chancellor is due to come to an end by lapse of time, a committee consisting of:
 - (a) the Chancellor, or, if the Chancellor is unable or unwilling to act, one of the members of Council nominated

- under the provisions of section 4 (7)-(10) of Statute VI, who shall if possible be appointed by the Chancellor for this purpose, or, if the Chancellor is unable or unwilling to make such an appointment, shall be appointed by Council, and who shall chair the committee:
- (b)-(e) four persons, not also being members of Council, elected by Congregation;
- (f)-(h) three persons appointed by Council, of whom, if the Chancellor is to chair the committee personally, one shall be one of the members of Council nominated under the provisions of section 4 (7)-(10) of Statute VI;
- (i)-(l) one person appointed by each of the divisional boards;
- (*m*) the Chairman of the Conference of Colleges or his or her nominee;
- (n) a person, not also being a member of Council, elected by the Conference of Colleges
- shall report to Council with a recommendation either that the current Vice-Chancellor be reappointed for a further period of not more than two years, or that another, named, person be appointed as the next Vice-Chancellor.
- (2) Not less than one year before any period of reappointment to the office of Vice-Chancellor is due to come to an end by lapse of time, the committee at paragraph (1) above shall report to Council with a recommendation that a named person be appointed as the next Vice-Chancellor.;
- (23) (a) The appointed and elected members of the committee at paragraph (1) above shall hold office for seven five years and shall not be eligible for a further period of office on the committee in either an appointed or an elected position reappointment or re-election until the expiry of seven five years from the date on which the first this period of office expires, except that a member appointed or

elected for less than a full period in order to fill a casual vacancy may be reappointed or re-elected for one full consecutive period of seven years.

(b) A member of the committee elected under paragraph (1) (b)-(e) or (n) above who becomes a member of Council during his or her period of office shall immediately vacate his or her office; no person shall be appointed or elected under paragraph (1) (b)-(l) or (n) above if the result of his or her appointment or election would be that more than two members of the committee, excluding the chairman, were members of the governing body of any one college, society, or Permanent Private Hall; if this limit is exceeded by reason of persons being appointed or elected simultaneously by different bodies, the person or persons senior in academic standing shall be deemed appointed or elected to the extent permitted by the limit, and the other or others shall be deemed not appointed or elected (in the event of equality in academic standing, appointment or election being made by lot).

(34) When Council has considered the committee's report, and any further report on the appointment or reappointment which it may have requested the committee to make, Council shall submit to Congregation either the name of the person proposed for appointment, or a proposal for the reappointment of the current Vice-Chancellor, as the case may be.

- (45) (a) Council's proposal for the appointment of a new Vice-Chancellor shall be deemed approved unless it is rejected with at least 125 members voting in favour of rejection.
 - (b) If a proposal for the appointment of a new Vice-Chancellor is rejected, Council shall, after consultation with the committee, within two months nominate two persons to Congregation (of whom one may be the person previously rejected) and offer Congregation the choice between them.
- (6) (a) Council's proposal for the reappointment of the current Vice-Chancellor shall be deemed approved unless it is rejected with at least 125 members voting in favour of rejection.
 - (b) If a proposal for the reappointment of the current Vice-Chancellor is rejected, Council shall, after

consultation with the committee, within two months submit to Congregation the name of another person for appointment as a new Vice-Chancellor, and the same procedure shall apply as at paragraph (5) above.

(57) If for any reason there is no Vice-Chancellor-elect able and willing to take up office on the laying down of office by a Vice-Chancellor, an Acting Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed under the provisions of regulation 7 below, until such time as a new Vice-Chancellor has been appointed under the procedure laid down in paragraphs (1)-(46) above.

6. As nearly as possible at the beginning of the academic year in which he or she takes up office, the Vice-Chancellor shall be admitted at a meeting of Congregation.

Acting Vice-Chancellor

- 7. (1) In the event of the incapacity or the initiation of the removal procedure under Part G of Statute XII or absence from Oxford of the Vice-Chancellor, or in the event of a vacancy in the Vice-Chancellorship, one of the Pro-Vice-Chancellors shall be appointed Acting Vice-Chancellor.
 - (2) In the event that the Vice-Chancellor's membership of Council is terminated under section 9 (1) of Statute VI, one of the Pro-Vice-Chancellors shall be appointed chairman of Council.
 - (3) The appointment shall be made:
 - (a) by the Vice-Chancellor in the event of incapacity or absence, if the incapacity or absence is unlikely to be longer than two months;
 - (b) by the Chancellor if the incapacity or absence is likely to be for longer than two months, or the removal procedure under Part G of Statute XII has been initiated, or membership of Council has been terminated, or after an appointment under (a) has lasted for two months, or in the event of a vacancy in the Vice-Chancellorship;
 - (c) by Council in default of an appointment under (a) or (b).

8. An Acting Vice-Chancellor shall have all the functions and powers of the Vice-Chancellor.'

Under regulation 9.3 of Congregation Regulations 2 of 2002, the nomination below shall be deemed to be approved unless not later than **4pm on Thursday, 31 October**, the Registrar has received from not fewer than 20 members of Congregation a written request for a postal ballot to be taken in respect of that nomination.

Approval of nomination of the Right Honourable Lord Drayson as an external member of Council

The nomination by Council, under the provisions of section 4(7)-(10) of Statute VI, of the Right Honourable Lord Drayson as a member of Council for a period of two terms from Hilary term 2014, to fill the vacancy left by Sir Paul Nurse standing down from Council, is submitted for approval.

Notes on the nominated external member of Council

The Right Honourable Lord Drayson

(Paul Drayson) graduated in Production Engineering (Aston University, 1982) and has a PhD in Robotics (Aston University, 1985). His early career was with BL Technology and Trebor Group as a Development Engineer. He then began his career as a science entrepreneur, founding Lambourn Food Company in 1987, leading its management buyout in 1989 and founding Genisys Development in 1991. In 1993 he co-founded and was Chairman and CEO of PowderJect, an Oxford University spin-out company that he led over ten years until the sale of the company in 2003. He was appointed to the House of Lords in 2004, was Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Defence Equipment and Support and Minister of State for Business and Regulatory Reform from 2005-7 and was Minister of State for Science and Innovation from 2008-10. He has been a member of the Privy Council since 2008. In 2007 he co-founded Drayson Racing Technologies LLP, a motorsport research and development business based near Oxford airport, and he is currently Managing Partner. He has considerable motor-racing experience, including racing twice in the Le Mans 24-Hour. Lord Drayson was Science Entrepreneur in Residence at the Saïd Business School from 2003-5. He has been a member of the Advisory Board at Isis Innovation, Chairman of Oxford Children's Hospital Appeal and since 2010 has been President of the Motorsports Industry Association. He is a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering.

General Purposes Committee of Council

Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on

15 November.

(a) Winchester Lecturership and Pavry Memorial Lecturership

Explanatory Note

These changes transfer responsibility for the appointment of the fund's board of management from variously Council and two obsolete boards to the academic divisions of the University, and reflect the updated name of the Board of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, in §385 amend regulation 3 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

- '3. The management of the income of the fund, including all arrangements for the lectures, shall be the responsibility of a committee consisting of eight persons, who shall be:
 - (1) the Vice Chancellor <u>or his or her</u> <u>representative</u>;
 - (2) one person appointed by Gouncil the Board of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division;
 - (3) one person appointed by the General Board Board of the Medical Sciences
 Division;
 - (4) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Social Studies Social Sciences Division;
 - (5) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of History;
 - (6) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Philosophy;
 - (7) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Law;
 - (8) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

The persons appointed by Council and the General Board shall be from subject areas other than those represented under (4) (8) and shall keep in mind the interests of all subjects not represented by those five members.'

(b) Pirie-Reid Fund

Explanatory Note

This change transfers responsibility for the appointment of the fund's board of management from Council to the Student Health and Welfare Subcommittee of the Education Committee.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, in §280 amend regulation 3 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'3. The fund shall be administered by a board of management consisting of up to six persons, to be appointed by Gouncil the Student Health and Welfare Subcommittee of the Education Committee for such periods as it shall think fit, which shall determine the conditions of award of such scholarships, their several value and tenure, and the eligibility of candidates.'

(c) Establishment of Sassoon Visiting Fellows Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish the Sassoon Visiting Fellows Fund for the endowment of a visiting fellowship and associated overheads at the Bodleian Libraries.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, insert new §316 as follows, and renumber existing §§316-392 as §§317-393:

'§316. Sassoon Visiting Fellows Fund

- 1. The University receives with gratitude sums from Dr Joseph Sassoon to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Sassoon Visiting Fellows Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").

- 3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund (if any), towards the salary and expenses of the holders from time to time of a visiting fellowship at the Bodleian Libraries, and associated overheads.
- 4. Bodley's Librarian shall be responsible to the Curators of the University Libraries for the administration of the Fund and the application of its income.
- 5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Fellowship.
- 7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 8. Regulations 1-10 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 10. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

Guidelines for leave for academic staff

1 Approval of applications for leave

All applications for leave from normal academic duties (sabbatical leave, leave to hold research awards, special leave, etc) must be accompanied by a recommendation from the individual's department or faculty board, as appropriate, and must also be approved by the divisional board which now has the authority to grant leave.

2 Sabbatical leave and dispensation from CUF lecturing obligations

The University's regulations in respect of sabbatical leave and dispensation from CUF lecturing duties are set out in Council Regulations 4 of 2004. Application forms and advice on individuals' entitlement may be obtained from:

3 Sabbatical leave in advance of entitlement

In some circumstances individuals may wish to take leave for purposes covered by the sabbatical leave scheme at a time when they do not have sufficient sabbatical entitlement. Such circumstances might include an unrepeatable opportunity to pursue academic interests, or a need to undertake fieldwork for a period exceeding one year. In such cases leave could be granted in whole or in part as sabbatical leave in advance of entitlement if a good academic case could be demonstrated.

4 Applications for leave to hold some public offices

Applications for leave to accept an appointment in the public service of national or international importance are normally granted by the divisional board, provided that:

- the purpose of the leave can be shown to be compatible with the academic interests of the department or faculty;
- the department or faculty (and the college in the case of joint appointments) supports the application and is able to cover the individual's duties including examining and graduate supervision; and
- it is clear that the individual intends to return to University service after the period of leave.

Applications for leave to hold such offices should be made to the divisional secretary, faculty board secretary or other officer as notified locally.

5 Applications for certain research awards

Applications to national bodies of prestigious and competitive research awards (eg British Academy Research Readerships and Senior Research Fellowships, AHRC Research Leave awards, EPSRC Senior or Advanced Fellowships) are normally granted by the divisional board provided that the department or faculty (and the college in the case of joint appointments) supports the application and that appropriate arrangements can be made to cover the individual's duties, including examining and graduate supervision, should the application be successful.

Applications for research awards by members of the Humanities Division must be notified to the appropriate divisional research facilitator *at least one month* before the funder's deadline. The research facilitator will provide advice and support for the application, produce a budget and an OG (internal authorisation form required by

Research Services) and will liaise with the Humanities Division and Research Services to obtain approval for the application. It is the responsibility of the applicant to obtain in advance the consent of the college (where appropriate) for any research leave application. Consent must be forwarded to the research facilitator and is required by Research Services as part $of the internal\, checking\, and\, authorisation$ process. Note: all applications to outside bodies for research funding must be checked and authorised by Research Services. The AHRC will not accept applications directly from colleges; applications from CUF lecturers to that body can only be submitted via the relevant faculty.

6 Applications for special **unpaid** leave

Applications for leave other than those outlined above may be considered as applications for special **unpaid** leave. Applications may be considered if they meet one or both of the following criteria:

i) providing academic benefit to the University; and/or

ii) providing a career development opportunity for the individual, hence aiding staff retention.

Activities under these criteria might include visiting another institution to study specialised laboratory techniques, taking up a visiting lecturership or visiting professorship at a prestigious department abroad, an extended period of fieldwork, etc.

In all cases, it is essential that the consent of the college (where appropriate) and of the department/faculty board is obtained before an application is made to the divisional board. In considering applications, colleges and departments/faculty boards must be satisfied that the proposed leave fits with their overall plans and objectives, and it must be clear that the individual's duties for the college and for the department/ faculty, including examining and graduate supervision, can be covered satisfactorily. Divisional boards will consider applications both on their own merits and in the context of overall operational needs, and will not approve applications which are prejudicial to the teaching and research of the department/faculty or which are not supported by the applicant's college.

Occasionally applications are made for leave to enable an individual to accept a fixed-term appointment in another academic institution (other than routine visiting appointments held during sabbatical leave). In such instances the college and the department/faculty board would need to

be satisfied that the application was in line with their overall plans and objectives, as above, and that all operational requirements could be covered satisfactorily, before the application was put to the divisional board. Applicants would normally be expected to give a commitment to return to Oxford after the period of leave. It should be noted that the longer the appointment at the other institution, the less likely it is that leave will be granted.

Leave will not be granted, except in the most truly exceptional circumstances, to enable an individual to decide whether to accept a *permanent* post elsewhere.

It is recognised that some offers are made to individuals at short notice. Given the fact that all members of the academic staff have clear obligations to the University and to their college under the terms of their contracts, no such offer should be accepted without the support of the college and the department/faculty and the explicit approval of the divisional board. It is essential, therefore, that any prospect of such an offer is discussed, in confidence, with the college and with the divisional secretary or faculty board secretary at the earliest opportunity so as to avoid delays, and the possibility of refusal, if a firm offer is then made at very short notice.

All applications for special unpaid leave should be made to the divisional secretary, faculty board secretary or other officer as notified locally, who will also be able to advise on the likelihood of success of any application on the University side; the college's consent in appropriate cases must be obtained before an application is put to the divisional board.

7 Special **paid** leave

Divisions may, if they wish, with the concurrence of the college in relevant cases, grant additional paid leave outside sabbatical entitlement, funded from their own resources, to enable staff to undertake projects of mutual benefit to the individual and the University. Examples might include asking a member of staff to concentrate for a term wholly on considering revised teaching patterns across a whole subject area; or permitting a member of staff to teach at another university for a term to foster inter-institutional links, possibly as part of an exchange arrangement.

8 Stipendiary arrangements

 Sabbatical leave and dispensation from CUF lecturing duties: leave will be granted with stipend (although it may be granted without stipend if taken for the purpose of holding a remunerated visiting appointment under 6 above).

- Leave to hold a public office: leave will be granted without stipend.
- Leave to hold a research award: the arrangements vary depending on the regulations governing the award, but it is normal for individuals holding such awards to continue to receive their usual University stipend, the awarding body either providing funds to make a replacement appointment or reimbursing the University for the individual's salary costs.
- Special leave: leave will normally be granted without stipend, but see 7 above.

9 Implications for future entitlement to sabbatical leave or dispensation from CUF lecturing duties

Special leave does not count as qualifying service for the purposes of calculating future entitlement to sabbatical leave or dispensation from CUF lecturing duties. However, it does not count against an individual's future entitlement. When special leave has been granted for the purposes of holding a public office or a research award, sabbatical leave is not normally granted in the period immediately preceding or following the period of special leave, although some flexibility may be exercised at the divisional board's discretion in respect of periods of special leave not exceeding one year, especially in connection with the holding of research awards.

Professor Rory Collins was appointed to head the Nuffield Department of Population Health (NDPH) when it was established on 1 July 2013. This new Department brings together the Clinical Trial Service Unit & Epidemiological Studies Unit, the Cancer Epidemiology Unit, and the Department of Public Health. The aims of the NDPH are to deliver high quality research that has a major impact on population health, as well as to

help train and develop the next generation of researchers. 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General Purposes Committee of Council

Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on

13 December.

(a) Dean Ireland's Professor of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture

Explanatory Note

The following change amends the composition of the electoral board of the Dean Ireland's Professorship of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture to reflect the change in college association recently approved from Queen's to Keble, and the change of the faculty's name from 'Theology' to 'Theology and Religion'. It also brings the wording into line with the general provisions for electoral boards laid down in Council Regulations 3 of 2004, replaces references to 'decrees' with references to 'regulations', and removes the reference to the General Board.

Text of Regulations

In Sect III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, delete §149 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'§ 149. Dean Ireland's Professor of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture

- 1. The Dean Ireland's Professor of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture shall lecture and give instruction in the Exegesis of the New Testament Scriptures.
- 2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the <u>Warden of Keble College Provost of Queen's College</u> is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;
 - (2) the <u>Warden of Keble College Provost</u> of <u>Queen's College</u>, or, if the <u>Warden</u> Provost should be unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the Governing Body of <u>Keble Queen's</u> College on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

- (3) a person appointed by the Governing Body of <u>Keble Queen's</u> College;
- (4), (5) two persons a person appointed by Council;
- (5) a person appointed by the General Board;
- (6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or his or her nominee;
- (6), (7)-(9) three two persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the <u>regulations decree</u> concerning the duties of the professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same <u>regulations decree</u>, which are applicable to this chair.'

(b) Professor of German Medieval and Linguistic Studies

Explanatory Note

The following change amends the composition of the electoral board of the Professor of German Medieval and Linguistic Studies to comply with the general provisions for electoral boards laid down in Council Regulations 3 of 2004. It also replaces references to 'decrees' with references to 'regulations' and removes the reference to the General Board.

Text of Regulations

In Sect III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, delete §116 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'§ 116. Professor of German Medieval and Linguistic Studies

- 1. The Professor of German Medieval and Linguistic Studies shall lecture and give instruction in German Medieval and Linguistic Studies or in some branch of these studies, and shall promote generally the study of the subject in the University.
- 2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the Principal of St Edmund Hall is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the

occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

(2) the Principal of St Edmund Hall, or, if the Principal is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the Governing Body of St Edmund Hall on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;

- (3) a person appointed by the Governing Body of St Edmund Hall;
- (4)-(5) a two persons appointed by Council;
- (5) a person appointed by the General Board:
- (6) the head of the Humanities Division, or his or her nominee;
- (6)-(8)(7)-(9) three persons elected by the Board of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages.
- 3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations decree concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations decree which are applicable to this chair.'

(c) Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity

Explanatory Note

The following change amends the composition of the electoral board of the Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity to reflect approval by the Humanities Board, Christ Church (which co-funds the chair, with which a residential canonry at the college is associated), and the Church of England's General Synod that the chair should be open to lay as well as ordained holders, and to comply with the general provisions for electoral boards laid down in Council Regulations 3 of 2004. It also replaces references to 'decrees' with references to 'regulations' and removes the reference to the General Board.

Text of Regulations

In Sect III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, delete §61 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

Congregation

'§ 61. Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity

- 1. The Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity, who must be in Priest's Orders in the Church of England or in an Episcopal Church in communion with the Church of England, shall either expound some portion of the Holy Scriptures or discuss questions pertaining to the study of Theology.
- 2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the Dean of Christ Church is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;
 - (2) the Dean of Christ Church, or, if the Dean is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the Governing Body of Christ Church on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;
 - (3) a person appointed by the Governing Body of Christ Church;
 - (4), (5) two persons appointed by Council, one of whom shall be appointed after consultation with Christ Church;
 - (6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or his or her nominee; a person appointed by the General Board;
 - (7)-(9) three persons elected by the Board of the Faculty of Theology <u>and Religion</u>.
- 3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the <u>regulations</u> decree concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same <u>regulations</u> decree which are applicable to this chair.'

(1) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XIV: Employment of Academic and Support Staff by the University

Explanatory Note

Following Congregation's approval of the resolution to rename the main lecturer grade as 'associate professor' (published in *Gazette* No 5037, 17 October 2013), this legislative proposal amends the legislation relating to the employment of staff by the University.

The changes establish the grade of associate professor with effect from 1 January 2014 such that those lecturers that are currently appointed as a university lecturer, a university lecturer (medical), a CUF lecturer, a faculty lecturer or a ULNTF may, as they wish, either use the title of associate professor or retain their previous nomenclature without prejudice to their existing position under the statutes and regulations (for example in respect of eligibility to apply for sabbatical leave or dispensation from lecturing obligations). Appointments to those grades on or after 1 January 2014 will be to the grade of associate professor.

In accordance with the detailed, refined proposal accompanying the resolution, the changes also allow for the following to use the title of associate professor: titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers, supernumerary titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers and university lecturers and university lecturers and university lecturers, substantive readers (including clinical readers), researchers in the professorial-equivalent grade of RSIV, Wellcome Principal Research Fellows, honorary consultant MRC directors, keepers in ASUC whose contractual duties include teaching and research and all university researchers and ASUC staff currently holding the title of reader.

For the avoidance of doubt, those persons upon whom the title of full professor or reader has been conferred may continue to use that title.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend Statute XIV concerning the employment of academic and support staff by the University, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

- 1 In Statute XIV, concerning the employment of academic and support staff by the University, delete existing section 7 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '7. The three main categories of academic staff shall be:

- (1) professors;;
- (2) readers;; and
- (3) associate professors or lecturers.1

¹Appointments to the post of university lecturer (including university lecturer (medical) and ULNTF), CUF lecturer and faculty lecturer on or after 1 January 2014 shall be to the post of associate professor. Those appointed to the posts of university lecturer (including university lecturer (medical) and ULNTF), CUF lecturer and faculty lecturer prior to 1 January 2014 shall be eligible to use the title of associate professor without prejudice to their existing position under the statutes and regulations.'

- 2 Ibid, insert new sections 8 and 9 and renumber existing sections 8-14 as sections 10-16 (new text underlined):
- '8. Those lecturers who were appointed to the post of university lecturer, CUF lecturer or faculty lecturer prior to 1 January 2014 shall be eligible to use the title of associate professor but the provisions relating to lecturers and, where relevant, those particular provisions relating to university lecturers, CUF lecturers and faculty lecturers, shall continue to apply to any such persons for so long as they remain in that post.
- 9. Associate professors appointed on or after 1 January 2014 shall be subject to the provisions relating to lecturers including those particular provisions relating to university lecturers, CUF lecturers or faculty lecturers as shall be appropriate in light of the duties attaching to their post.'
- **3** This statute shall be effective from 1 January 2014.

Regulations to be made by Council if the Statute is approved

- 1 In Council Regulations 3 of 2004, concerning the employment of University Staff, insert new regulation 9 and renumber existing regulations 9–29 as regulations 10–30 (new text underlined):
- '9. Without prejudice to their position under the statutes and regulations, the following persons shall be eligible to use the title of associate professor:
 - (1) all those holding the post of reader (including clinical readers);
 - (2) titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers:
 - (3) supernumerary titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers;
 - (4) all those in the grade of RSIV;
 - (5) Wellcome Principal Research Fellows;
 - (6) honorary consultant MRC directors;

- (7) keepers in the major museums and scientific collections whose contractual duties include teaching and research;
- (8) researchers holding the title of reader; and
- (9) staff in the major museums and scientific collections holding the title of reader.'
- **2** This regulation shall be effective from 1 January 2014.

(2) Voting on a Resolution authorising the use of space in the Pharmacology Building

Explanatory Note

This resolution allocates space formerly leased by the Medical Research Council (MRC), for the MRC Anatomical Neuropharmacology Unit, to the Department of Pharmacology, following the termination of the aforementioned lease and transfer of the unit's work and staff to the department.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 728 sq m net usable area in the Pharmacology Building, formerly leased by the MRC, be allocated to the Department of Pharmacology.

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Changes in Regulations

(a) Regulations for Council

Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **20 December**.

Explanatory Note

Council has changed its pattern of meetings in 2013-14. Instead of having twelve ordinary meetings in each academic year, it will have eleven: eight long meetings, and three short meetings. The three short meetings are scheduled for week 1 of each term in case they are needed for urgent business. However, they will usually be cancelled. The requirement for members of Council to attend a minimum number of meetings has been reviewed in the light of this. The following proposed changes increase the minimum number of meetings that a Council member has to attend from eight to nine, less the number of meetings cancelled. This takes into account that the three short meetings are expected to be cancelled. It is also proposed to delete the regulations governing dispensation from the minimum number of meetings to be attended and to include provision for such dispensation in Council's standing orders, and to give responsibility for granting dispensation to the General Purposes Committee.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 13 of 2002, concerning Council, delete existing regulation 3 and substitute (deleted text scored through, new text underlined):

3. If a member of Council serving under the provisions of section section 4 of Statute VI, or co-opted under the provisions of section 6, has attended fewer meetings than eight nine less the number of any meetings which have been cancelled in the course of any academic year, his or her seat shall at the close of that year be declared by the chairman of Council to be vacant and shall then immediately be vacated, unless the General Purposes Committee of Council agrees otherwise for good reason, subject to the following conditions:

(1) (a) A member shall only be required to attend the same proportion of meetings due to be held subsequent to the commencement date of his or her term as eight bears to the total number of meetings due to be held in the academic year, any fraction being reckoned to the nearest unit, and the resulting number then being reduced by the number of any meetings cancelled which were due to be held subsequent to that commencement date.

(b) The applicable commencement date is:

(i) the date of election or cooptation for a person elected or coopted to fill a casual vacancy;

(ii) the date of the approval by Congregation of the nomination for a person nominated to fill a casual vacancy;

(iii) the date of appointment to the relevant office for a person serving *ex officio*.

(2) If a member of Council has been dispensed from his or her prescribed university or college duties for not less than one term in any year, he or she shall be deemed to have satisfied the requirements of this regulation if he or she has attended in that year at least six meetings less the number of any meetings which have been cancelled, or in the case of a person joining Council after the beginning of an academic year, if he or she has attended such lesser number as shall have been calculated in proportion to six by the method (with any necessary substitutions) prescribed under paragraph (1) above.

(3) A member of Council whose minimum attendance requirement has not been reduced under paragraph (2) above may, at the discretion of the chairman of Council, be deemed to have satisfied the requirements of this regulation if in any year he or she has attended, but for good reason has been prevented from attending more than, six meetings less the number of any

meetings which have been cancelled, or in the case of a person joining Council after the beginning of an academic year, if he or she has attended, but for good reason has been prevented from attending more than, such lesser number as shall have been calculated in proportion to six by the method (with any necessary substitutions) prescribed under paragraph (1) above.'

(b) Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee and Investment Committee

Explanatory Note

The proposed changes to the remits of the Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee and the Investment Committee aim to delineate more clearly the responsibilities of those committees and reflect the revised Socially Responsible Investment Review Policy (see 'General Notices' section below, p174). In relation to the Investment Committee, the opportunity is also being taken to amend its composition, removing the requirement for the membership to include internal members while not prohibiting the appointment of one or two such members.

Text of Regulations

1 In Part 29 of Council Regulations 15 of 2002, concerning the Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee, delete existing regulations 29.2–29.6 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'29.2. The committee shall review the University's policy on socially responsible investment and its implementation at least every five years and submit to Council any changes it may wish to propose.

29.23. The committee shall consider representations concerning the <u>Socially</u> Responsible Investment Policy ("the Policy") policy on socially responsible investment and proposals related to the implementation of the Policy to invest or disinvest submitted to it as set out in <u>29.3.(1)-(3)</u> (a)-(c) below to ensure that they are consistent with the policy statement, seek the views of the Investment Committee on the efficacy and costs of implementation where appropriate,

and make a recommendations to Council <u>as</u> where appropriate.

<u>29.3.(1)</u> Representations concerning the <u>pPolicy on socially responsible investment</u> and proposals <u>related</u> to <u>the implementation of the Policy invest or disinvest may be</u> submitted to the committee as follows:

(1a) by Council, the Investment Committee or any other committee reporting directly to Council;

 $(\underline{2b})$ by 20 or more members of Congregation;

 $(\underline{3}e)$ by a majority resolution of the Council of the Oxford University Student Union.

29.4. The committee shall make such recommendations to Council as it thinks fit on positive or negative screening, or on engagement strategy, in respect of its investments.

29.4. The committee shall:

(1) engage from time to time, as required in order to fulfil its remit, with those bodies that have a duty of oversight for the University's investments, which for the avoidance of doubt includes the Investment Committee;

(2) receive the section(s) of the Investment Committee's annual report to Council relating to the Policy.

29.5. The committee shall make a report to Council at least annually on its activities, including on the proposals considered under regulation 29.3 (1), on an assessment of the processes and practices through which the Policy is implemented, University's investments against its defined policy statement on Socially Responsible Investment and on any other relevant matters, through the General Purposes Committee of Council.

29.6. The committee shall review the Policy, including determinations made by Council under the provisions of the Policy, at least once in every three years and make recommendations to Council as appropriate.

 $29.\overline{2}6$. Regulations 1.6 and 1.7 in Part 1 apply to this committee except that the quorum is one third plus one of those members eligible to vote upon the business of the committee (rounded to the nearest integer).'

2 In Council Regulations 15 of 2002, delete existing Part 23 concerning the Investment Committee and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'23.1. The Investment Committee shall consist of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor;

(2)_(6) at least five external persons appointed by Council, all of whom shall bring recent and relevant expertise of investment management to the working of the committee, and one of whom shall be appointed by Council to serve as chairman of the committee;

(7)-(8)(3) at least <u>up to</u> two other members appointed by Council who shall have recent and relevant expertise of investment management.

23.2. The Director of Finance and the Chief Investment Officer of Oxford University Endowment Management Ltd ("OUEM") shall normally be in attendance at the meeting of the committee, but shall not have the right to vote.

23.<u>32</u>. All members of the committee shall serve for five years and shall be re-eligible for reappointment.

23.43. The committee shall be responsible for the strategic oversight and supervision of all funds invested by, or for the benefit of, the University (including any funds placed with the University by external bodies), except:

(1) those investments which Council determines to be the responsibility of the Finance Committee or other bodies; and

(2) those held by Societies or the Press.

23.<u>5</u>4. In particular, the committee shall be responsible for:

(1) recommending to Council defining suitable investment objectives and, where relevant, distribution policies for the funds under its remit ("the Funds") for the investments covered by 23.3 above;

(2) setting investment policies, benchmarks, risk guidelines and investment restrictions for the Funds taking into account the agreed objectives and policies as set out in 23.5(1) and including those relating to socially responsible investment, and monitoring performance against, guidelines and will benchmark in order to meet those objectives;

(3) evaluating, on a regular basis, the performance of the Funds against investment objectives and agreed benchmarks and compliance with all policies and guidelines relevant to the Funds the effective management and control of investment risks;

(4) <u>advising the Board of OUEM in</u> <u>the recruitmenting</u>, supporting and apprais<u>aling of</u> the Chief Investment Officer <u>of OUEM</u> and monitoring his or her performance;

(5) reporting to Council <u>at least annually</u> on the matters above and on such other matters as the committee sees fit.'

(c) Personnel Committee

Explanatory Note

The following amendments, proposed in the context of the Committee's review of self-effectiveness, provide a broader definition of the role of the Personnel Committee to: (i) better reflect the expectations of Council in delegating more to the Committee; and (ii) set out the role of the Committee in taking a broad and strategic view of personnel and equality issues across the University.

Text of Regulations

In Part 4 of Council Regulations 15 of 2002, concerning the Personnel Committee, delete existing regulations 4.3–4.5 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'4.3. The committee shall be responsible for all personnel and equality matters connected with the employment of the University's employees, save where otherwise provided or where the committee deems it necessary to refer the matter to Council or another committee as defined in section 6(3) of Statute I. be responsible, in the light of employment legislation and other relevant requirements, and in liaison with the colleges, societies, and Permanent Private Halls as appropriate, for the development and review of comprehensive policies on the employment of all university staff, including policies on recruitment and selection, staff development and training, equality of opportunity, and salaries and other conditions of service.

4.4. In particular, \pm the committee shall:

(1) be responsible, in the light of employment legislation and other relevant requirements, and in liaison with the colleges, societies, and Permanent Private Halls as appropriate, for the development and review of policies on the employment of all University staff, including policies on recruitment and selection, staff development and training, equality of opportunity, and salaries and other conditions of service;

(12) oversee any centrally organised exercises relating to personnel matters, such as the conferment of the title of

professor and the making of distinction awards for professors and readers;

- (23) be responsible for, and make recommendations to Council on, the policy in respect of joint appointments between the University and the colleges, societies, and Permanent Private Halls, exercising this responsibility through a subcommittee on which there shall be balanced representation as between the University and the colleges, societies, and Permanent Private Halls;
- (34) monitor the implementation and effectiveness of the University's policies relating to personnel and equality matters:
- (45) oversee the relations between the University and its employees through recognised employee representatives.
- 4.5. The committee shall have power to make, amend, and repeal regulations concerning any of the following matters, on condition that it shall bring forward to Council for decision any case which it considers to raise particular difficulties:
 - (1) the appointment of individual members of boards of electors for the duration of proceedings to fill a particular vacancy (in cases in which a regulation is necessary);
 - (2) the conferment of the title of Visiting Professor or Visiting Lecturer (in cases in which a regulation is necessary);
 - (3) the amendment of the regulations governing the payment of special allowances to certain heads of departments, subject to the approval of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee of Council as to the financial implications of each such proposed amendment; and
 - (4) the creation of a fixed-term university lecturership when a divisional board or the body responsible for another spending sector proposes to set up such a post in a situation other than that of replacing a member of staff on leave or covering emergency teaching needs (in cases in which a regulation is necessary).'

(d) Medical Sciences Board

Explanatory Note

The proposed changes in regulations reflect the renaming of the Department of Primary Care Health Sciences as the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences. The opportunity has also been taken to amend the regulations to reflect the fact that the Department of Public Health

has now been renamed as the Nuffield Department of Population Health. Please note that these regulation changes pertain to the regulation changes which were published on 27 June 2013 and come into effect on 1 January 2014.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Council Regulations 17 of 2002, concerning Divisional Boards, in regulation 12 replace references to 'Department of Primary Care Health Sciences' and 'Department of Public Health' with 'Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences' and 'Nuffield Department of Population Health' respectively.
- **2** These changes in regulations shall be effective from 1 January 2014.

(e) Hodgson Memorial Fund

Explanatory Note

The following change, made on the recommendation of the Medical Sciences Board, updates the membership of the board of management to reflect the fact that the Department of Public Health has changed its name to the Nuffield Department of Population Health.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, in §169 delete existing regulation 3 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

- '3. The fund shall be administered by a board of management consisting of
 - (1) the Head of the <u>Nuffield</u> Department of Public Population Health;
 - (2) the Director of Clinical Studies (or his or her nominee);
 - (3) a person appointed by the <u>Medical Sciences</u> Board of the <u>Faculty of Clinical Medicine</u> in consultation with the Head of the <u>Nuffield</u> Department of <u>Public Population</u> Health for such period or periods as it shall determine.'

(f) Lawrence Memorial Travel Scholarship

Explanatory Note

The following change, made on the recommendation of the Medical Sciences Board, updates the membership of the board of management to reflect the fact that the Department of Primary Health Care has changed its name to the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences. The opportunity is also taken to amend outdated references.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, in §199 delete existing regulation 3 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '3. The fund shall be administered by a board of management consisting of:
 - (1) the Head of the <u>Nuffield</u> Department of Primary <u>Health</u> Care <u>Health Sciences</u>;
 - (2) the Head of the Division of Medical Sciences (or his or her nominee);
 - (3) the Warden of Green <u>Templeton</u> College (or his or her nominee);

(1) Voting on Legislative Proposal: Statute XIV: Employment of Academic and Support Staff by the University

Explanatory Note

Following Congregation's approval of the resolution to rename the main lecturer grade as 'associate professor' (published in *Gazette* No 5037, 17 October 2013), this legislative proposal amends the legislation relating to the employment of staff by the University.

The changes establish the grade of associate professor with effect from 1 January 2014 such that those lecturers that are currently appointed as a university lecturer, a university lecturer (medical), a CUF lecturer, a faculty lecturer or a ULNTF may, as they wish, either use the title of associate professor or retain their previous

nomenclature without prejudice to their existing position under the statutes and regulations (for example in respect of eligibility to apply for sabbatical leave or dispensation from lecturing obligations). Appointments to those grades on or after 1 January 2014 will be to the grade of associate professor.

In accordance with the detailed, refined proposal accompanying the resolution, the changes also allow for the following to use the title of associate professor: titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers, supernumerary titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers, substantive readers (including clinical readers), researchers in the professorial-equivalent grade of RSIV, Wellcome Principal Research Fellows, honorary consultant MRC directors, keepers in ASUC whose contractual duties include teaching and research and all university researchers and ASUC staff currently holding the title of reader.

For the avoidance of doubt, those persons upon whom the title of full professor or reader has been conferred may continue to use that title.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend Statute XIV concerning the employment of academic and support staff by the University, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

- 1 In Statute XIV, concerning the employment of academic and support staff by the University, delete existing section 7 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '7. The three main categories of academic staff shall be:
 - (1) professors;;
 - (2) readers;; and
 - (3) associate professors or lecturers.1

lAppointments to the post of university lecturer (including university lecturer (medical) and ULNTF), CUF lecturer and faculty lecturer on or after 1 January 2014 shall be to the post of associate professor.

Those appointed to the posts of university lecturer (including university lecturer (medical) and ULNTF), CUF lecturer and faculty lecturer prior to 1 January 2014 shall be eligible to use the title of associate professor without prejudice to their existing position under the statutes and regulations:

- '8. Those lecturers who were appointed to the post of university lecturer, CUF lecturer or faculty lecturer prior to 1 January 2014 shall be eligible to use the title of associate professor but the provisions relating to lecturers and, where relevant, those particular provisions relating to university lecturers, CUF lecturers and faculty lecturers, shall continue to apply to any such persons for so long as they remain in that post.
- 9. Associate professors appointed on or after 1 January 2014 shall be subject to the provisions relating to lecturers including those particular provisions relating to university lecturers, CUF lecturers or faculty lecturers as shall be appropriate in light of the duties attaching to their post.'
- **3** This statute shall be effective from 1 January 2014.

Regulations to be made by Council if the Statute is approved

- 1 In Council Regulations 3 of 2004, concerning the employment of University Staff, insert new regulation 9 and renumber existing regulations 9-29 as regulations 10-30 (new text underlined):
- '9. Without prejudice to their position under the statutes and regulations, the following persons shall be eligible to use the title of associate professor:
 - (1) all those holding the post of reader (including clinical readers);
 - (2) titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers;
 - (3) supernumerary titular CUF lecturers and university lecturers;
 - (4) all those in the grade of RSIV;
 - (5) Wellcome Principal Research Fellows;
 - (6) honorary consultant MRC directors;
 - (7) keepers in the major museums and scientific collections whose contractual duties include teaching and research;

- (8) researchers holding the title of reader; and
- (9) staff in the major museums and scientific collections holding the title of reader.'
- **2** This regulation shall be effective from 1 January 2014.

University Policy and Procedures relating to Socially Responsible Investment

The University first published a Policy on Socially Responsible Investment in March 2008 supported by a series of procedures in support of its policy. The current Policy and Procedures, set out below, were approved by Council on 2 December 2013.

POLICY

The University of Oxford is committed to ensuring that it makes investment decisions responsibly and with integrity. The University's Policy is to ensure that its investment decisions (including those taken on its behalf) take into account social,

environmental and political issues in order to maintain its ethical standards.

Council has established a Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee ('SRIRC') to provide it with advice on this policy and its delivery. The SRIRC reports directly into Council but also has a mandate to discuss its recommendations with those bodies that have a duty of oversight for the University's investments, in particular the Investment Committee, in so far as those recommendations concern the funds for which each body has responsibility.

PROCEDURES

The University will ensure that Procedures in support of this Policy fulfill the following aims:

- (a) to review regularly this Policy, and practices relating to it, to ensure that social, environmental and political issues are adequately reflected;
- (b) to provide a forum for considering representations to change this Policy and/or practices relating to it on ethical grounds;
- (c) to engage in responsible stewardship with its investment managers and to provide a forum for the review and monitoring of investments in the context of this Policy;
- (d) to engage directly and indirectly with managers (and where possible directly with investments) to make representations concerning social, environmental and political concerns as appropriate.

Delivery of these Procedures is the joint responsibility of the SRIRC (points (a) and (b) above) and those bodies with a duty of oversight for the University's investments, in particular, the Investment Committee (points (c) and (d) above).

(1) Voting on a Resolution authorising the use of space in Dartington House

Explanatory Note

The relocation of the Mathematical Institute to its new building on the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter (the Andrew Wiles building) has led to space becoming available in a number of properties, including Dartington House. It is recommended that, in the short term, the majority of the space vacated in Dartington House should be allocated to IT Services. This allocation enables IT Services to colocate staff who are currently split across a number of sites in a way which better reflects the structure of the department, and facilitates more efficient project delivery. The recommended allocation, which is conditional upon IT Services vacating space at five locations (Blue Boar Court, 5 Worcester Street, Hythe Bridge Street, the Malthouse and 16 Wellington Square), also enables better space efficiency, reducing the space required by IT Services by $578 \, \mathrm{sq} \, \mathrm{m}$, and provides an opportunity for the University to consider reducing the amount of leased space within its estate, in line with the Estate Strategy.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 1,293 sq m net usable area in Dartington House be allocated to IT Services from 1 February 2014 until 31 January 2016.

(2) Voting on a Resolution authorising the use of space at 128 Bullingdon Road

Explanatory Note

The Ruskin School of Art occupies premises at 74 High Street and 128 Bullingdon Road. The latter, located just off Cowley Road, provides studio and workshop space, but the fabric of this building is at the end of its useful life. The provision of better and additional space for the school is the highest capital priority for the Humanities Division. The increase in space is required to enable the school to launch a Master in Fine Arts course. Replacement of the existing building at Bullingdon Road has now been identified as an effective way of delivering this priority. It is anticipated that the new building will provide 1,360 sq m net usable area, an increase of approximately 520 sq m net usable area when compared to the existing building.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 1,360 sq m net usable area at 128 Bullingdon Road be allocated to the Ruskin School of Art.

(3) Voting on a Resolution authorising the use of space in the Tinsley Building

Explanatory Note

The Tinsley Building, located on Mansfield Road, provides accommodation across four floors (including a basement). On 1 June 2010, Congregation authorised the use of the first and second floors by the Department of Physiology, Anatomy and Genetics for the establishment of a new centre.

The ground and basement floors have now been identified as the ideal location for the establishment of a physical base for the Sleep and Circadian Neuroscience Institute (SCNi) (currently a virtual institute). The SCNi is the first institute in the world dedicated to the neuroscience of sleep and to advancing our understanding of how sleep and circadian rhythm disruption (SCRD) impacts upon health.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 700 sq m net usable area in the Tinsley Building be allocated to the Department of Clinical Neuroscience, for the Sleep and Circadian Neuroscience Institute.

The Committee will consider all nominations and applications received by the closing date as well as any candidates proposed by its own members and by the search consultants; it will select from them having due regard to the principles of equality and diversity and the published selection criteria, and it will then make recommendations to Council. Council will consider all recommendations received from the Nominations Committee and will

either propose a candidate for approval by Congregation or will ask the Committee to submit further names for its consideration. The appointment will be for four years, extendable for a further four years.

Responsibilities of members of Council

Whilst Congregation is the University's sovereign body, Council is the University's executive governing body. It is responsible for the advancement of the University's objects, for its administration, and for the management of its finances and property. Council is therefore responsible for the academic policy and strategic direction of the University, subject to the powers of Congregation. Legally, the members of Council are charity trustees and are bound by fiduciary duties. Each must comply with the duties of a charity trustee, and when doing so must exercise the proper standard of care.

Criteria for external members of Council

All members of Council will have a strong personal commitment to higher education and to the values, aims and objectives of Oxford as a collegiate University (ie the University and its colleges).

In considering nominations for external membership of Council, personal qualities will be the primary consideration, but successful candidates will need to be able to demonstrate significant levels of relevant experience. The Nominations Committee will consider demonstrable evidence of the following:

- significant experience in a position or positions requiring the exercise of high levels of responsibility;
- substantial experience in the governance of large complex organisations in the public, private or not-for-profit sectors;
- the ability to engage with issues such as educational policy, strategic planning, risk management, IT and information systems, property, investment, financial

- management, and legal issues, in order to ensure a balance of skills and experience on Council:
- a willingness to represent the values, aims and objectives of the University to those who are not part of the institution and to bring a better understanding of issues outside the institution to the members of the collegiate University;
- the capacity to act fairly and impartially in the interests of the University as a whole, using independent judgement and maintaining confidentiality as appropriate, and avoiding conflicts of interest;
- the willingness to listen, engage, understand and interact with members of the collegiate University at all levels; and
- the willingness to play a role in liaising between key stakeholders and the University and in fundraising.

The role also requires the willingness and ability to devote a significant amount of time on a voluntary basis. External members of Council are expected to spend one to two days per month in Oxford. It is expected that the people appointed to these roles will become involved in the life of the University, and may be asked to become members of other committees.

All members have a responsibility for ensuring that Council conducts itself in accordance with accepted standards of behaviour in public life, embracing selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership. They must also play an appropriate part in ensuring that the business of Council is carried out effectively, efficiently and in a manner appropriate for the proper conduct of public business.

Biographical information about the current external members of Council

Alice Perkins, CB, graduated in Modern History (St Anne's, 1971) and went straight into the Civil Service fast-stream. Her career spanned policy and operations in the Departments of Health and Social Security, public spending in HM Treasury and Civil

Service reform in the Cabinet Office. In her last job, she reported to the Cabinet Secretary and was responsible for Civil Service-wide policies on human resource management, training and development, and reform. She left the Civil Service in 2005 and has since had a number of part-time roles, including non-executive director roles on the boards of Littlewoods, BAA and TaylorNelsonSofres. She is currently non-executive chair of Post Office Limited. She is also a part-time executive coach at the JCA Group. Ms Perkins has been a member of Council since Michaelmas term 2006: her second term expires in Michaelmas term 2014. She has been a member of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, the Task Force on Academic Employment, the Saïd Business School's Business Advisory Council and the Chair of the Nominations Committee and is currently a member of the Finance Committee.

Sir Crispin Davis graduated in Modern History (Oriel, 1970). He then worked for Procter and Gamble from 1970-90, holding a series of senior positions in the UK and Germany before becoming President of the company's North American food business. Sir Crispin is a nonexecutive director of GlaxoSmithKline. a member of the Global Advisory Board for Citigroup, and a member of the Council and the Board of Trustees for the National Trust. He has in the past served on the Development Board of the Tate (2002-7) and the Oxford University Press Finance Committee (1994-9). He has been a member of Council since Hilary term 2009 and is a member of the Finance Committee and of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, and Chair of the Committee to Review the Salaries of Senior University Officers.

Jayne Almond graduated in PPE (St Hilda's, 1975-8). She then worked for Shell from 1978 to 1984 in a number of roles before moving to LEK Consulting, a leading strategy consulting firm, where she became a senior partner and Head of LEK's Financial Service practice. In 1999 she joined Lloyds TSB where she had a number of roles including Managing Director of European Internet Banking, Director of Retail Banking Strategy and Group Marketing Director. She left Lloyds TSB to join Barclays in 2003 where she became Managing Director of Barclays Home Finance division, which included Barclays/Woolwich mortgage business. She left Barclays to set up Stonehaven, a specialist mortgage business, which was launched in August 2006 and where she is currently Executive Chairman. Individuals whose work is interdisciplinary and spans more than one division, or who hold contracts in more than one division, should make an application to the division they consider to be most relevant, and may consult their head of department for advice as necessary. Divisions will confer as necessary about interdisciplinary applications.

With effect from 1 October 2014, all non-medical lecturers (ie University Lecturer, ULNTF, CUF Lecturer and Faculty Lecturer), titular or supernumerary titular ULs/CUFs and Keepers in ASUC, who are in post and who have been deemed to meet the criteria for the conferment of the title of professor, will (unless they already receive recruitment or retention payments at this level or above) receive an increase to their salary of £2,600 per annum whether or not they actually choose to use the title of professor. They will then become eligible for consideration in subsequent exercises for professorial distinction awards.

All applicants can be assured that the standards now to be applied will be no higher than hitherto, and financial constraints will not affect individual decisions.

It is suggested that those considering applying should take advice on their potential case from their head of department, their faculty board chair, or equivalent; though it should be clear that encouragement to apply cannot guarantee a successful outcome. Lecturers with the title of reader had a significantly higher success rate among those applying for the title of professor in the last round, and the Personnel Committee hopes that, in the present round, further lecturers with the title of reader will be able to demonstrate that they now meet the criteria for the conferment of the title of professor.

Conferment of the title of professor will have no implications for the duties of the individual concerned.

2 Eligibility

All those employed by the University in academic or senior research roles are eligible for consideration, as are other University employees who are making a significant and sustained academic contribution to the University.

Individuals not employed by the University, but who are employed on a long-term basis by an Oxford college or by a Recognised Independent Centre or by the NHS and who, in the view of the divisional committee, are making a significant and sustained academic contribution to the University's work, are eligible to be considered for title. Any applicant not employed by the University should apply in the normal way, and the divisional committee will first decide whether the nature and extent of the applicant's contribution to the University, and the opportunities for it to continue, are sufficient for eligibility; the committee will notify their decision regarding eligibility direct to the applicant before seeking references on academic quality and before embarking on any qualitative assessment against the criteria for the conferment of title.

3 Criteria for conferment of the title of professor

The criteria by which cases for the conferment of the title of professor will be considered cover three areas: research, teaching, and good citizenship.

There are three separate thresholds for award of the title of professor, all of which must be met. There are no circumstances in which narrowly undershooting any one of these thresholds can be compensated, in terms of the award of the title, by exceptional achievements in respect of the other thresholds.

The threshold criteria are as set out in the boxes below:

Research

An ongoing research record which is characterised by a significant influence on the field of study and is of a high order of excellence and of international standing, and the quality of which in terms of research distinction is at least equal to that expected of those appointed to full professorships at other leading international research universities.

Research' is to be understood as original investigation undertaken in order to gain knowledge and understanding, including work of direct relevance to the needs of commerce and industry, as well as to the public and voluntary sectors; scholarship; the invention and generation of ideas, images, performances, and artefacts, including design, where these lead to new or substantially improved insights; and the use of existing knowledge in experimental development to produce new or substantially improved materials, devices, products, and processes, including design and construction.

This requirement goes significantly beyond the level of research achievement necessary for reappointment to the retiring age in a University lecturership at Oxford. The University will be looking for evidence of an appropriate combination of some or all of the following activities and outputs, considered in the context of excellence in the discipline:

- research outputs or scholarship recognised in terms of originality, significance and rigour;
- academic leadership in shaping the future of the discipline (which may include the establishment of successful research groups and/or significant engagement with major collaborations);
- an effective contribution to the research culture of the department/faculty at Oxford, eg through the supervision and mentoring of the next generation of researchers;
- a proven record of successful DPhil supervision;

- a record of securing external research funding from relevant sources, where appropriate;
- influence of the research activity beyond academia, including engagement with technology transfer and/or technical developments and/or knowledge exchange, where appropriate;
- recognition of the excellence of research, for example through election to learned societies and research bodies/invitations to deliver prestigious lectures/ appointment to editorial boards of leading journals.

Not all of these seven points have to be met (and this is not an exhaustive list of possible research achievements). However, strong performance across several aspects is expected for the conferment of the title of professor, and the title is not likely to be conferred on applicants with achievements in just a few of the above areas, nor in the absence of research outputs or scholarship recognised in terms of originality, significance and rigour.

Teaching

A record of effective teaching for the University and for colleges concomitant with the duties of the University post and the college fellowship (where one is held).

'Teaching' covers either undergraduate or graduate teaching, or both.

Good citizenship

A record of involvement in University and/or college administration and demonstrable competence in such administration.

Account may also be taken of editorship of journals, service on committees working in a national context, and other forms of public engagement, as well as activities connected to enterprise, links with industry and business etc.

4 Applications

Applications for the Recognition of Distinction exercise should be submitted via the online system (see paragraph 9 below) by **noon on 14 February 2014** and include a *curriculum vitae* arranged in order under the headings listed below. This document should be as concise as possible, and must comprise *no more than* 12 sides of A4 in total (with a font size no smaller than the equivalent to Arial 10), including lists of publications etc.

- (1) Any relevant information such as might normally appear in a *curriculum vitae*, including employment history and current post.
- (2) Advanced study and research, including publications, grants etc, marking with an asterisk the six most significant publications.
- (3) University lectures and classes given, including any participation in curriculum development, syllabus design etc over the last three years or such period as may be required to demonstrate fulfilment of the criteria.
- (4) Graduate supervision and other graduate teaching undertaken over the last three years or such period as may be required to demonstrate fulfilment of the criteria.
- (5) University examining over the last three years or such period as may be required to demonstrate fulfilment of the criteria.
- (6) University administration, academic leadership, contribution to the subject outside the University, editorship of journals, service on committees working in a national context, other forms of public engagement, any enterprise activities or links to industry or business in appropriate cases over the last three years or such period as may be required to demonstrate fulfilment of the criteria.
- (7) Undergraduate teaching for college(s) over the last three years or such period as may be required to demonstrate fulfilment of the criteria.
- (8) College administration over the last three years or such period as may be required to demonstrate fulfilment of the criteria.
- (9) Future plans for research.
- (10) The preferred precise title which applicants think would be appropriate, eg Professor of English Literature, Professor of English Cience. The title should be as concise as possible. Final decisions on the precise titles to be conferred on successful applicants will be made by the University. Applicants are free to specify that if their applications are successful they would not wish to use the title of professor.

5 Disclosure of personal circumstances

Applicants should feel free to disclose circumstances that may, over a considerable period of time, have had a substantial effect on their record of research. This is intended to cover not only circumstances protected under employment and equality legislation, but also unusually high loads of teaching and/or administration and/or clinical duties. In respect of the last five years, applicants who were permitted submission in the REF with a reduced number of outputs may wish to report that decision (this applies in particular to those who may have kept their particular circumstances confidential, in which case they need not supply the underlying details).

6 References

The references listed below should be requested by applicants and be submitted by the referees to the relevant Divisional Recognition of Distinction Committee by **noon on 14 February 2014** (please see section 9 for divisional email addresses). It is the responsibility of applicants to ensure that their references are submitted by the deadline and to check with their references (**not** with the divisional office) that references have been sent:

- (1) from **the head of department or the faculty board chair** (who may delegate the writing of the reference). In respect of those who are working in Continuing Education, or the Academic Services and University Collections, and those who are not University employees, there should also be a reference from the head of the department/faculty board chair with which their academic work is most closely associated;
- (2) from **one research referee** of their own choice. The research referees may also address the teaching and/or the good citizenship criteria if they wish to do so;
- (3) from **the head of house** (who may delegate the writing of the reference) in all cases where the individual has a college attachment.

The principal function of the references from the head of department or faculty board chair and the head of house is to give an assessment of the individual's contributions against the criteria for teaching and good citizenship. These references may also address the research criterion if they wish. Where an applicant does not have a college attachment the assessment of teaching and good citizenship

criteria will rely on the reference from the head of department or faculty board chair.

In addition to the references arranged by applicants as outlined above, divisional Recognition of Distinction committees will seek at least two additional references for each applicant which focus on the extent to which applicants meet the research criterion. The combination of research references should be sufficient to give the clearest evidence as to whether the research criterion has been met, noting that that criterion requires a research record at least equal in distinction to that expected of those appointed to full professorships at other leading international research universities. The divisional committees may seek supplementary information, as they see necessary, in order to reach fair and consistent decisions. The research referees may also address the teaching and/or the good citizenship criteria if they wish to do

Where it has not proved possible for a division to obtain at least two additional references within the timescale of the exercise, consideration of the application shall be suspended by the divisional committee; the applicant will be notified in such circumstances and asked whether they wish the application to be retained for consideration within a future exercise (such applicants may decide subsequently to submit an updated application).

7 Divisional Recognition of Distinction Committees and the Senior Appointments Panel

Each divisional board will delegate the consideration of applications and the making of recommendations for the award of title to a single Recognition of Distinction committee, normally chaired by the head of the division. The membership of these committees will be published in the *Gazette* and on relevant University webpages.

Divisional Recognition of Distinction committees will assess each case strictly by reference to the criteria set out above, account having been taken of any personal circumstances disclosed by the applicant.

Divisional Recognition of Distinction committees will consult between themselves in cases where an individual falls for consideration by more than one board. Particularly careful consideration (especially in relation to the seeking of research references) will be given to applicants whose work is interdisciplinary.

The divisional Recognition of Distinction committees will forward their recommendations in respect of all applications to the afforced Senior Appointments Panel, who will scrutinise the cases for proper procedure and for fair application of standards and may refer any case back for further consideration.

8 Timetable for the Recognition of Distinction exercise 2014

December 2013-January 2014

Applicants prepare their applications and request references to be supplied to the relevant divisional email address (please see section 9 for details).

Individuals considering making an application are strongly encouraged to take advice on their application from the relevant head of department, faculty board chair, or equivalent; the head/chair may refer them to other senior members of the department or faculty for such advice.

10 January 2014

The online application process will be open for applications to be submitted.

noon, 14 February 2014

Deadline for submission of applications including:

- a curriculum vitae arranged as outlined above to be submitted via the online process;
- a statement of personal circumstances, if relevant, to be submitted via the online process;
- references requested by applicants, including from head of department/ faculty board chair, head of house and one research referee. Referees should send the reference by email to the relevant divisional email address set out above.

Please note that no exceptions can be made to the **noon on 14 February** deadline.

February-March 2014

Divisional Recognition of Distinction committees will: review applications; request additional research references for each applicant; confer with other divisional committees about interdisciplinary applicants; seek any additional material as evidence if required; and review applications from those who are not employees of the University and notify such applicants with a decision about their eligibility for consideration.

May 2014

Divisional Recognition of Distinction committees will meet to make proposals for the conferment of title to the Senior Appointments Panel.

July 2014

The Senior Appointments Panel will meet to make decisions based on divisional committee proposals. The Vice-Chancellor will write to all applicants to notify them of the outcome. Titles for successful applicants will take effect immediately the decision is notified.

Feedback from divisional committees will be available from the head of division in cases in which it is agreed not to confer the title of professor.

October 2014

A list of people on whom the title of professor has been conferred will be published in the *Gazette*. Additional payments to those eligible will take effect from 1 October.

Departments and colleges are asked not to publish details of successful applicants on their websites until 1 October.

The online system will be open for applications between **10 January 2014 and noon on 14 February 2014**.

General Purposes Committee of Council

Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **31 January**.

Establishment of Professorship of Economic Policy Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish the Professorship of Economic Policy Fund for the endowment of the salary and expenses of the holder of the professorship and associated overheads.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning academic and other posts, insert new §64 as follows, and renumber existing §§64-332 as §§65-333:

'§64. Professorship of Economic Policy Fund

- 1. The University receives with gratitude the sum of US\$3,803,000 from the Foundation to Promote Open Society to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Professorship of Economic Policy Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the salary and expenses of the holder of the Professorship and associated overheads. The Professor shall undertake research, lecture and give instruction in economic policy and generally promote its study in the University. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Professor

are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the income and/or capital of the Fund to support the Professor's research.

- 4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Social Sciences Divisional Board.
- 5. At such times as Paul Collier (being the Professor of Economics and Public Policy at the Blavatnik School of Government at the date these regulations are made) is not employed or engaged as a consultant by any part of the collegiate University, the Professor shall be known as the Paul Collier Professor of Economic Policy.
- 6. The Professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) below is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council:
 - (2) the head of the college to which the Professorship may be allocated by Council from time to time; or if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) above;
 - (4)-(5) two persons appointed by Council;
 - (6) a person appointed by the Social Sciences Board;
 - (7)-(8) two persons appointed by the Blavatnik School of Government;
 - (9)-(10) two persons appointed by the Department of Economics.
- 7. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to the Professorship.
- 8. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead

- of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 9. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Professorship.
- 10. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 11. Regulations 1-5 and 8-13 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 12. Subject to regulation 13, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 13. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

Planning and Resource Allocation Committee of Council

Changes in Regulations

The Planning and Resource Allocation Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **31 January**.

(a) Establishment of the Professorship of Economic History

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, establish a new Professorship of Economic History. The Professorship of Economic History in the Department of Economics shall replace the Readership of Recent Social and Economic History on the retirement of the present incumbent.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Schedule A of Council Regulations 3 of 2004, concerning statutory professorships, after 'Chichele Professor of Economic History' insert 'Professor of Economic History'.
- **2** In Sect III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, delete existing regulation §138 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'§138. Reader <u>Professor of in Recent Social and Economic History</u>

- 1.The Reader <u>Professor of in Recent Social and Economic History shall lecture and give instruction in Recent Social and Economic History on such conditions and with such duties as the General <u>Social Sciences</u> Board shall from time to time determine.</u>
- 2.The readerprofessor shall be elected by a board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor;
 - (2) the head of the college with which the readership professorship shall be for the time being associated, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;
 - (4) the Chichele Professor of Economic History;
 - (5) a person appointed by Council;
 - (6) a person appointed by the General <u>Social Sciences</u> Board;

- (7) a person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of History;
- (8), (9) two persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Social Studies Department of Economics.'

(b) Renaming of the Cookson Professorship of Materials

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board, rename the Cookson Professor of Materials as the Vesuvius Professorship of Materials. This change is being made in light of a change to the name of the donor to Vesuvius plc. The opportunity has also been taken to amend outdated references.

Text of Regulations

 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;
 - (2) the head of the college to which the professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any regulation decree in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;
 - (4), (5) two persons appointed by Council, one of whom shall be appointed after consultation with the Cookson Group Vesuvius plc;

- (6) a person appointed by the General Board;
- (7)-(9) three persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Physical Sciences.
- (6)-(9) four persons appointed by the Mathematical Physical and Life Sciences Board.
- 4. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the <u>regulations</u> decree concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same <u>regulations</u> decree which are applicable to this chair.'

Procedure for election of external members of Council

There will be a vacant place on Council for an external member from Michaelmas term 2014. An external member is defined in Statute I as 'a person who is not the resident holder of a teaching, research or administrative post in the University or in any college, society or Permanent Private Hall'.

Members of Congregation are invited to submit nominations for consideration by the Nominations Committee for the place on Council, taking account of the criteria set out below, on a form available on www. admin.ox.ac.uk/councilsec/nomination or from the Registrar's office (01865 280415). The Nominations Committee expects that nominations will be made without any communication by the nominator with the nominee. Nominators should indicate on the nominations form if any informal communication has taken place.

The closing date for nominations is **Monday, 10 February 2014**.

The Nominations Committee will act in accordance with Council Regulation 15 of 2002, available on the website at www. admin.ox.ac.uk/statutes/regulations/520-122q.shtml. Current Council members are listed at www.admin.ox.ac.uk/councilsec/governance/council/membershipofcouncil. The Committee is being assisted by Saxton Bampfylde search consultants.

The Committee will consider all nominations and applications received by the closing date as well as any candidates proposed by its own members and by the search consultants; it will select from them having due regard to the principles of equality and diversity and the published selection criteria, and it will then make recommendations to Council. Council will consider all recommendations received from the Nominations Committee and will either propose a candidate for approval by Congregation or will ask the Committee to submit further names for its consideration. If a candidate is rejected by Congregation the Committee will propose a further candidate or candidates to be put to Council in accordance with the above procedures until the vacancy is filled.

The appointment will be for four years, extendable for a further four years.

Responsibilities of members of Council

Whilst Congregation is the University's sovereign body, Council is the University's executive governing body. It is responsible for the advancement of the University's objects, for its administration, and for the management of its finances and property. Council is therefore responsible for the academic policy and strategic direction of the University, subject to the powers of Congregation. Legally, the members of Council are charity trustees and are bound by fiduciary duties. Each must comply with the duties of a charity trustee, and when doing so must exercise the proper standard of care.

Criteria for external members of Council

All members of Council will have a strong personal commitment to higher education and to the values, aims and objectives of Oxford as a collegiate University (ie the University and its colleges).

In considering nominations for external membership of Council, personal qualities will be the primary consideration, but successful candidates will need to be able to demonstrate significant levels of relevant experience. The Nominations Committee will consider demonstrable evidence of the following:

- significant experience in a position or positions requiring the exercise of high levels of responsibility;
- substantial experience in the governance of large complex organisations in the public, private or not-for-profit sectors;
- the ability to engage with issues such as educational policy, strategic planning, risk management, IT and information systems, property, investment, financial management, and legal issues, in order to ensure a balance of skills and experience on Council;
- a willingness to represent the values, aims and objectives of the University to those who are not part of the institution and to bring a better understanding of issues outside the institution to the members of the collegiate University;
- the capacity to act fairly and impartially in the interests of the University as a whole, using independent judgement and maintaining confidentiality as appropriate, and avoiding conflicts of interest;
- the willingness to listen, engage, understand and interact with members of the collegiate University at all levels; and
- the willingness to play a role in liaising between key stakeholders and the University and in fundraising.

The role also requires the willingness and ability to devote a significant amount of time on a voluntary basis. External members of Council are expected to spend one to two days per month in Oxford. It is expected that the people appointed to these roles will become involved in the life of the University, and may be asked to become members of other committees.

All members have a responsibility for ensuring that Council conducts itself in accordance with accepted standards of behaviour in public life, embracing selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership. They must also play an appropriate part in ensuring that the business of Council is carried out effectively, efficiently and in a manner appropriate for the proper conduct of public business.

Biographical information about the current external members of Council

Alice Perkins, CB, graduated in Modern History (St Anne's, 1971) and went straight into the Civil Service fast-stream. Her career spanned policy and operations in the Departments of Health and Social Security, public spending in HM Treasury and Civil Service reform in the Cabinet Office. In her last job, she reported to the Cabinet Secretary and was responsible for Civil Service-wide policies on human resource management, training and development, and reform. She left the Civil Service in 2005 and has since had a number of part-time roles, including non-executive director roles on the boards of Littlewoods, BAA and TaylorNelsonSofres. She is currently non-executive chair of Post Office Limited. She is also a part-time executive coach at the JCA Group. Ms Perkins has been a member of Council since Michaelmas term 2006; her second term expires in Michaelmas term 2014. She has been a member of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, the Task Force on Academic Employment, the Saïd Business School's Business Advisory Council and the Chair of the Nominations Committee and is currently a member of the Finance Committee.

Sir Crispin Davis graduated in Modern History (Oriel, 1970). - teaching, learning and assessment
- the relationship between teaching and research
- academic and pastoral support and guidance
- the provision and use of learning resources (including staff resources)
- specific arrangements for the pursuit of graduate studies (including research degrees and research training and provision for part-time study)
- · relationships with colleges
- quality assurance mechanisms;

- (c) the organisation of the school, its management structures and the relationship between the school and the division, including such matters as:
- strategic planning (including relationship to the divisional five-year plans and the University's Corporate Plan)
- academic and non-academic staff planning and recruitment
- student number planning
- terms of appointment for academic staff, including career development and equal opportunities issues
- accommodation and future space needs
- · fundraising;

(d) the relationship (structural and operational) between units within the school, and between the school and cognate subject areas and colleges to which it is linked in teaching and research.

2 To consider the current and longterm financial position of, and funding arrangements for, the school, and its financial strategy.

Guidance notes for the holding of outside appointments and the conduct of outside work

This guidance note should be read in conjunction with Council Regulations 5 of 2004.

(1) PROCEDURES FOR APPLYING FOR APPROVAL TO HOLD OUTSIDE APPOINTMENTS

(a) Applicants must complete an application form available at: www.admin. ox.ac.uk/personnel/staffinfo/academic/approvaltoholdoutsideappointments.

(b) Applicants whose salaries are funded from externally funded research grants or contracts, or who are Principal Investigators (PIs) or Co-Investigators on outsidesponsored projects, must adhere to the terms and conditions stipulated by or agreed with the sponsor and, if necessary, seek written approval from the sponsor¹. If you are in any doubt, please contact Research Services staff for advice on the terms and conditions of externally funded research grants and contracts held by the University (tel: Oxford (2)70143).

(c) Applicants must obtain the approval of their direct line manager where relevant.

(d) When the necessary approvals have been obtained from the relevant line manager or sponsor (as appropriate), applicants should submit the completed form to their head of department², who will be asked to sign to confirm that he/she is content to approve the outside commitment in the context of the applicant's University duties. The person who signs the forms should be:

- the head of department or faculty board chairman; or
- the head of division if the applicant is a head of department, or the application is for a total of more than 30 days per year; or

- the line manager of the senior officer making the application (where applicable). For the avoidance of doubt, the application should be made to the Vice-Chancellor in respect of each of the Pro-Vice-Chancellors with portfolio, the Heads of Division, the Registrar and Bodley's Librarian. In the case of the Vice-Chancellor, he or she should submit an application to the Chancellor;
- the person at the next higher level of authority if the head of department (or equivalent) has an interest in the appointment or activity.

(e) Applicants must ensure that they are familiar with the University's policy and procedure on conflict of interest (www. admin.ox.ac.uk/researchsupport/integrity/conflict). If they have any concerns about potential conflicts implicit in their proposed arrangements they should approach the secretary of the Conflict of Interest Committee (www.admin.ox.ac.uk/researchsupport/integrity/conflict/policy).

(f) If the outside appointment is arranged via Oxford University Consulting (see section 2 below) and approval is granted for the outside appointment, the applicant will enjoy a measure of protection under the University's insurance arrangements (see www.admin.ox.ac.uk/researchsupport/oxonly/contracts/consulting/faqs). If the outside appointment is arranged privately the individual (or the company) will need to hold their own insurance cover (see www. admin.ox.ac.uk/researchsupport/oxonly/contracts/consulting/private).

(2) OXFORD UNIVERSITY CONSULTING

The University's wholly owned subsidiary company, Isis Innovation Limited, has a division, Oxford University Consulting (OUC) (www.isis-innovation.com/consulting/index.html), to help members of the University market their expertise to outside bodies, negotiate commercial terms and payment on behalf of individuals, and manage the administration associated with consultancy. OUC offers a professional service for academics and departments throughout the University, which will identify consultancy and related opportunities with local, national and

international companies and organisations. Details of this service may be obtained by telephone (Oxford (2)80829) or by email (consulting@isis.ox.ac.uk).

Members of the University choosing to use the services of OUC must still follow the internal procedures for University approval of their outside appointments as outlined in this Guidance Note; OUC will, however, assist with the process on behalf of the individuals concerned. Please see the University's Consulting Policy and Procedures (www.admin.ox.ac.uk/researchsupport/contracts/consulting).

(3) CONSULTANCIES WITHIN RESEARCH GRANT APPLICATIONS AND CONTRACTS

The holding of a consultancy may be included where appropriate within research grant applications and contracts. Where consultancies are included in this way and provision is made through the payroll to pay staff for such work, the Outside Grants (OG) form should itemise, among the costs of the project, the costs of the consultancy payment (including employer's on-costs). Indirect costs should also be calculated on the total cost of the project, including the fee for the consultancy.

The PI should personally ensure that their Oxford colleague (acting as consultant on the project) understands the conditions under which they are being engaged (eg tasks to be undertaken, due dates, payment, intellectual property provisions, etc). This would normally be done in a meeting between the PI and the consultant (a brief follow-up email exchange to note what was agreed may also be appropriate). Time spent on such consultancies will count towards the 30-day limit.

If a department wishes to make personal payments to a University of Oxford staff member from a research account, these payments must go through the University payroll.

(4) SERVICES TO INDUSTRY AND OUTSIDE RODIES

Not all work for outside bodies is governed by a contract with an external sponsor under the University's research grants and contracts procedures. Some is likely to be 'service' work, ie the provision of a service to an external organisation which is not of academic benefit but which makes use of spare capacity in a department (most often specialist facilities/equipment) in return for payment. Such arrangements should nevertheless be covered by an agreement approved by the head of department which is drawn up in consultation with

the departmental administrator and (for tax reasons) with the Finance Division. Customers must be made aware of the University's standard conditions of sale and supply (available from the Legal Services Office (LSO)), which must be incorporated into all contracts (subject to any variations required on a case-by-case basis, and drafted or endorsed by the LSO).

A department may well wish to engage Oxford University Consulting to arrange these service agreements with third parties (see www.isis-innovation.com/consulting/index.html).

Where appropriate, a payment may be made through the payroll to individuals for the additional work undertaken in performing the services. It is expected that the head of department will decide on an appropriate fee to be paid to the individual based on the time spent (which again will count towards the 30 days per year limit). In such cases, where an agreement has been made with the University in respect of the service, it is not expected that a further personal consultancy agreement with the academic concerned will be necessary.

(5) FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS FOR OUTSIDE APPOINTMENTS

The University does not generally (except in the case of consultancies for which the information is requested for the annual HE-BCI survey) seek details of remuneration which applicants are to receive in return for outside commitments, but reserves the right to request to be provided with such details in certain circumstances, eg in the light of any potential conflict of interest with the outside commitment. Applicants wishing exceptionally to make a case to spend a total of more than 30 days in any one year on outside commitments **will** be required to provide details of remuneration.

(6) MONITORING AND REPORTING OF OUTSIDE APPOINTMENTS

(a) Heads of department are responsible, through their departmental administration, for keeping records of the number of days spent on outside commitments by all staff (regardless of staff group) in their departments.

(b) Departments and divisions are responsible for reporting the details of all outside commitments held by staff via HRIS by the end of September each year.

EXTENSION FEE FOR PART-TIME MSC IN MATHEMATICAL FINANCE

Explanatory Note

The following change makes provision for a extension fee for students taking the parttime MSc in Mathematical Finance who extend beyond the standard seven terms for which tuition fees are payable. This regularises an existing arrangement. The level of the extension fee has been reviewed and is now set at £500 per term, of which £400 will flow to the Mathematical Institute and £100 to the student's college. This revised level of fee is lower than the current fee charged for extensions: since this is to students' advantage, it is acceptable that the change be brought in to apply to students currently on course. New text is shown by underlining.

Text of Regulations

With effect from 1 January 2014

1 In *Examination Regulations* 2013, p1125, delete ll16–32, as amended by *Gazette* No 5032, 4 July 2013, pp686–7, and substitute:

'5. Fee requirements relating to full-time students undertaking graduate study shall also apply to part-time students holding the same status, save that part-time students shall be required to pay half the applicable full-time fee over twice the applicable length of time for full-time students, except where the fee for the part-time programme is otherwise specified in the regulations, and except where the applicable period is otherwise specified under cl 6 below.

6. The number of composition fees payable under cl 3 above by those working for any qualification other than the degree of DPhil shall not exceed six in respect of each qualification⁽⁷⁾, save that those students receiving tuition or supervision after attempting an examination shall continue to pay composition fees for each term in which they receive tuition or supervision, and

(a) part-time students for the Degree of Master of Science in Education shall pay not more than twelve composition fees;

(b) students for the Degree of Master of Science in Evidence-Based Health

Care, Experimental Therapeutics, Software and System Security, Software Engineering, Surgical Science and Practice, or Sustainable Urban Development shall pay not more and not fewer than six termly programme fees irrespective of the period for which they are registered for that degree;

(c) students for the Degree of Master of Theology shall not pay more than six fees (at the half rate) while working for Part II of that degree;

(d) students for the Degree of Master of Studies in International Human Rights Law shall pay not more than six composition fees; and

(e) part-time students for the MSc in Mathematical Finance shall pay not more than two tuition fees covering seven terms of study, payable at the start of the first and second year of the course respectively; students requiring an extension of time shall pay a continuation fee of £500 for each term in which they continue to receive tuition or supervision;

save that for those students under (a)–(d) above who receive tuition or supervision after attempting an examination or who require an extension of time shall continue to pay composition fees for each term in which they receive tuition or supervision.

The Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC) and Education Committee have reviewed the fees payable by candidates for higher degrees (that is, the DSc, DLitt, DD, DCL and DMus). The review took into account the fee payable to judges for those degrees, which the committees have agreed should be increased in the light of recommendations from Education Committee's Graduate Panel. The review was also informed by details of the administrative costs associated with the handling of applications for higher degrees. and by benchmarking against the fees payable by candidates for higher degrees at other institutions. Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on

21 February.

Weldon Memorial Prize

Explanatory Note

These changes: (i) replace the reference to the Linacre Professor of Zoology with reference to any Established Chair within Zoology; (ii) reflect the updated arrangements for responsibility for appointments formerly made by faculty boards, in this case the Boards of the Faculty of Biological Sciences and the Faculty of Mathematical Sciences; and (iii) reflect the change in responsibility for appointments from Hebdomadal Council to the Medical Sciences Divisional Board.

Text of Regulations

1 In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, in regulation §372, relating to the Weldon Memorial Prize, amend regulation 3 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

- '3. The electors to the prize shall be
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor;
 - (2) the Linacre Professor of Zoology holder of an Established Chair in the Department of Zoology on a rotational basis;
 - (3) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Biological Sciences;
 - (4) one person appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Mathematical Sciences;
 - (3)-(4) two persons appointed by the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Divisional Board;
 - (5)-(6) two persons appointed by Gouncil the Medical Sciences Divisional Board.

Appointees shall hold office for six years and shall be re-eligible.'

2 Ibid, amend regulation 6 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'6. The prize shall, subject to the provisions of clause regulation 5 above, be awarded without regard to nationality or membership of any University to the person who, in the judgement of the electors, has, in the ten years next preceding the date of the award, published the most noteworthy contribution to the development of mathematical or statistical methods applied to problems in Biology. Biology shall, for the purposes of this clause, be interpreted as including Zoology, Botany, Anthropology, Sociology, Psychology, and Medical Science.'

3 Ibid, amend regulation 10 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'10. The electors shall have power to make regulations or by-laws rules for the purpose of carrying this decree these regulations into effect; and Council shall have power to alter the decree regulations from time to time in such manner as it shall deem expedient, provided that the main objects of the foundation as expressed in clauses regulations 1 and 6 above are always kept in view.'

The review committee's terms of reference are:

1 To review the quality of academic activities in the department, by reference to:

- international standards of excellence
- action taken since the last review of the department
- planning statements at department and divisional level, and in the context of the University's mission statement and corporate plan.

In particular:

(a) the quality of the research of the department, including its participation in interdepartmental, interdivisional and interdisciplinary activities, its research profile and strategy, and future challenges and opportunities;

(b) the quality of undergraduate and graduate programmes and their delivery and related issues, including:

- · access and admissions
- curriculum design and programme structure
- teaching, learning and assessment
- the relationship between teaching and research
- academic and pastoral support and guidance
- the provision and use of learning resources (including staff resources)
- specific arrangements for the pursuit of graduate studies (including research degrees and research training and provision for part-time study)
- · relationships with colleges
- quality assurance mechanisms;

(c) the organisation of the department, its management structures and the relationship between the department and the division, including such matters as:

- strategic planning (including relationship to the divisional five-year plans and the University's Corporate Plan)
- academic and non-academic staff planning and recruitment
- · student number planning
- terms of appointment for academic staff, including career development and equal opportunities issues
- · accommodation and future space needs
- · fundraising;

(d) the relationship (structural and operational) between units within the department, and between the department and cognate subject areas and colleges to which it is linked in teaching and research.

2 To consider the current and longterm financial position of, and funding arrangements for, the department, and its financial strategy.

Clubs Committee

ANNUAL REPORT 2012-13

The Clubs Committee is pleased to present its annual report for 2012–13 in accordance with section 4.6 of its terms of reference as set out in Council Regulations 2 of 2004. This report was considered by Council's General Purposes Committee in January 2014.

- **1** As usual, Clubs Committee was chaired by the Assessor (Dr Helen Leith Spencer followed by Dr Penny Probert Smith) with a membership of both staff and student representatives. It continued to provide a range of support for the University's official student clubs and societies (ie those registered with the Proctors).
- **2** Funding for the committee's activities was provided from two sources in the usual way: an allocation from PRAS (£9.38k), which represented a slight increase from the previous year, and a net share (£10.13k) of the proceeds of the per-capita levy paid by all colleges to support both sports and nonsports clubs at university level.

- 3 The committee continued to operate a Clubs Office (co-located within the Proctors' Office in the University Offices) staffed by a part-time Clubs Officer. We thank her for her quiet but very effective work. In addition to being available to provide secretarial services on request to student organisations, the Clubs Officer advised on and assisted with registration procedures (including checking financial information submitted). During the year, around 250 clubs and societies registered and re-registered with the Proctors (80 of these were designated as Sports Clubs and dealt with their registration through the Sports Department, while the remaining non-sports clubs and publications dealt direct with the Clubs Office). A total of 19 new non-sports clubs were added to the register during the year.
- 4 The committee also continued its cooperation with the Sports Department over the Driver Assessment and Vehicle Hire Scheme (administered from the Sports Department but open to use by any club registered with the Proctors). This important scheme enables students to drive goodquality hired vehicles safely, insured by the University, when taking part in bona fide club activities such as travelling to sports fixtures or events outside Oxford. 691 total hires were made by clubs under the scheme, the great majority of these (567) being for sports purposes. During the year, driver assessments were carried out on 28 days (both new and refresher assessments). These were much the same as the previous year. The number of student drivers showed an increase of around 30% to 330 on the scheme's database. The number of reportable insurance incidents was lower than last year: 13 rather than 17, an encouraging trend. However the overall cost was slightly higher owing to three large claims (all incurred while drivers were manoeuvring vehicles at low speed). Action to reduce such claims continues with the Assessment Consultant and directly with
- **5** Financial support was provided direct to clubs in the form of grants and interest-free loans. During the year the committee considered about 20 applications from non-sports clubs and publications. Of these, 13 applications were supported. Start-up awards (up to £200) reflected our global reach: the maximum grant was given to the Tea Appreciation Society, Society for Geology for Global Development and the Oxford Indian Classical Arts Society, as well as the Ballet Society and, a group undeterred by the laws of physics, the Quidditch Society. The Darts Club, which lapsed in 2007, was re-registered and also qualified

- for the start-up grant of £200. The support of music continued with a grant of £140 to the Oxford Philharmonia for rehearsal room hire, £769 towards the costs of hosting an Oxford/Cambridge performance of Verdi's Requiem, and a grant of £230 to the OU Brass Band, to support its participation in the 2013 national student championships. The committee appreciated the application of the OU Historical Re-enactment Society towards the provision of helmets, swords and a new axe and gave a grant of £300 (after inspection of a safety assessment!). The Chabad Society was given £500 for bookcases for Tajtelbaum Library in Chabad House. Students continue to give generously of their time: the Exeter College Vacation Project (open to students from all colleges) was given £500 towards the costs of the student volunteers taking the children from deprived regions on holiday. Oxford Lawyers Without Borders received a loan of £200 towards the costs of staging a global conference. The reports back to the committee show that its funding, although often comparatively modest, makes a considerable difference to the viability of new clubs and to the success of the activities of those which have been in existence longer.
- **6** Last year we reported that a Working Group on Club Constitutions had been set up. Its recommendations to the Rules Committee in Hilary 2013 were accepted. The significant ruling was that all clubs should work from the same basic constitution, although it was acknowledged that the large Sports Clubs would need particular additions. Early consultations with the large clubs were encouraging. Clubs were given until September 2014 to adopt the new constitution. Unfortunately progress on implementing these recommendations has been slower than hoped but it is expected that most clubs will still be able to meet the September deadline.
- **7** As always the Clubs Committee benefited from the keen interest and lively contributions of its student members. The committee remains convinced that student clubs contribute hugely to the University's sporting, social, cultural and charitable activities and is pleased to be able to help to promote and support these.
- **8** Finally we are very sorry to report the resignation of Brian Gasser as Clerk to the Proctors. Dr Gasser has been secretary to the Clubs Committee for many years. He has given generously of his time and expertise both to the committee and to individual clubs and we are very grateful to him for all his work.



Council of the University

Changes in Regulations

Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **28 February**.

(a) Value for Money Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC), are designed to support the Value for Money Subcommittee in seeking delivery of agreed, measurable objectives, and in scrutinising and challenging these objectives as appropriate. The opportunity is also being taken to make a non-substantive change to the wording of the membership, to remove an unnecessary reference to the Chair also being a member of PRAC, as the PRAC regulations already make clear that the Chair of the Value for Money Subcommittee is an exofficio member of PRAC.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Council Regulations 15 of 2002 Part 34, concerning the Value for Money Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, amend regulation 34.1(1) as follows (deleted text scored through):
- '34.1. The Value for Money Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee shall consist of:
 - (1) a person appointed by Council as chairman of the committee, who shall also be a member of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;'.
- **2** Ibid, amend regulation 34.6 as follows (new text underlined):
- '34.6. The subcommittee shall be responsible for:
 - (1) developing and maintaining strategy, policy and guidance setting out the University's objectives in the pursuit of value for money as defined in regulation 5.4 (69) of Council Regulations 15 of 2002;

- (2) developing and implementing strategies to promote and support the pursuit of value for money throughout the University, including within planning and decision-making processes at all levels, to ensure that value for money is embedded within the University's operations and culture;
- (3) adopting and disseminating value for money good practice;
- (4) raising the profile of value for money across the University.; and
- (5) reporting to the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee and the Audit and Scrutiny Committee on:
 - (a) the divisions' and services' development of objectives that are aligned, measureable, and focused on significant resource impact; and
 - (b) the challenge and scrutiny of value for money delivery.'

(b) Budget Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC), provide for the Chair of the IT Committee of Council to be an *ex officio* member and for representatives from each of the four academic divisions to be members of the Budget Subcommittee of PRAC, in order to increase the effectiveness of the Subcommittee in complementing the work of IT Committee and the IT Planning and Resources Group, and in scrutinising UAS budgets.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 15 of 2002 Part 9, concerning the Budget Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, delete existing regulation 9.1 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

- '9.1. The Budget Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee shall consist of:
 - (1) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Planning and Resources) who shall chair the committee:
 - (2) the Chair of the IT Committee;
 - (2), (3), (4) two external persons appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;
 - (4)(5)-(8) five four members of Congregation, one representing each of

the academic divisions, appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee after consultation with the head of each division.for their expertise in an area relevant to the remit of the committee, but ensuring cross-divisional membership;

(9) one person with expertise in Information and Communications Technology appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, who does not have responsibility for Information and Communications Technology provision by service units in the University Administration and Services and the Academic Services and University Collections.'

(c) Oxford University Museum of Natural History

Explanatory Note

The following change, made on the recommendation of the Board of Visitors of the Oxford University Museum of Natural History, amends the membership of the Board of Visitors to replace the Professor of Zoology with the Hope Professor of Zoology (Entomology) with effect from the date of retirement of the current Professor of Zoology. The Hope Professor of Zoology (Entomology) was a member of the Board of Visitors until the professorship was suspended; however, given that the professorship has now been refilled, it is considered that the previous arrangement should be reinstated.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Council Regulations 48 of 2002, concerning the Oxford University Museum of Natural History, amend existing regulation 2(9) and substitute (new text underlined):
 - '(9) the <u>Hope</u> Professor of Zoology (<u>Entomology</u>) or his or her nominee;'.
- **2** These changes in regulations shall be effective from 1 October 2014.

(d) Law Faculty Board

Explanatory Note

These changes to the membership of the Law Faculty Board, made on the recommendation of the Law Faculty Board and the Social Sciences Board, increase the number of *ex officio* members and reduce the number of elected members accordingly. The changes also increase the term of office for elected members from two to three years. The number of members to be elected to the Law Faculty Board in any given year is also amended in light of these other changes.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Council Regulations 19 of 2002, concerning Faculty Boards, delete existing regulations 12-15 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '12. The number of official and ordinary members of each faculty listed in regulation 7 <u>above</u> shall be as follows:

save that, if in the case of any board the number of persons qualified under regulation 8 above to be official members of the board is less than the number specified in this regulation 1211, then the number of official members of the board shall be that smaller number.

- 14. (1) Every elected member of a board of a faculty shall, in the absence of provision in these regulations to the contrary, hold office for two years with effect from the first day of the Michaelmas term next following the date of his or her election, save that casual vacancies shall be filled for the remaining period of office of the person being replaced.
 - (2) Every elected member of the board of the Faculty of Law shall hold office for three years with effect from the first day of the Michaelmas term next following the date of his or her election, save that casual vacancies shall be filled for the remaining period of office of the person being replaced.
- 15. (1) The persons qualified to elect the ordinary members of the board of any faculty may, if they think fit, direct by bylaw that no ordinary member shall serve for more than three successive periods of two years each or two successive periods of three years each, as appropriate.
 - (2) A meeting of those electors may be summoned at any time by the chairman of the faculty, or, if the faculty has been divided into sub-faculties, by the chairman of the board, for the purpose of making or rescinding such a by-law, and shall be so summoned by him or her on

- the requisition of not less than one-half of the total number of such electors, or, if the number of such electors exceeds thirty, on the requisition of not fewer than fifteen.
- (3) Not less than seven clear days' notice shall be given of any such meeting; the chairman of the faculty or the chairman of the board shall (unless some other chairman is appointed by the meeting) preside at the meeting, but shall not (unless he or she is an elector) vote.
- (4) The chairman of the meeting shall immediately notify to the Registrar the decision of the meeting, which shall be published in the *University Gazette*.
- ¹Of whom four shall be, ex officio:
 - 1. Director of the Centre for Criminology;
 - 2. Director of the Centre for Socio-Legal Studies;
 - 3. Director of the Institute for European and
 - Comparative Law; and
 - 4. Director of the Oxford Intellectual Property Research Centre.
- ²⁴ Of whom two<u>six</u> shall be, the faculty board's directors of graduate studies, and one the chairman of the faculty exofficio:
 - 1. Dean of the Law Faculty (Chair of the Law Board);
 - 2. Vice-Chair of the Law Board;
 3. Director of Graduate Studies (Research);
 - 4. Director of Graduate Studies (Taught);
 - 5. Director of Undergraduate Studies in Law; and 6. Development Co-ordinator.
- 32 Where an election is required.
- **2** These regulations shall be effective from 1 October 2014.

(e) Regulations for College Contributions

Explanatory Note

Amendments to the regulation concerning the tax bands and rates are proposed to (i) enable the use of the current tax bands and rates in 2013/14; and (ii) remove the need for this regulation to be amended on an annual basis. The committee will continue to be required to review the bands and rates annually, but a change of regulation will only be necessary in the event that a change to the bands and/or rates is proposed. In addition, in the regulation concerning the criteria for making a grant from the Oxford College Contributions Fund, 'low endowment per student' is changed to 'low taxable assets per student' to reflect the committee's established practice. The opportunity has been taken to propose other drafting amendments for greater consistency with other University regulations and to ensure correct application of the definitions established in Section 1 of Statute XV.

Text of Regulations

Delete existing Council Regulations 1 of 2009, concerning College Contributions, and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'Council Regulations 1 of 2014

Regulations for College Contributions

- 1. These regulations are made under the provisions of Statute XV, and references to sections are to the sections of that statute unless otherwise stated.
- (1) The College Contributions Committee ("the committee") established by section 3 shall consist of
 - (a) a Chairman appointed by the Vice-Chancellor;
 - (b)-(d) three members appointed by Council, one of whom shall be appointed from among its own members:
 - (*e*)-(*h*) four members elected by the Conference of Colleges.
 - (2) The appointed and elected members shall hold office for four years.
 - (2)(3) Subject to the approval of the Chairman of the Conference of Colleges and the Chairman of Council on each occasion, the committee may co-opt up to two external members for such periods as it sees fit, on condition that the committee shall be satisfied that those appointed have no financial interest in any college of the University.
 - (3) The appointed and elected members shall hold office for four years.
 - (4) Members shall serve no more than two consecutive full terms of office. Casual terms of office shall not count towards this limit.
 - (5) Notwithstanding regulation 2(4) above, the General Purposes Committee of Council may determine that one further consecutive period is permitted in an individual case.
- 3. (1) (6) The committee shall be responsible to Council <u>for</u>:
 - (a) for the proper administration of the F_{f} und; and
 - (b) for the distribution of income from the Ffund in accordance with these Rregulations.
 - (2)(7) The committee shall have the power (subject to regulation <u>8</u>7 below):

- (a) to make rulings on the income of colleges for the purpose of the Sscheme, and on their consequent liability to contribute;
- (b) to call for reports from colleges to amplify their financial statements and calculations;
- (c) to determine what grants or loans from the Ffund will meet the purpose of the Sscheme;
- (d) to carry out whatever investigation may be necessary in order to ascertain that grants and loans have been used as intended; and
- (e) to charge interest on late payment of contributions at the official rate of interest (that is to say, the rate applicable under Section 178 of the Finance Act 1989, or any statute amending or replacing that Section).
- (3)(8) The committee shall review the scheme after five years of operation and report to Council on its performance.
- $\underline{43}$. The sum payable by each college under section 4 shall be calculated as follows:
 - (1) The total annual sum to be transferred to the F_1 und shall set by Council. The aggregate contribution of the colleges to the F_1 und shall be capped at £3m million per annum; and the contribution of the University shall be capped at £2m million in 2008/9 and £1m million in each subsequent year.
 - (2) Contributions under these regulations shall be made for a fixed period of ten years, the final contribution being made on the basis of the annual accounts prepared by colleges as at 31 July 2017. No contributions under these regulations will be levied thereafter.
 - (3) The bands and rates of contribution for a particular financial year shall be set by Council by regulation on the recommendation of the committee before the end of that <u>financial</u> year. If the total sum raised from the colleges exceeds the agreed amount, the committee shall have the power to order a rebate to colleges pro rata (rebating in equal proportion to all contributing colleges). If the sum raised from colleges falls short of the agreed amount the committee shall, if necessary, adjust the contribution rate in the following year to make up the deficit.
 - (4) The bands and rates for the contributions payable in 2012/132013/14, based on the 2011/12 accounts for the year ending on the prior 31 July, shall be as follows:

- On the first £35mmillion of taxable assets
 On the next £3mmillion 0.10 per cent
 On the next £3mmillion 0.20 per cent
 On the next £3mmillion 0.30 per cent
 On taxable assets over 0.36 per cent
 £44mmillion
 - (5) The committee shall review the tax bands and rates annually and make such recommendations to Council for change as it sees fit.
 - (6) In the absence of any recommendation for change under the provision of regulation 4.(5) above, the bands and rates set out in regulation 4.(4) above shall be used to calculate the contributions payable in 2014/15 and each subsequent year up to and including 2017/18, in each case based on the accounts for the year ending on the prior 31 July.
- 5. At the same time as submitting its annual financial statements under section 8, each college shall also submit a statement in the form set out in the Schedule to these regulations.
- 64. For the purposes of the scheme, In order to calculate contributions, taxable assets will be computed on the basis of calculated to be:
 - (1) the aggregate of the following:
 - (1)(a) total funds less tangible fixed assets per the consolidated audited financial statements of the college at 31 July;
 - (2)(b) 30 per cent of conference and function income included in the consolidated audited financial statements of the college at 31 July, multiplied by 100/4; and
 - (3)(c) total funds per the consolidated audited financial statements of any entity over which the college exercises control or dominant influence, or whose objectives are mainly or exclusively confined to the benefit of the college, if the financial statements of that entity are not consolidated with those of the college - such financial statements to be drawn up not more than 12 months preceding the 31 July at which the college's financial statements are drawn up; less (4) funds included in total funds per the consolidated audited financial statements of the college at 31 July which must be applied by the college as sole trustee for purposes wholly outside the objects of the college;

(5)(2) less allowances for exceptional obligations, multiplied by 100/4.

5. Conference and Function Income.

- 7. (1) There shall be excluded from conference and function income all fees, dues, establishment charges and charges for meals which are paid to the college by or on behalf of juniorstudent members of the college who are members of the University; and also charges paid to the college by senior members of the college in connection with their employment by the college, or in connection with their membership of the college or its common room.
 - (2) Conference and function income shall otherwise include all fees and charges paid to the college by or on behalf of all parties, including visiting students who are not members of the University, and all fees and charges paid to the college in respect to conferences and functions organised by or on behalf of members of the college.

6. Exceptional Obligations.

- (1) Exceptional obligations recognised by the Gcollege Gcontributions Sscheme prior to 2007/8 will not be carried forward into the Sscheme from 2008/9 onwards.
 - (2) Notwithstanding regulation 6-8.(1) above, if a contributing college makes to the College Contributions Committee a written application on the ground considers that its endowment is burdened by some charge or obligation of an exceptional nature in respect of which a deduction ought fairly to be made, it may submit a written application to the committee. (whether imposed on the college or accepted voluntarily by the college for reasons which the committee considers reasonable having regard to the interest not necessarily only of the college but if appropriate also of the University and colleges as a whole), **†**The committee shall consider that application and may at its discretion decide what deduction (if any) shall be allowed to the college in respect of that charge or obligation (whether imposed on the college or accepted voluntarily by the college for reasons which the committee considers reasonable having regard to the interest not necessarily only of the college but if appropriate also of the University and colleges as a whole).
- 7.9. (1) The committee shall make recommendations to Council at least once a year on the <u>distribution</u>

allocation of the income of the Gollege Contributions F fund to and between the individual colleges, with the proviso that the committee may recommend that no distributions are allocation be made.

(2) The criteria for making an award a grant or loan will be satisfied if a college can provide evidence to show that:

(a) the college has a low taxable assets endowment per student, the calculation of which shall be decided by the committee; and

(b) it is below a median or target value in one or more categories for which grants will be awarded as defined by the committee; and

(c) it makes a <u>convincing</u> case for support.

8. Appeal to Council.

10. A college aggrieved by a decision of the committee may appeal to Council.

Consultation on possible revisions to Statute XII

The Personnel Committee is consulting all divisional boards, the Continuing Education Board, Academic Services and University Collections¹, and all colleges and the Conference of Colleges, the Joint Consultative Committee with the Oxford UCU, individual members of Congregation and all University staff on matters of principle relating to possible revisions to Statute XII.

Statute XII can be seen online at www. admin.ox.ac.uk/statutes/353-051.shtml.

The text of the consultative paper is set out below, and the specific areas where comment is sought are listed in paragraph 5. This initial consultation, which will run until 4 June 2014, will seek views on the overarching principles for possible reform. The collected views and a summary will be published on the University website, and it is anticipated that they will serve to provide a focus for a discussion meeting of Congregation.

According to the views that emerge, and in particular if they show a wish to proceed with change, a draft revised Statute would then be prepared for a second consultation to address matters of detail. That will be the stage at which to consider whether the suggested revisions, if adopted, would strike the right balance between appropriate protections for employment on the one hand, and usability and fitness for purpose of the Statute on the other.

Only after that, would Council take a view on putting to Congregation any formal proposals for legislative change.

Summary

1 Statute XII ('Academic Staff and the Visitatorial Board') governs major aspects of the employment by the University of 'academic staff', a term which, for the purposes of this Statute, is defined as all those eligible for membership of the Universities Superannuation Scheme. The Statute's coverage therefore includes not only academic staff in the sense of Statute XIV (professors, readers and associate professors), but also research staff, and a wide range of professional, technical and administrative staff, including those employed in grade 8 and above (who are eligible for membership of Congregation) as well as others down to and including everyone within grade 6. The Statute provides for dismissal on grounds of redundancy or 'good cause', for disciplinary action short of dismissal, for dismissal on medical grounds, for appeals, and for grievances raised by individuals against their managers or the University. The colleges have distinct provisions in their own statutes to deal with these matters in respect of college employment.

2 The Statute states as its three guiding principles: (i) to ensure that academic staff have freedom within the law to question and test received wisdom, and to put forward new ideas and controversial or unpopular opinions, without placing themselves in jeopardy of losing their jobs or privileges; (ii) to enable the University to provide education, promote learning, and engage in research efficiently and economically; and (iii) to apply the principles of justice and fairness.

- 3 Statute XII has not been revised since it first came into effect over 21 years ago. It is not fully aligned with current employment law, and its procedures are exceptionally elaborate and not always clear. It not infrequently takes a year or more to resolve a disciplinary case or a grievance, so prolonging the stress for all parties involved. The Statute extends a special degree of protection to 75% of the staff in the University, arguably a broader range of staff than is appropriate for the Statute's declared first aim. In all these respects, Statute XII fails to provide an effective and proportionate framework for the governance of employment across the University.
- 4 The Personnel Committee is mindful of the sensitivity attaching to Statute XII and wishes to emphasise that its only aim through this consultation is to look for ways to improve the Statute's fitness for purpose while respecting all three of the Statute's guiding principles of ensuring academic freedom, enabling the efficient and economical operation of the University, and the application of justice and fairness. The Committee's interest in revising the Statute is not driven by any preconceived agenda for changes to employment within the University.

5 The aspects of the Statute that the Personnel Committee is suggesting be addressed are described below in paragraphs 8–12. This paper seeks comments on the following matters in particular and on any other points that respondents consider pertinent:

(a) whether the existing coverage of Statute XII should be reduced (see paragraph 8);

(b) the desirability of simplifying procedures under the Statute (see paragraph 9);

(c) the desirability of revising the Statute to improve the clarity of its provisions (see paragraph 10);

(d) the desirability of revising the procedure under Statute XII for addressing grievances (see paragraph 11).

The present Statute

6 In brief outline, the parts of Statute XII are as follows:

Part A This sets out the three guiding principles according to which the Statute and all regulations made under it are to be construed. It specifies that the Statute applies widely to academics and, by cross-reference to Part C, to any others who are eligible to belong to the Universities Superannuation Scheme. This section also defines a number of different reasons for dismissal.

Part B This outlines the process for determining redundancy in certain circumstances.

Part C Outlines the membership of the Visitatorial Board, the role of which is to consider cases referred to it by the Vice-Chancellor where it is alleged there may be good cause for dismissal, good cause including reasons related to conduct, capability, or qualifications for performing the duties attaching to a post, such as mental or physical incapacity.

Part D This provides a three-stage disciplinary code, with provision for oral and written warnings. A Pro-Vice-Chancellor can hear appeals against such warnings. The Vice-Chancellor can refer a case to the Visitatorial Board for potential dismissal.

Part E This outlines a second process for dismissal on medical grounds, ie a process additional to that covered by Part D.

Part F This outlines the grievance procedures. Issues can be raised by an individual with their head of department and then with the Vice-Chancellor, who can refer the case to the Grievance Committee.

Part G This describes the process for removing the Vice-Chancellor from office via a tribunal appointed by Council.

Part H This describes the process for appeal against any decision to dismiss or discipline a member of staff taken

under Statute XII. An appeal is made to the Registrar, who refers the case to the Appeal Court, as determined in Statute XI.

7 Statute XII can be changed only with the assent of the Queen in Privy Council, a lengthy and elaborate process. This provides reassurance, both within the University and without, that so important a part of the University's governance can be changed only after the most deliberate and extensive consultation. It does, however, make it difficult to modify the Statute to keep it in line with the law and with changing needs within the University. By contrast, the Statute is underpinned by regulations which prescribe the relevant procedures at a detailed level, and these regulations can be amended by Council as and when the need

One approach to implementing change to the Statute could be to undertake a radical rewriting that would move as much as possible into regulations, while reserving the 'Oueen in Council Statute' itself for issues of principle. Whilst the Personnel Committee sees wisdom in moving more of the detail into regulations, it is currently inclined to pursue a relatively conservative approach to this. A working party set up by the Committee has looked into this matter and is confident that making a series of revisions to the existing Statute, with consequent changes to regulations, could be sufficient to achieve effective change where it is needed. Such an approach was thought to be more likely to retain confidence within the University.

Aspects of the Statute for consideration

8 The range of staff covered by Statute XII is extremely wide.

This aspect of the Statute is fundamental to any significant revision that might be pursued.

In providing for the just and fair consideration of disciplinary action, dismissals and appeals, the Statute goes far beyond the requirements of employment law. The special level of protection offered by Statute XII ensures, in the words of the Statute, 'that academic staff have freedom within the law to question and test received wisdom, and to put forward new ideas and controversial or unpopular opinions, without placing themselves in jeopardy of losing their jobs or privileges'. It is clear that traditional academics (those holding posts requiring the delivery of teaching and research) and senior research staff should

be afforded special protection in order to safeguard academic freedom.

By contrast, it is arguable that the other staff currently covered by the Statute, those whose role is to provide specialist support such as administrative staff, librarians, computing staff and other professional and technical specialists, should be treated on a par with all other non-academic staff. For these staff, there is no special need relating to academic freedom and there are existing procedures offering the full and extensive protection required under employment law. These procedures have regularly been revised to improve protection in line with new legislation, so the principles of fairness and justice would be maintained. Reducing the coverage of the Statute would take particular account of the second of the guiding principles of the Statute by facilitating the management of the services that support the academic mission of the University so they could be more readily adaptable to suit changing needs.

The annexe summarises the numbers of staff within the Statute by type of post and grade.

Comment is sought on whether the existing coverage of Statute XII should be reduced and, if so, which staff groups should most appropriately be included.

9 The Statute specifies procedures that are disproportionate and overly complex.

Two obvious examples can be cited: the Visitatorial Board procedures and the Appeals procedure.

The Visitatorial Board is a panel consisting of a Chair and four members whose role is to hear cases involving potential dismissal for good cause and to make recommendations to the Vice-Chancellor. The Chair of the Board is appointed by the High Steward, is not a member of Congregation and is a barrister or solicitor of at least five years' standing or someone who has had judicial experience. The four members are drawn by ballot from a panel of twelve members of Congregation elected by Congregation. The composition of the Board, with its highly qualified Chair and its large size, five persons in all, is unusual for an internal disciplinary body. When the Board is used, the difficulties of convening it can contribute to significant delays with consequent detriment both to the individuals involved and to the work of the University.

The language of the Statute is inappropriately intimidating (referring to

'charges' as if in criminal proceedings), and the regulations for the Board are unusually elaborate, such that minor departures from them can give rise to challenges on technical rather than on substantive grounds.

Under Statute XII, appeals are heard by the University Appeal Court set up under Statute XI. This Appeal Court is chaired in each instance by one of a panel of five external persons, each of whom is a Lord or Lady of Appeal, a Lord or Lady Justice of Appeal, or a Justice of the High Court of Justice; or a person who has held such an appointment and is retired; or a Queen's Counsel of not less than six years' standing. This process typically takes many months to produce a ruling, even when the procedures are applied as expeditiously as possible, thus adding to the stress of all those involved. The decisions of this Appeal Court can then be challenged in an employment tribunal (often an employment judge sitting alone) and only at the second stage of appeal from that tribunal is the case likely to come before a lawyer of the standing of the one who took the decision in the University Appeal Court. This sequence of seniority of lawyers in the successive opportunities for appeal suggests that the provisions for the University's internal appeal are disproportionate.

The Personnel Committee considers that there would be benefit in simplifying these procedures, but how to strike the right balance between utility on the one hand, and appropriate safeguards on the other, will need careful consideration in the light of the range of staff who are to be covered.

Comment is sought on the desirability of simplifying procedures under the Statute.

10 Statute XII is not always sufficiently clear in specifying procedure.

An example of ambiguity in the Statute relates to its two routes for dealing with medical incapacity: whilst the Statute provides for a Medical Board to assess cases of medical incapacity, it also provides that cases of dismissal for good cause, which by definition includes physical or mental incapacity, can be remitted to the Visitatorial Board. This has the potential to cause confusion especially since it frequently emerges that disciplinary considerations relating to under-performance or to improper behaviour need to be taken alongside medical considerations, and the need for this combination of disciplinary and medical consideration may only become apparent partway through proceedings.

These issues could, for instance, be addressed by taking all appropriate cases to the Visitatorial Board, but with provision to ensure that, whenever necessary, the Visitatorial Board would have access to medical evidence and to expert guidance in the assessment of that evidence. The existence of a properly founded single route would avoid the possibility that a case might proceed partway in the Visitatorial Board and then need to be remitted for a new hearing in the Medical Board, with obvious adverse consequences - not least to the unwell member of staff.

Comment is sought on the desirability of revising the Statute to improve the clarity of its provisions.

11 Under Statute XII, relatively minor grievance cases can become escalated to the central University with inappropriate rapidity, and there is no formal provision for appeals.

Grievance policies are in place to enable cases to be addressed initially at a local level (usually departmentally), with the option of an appeal stage at divisional level, the intention being to provide for a resolution as soon as possible and so avoid a protracted process with the potential for causing continuing distress. However, Statute XII offers little to foster this approach: the Statute's grievance procedure encourages swift escalation, with an approach to the Head of Department being followed immediately by an application to the Vice-Chancellor who may refer the matter to a Grievance Committee appointed by Council. This central stage, although it operates in practice as an appeal, is not constituted as such in the Statute, and the absence of explicit provision for a formal appeal does not reflect employment law.

Comment is sought on the desirability of revising the procedure under Statute XII for addressing grievances with the aim of strengthening the routes for settlement at local level and providing a formal process for appeal.

12 Statute XII has not been amended during the last 21 years to reflect changes in employment law.

The Statute contains specific references to employment law which should ideally be updated and future-proofed (expressed so as to ensure that the Statute always refers clearly to the law in force). More significantly, the Statute no longer accurately reflects the legal position

regarding the range of circumstances in which a contract of employment may be brought to an end.

For example, the Statute is silent on dismissals on the ground of 'some other substantial reason' (SOSR), as set out in the Employment Rights Act 1996, and is therefore out of line with the general law of unfair dismissal as it now stands. A dismissal for SOSR can take place in a number of different circumstances. To give one example, a dismissal of an employee engaged to provide sickness absence cover would qualify as a dismissal for SOSR if it occurs because the sick employee has returned to work.

Similarly, the Statute is silent on dismissals in circumstances where there is statutory restriction on continued employment. This is a further potentially fair reason for dismissal provided for by the Employment Rights Act 1996. An example of where this may apply is a situation where continued employment would contravene immigration rules.

The Personnel Committee recommends updating the Statute to reflect current employment law.

Responses

13 The Personnel Committee now requests comments from the bodies and individuals addressed in this paper on the matters set out in paragraph 5. Responses should be sent electronically to sarah.thonemann@admin.ox.ac.uk no later than 4 June 2014. Enquiries should be sent to the same address.

A summary of the responses will be published as soon as possible after the consultation closes. That summary will be accompanied by the text of the responses, attributed to their authors unless they make it clear when responding that they wish to remain anonymous, or that their response should be kept private.

Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on

21 March.

(a) Establishment of the Sackler Keeper of Antiquities Endowment Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish 'The Sackler Keeper of Antiquities Endowment Fund' for the purpose of endowing the functions and activities of the Sackler Keeper of Antiquities at the Ashmolean.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, insert new §310 as follows, and renumber existing §§310–398 as §§311–399:

'§310. Sackler Keeper of Antiquities Endowment Fund

- 1. The University receives with gratitude the sum of £500,000 and the commitment of a further £1,500,000 from the Dr Mortimer and Theresa Sackler Foundation to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Sackler Keeper of Antiquities Endowment Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the purposes, functions and activities of the Sackler Keeper of Antiquities at the Ashmolean. The Fund shall not be applied to pay the expenses (other than salary) relating to the Sackler Keeper of Antiquities

at the Ashmolean, including the overhead, travel, administrative and pension costs associated with such post.

- 4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Board of Visitors of the Ashmolean.
- 5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund.
- 7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 8. Regulations 1-10 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 10. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

(b) Establishment of the David Walker Fellowship Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish 'The David Walker Fellowship Fund' for the purpose of supporting the costs of visiting fellows at the Bodleian Libraries.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, insert new §363 as follows, and renumber existing §\$363–391 as §\$364–392:

'§363. David Walker Fellowship Fund

- 1. The University receives with gratitude the sum of £125,000 from the executors of the estate of David Walker to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the David Walker Fellowship Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund in supporting the costs of visiting fellows at the Bodleian Libraries, to be known as David Walker Fellows. Preference shall be given to those fellows with an interest in the English Renaissance and book illustration and illumination.
- 4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Curators of the University Libraries.
- 5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such

income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

- 6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund.
- 7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 8. Regulations 1-10 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 10. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

Encaenia honorary degrees are conferred at the University's annual ceremonial event and degrees by diploma are conferred on heads of state and royalty. When considering possible honorands, the Honorary Degrees Committee will focus on individuals in the following categories:

- 1 those of high academic distinction in the fields of research and scholarship of specific interest to the University of Oxford
- **2** those distinguished in the visual, literary, musical and performing arts
- **3** those distinguished in business and industry
- **4** those who have played a distinguished role in public life, for example in contributing to progress and change in society
- **5** those who have made a significant contribution to the activities of the University of Oxford such individuals would normally also fall into one of the categories above.

Within those categories, the Honorary Degrees Committee will aim to produce a balanced list, which takes account of the global dimension that characterises this University's activities. Honorary degrees will not be conferred on anyone who holds, or who has retired from, a resident teaching, research or administrative post within the University or in any college or other society, except in exceptional circumstances such as distinguished service outside the terms of his or her paid service.

All names will then be reviewed by the Registrar and Vice-Chancellor prior to being forwarded to GPC and/or Council for consideration as the appointing bodies for these committees.

The purpose of this invitation is to broaden the pool of potential candidates brought to the attention of the appointing body. The names put to the appointing body are only suggestions. It should be noted that the appointing body remains free to take its own decision, irrespective of any names received through this route. Van Houten Fund

The Van Houten Bequest is a fund left by the late M Van Houten in the 1950s to be used 'for the benefit of the University in such ways as the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor and Council shall see fit'. The Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, Council and the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee agreed in 2005 to delegate responsibility to the Registrar to approve grants subject to a regular report to be made to Council on the decisions taken.

Bids are now being invited for grants from this fund to be used to support projects that do not form part of the normal day-today operations of a department and which would not easily be funded from other regular sources. Recipients within the last year have included:

- 80,000 Hours, a free advisory service for young people interested in ethical careers
- Oxford Hub, the focal point for student social action and volunteering at the University.

Grants to internal applicants are usually in the region of £4,000-£15,000, either given as a one-off award, or spread over two or three years. Grants are also available to organisations external to the University; in such cases, the amounts awarded are usually lower and there is a cap on the total amount of funding provided to external organisations, which is £50,000 for the current financial year.

The most recent invitation to bid, in November 2013, attracted ten applications and resulted in awards for four of those.

The guidelines by which bids are assessed are as follows:

1 Bids for grants will be assessed according to the breadth of the benefit to the University offered by the project in question, the strategic importance of the project to the University and the availability of funds. Only in exceptional

circumstances will a grant be awarded in respect of a project which benefits a single department.

- **2** Grants will not ordinarily be awarded for purposes for which other trust fund (or similar) support exists within the University: for example, the funding of academic scholarships, regardless of whether or not the alternative fund(s) in question are in a position to fund the expenditure proposed.
- **3** Grants will not ordinarily be awarded in respect of costs for which a department might reasonably be expected to hold a budget.
- **4** Grants will not ordinarily be agreed in respect of recurrent activities except to provide:
 - (a) seed funding to support an activity in its first one to three years; or
 - (b) bridging support for one year only where a source of funding is lost and the department/faculty in question is confident that an alternative can be found for the following year.
- **5** Grants will not ordinarily cover the full cost of a project. Departments will be expected to make some contribution, or to use the grant secured by the Van Houten Fund to assist in securing other funding (including external funding).
- **6** The extent to which funds may be awarded to external organisations each financial year may be subject to an upper limit, to be set by the General Purposes Committee and reviewed on an annual basis.¹

Bids for funding should take the form of a written submission outlining the amount requested, how the grant would be used, the benefit that would be conferred to the University, approximate costings, timescales, details of any other funding secured and any further supporting information. Alternatively, an application form is available from the secretary. The bids will be considered by the Registrar as a gathered field. Applications should be sent, preferably as a Word document attached to an email, to the secretary of the fund, Mrs Adrienne Lingard, by **25 April 2014**.

For the 2012-13 financial year, GPC approved a limit on total external funding of £50,000; the cap for 2013-14 has not yet been agreed but is likely to be similar.

When considering possible honorands, the Honorary Degrees Committee will focus on individuals in the following categories:

- 1 those of high academic distinction in the fields of research and scholarship of specific interest to the University of Oxford
- **2** those distinguished in the visual, literary, musical and performing arts
- **3** those distinguished in business and industry
- **4** those who have played a distinguished role in public life, for example in contributing to progress and change in society
- **5** those who have made a significant contribution to the activities of the University of Oxford such individuals would normally also fall into one of the categories above.

Within those categories, the Honorary Degrees Committee will aim to produce a balanced list, which takes account of the global dimension that characterises this University's activities. The Honorary Degrees Committee therefore encourages the nomination of individuals of conspicuous distinction with particular reference to diversity.

Honorary degrees will not be conferred on anyone who holds, or who has retired from, a resident teaching, research or administrative post within the University or in any college or other society, except in exceptional circumstances such as distinguished service outside the terms of his or her paid service.

Oration by the demitting Proctors and Assessor

The following Oration was delivered in Congregation on Wednesday, 19 March, by Jonathan Mallinson, MA PhD Camb, MA Oxf, Fellow of Trinity, on demitting office as Senior Proctor.

Senior Proctor: *Insignissime Vice-Cancellarie: licetne Anglice loqui?*

Vice-Chancellor: Licet.

Senior Proctor: There have been times in history when it has not been good to be associated with the term *proctor*. Thumbing through 19th-century dictionaries of regional English, as one does, one finds an article which evokes the unenviable fate of proctors in Tudor times:

Time was, when they were thought useful; for they were expressly allowed by a statute of 1 Edward VI. But within fifty years they became so great a public nuisance, by their impudence, importunity, threatening and abusive language, that it became necessary to put them down by the statute of 39 Eliz. c,4. which makes them rogues and vagabonds.

Of course, you will realise, the article is not describing the Proctors of Oxford (or of Cambridge, for that matter); the proctors in question here were much more disreputable types, as the article makes plain:

...the greatest care must be taken not to confound those bullies and swaggerers with the officers in our Universities, who bear the same title...

Such times are long gone, of course, and nobody today would confuse the Proctors of our university with *bullies and swaggerers*. And yet, the Proctors do find themselves going back in time in many different ways, and history is an essential part of their life and identity. Indeed we, like many generations of Proctors before us, have taken

part in ceremonies which have their origins in the 16th century, from Encaenia to the Glove Ceremony and Court Sermon. Others, like the Chancellor's Court of Benefactors, are approaching a much more youthful quarter century. We also join each year with representatives of the city in communal acts of commemoration of our shared past, from the St Frideswide service in Christ Church to the Remembrance Day Service in St Giles'. To be a Proctor is to be part of a historical process, in which each year traditions of the University are re-enacted, revalidated.

Particularly memorable for us this year was May Day, celebrated on a crisp but glorious morning, from the top of Magdalen College Tower. To reach this exalted height required us to ascend what appeared from the bottom to be a sheer and endless ladder. To climb it at all was enough of a challenge; to do so in the early hours of the morning, in full sub-fusc, gown and cap, took us into the realms of the hysterical. It would not be the only time we were called upon to maintain composure, dignity and a sense of humour while finding ourselves an unintended distance up a wall. Memorable in a different way was the walk back to Wellington Square that same morning, through a bustling Broad Street, which brought together the most unlikely combination of Proctors, pagans and morris dancers. There we all were, each group purposefully going about its business, each clad in the robes of an ancient identity, each apparently quite certain that they knew what the day was really about and how it should be celebrated, each slightly bemused by the presence of the others, yet all come together in the one place, to share the same moment - it was a very valuable lesson in perspective, and in co-existence, a lesson which it is useful for a Proctor to learn in good time.

Proctors re-enact history, but each year they also bear witness to events which, in their turn and in their different ways, will become part of the history of the institution. These included for us headline moments like the completion and official opening of the Andrew Wiles building, or the munificent gifts from the Li Ka Shing Foundation and the McCall MacBain Foundation, which will take the University's global health research and the international graduate scholarship programme of Rhodes House long into the current century. This year also saw the successful outcome of major sponsorship bids or negotiations: the City Deal which promises £14m to the Begbroke Science Park and the Old Road Campus, and HEFCE grant funding, which will bring £3m of support for over 100 full and partial Oxford Graduate Scholarships. Of the greatest value, too, but of a different kind, were some truly classic exhibitions at the Ashmolean and the Bodleian, which brought into our midst Stradivarius and Cézanne, Bacon and Moore, Magical Books and Great Medical Discoveries.

Proctors witness history in the making. But not just history; it can be fantasy, too, which, as Julian Barnes would say, is really just history waiting to happen. One of the Senior Proctor's most unexpected tasks this year was to authorise (with the Vice-Chancellor) the Quidditch Club - which, for those who may not know, is now an international sport - to associate itself formally with the University of Oxford. I'm quite sure that some believe that quidditch is not the only manifestation of J K Rowling's fantasy world in this university, and that Voldemort or Malfoy already occupy buildings somewhere to the west of St Giles'. Be that as it may, it is certainly the case that if you walk resolutely towards what looks like a blank wall between the back entrance to the UAS

canteen and four large wheelie bins, you find a door - known to some as number 9¾ Little Clarendon Street - which is, in fact, the back entrance to the Proctors' Office. This is the setting of two as yet unpublished novels, Junior Proctor and the Baptism of Fire and Senior Proctor and the Prisoner of Wellington Square. A third part of the projected trilogy, Demitting Proctor and the Council of Secrets is currently under consideration by the Assessor, and our legal advisors.

The Proctors are part of the University's public world, but we are also charged by statute to look behind the scenes. And what have we seen behind these scenes? Firstly, it is that behind every ceremony, benefaction or building, behind every exam session, admissions season or celebrity visit, behind every press statement, set of committee papers or investment figures there are committed and talented individuals whose ultimate criterion of success is, in effect, to remain invisible. It is the privilege of the Proctors, though, to witness this work on a daily basis, and it is a pleasure to put those behind it now, if anonymously, in the limelight.

The University does not just boil down to these two faces, though, the public and the private. The very word university focuses on unity, community, wholeness, but what that means in this particular place is not something which a single word - even a single word with a qualifying adjective, collegiate - can easily encompass. There is no doubt that in law, as in the public imagination, there is such a thing as the University of Oxford which subsumes all its constituent parts. In law, it is an entity responsible for the actions, good or bad, of its subsidiaries; and the legal autonomy of colleges does not prevent the world at large from associating any of their actions, good or bad, with the University of Oxford. And yet, as we know, the reality is very different: the University is anything but unified. Events, both this year and last, have led to serious reflexion about who, what or where the University is, and how it relates to the elements which make it up.

We are geographically dispersed, as even a cursory look at the map of the University's Functional Estate makes very clear. Finding a means of connecting all these elements, of dealing with all the data they generate, is the underlying challenge for IT services. The troubled progress this year of the new and highly complex SITS project, designed to produce an integrated student records system, gives some idea of the difficulties facing those who seek to ensure communication and compatibility across

the University, at the level of applicants and students, administrators and academics. The integrated communication project, which takes us beyond desktop phones to a world of instant messaging, videoconferencing and screen sharing, and which will make communication with Oxford colleagues easier and more flexible, wherever you, or they, are in the world, is another major undertaking to join up the University's dots, and is now entering its design and build stage.

At another level, of course, the University's watchword is actually diversity, and the launch of the Vice-Chancellor's Diversity Fund last summer was a powerful statement of this commitment. Earlier this month, a specially convened race summit brought together students and senior officers of the University to discuss the admission and experience of black and minority ethnic students at Oxford. In the area of disability, the Assessor has been working closely with the Disability Advisory Service to establish a common Disability Framework for departments and colleges. Similarly, the year has seen continued efforts towards gender equality. The University applied for the renewal of its Athena SWAN institutional award at Bronze level, but is setting its sights on silver in 2016. I have it on the highest authority that initiatives in other areas of gender imbalance are also underway. It is worth observing, too, that this year was the second year running that the elected trio in the Proctors' Office did not have a majority of men; less comforting, perhaps, is the fact that it is only the fourth time in the last 25 years that this has been the case. In this area, we like to think that progress would not be so difficult to achieve.

Inclusivity is an essential part of the University's sense of itself, and unity is not the same as uniformity. Diversity can be defended within a devolved structure of governance, but the right to be oneself, to do one's own thing, does have its limits. Diversity of practice or provision between departments or colleges can produce inequity; it is these very issues which the Proctors are often called upon to deal with.

The same question of identity has also occupied other committees in reflexions which can achieve all the magnitude and fragility of a theological system: the coinherence of the Holy Trinity - in this case, Colleges, Divisions and Administration - each independent and yet interdependent, may easily be caricatured as the incoherence of institutional complexity; from the one to the other is just a short linguistic step. What is more, a devolved structure lends itself

to narratives of primeval struggle between centre and periphery, in which colleges and departments, academics and administrative offices are all assigned different roles, according to who the particular narrator is. And yet we have witnessed this year much very productive collaboration, one might even call it interdisciplinarity, a term which describes not just some academic endeavour or methodology, but which, more importantly, suggests the constructive exchange of different perspectives. It's that May Day morning moment writ large. The very process of electing Proctors and Assessor, plucked seemingly at random from the confines of college and department, and charged to work closely together for a single year, is testimony to the flexible, interactive nature of our system. To work at Wellington Square is neither to be pulled to the centre, nor to be despatched to the margins; it may appear to be in a different time zone, but it remains, more or less, on the same planet. The centre is not a place, it is a process; and it works through collaboration, pragmatism, trust.

Of course, the question of identity is not just to do with organisational structure, it is also to do with money. There are very real issues of balance and priority in an organisation where each element - Faculty, Division, College - has different ambitions, size and wealth, but is yet part of a greater whole. No individual component can prosper without (not to say, outwith) the University, its name or its reputation; even our most successful departments clearly recognise that. At the same time, we benefit already from a controlled measure of cross-subsidy, between colleges, and, to a limited extent, between divisions; and the University, on a larger scale, benefits to an unimaginable degree from the cash transfers of OUP. The challenge faced by the University is to find a balance between the independence of its different constituents and a spirit of corporate responsibility.

These relationships have been the object of particular attention this year, not least in the review of our processes for distributing income and costs across the University, the J-RAM and the 1-2-3. It is evident from many discussions this year that the principle of equity is paramount, and that the most objective measure of fairness is not rhetorical but numerical, not words but numbers: numbers have clear values, they can be put in order of size. The need to quantify means that the activities of departments are translated into terms which can be measured and compared, a common language, recognisable by all: income

earned, resources used, space occupied. But like all translations, of course, these can only ever be an approximation, a compromise.

These questions have had a particular urgency and pertinence this year against the background of a significant reduction in the capital grant from HEFCE. Important questions have followed from this, related to the means by which capital projects are to be identified, prioritised, financed. Increasingly, the value of a subject, or a post, or a project, is defined - or, one might say, calculated - with reference to its ability to pay its own way. And in these straitened times, there is a duty to do so. Words can fail us, but you can count on numbers; and we do, after all, require an argument to add up. There is, though, a lesson to be learned from words. In language, if not in arithmetic, two negatives do not simply cancel each other out; the two statements We can afford to do this and We cannot afford not to do this do not amount to the same, and both have their validity. These issues have informed many discussions this year; they will continue for sure into the next, and the next...

Diverse, independent, collaborative... this all brings us back seamlessly to the Proctors. It may be easier to define what the Proctors do than it is to define what the University is, but their ways of working, and their place in the University structure, became in their turn this year the object of some reflexion.

We witnessed in 2013 the end of an era, the retirement of two mainstays of the Proctors' Office, who had come to represent the office which they had done so much to create over their 40 years of joint service: Linda Mason and Brian Gasser. To lose one may be regarded as a misfortune; to lose both... well, I can't quite remember the rest of the quotation. Linda Mason provided unerring advice on exams process and precedent for pretty much a quarter of a century. And as for Brian Gasser, first Clerk to the Proctors, generation upon generation of Proctors, Senior Tutors, Academic Administrators, Deans, Deans of Degrees, and many others besides, can all bear witness to his wisdom, integrity and clarity of mind, to his advice and support given unstintingly, with great courtesy and calm. It may be that only a very small proportion of our students have troubles during exams, but when all these troubles focus on the same office, one needs very special qualities. Brian had those. The University owes him a great debt of gratitude.

The volume of work coming through the office – requests for special provision, exams appeals, complaints and disciplinary cases – have all increased steadily over the

last few years, and successive generations of Proctors have drawn attention to it; this year has been no exception. It fell to us to think through new ways of dealing with this. New casework management systems, more electronic communication and a clearer distinction between the routine and the exceptional will, we hope, lead to an effective streamlining of cases. This has been accompanied by close working relationships with different units in the University: the Examination Schools, Education Policy and Support, Legal Services, the Disability Advisory Service.

These changes typify what we see to be the unique role and value of the Proctors. The Proctors have a long historical tradition behind them, but it is not the antiquity of the office which gives it value in this university, nor is it the quaint clothes which define it. It is through the Proctors that the University demonstrates its capacity for impartial self-scrutiny, with regard both to its own governance and to its relationship with its students. Proctors represent no individual constituency, but they bring to their work their own unique perspectives, a mixture of department, college and other experience, each year very different. It's perhaps not surprising, then, that when you put together an engineer, a social scientist and a linguist, processes, policies and words all come under scrutiny. And yet, it must be remembered, their authority is invested in them by statute; they are, in this very obvious sense, a part of the University. Proctors occupy, then, a middle ground, a neutral space. Their office is situated in a corridor which links the University Administration and the outside world, with a door onto each. And the Proctors' daily work is a negotiation of various borders: between individuals and regulations, policy and practice, letter and spirit. And when we say Proctors, we include also, quite emphatically, the Assessor, whose function is much less clearly codified and arguably underexploited. At the end of this year, the current Assessor put forward a set of proposals for a review of the office. Much college and University money is put into this role, and it is important that it should be used to best effect.

Proctors may have almost limitless statutory powers, but they cannot work alone, and it is our pleasure to thank all those who have assisted us in our year of office; we name no names, time is too short for that. We do recognise, though, the outstanding contributions of our own office staff, who have worked with great fortitude and commitment through this year like no other, and of our interim Clerk, James Bufford, who

has given us limitless support in this time of transition. We are delighted, too, that a new Clerk will be taking up office in some two months' time. We hand over to our successors an office which is rather different from the one we inherited 53 weeks ago, but one which is, we believe, ready for business.

It is quite right that this annual ceremony should be referred to as the Admission of the new Proctors, rather than as the Demission of the old. It is important always to look forward, not back. As you are about to begin your year of office, we hope you will take courage from the legend of the French martyr St Denis, beheaded for his faith in the third century. Not that I'm equating the admission of Proctors to martyrdom, let me hasten to say. Legend has it that St Denis, after his decapitation in Montmartre, took up his head and proceeded to walk a distance of six miles to the spot on which a church would subsequently be built in his name. When, in the 18th century, the cardinal de Polignac recounted the tale of this miraculous journey to the celebrated wit, Mme du Deffand, she is reputed to have replied with characteristically dry humour: It really makes no difference how far he walked; it's taking the first step that's difficult. We wish you bon courage as you take your first step now, and we wish a fulfilling year for you and for those who accompany you on the many steps which will follow.

Proctorial Year 2013-14

Summary of Complaints Cases

During 2013-14 the Proctors received 226 complaints, of which 33% were upheld in whole or in part. In addition they completed some cases carried over from previous proctorial years. The great majority (85%) of these complaints related to examinations and research student candidatures. (Totals for previous year are given in brackets.)

Taught-course examinations (undergraduate and postgraduate): 190 (192)

107 of these cases involved a straightforward marks check and led to no further action being taken. The Proctors upheld, in whole or in part, a total of 68 complaints relating to new cases. 7 complaints remain under consideration.

Research student matters: 12 (8)

The Proctors upheld 4 cases. 5 remain outstanding.

Equal opportunities: 0 (2)

Harassment: 3(1)

While harassment cases remain rare, the Proctors continue to take these complaints seriously. Two of the cases this year related to one individual.

Maladministration: 13 (4)

While the statistics show an increase from 4 to 13, a more detailed examination of these cases reveals that this increase is mainly due to the way in which cases are classified and are not symptomatic of a trend in the University's processes.

Quality of/access to teaching, learning, support facilities: 6 (2)

These complaints typically concerned dissatisfaction with delayed or reduced tutorial provision or delays in the appointment of thesis or project supervisors.

Suspension/rustication: 0 (0)

Student Union: 0 (0)

Other matters: (3)

These three cases related to articles published in student newspapers. Two cases were brought to an informal settlement; the other is ongoing.

Changes in Regulations

Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **11 April**.

(a) Committee for Development and Alumni Relations

Explanatory Note

The proposed changes, made on the recommendation of the Committee for Development and Alumni Relations, amend the committee's remit and membership by (i) reducing the number of members and (ii) removing its responsibilities in relation to sponsorship matters and setting priorities for fundraising and alumni relations.

Text of Regulations

1 In Council Regulations 15 of 2002, amend Part 17 concerning the Committee for Development and Alumni Relations as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'17.1. The Committee for Development and Alumni Relations shall consist of:

- (1) the Vice-Chancellor;
- (2) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Development and External Affairs), who shall be vice-chairman of the committee;
- (2) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Planning and Resources);
- (3) one of the Proctors and the Assessor as may be agreed between them;
- (4) the Chairman of the Conference of Colleges or, subject to the approval of the Council, his or her nominee;
- (5) the <u>Chair of the Development Panel</u> Vice-Chairman of the Development Council:
- (6)-(9) the head (or the nominee of the head) of each of the four divisions;
- (10)-_(1<u>1</u>3) four <u>two</u> persons appointed by Council, of whom one shall be appointed from among the members of Council specified in section 4 (15)-(25) of Statute VI, one shall be a member of its Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, and two shall be heads of house;

(124) one student member representative appointed by the Executive of the Oxford University Student Union from among their own number.

17.2. The committee may co-opt up to two additional members for such periods as the committee shall deem appropriate.

17.3. The committee shall:

(1) advise Council on strategy and policy relating to development, and alumni relations and sponsorship, and the alignment of development and alumni relations priorities with the strategic objectives of the University;

(2) monitor the implementation and effectiveness of the University's policies and procedures relating to development and alumni relations, reporting and referring matters to Council as appropriate, and if deemed appropriate by the Committee, offer feedback and advice to Council on policies or strategy for fundraising and alumni relations make recommendations to Council (in consultation with the Academic Divisions and the main committees of Council, as appropriate) on the short- and long-term priorities for fundraising and alumni relations;

- (3) seek to promote and facilitate fundraising and alumni relations within the collegiate University; <u>and</u>
- (4) oversee a review and approval procedure for individual sponsorship proposals;
- (45) refer cases which in its view raise issues of a reputational, ethical or similar nature to the Committee for the Review of Donations.;
- (6) monitor the implementation and effectiveness of the University's policies and procedures relating to development, alumni relations and sponsorship, reporting and referring matters to Council as appropriate.'

2 These regulations shall be effective from 1 October 2014.

(b) Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board

Explanatory Note

The proposed changes, made on the recommendation of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board, revise the constitution of the board to include one additional representative appointed from amongst the division's research staff community and reduce the number of persons appointed by the Conference of Colleges from three to two, to reflect current practice.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Council Regulations 17 of 2002, concerning divisional boards, delete regulations 10–11 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '10. The Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board shall consist of:
 - (1) the Head of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division, who shall be chairman;
 - (2)-(11) the Heads of the Departments of Chemistry, Computer Science, Earth Sciences, Engineering Science, Materials, Mathematics, Physics, Plant Sciences, Statistics and Zoology;
 - (12), (13) two persons elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Chemistry;
 - (14), (15) two persons elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Engineering Science;
 - (16), (17) two persons elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Physics;
 - (18), (19) two persons elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Mathematics;
 - (20) a person elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Computer Science;
 - (21) a person elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Earth Sciences;
 - (22) a person elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Materials;

- (23) a person elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Plant Sciences:
- (24) a person elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Statistics;
- (25) a person elected by and from among the members of the Faculty of Zoology;
- (26)-(287) three two persons appointed, for a three-year term, under the procedures of the Conference of Colleges. They shall have appropriate experience and understanding of academic policy and finance and be familiar with the subject areas concerned, but should not hold a salaried teaching or research post within the division:
- (28) a person appointed, for a three-year term, under the procedures of the Oxford Research Staff Society (OxRSS) from among its members, being members of a department in the division. Attendance at meetings by the OxRSS member shall be subject to similar arrangements as for student members, as set out in regulations 37–39 below.
- 11. The board may co-opt up to four additional members, on condition that the board shall always ensure by the use of its power of co-optation that the overall range of activities and concerns in the division is as fully represented within the total membership of the board as is reasonably practicable.'
- **2** These regulations shall be effective from 1 October 2014.

(c) Financial Regulations

Explanatory Note

These proposed minor amendments to the regulations reflect changes in processes following the upgrade of the Oracle Financials system to its latest release, Release 12. The opportunity is also taken to amend a small number of outdated references.

 ${\it Text of Regulations}$

1 In the Financial Regulations, amend regulation 1.4(1)(b) as follows (deleted text scored through):

'1.4 Financial Control

(1) Financial Planning and Reporting

- (a) All heads of unit must meet the requirements of the Managing Budgets, Forecasts and Reporting process.
- (b) Specific requirements of the Financial Planning and Reporting process include the provision that, in accordance with the timetable issued by PRAC, each budgetary unit prepare a budget for the financial year and to submit the budget to its parent body for approval. Budgetary units are required to keep income and expenditure within the budgetary targets set by their parent body. Where expenditure is expected to exceed income, the unit must seek prior approval from its parent body to set a deficit budget. If the deficit arises for reasons other than the planned spending down of previously accumulated reserves the unit must provide a plan to show how the budget deficit will be recovered, over a period of no longer than three years, unless otherwise agreed by PRAC. Parent body approval is still required if the deficit arises from the spending down of previously accumulated reserves but in this case it is not necessary to provide a recovery plan.
- Budgetary units are required to keep their income and expenditure within the budgetary limits approved by PRAC. In so doing, divisions may agree to offset their departmental budgets against one another.'
- **2** Ibid, amend regulation 1.4(3) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'(3) Access to the University's Business System

All persons with access to the University's recommended business system must comply with the <u>University's Information Security Policy relevant password and other security controls</u>, and with the Regulations Relating to the Use of Information Technology Facilities.'

3 Ibid, amend regulation 1.4(4)(b) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

- '(b) All employees and others with responsibility for the administration and management of funds received or held by the University have a responsibility to guard against fraudulent practices affecting the University and follow the University Policies on Bribery and Fraud, and Gifts and Hospitality if such practices are discovered, seeking advice from the Senior Assistant Registrar (Compliance) in the Council Secretariat Head of Financial Assurance Services as required.'
- **4** Ibid, amend regulation 2.1(1) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '(1) In a unit that receives cash or cheques, the head of that unit is responsible for ensuring compliance with the Cash <u>and</u> <u>Banking Management</u> process governing such receipts.'
- **5** Ibid, amend regulation 2.3(1) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

2.3 Gifts and Hospitality Received

- (1) Gifts and hospitality received must comply with the University Policy on Gifts and Hospitality <u>as identified in the</u> University's Expenses and Benefits Guide.'
- **6** Ibid, amend regulation 3.1(1)-(6) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '(1) All procurement of goods and services must be in accordance with the Purchase to Pay processes and the Purchasing Procedures.
- (2) Subject to 3.1 (3), all contracts (other than construction-related contracts) for the purchase of goods and/or services to the value of £100,000 or more must be negotiated through the <u>University</u> Purchasing <u>Department</u>Office. For limits below this, the limits set out in Table F apply (excluding insurance costs which must follow Insurance Section processes). No purchase order is required for purchases below £100. A banker's guarantee is required for payments made in advance that exceed £50,000.

(3) For all equipment and services expenditure incurred on research awards departments should ensure that each award funder's general and grant-specific terms and conditions for the procurement process are met. Note that these requirements will sometimes go beyond the University's standard requirements outlined above.

(4) All contracts for the purchase of goods must incorporate the University's standard conditions of purchase, and all contracts for the procurement of services must be in the form of the University's standard contracts for services, unless (in either case) other terms are negotiated through the Purchasing Department Office or (for construction-related contracts) Estates Services. Orders placed above £100,000 must be managed using the principles established in the University's Contract Management Guidelines.

(5) RS is responsible for the authorisation of research-related services. Units are responsible for procuring items on approved research projects. Further requirements for research-related expenditure are included in regulations 4.1-4.2 below.

(6) All contracts for the acquisition of goods and services otherwise than by purchase (for example, leasing arrangements) must be negotiated through the Purchasing DepartmentOffice and notified to the Head of Accounting Services.'

7 Ibid, amend regulation 3.2(1) as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'(1) All salaries and expenses processed within the University should meet the requirements set out in the Payroll <u>process control framework</u> and Expenses <u>and Benefits Guide process</u>. The requirements

for relocation expenses, travel and subsistence expenses, and payments for entertaining are set out in the University's Expenses and Benefits Manual.'

8 Ibid, amend regulation 6.1 as follows (deleted text scored through):

'All cash within the unit must be managed in line with the Cash Handling and Banking process.'

9 Ibid, amend regulation 6.6 as follows (deleted text scored through):

'6.6 Insurance

(1) Except in cases where express agreement to the contrary has been reached with the Finance Division, all insurances must be arranged only through the Insurance Section, which will provide all necessary advice.

(2) Each budgetary unit must submit an Annual Insurance Return that provides details of the unit's contents to be insured. Items of equipment will be covered for all-risks insurance if they are included within the return. The unit's equipment register must be updated regularly, to include all acquisitions and disposals. Items purchased between annual submissions to the Insurance Section are covered automatically: however, the Insurance Section must be notified at the time of acquisition whenever an individual item exceeds £100,000 in value.

(3) University-owned vehicles may be used for University business purposes only. Use must be authorised in writing by the head of unit, and a record of authorised drivers maintained. The unit must refer to the Insurance Section whenever a driver has six or more points on his or her licence. The Insurance Section must receive immediate

notification of all vehicle acquisitions and disposals and hires for a period of fourteen days or more. In addition the unit must submit to the Insurance Section the Annual Insurance Return: Departmental Vehicles.'

10 Ibid, amend regulation 7.2 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'7.2 Assurance

Heads of unit must also support the need for the University to discharge its assurance responsibilities to external, regulatory or other review bodies. This assurance covers both financial and non-financial activities. The University also requires departments to comply with its set out in the Self-Assurance process.'

REGULATIONS ON FINANCIAL MATTERS

Explanatory Note

The following change revises and streamlines the information set out in the Financial Matters Appendix to the *Examination Regulations* following a review by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC) and Education Committee, on the recommendation of the Joint Fees and Student Support Advisory Group.

The revised version removes the rates of fees that are set annually, and instead refers to the Fees and Funding website at www. ox.ac.uk/feesandfunding. This website gives the annual fees, dating back to 2005/6, in a format that is far clearer than that adopted in the Financial Matters Appendix. The website includes lists of fees that can be analysed by division, department, year of entry etc, and also a fees and funding search that brings up information on fees and financial support for those interested in any area of study.

In the Financial Matters Appendix as it currently stands, many fees are listed under a schedule: as fee rates have become increasingly differentiated over recent years, the number of fee categories (or fee bands) listed in the schedule has increased, while many programmes have moved from one category to another, and so are listed under more than one category according to year of student entry. Even so, fees for an increasing number of courses do not fall into any of the categories listed in the schedule and so are listed in a separate table. However, this is not comprehensive. The outcome is that the appendix is not suitable for interrogation by students or staff other than fee specialists. Rather than restructure the appendix, for instance by reproducing within it the fee

lists on the website, it is proposed simply to cross-refer to the website. The same group of officers (from Planning and Resource Allocation, Education Policy Support and Student Services, in consultation with the divisions) are responsible for ensuring that both the website and appendix are updated to reflect the fees approved annually by PRAC and Education Committee on the recommendation of the Joint Fees and Student Support Advisory Group, and previous years' fees are archived on the website: there will therefore be no loss of accuracy, but the change will reduce duplication of effort in presenting fees in different formats.

The opportunity is taken to re-order the appendix in a more logical sequence; to remove the Special Appendix, concerning the definition of 'home' student status, which is derived from government regulations, and instead to refer directly to those government regulations; to include text that was previously in footnotes within the related main clauses; and to adopt some rewording. In particular, 'University fees' has been substituted for 'Composition fees', the latter being an archaic term that has given rise to confusion.

The changes now put forward will reduce the length of the Financial Matters Appendix by over half.

The text below reproduces the proposed new version of the Financial Matters
Appendix in full. New wording is underlined and deleted words struck through. Changes in the ordering of subsections are not highlighted, and removed subsections are not shown, but are explained above.

With effect from 1 October 2014

In *Examination Regulations* 2013, delete from p1121, 14 to p1157, 136 and substitute:

'Section I. Fees and Dues Payable to the University

§1. Composition <u>University</u> fees payable by members of the University

1. All fees payable under this Section are set by Council's Planning and Resource Allocation Committee on an annual basis and are available from www.ox.ac. uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/ university rates or from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section. Fees are payable at one of four rates, 'home', 'ELQ', 'islands' and 'overseas'. The 'home' rate is payable by students who meet the criteria given in Schedule 1 of the Education (Fees and Awards) (England) Regulations 2007 and subsequent amendments. The 'ELQ' rate is payable by students who meet the criteria for the 'home' rate but who are reading for a qualification of an equivalent or lower level to one they already hold. The 'islands' rate is payable by residents of the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man who meet the requirements laid down by the respective Islands governments. Where a course does not have a separate 'ELQ' or 'islands' rate, the 'ELQ' or 'islands' rate will be the same as the 'home' rate. All students not meeting these criteria shall pay fees at the 'overseas' rate unless otherwise exempted.

2. (a) Every member of the University shall pay a composition University fee at the appropriate annual rate for each academic year in which he or she is working in Oxford:

(i) for the Degree of BA or the Degree of MBiochem or the Degree of MChem or the Degree of MChem or the Degree of MMathCompSci or the Degree of MEarthSc or the Degree of MEng or the Degree of MMath or the Degree of MCompSci or the Degree of MCompPhil or the Degree of MPhys or the Degree of MPhysPhil or the Degree of MMathPhil (Those working for an honour school requiring the study of one or more languages for an academic year outside Oxford or for Law with Law

Studies in Europe, or for an honour school requiring a period of study shorter than a year outside Oxford, or for Part II in Chemistry or Metallurgy and Science of Materials or Molecular and Cellular Biochemistry, or for Part II in the Honour Schools of Engineering Science [until 1 October **2017**: or Engineering, Economics and Management] [until 1 October 2018: or Materials, Economics and Management], shall be deemed for all the purposes of this clause to be working in Oxford for the degree of BA or the Degree of MBiochem or the Degree of MChem or the Degree of MEng, whether or not their work is being undertaken in Oxford); (ii) for the Degree of BFA; (iii) for the Degree of BCL or Magister Juris; (iv) for a second Final Honour School; (v) for the First Examination for the Degree of BM; (vi) for the Diploma in Theology; (vii) for the Diploma in Legal Studies; (viii) for the Certificate in Diplomatic Studies: (ix) for the Postgraduate Diploma in Diplomatic Studies; (x) for the Postgraduate Diploma in Education; or (xi) for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education (those working for the certificate shall be deemed for all the

being undertaken in Oxford). (b) The fees shall be paid as follows:

purposes of this clause to be working

in Oxford, whether or not their work is

(i) in the case of those members of the University whose fees are paid under the terms of the Education (Student Support) Regulations (or under corresponding arrangements approved by the Scottish Executive, Northern Ireland Assembly, Welsh Assembly or the States Assembly of Jersey, States Assembly of Guernsey or Isle of Man Government) the fees shall be paid in accordance with the arrangements laid down in those regulations;

(ii) in all other cases, the fees shall be collected in accordance with the provisions of §3 below;

(iii) on application by their society, and subject to the approval of Council's Education Committee, some part of the <u>University</u> fee for an academic year may subsequently be returned to those who do not work in Oxford for the whole of that year. The general rule agreed by Council is that, for each complete term not spent working in Oxford, one-third of the annual fee shall be returned.

- 3. Every member of the University shall pay a composition <u>University</u> fee at the appropriate annual rate for each term from and including the term in which he or she begins to work for the Second Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine up to and including the term in which he or she completes all the stages of the examination, or ceases to work for the examination.
- 4. (a) Subject to the provisions of cl 5
 below, every member of the University
 shall pay a composition University fee
 at the appropriate annual rate for each
 term in which he or she is registered
 as a Probationer Research Student or
 is working for one of the qualifications
 listed below, from and including the term
 in which he or she is first so registered or
 begins working for such qualification, up
 to and including the term in which he or
 she takes the examination or (in the case
 of a degree or diploma by thesis only)
 submits his or her thesis:

(i) the Degree of BPhil;
(ii) the Degree of MSc;
(iii) the Degree of MSt;
(iv) the Degree of MBA;
(v) the Degree of MPP;
(vi) the Degree of MLitt;
(vii) the Degree of MPhil;
(viii) the Degree of MTh;
(ix) the Degree of MFA;
(x) the Degree of DPhil;
(xi) the degree of EngD;
(xii) any diploma or certificate other than:

- (a) the Diploma in Theology;(b) the Diploma in Legal Studies;(c) the Postgraduate Diploma in Education;
- (d) the Postgraduate Certificate in Education;
- (e) the Certificate in Management Studies;
- (f) the Certificate in Theology;(g) the Certificate in Diplomatic Studies;
- (h) the Postgraduate Diploma in Diplomatic Studies; or (i) certificates issued by the Board of Studies in Education under the provisions of the appropriate regulation.

(b) Where the examination comprises a written examination followed by the submission of a dissertation, the relevant term is that in which the written examination is taken, save that the relevant term for a student for the Degree of MTh is that in which his or her dissertation is submitted (subject to the provisions of cl 5 of this subsection). A thesis submitted other than during Full Term shall be deemed for the purposes of this clause to have been submitted during the preceding term.

(c) Candidates who continue to work for one of the qualifications listed in this <u>clause</u> after attempting an examination shall pay a composition University fee for each term in which they receive tuition or supervision; but if they receive no further tuition or supervision, they shall pay no further composition University fees but shall pay the fee prescribed in §7 below when they re-enter. Candidates whose thesis submitted for the degree of MLitt, MSc or DPhil has been referred back shall pay no further composition University fees, but shall pay the fee prescribed in §7 below when they apply for re-examination; and candidates whose dissertation for the degree of MSc in Education did not satisfy the examiners shall pay the fee prescribed in §7 below before a revised or new dissertation for Part II of the examination is examined. For the purposes of this clause, 'term' shall include any period of

- forty-two days' residence reckoned as a term of residence under the Regulations for Residence in the University provided that not more than three composition University fees shall be payable in the same academical year.
- (d) The fee shall be collected in accordance with §3 below.
- 5. (a) The number of composition termly <u>University</u> fees payable under cl 4 above by those working for the degree of DPhil shall not exceed nine provided that:

(i) [for candidates admitted <u>for a DPhil</u> from 1 September 2006 onwards] candidates for the DPhil may count towards this figure up to three composition termly University fees paid while working for the degree of MPhil, MSt in Legal Research or BPhil provided that the candidate has been given leave to supplicate for that degree;

(ii) candidates for the DPhil who have held the status of Probationer Research Student, or of Student for the Degree of MSc by Research or MLitt or for the Diploma in Law, before transferring to work for the degree of DPhil shall be deemed for the purpose of this subsection to have been working for the DPhil from the term in which they began working for the course from which they have transferred, and may count towards their DPhil fee liability any fees paid while holding their previous status, subject to the payment on transfer of any consequent additional fees for which they are liable. A candidate is not deemed to be 'transferring to work for the Degree of DPhil', when he or she is admitted for the Diploma in Law or as a DPhil student after satisfying the examiners for the Degree of MSc by Research or MLitt;

(iii) the number of composition termly University fees payable by candidates for the DPhil in the Doctoral Training Centre at the Life Sciences Interface, the DPhil in the Doctoral Training Centre in Systems Biology, the DPhil in the

Centre for Doctoral Training in Healthcare Innovation, and the DPhil in the Industrial Doctorate Centre in Systems Approaches to Biomedical Sciences shall not exceed twelve;

(iv) the number of eomposition termly University fees payable by candidates for a DPhil in the Medical Sciences Doctoral Training Centre who have been admitted to a four-year doctoral programme shall not exceed twelve;

(v) the number of composition termly <u>University</u> fees payable by candidates for a DPhil in Biomedical Sciences under the NIH-Oxford programme shall not exceed six.

(b) The number of composition termly University fees payable by candidates for the Doctor of Engineering shall not exceed twelve.

(c) The number of composition termly University fees payable under cl 4 above by those working for any qualification other than the degree of DPhil or EngD shall not exceed six in respect of each qualification, provided that:

(i) candidates who transfer from the DPhil to the MLitt or MSc by Research may count up to six composition University fees paid while working towards the DPhil (including fees paid while holding the status Probationer Research Student) towards this figure;

(ii) candidates receiving tuition or supervision after attempting an examination shall continue to pay composition <u>University</u> fees for each term in which they receive tuition or supervision;

(iii) candidates under (iv)-(vii) below who receive tuition or supervision after failing an examination or who require an extension of time shall continue to pay composition University fees for each term in which they receive tuition or supervision;

(iv) part-time students for the Degree of Master of Science in Education shall pay not more than twelve composition <u>University</u> fees (at the half rate);

(v) students for the Degree of Master of Science in Evidence-Based Health Care, Experimental Therapeutics, Software and System Security, Software Engineering, Surgical Science and Practice, or Sustainable Urban Development shall pay not more and not fewer than six termly programme fees irrespective of the period for which they are registered for that degree;

(vi) <u>part-time</u> students for the Degree of Master of Theology shall not pay more than six <u>University</u> fees (at the half rate) while working for Part II of that degree;

(vii) students for the Degree of Master of Studies in International Human Rights Law shall pay not more than six composition <u>University</u> fees; and

(viii) part-time students for the MSc in Mathematical Finance shall pay not more than two tuition fees covering seven terms of study, payable at the start of the first and second years of the course respectively; students requiring an extension of time shall pay a fee of £500 for each term in which they continue to receive tuition or supervision.

(d) Fee requirements relating to full-time students undertaking graduate study shall also apply to part-time students holding the same status, save that part-time students shall be required to pay half the applicable full-time fee over twice the applicable length of time for full-time students, except where the fee for the part-time programme is otherwise specified in the regulations, and except where the applicable period is otherwise specified under cl 5(c) above.

(e) (i) Where admission as a graduate student is reckoned from a term earlier than that in which the application for admission was approved, on the grounds that: (a) a term or terms had been spent at another university on a course of study directly relevant to the work subsequently undertaken for the degree of MLitt, MSc or DPhil, and

(b) the earlier study had not led to the award of a qualification of any university, and was under the supervision of a person who has subsequently taken up an appointment at Oxford,

(ii) subject to the approval of Council's Education Committee, any fees payable under cl 4 above in respect of such term or terms may be remitted either wholly or in part. For the purposes of determining the appropriate fee level, the student will usually be deemed to have commenced the programme of study in the term to which their admission has been antedated.

6. Subject to the approval of Council's Education Committee, where a clinical student has already spent at least three terms working full-time for the Degree of MSc by research and has paid at least three composition <u>University</u> fees in respect thereof, any further fees payable in respect of the MSc course for terms in which he or she is also working as a clinical student at a university clinical school outside Oxford may be remitted.

7. Every member of the University shall pay such other fees applicable to him or her as may be prescribed by any statute or regulation.

§2. Visiting, Recognised and Matriculated Non-Award Students

1. Every member of the University who, not holding an academic appointment in the University or the colleges, has been matriculated in order to study in the University otherwise than for a degree, diploma or certificate of the University shall pay a composition University fee at the appropriate annual rate published at www. ox.ac.uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/universityrates or available from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section for each term in which he or she is studying in the University.

- 2. Every person on the Register of Recognised Students or on the Register of Visiting Students shall pay a composition University fee at the appropriate annual rate published at www.ox.ac.uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/universityrates or available from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section for each term in which he or she is studying in the University.
- 3. Every member of the University person described in cll1 and 2 above shall pay such other fees applicable to him or her as may be prescribed by any statute or regulation.
- **§3.** <u>Arrangements relating to the payment of University composition fees</u>
- 1. (a) Not later than the fourteenth day after the last day of every Full Term, the Head or Bursar of every society, or the Head of the student's department for programmes where fees are usually paid directly to the department, shall send to the Secretary of the Chest a schedule signed by himself or herself containing the names of all members of the society who were liable to pay the composition University fees referred to in §1 and §2 above, in respect of that term.
 - (b) The Head or Bursar of every society shall pay to the Secretary of the Chest such composition <u>University</u> fees as were due for that term in accordance with the mechanisms agreed between the colleges and the <u>University</u> from time to time. Where composition <u>University</u> fees are collected by a department these shall be paid to the Secretary of the Chest in accordance with the mechanisms that are agreed from time to time.
- 2. The aAnnual composition University fees shall be paid on or before the seventh day of Michaelmas Full Term (or of the term in which the student commences his or her course, as the case may be) unless the Bursar of the student's college or the Head of the student's department for programmes where fees are usually paid directly to the department, certifies in writing that:
 - (a) the college has approved the student's application to pay by instalments, the first such instalment having been paid; and/or

- (b) the student has applied for, and is prima facie eligible for, a contribution to his or her fee from his or her local authority (or other fee-paying body) and the college is of the opinion that no contribution will be required from the student;
- (c) the student's programme did not commence on the first day of the relevant term, and payment is due on the seventh day after the actual commencement of the student's programme.
- 3. (a) In the event that any fee or continuation charge payable by the student, or the relevant instalment towards such a fee, remains unpaid after the due date of payment it shall be the duty of the Bursar of the student's college, or the Registrar for programmes where fees or charges are usually paid directly to the University, or the Head of the student's department for programmes where fees or charges are usually paid directly to the department, to notify the student concerned that, in the event that the fees or charges due have not been paid in full within four weeks from the date of such notification, the student shall be liable for suspension from access to the premises and facilities of the University (including the Examination Schools and other places of examination) from the end of such four-week period until such time as outstanding fees or charges have been paid. The Bursar or Head shall also inform the Registrar that he or she has so notified the student concerned; and if the fees or charges due have not been paid in full within the specified four-week period, the Bursar or Head shall inform the Registrar of the position, whereupon, subject to the other provisions of this clause, the University shall have the right forthwith to suspend the student concerned from access to the premises and facilities of the University.
 - (b) On application by their society, or by the Head of the student's department for programmes where fees are usually paid directly to the department, and subject to the approval of Council's Education Committee, some part of the fee for

- an academical year may subsequently be returned to those who do not work in Oxford as a result of suspension or withdrawal, for the whole of that year. The general rule agreed by Council is that, for each complete term not spent working in Oxford, one-third of the annual fee shall be returned. In addition, if a student withdraws or suspends their status on or before Monday of Week 4 of any term the fees payable in respect of that term will generally be reimbursed to the student. $\underline{\text{Certain programmes}}$ which have been granted permission to charge non-refundable deposits and programmes within the Department for Continuing Education and the Saïd Business School may operate different refund policies.
- (c) Applications for the remission or waiver of University fees, for the resolution of issues relating to the nonpayment of University fees, and for all other questions of doubt or difficulty relating to the liability of individual students for University fees, including those covered under cll 2 and 3(a) and (b) above, and for questions of doubt or difficulty relating to the charging of deposits for course fees, or for tuition charge waivers fee reductions or bursaries as covered in §6, or for liability for the continuation charge as covered in §4 shall be determined by the Fees Panel. The Panel shall be chaired by the Assessor and consist of two members nominated by Conference of Colleges, two members nominated by Council's Education Committee, and the Assessorelect. Applications for dispensation from residence requirements, other than those specified above, shall be determined by the Proctors, on condition that if the Fees Panel or the Proctors, as the case may be, are unable to agree on how to deal with any individual application they shall refer the application to Council's Education Committee for decision.
- (d) There shall be no appeal against a decision of the Fees Panel. A student may, however, make a further application under the procedures outlined above for relief from suspension or such terms

as may have been imposed by a Fees Panel if the Bursar of his or her college supports an application on the basis that the student's financial circumstances have changed for reasons beyond his or her control.

§4. Regulations relating to the University continuation charge

- 1. A candidate admitted to graduate research study (that is, a student for the DPhil, EngD, MLitt, MSc(Res), or any other programme of study designated as a research programme) who commenced their current programme of study in or after September 2011 and who has reached the end of the period of fee liability, as defined at §1, cl 5, and who thereafter remains registered as a graduate research student, shall pay a continuation charge for each subsequent term up to and including the term in which the thesis is submitted. Candidates whose thesis has been referred back shall pay no further composition University fee or continuation charge, but shall pay the fee prescribed in §7 below when they apply for re-examination.
- 2. A student who is paying composition <u>University</u> fees in respect of any given term shall not be liable for a continuation charge in the same term.
- 3. The continuation charge first became payable in 2013-14 and the rate will be reviewed on an annual basis. The rate for the current academic year is available from www.ox.ac.uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/maxlib/otherfees or from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section. Divisions may remit the continuation charge (subject to approval by Council's Planning and Resource Allocation Committee) for graduate research students on a specified course or courses of study, provided that the remission applies to all students on that course in a specified term or terms of study.
- **§5.** Regulations relating to the fees for certain scholarship and exchange agreements
- 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of §1 above, the University shall remit three-fifths of the prescribed composition <u>University</u> fees payable by any overseas student who establishes, by information certified to the Secretary of the Chest by an officer

- of the student's college or society, that at least half of the cost of the student's maintenance (as distinct from University or college fees) in the relevant year has been provided by resident Junior Members of the University (otherwise than from funds of common rooms contributed directly or indirectly by local education authorities or other grant-paying authorities in payment of membership fees); provided that the number of students whose fees are remitted under this clause shall not in any one year exceed thirty-five and that any arrangements required for determining the allocation between colleges or other societies of the benefits available under this clause shall be subject to approval from time to time by Council's Education Committee.
- 2. Council's Education Committee shall have power to approve exchange arrangements with other universities under which no fees are payable on either side. Any of the <u>University</u> fees prescribed in §1 or §2 above, which would otherwise have been payable by any person working in Oxford under those exchange arrangements shall be remitted.
- **§6.** Regulations for Oxford bursaries and tuition fee reductions
- 1. The arrangements described in this section apply to members of the University, entitled, in accordance with the criteria set out in §1, cl 1, to be charged <u>University</u> fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, who are working in Oxford:
 - (a) for the Degree of BA or the Degree of MBiochem or the Degree of MChem or the Degree of MChem or the Degree of MMathCompSci or the Degree of MEarthSc or the Degree of MEng or the Degree of MMath or the Degree of MCompSci or the Degree of MCompPhil or the Degree of MPhys or the Degree of MPhysPhil or the Degree of MMathPhil, or the degree of MMathPhys (4-year course only), or the degree of BTh (full-time mode only);
 - (b) for the degree of BFA;
 - (c) for the First Examination for the Degree of BM;
 - (*d*) for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine;

- (e) for the Second Examination for the degree of BM;
- (f) for the full-time Certificate or Diploma in Theological and Pastoral Studies;(g) for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education.
- 2. All students described in cl1 above, who are entitled to receive support from a funding agency as described in cl 6 below, will be eligible to be assessed for an Oxford bursary, subject to cl 4. Bursary levels will be at the rates determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee. Bursary amounts are set out on the University website. Members of the University described in cl1(a), (b) and (c) who are in their first year of study will be eligible to be assessed for an additional start-up bursary. Special regulations for members of the University described in cl 1 (*d*), (*e*), (*f*) and (*g*) are set out in cll 11 to 14.
- 3. All students described in cl 1, who are entitled to receive support from a funding agency as described in cl 6 below, who commenced their programme of study on or after 1 September 2012, and who would otherwise be liable for the full University composition fees as described in §1, hereafter referred to as 'tuition fees', will be eligible to be assessed for a reduction in their University fees, hereafter referred to as a 'tuition fee reduction', subject to cl 4. The level of the tuition fee reduction will be at the rates determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee $and\,Planning\,and\,Resource\,Allocation$ Committee. The <u>different</u> levels of tuition fee reductions are set out on the University website. Special regulations for members of the University described in cl 1(d)-(g) are set out in cll 11-14. Students will not be entitled to a cash equivalent of a tuition fee reduction.
- 4. If a student who is eligible to be charged the university composition <u>University</u> fees at the 'home' (and EU) rate is not entitled to means-tested maintenance support from his or her funding agency, he or she will not be eligible to be assessed for a bursary or tuition fee reduction in that academic year. Students who are entitled to be assessed by the Student Finance Services Non UK Team,

and who are entitled, in accordance with the criteria set out in §1, cl 1, to be charged fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, are eligible to be assessed for a bursary or tuition fee reduction, subject to the conditions referred to in cl 10 below.

- 5. Students who are repeating a year of their studies at Oxford will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction, subject to cl 4. Students repeating their first year or transferring to year one of a new course described in cl 1 will not be eligible for any start-up bursary, and will receive a tuition fee reduction at the level received by eligible students after their first year.
- 6. Requirements for the assessment of a student's household income are as follows:
 - (a) a member of the University as described in cl1 can only be considered for a bursary or tuition fee reduction if he or she is first financially assessed by his or her funding agency and if consent has been given for the University to access this information. Financial assessments will only be accepted from Student Finance England, Student Finance Northern Ireland, Student Finance Wales, the Student Awards Agency for Scotland, the Student Finance Services Non UK Team, the Student Loans Company (SLC) or the National Health Service (NHS). The University will only base a student's bursary and/or tuition fee reduction upon income information provided to it via the above agencies;
 - (b) special regulations for financial assessments apply to members of the University who are working in Oxford for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine and Second Examination for the degree of BM. These are set out in cll 11 and 12;
 - (c) 'home' students are obliged to accept any maintenance grant they become eligible for as a result of financial assessment by their funding agency in order to be eligible to be assessed for a bursary and/or a tuition fee reduction. 'Home' (and EU) students are not required by the University to take out a maintenance loan or tuition fee loan

from their funding agency to be eligible to be assessed for a bursary or for a tuition fee reduction respectively.

7. The annual deadlines for the assessment of bursaries and tuition fee reductions shall be as follows:

(a) to be assessed for an Oxford bursary and/or tuition fee reduction students must comply with the application deadlines set by their funding agency. Students who fail to comply with requests to provide information to their agency will not be assessed by the University after the deadlines listed in (b) and (c) below;

(b) to be assessed, or reassessed, for an Oxford bursary students must ensure that they have provided all information to their funding agency in time to ensure their assessment is complete and available to the University from the SLC or other approved agency by 30 May of the academic year in which they wish to be considered for a bursary;

(c) to be assessed, or reassessed, for a tuition fee reduction students must ensure that they have provided all information to their funding agency in time to ensure their assessment is complete and available to the University from the SLC or other approved agency by 20 December of the academic year in which they wish to be considered for a tuition fee reduction:

(d) any student who wishes to be considered for a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction, or for a change in their bursary and/or tuition fee reduction after the dates listed in (b) and (c) above must submit a case to the Student Financial Support section (Examination Schools, Oxford OX14BG) detailing the delay relating to their financial assessment by 30 May of that academic year. The student must confirm when he or she applied for funding, what difficulties he or she had in being assessed correctly, the action he or she took to rectify this and provide any corresponding evidence. The student will be expected to respond in a timely manner to any requests for further information from Student

Financial Support. The student must also provide the final financial notification for that year as soon as it is available and no later than 20 December of the following academic year. If the student is in their final year of study, the deadline for submission of the financial support notification is Friday of Week 9 of Trinity term of that year.

8. The arrangements for adjustments to bursaries during an academic year are as follows:

(a) each of the regulations in this clause will be subject to the dates and regulations listed in cl 7;

(b) students who have received an overpayment of their bursary following a revised household income assessment will not be asked to repay any funds, unless the bursary was obtained due to incorrect information being knowingly submitted to the student's funding agency by the student or his or her sponsor;

(c) if a student's revised household income assessment results in an increased bursary entitlement, subsequent bursary payments will be adjusted upwards to reflect the student's increased entitlement for the whole year. The increased bursary payments will be calculated as if the student had been eligible for that level from the start of the academic year;

(d) if a student fails to provide information requested by their funding agency, as a result of which the financial assessment is withdrawn, the University will suspend bursary payments until the student's assessment has been completed by the funding agency, at which point their bursary entitlement will be re-assessed;

(e) the amount paid per term will be onethird of the total annual bursary to which the student is eligible. Students will be expected to repay their bursary for any term where they have suspended or withdrawn before the bursary payment date, currently Week 4 in Michaelmas term and Week 2 in Hilary and Trinity terms. 9. The arrangements for adjustments to fee liability and tuition fee reductions during an academic year are as follows:

(a) each of the regulations in this clause will be subject to the dates and regulations listed in cl 7;

(b) students whose revised household income assessment has increased will not be liable for an increased University fees, unless the initial tuition fee reduction was obtained due to incorrect information being knowingly submitted to the student's funding agency by the student or his or her sponsor;

(c) if a student's revised household income assessment has reduced, resulting in an entitlement to a larger tuition fee reduction, he or she will receive an additional tuition fee reduction. The level of the tuition fee reduction will calculated as if the student had been eligible for that level from the start of the academic year.

10. The arrangements for changes to bursary and tuition fee reduction entitlement between years are as follows:

(a) students entitled, in accordance with the criteria set out in §1, cl 1, to be charged University fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, and who are entitled to be financially assessed by Student Finance England, Student Finance Northern Ireland, Student Finance Wales, the Student Awards Agency for Scotland, the Student Loans Company or the National Health Service, are required by these funding agencies to apply for financial support each year if they wish to access means-tested support. The assessment of their household income by their funding agency may change from year to year, and consequently their entitlement to a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction is subject to change each year. Special regulations are set out in cll 11 and 12 for financial assessments for members of the University working for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine (Part II) and Bachelor of Medicine (Second Examination):

(b) students entitled, in accordance with the criteria set out in §1, cl 1, to be charged fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate, and who are entitled to be financially assessed by the Student Finance Services Non UK Team, may have their household income assessed in the first year of study only. Students who wish to have their household income reassessed or continuing-year students who wish to be financially assessed for the first time must submit a request to the Student Financial Support section, Examination Schools, Oxford OX1 4BG.

(c) students will only be eligible to be assessed for a bursary and/or tuition fee reduction for the period in which they are entitled, in accordance with the criteria set out in §1, cl 1, to be charged tuition University fees at the appropriate 'home' (and EU) rate.

11. Special regulations apply for members of the University who are working in Oxford for the Preliminary Examination in Medicine (Part II) and Bachelor of Medicine (Second Examination) where these students were admitted on the accelerated four-year course. These are as follows:

(a) the household income of students in years two to four of their course will be estimated on the basis of the financial assessment of their household income in year one of their course or from their latest NHS (or corresponding authority) bursary assessment as evidenced by the student:

(b) students will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction in the first year of their course. Those students not eligible for fee support from the NHS/ SLC because their funding agency does not provide fee support for this course will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction in all years of their course where household income will be estimated on the basis of the financial assessment of their household income in year one of their course. A tuition fee reduction is not available to those students who are eligible for fee support from the NHS/SLC after the first year of their course. The level of the tuition

fee reduction will correspond to the reduction available to students described in cl 1(a), (b) and (c) after their first year of studies;

(c) students will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary for all years of the course. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1(a), (b) and (c) in their first year of study.

12. Special regulations apply for members of the University who are working in Oxford for the Bachelor of Medicine (Second Examination) in years four to six of the six-year medicine course:

(a) the household income of students in years five and six of the six-year medicine course will be estimated on the basis of the financial assessment of their household income in year four of their course or from their latest NHS (or corresponding authority) bursary assessment as evidenced by the student;

(b) students in year four of the course will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction. The level of the tuition fee reduction will correspond to the reduction available to those eligible students described in cl1(a), (b) and (c) after their first year of studies;

(c) students will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary for all years of the course. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1(a), (b) and (c) in their first year of study.

13. Special regulations apply for members of the University who are working in Oxford for the Certificate or Diploma in Theological and Pastoral Studies:

(a) students will be eligible to be assessed for the tuition fee reductions advertised on the Faculty of Theology and Religion website, and determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;

(b) students will be eligible to be assessed for a bursary for all years of the course. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1(a), (b) and (c) in their first year of study.

- 14. Members of the University working in Oxford for the Postgraduate Certificate in Education will be eligible to be assessed for a tuition fee reduction determined from time to time by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee. The level of the fee reduction will correspond to the reduction available to those eligible students described in cl1 (a), (b) and (c) after their first year of studies. They will only be eligible to be assessed for an Oxford bursary if their full entitlement to government maintenance support (including a government teacher training bursary or affiliated scholarship) amounts to less than £9,000. They will not be eligible for any start-up bursary available to students in cl1(a), (b) and (c) in their first year of study.
- 15. Students who have completed the parttime Foundation Certificate in History or English Language and Literature at Oxford with the Department for Continuing Education and who progress directly to the second year of the BA in History or the BA in English Language and Literature are eligible to be assessed for any start-up bursary and/ or enhanced tuition fee reduction that is normally available to students described in cl1(a), (b) and (c) in their first year.
- 16. If a student believes that his or her bursary or tuition fee reduction has not been processed according to these regulations and/or the bursary and tuition fee reduction rates approved by Council's Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, he or she should contact the Student Financial Support section, Examination Schools, Oxford OX1 4BG. Any question of doubt or difficulty relating to the eligibility of individual students for tuition fee reductions and/or Oxford bursaries shall be determined by the Fees Panel, as described in §3, cl 3.
- **§7.** Fees payable by candidates on registration, entry for an examination, application for leave to supplicate, or resubmission of a thesis for certain degrees, or supplicating for admission to or accumulation of certain degrees
- 1. Fees are payable in the following circumstances. Fees are reviewed on an annual basis with the fees for the current

- academic year available from www.ox.ac. uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/ maxlib/otherfees or from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section. In the case of circumstances described in (a)-(c) and (i) below and if University fees as defined in §1 are payable in respect of the same term, fees given in (a)-(i) below do not apply.
 - (*a*) On entering for certain University examinations:
 - (i) Certificates in Theology;(ii) Certificate and Diploma in Theological and Pastoral Studies;(iii) Degree of BMus.
 - (b) On re-entering the University examination for the Degrees of BPhil, MPhil, MTh, MSc (by Coursework), MSt, MBA, MFA, MPP, or any diploma or certificate (other than those listed under §1 cl 4(a)(xii) (a)-(i).
 - (c) On resubmission of a thesis for the degree of MLitt, MTh, MSc (by Research), DPhil or EngD, or on reinstatement on the Register of Students for the degree of MLitt, MSc (by Research), DPhil or EngD.
 - (d) For late entry for examinations:
 - (i) where a candidate proposes to offer a book or subject or part of the examination which has already been offered by a candidate who entered by the due date and no change in the conduct of the examination is involved;
 - (ii) where the provisions of (i) are not satisfied but the chairman of examiners is willing to consent.
 - (e) For late alteration of options:
 - (i) where a candidate proposes to offer a book or subject or part of the examination which has already been offered by a candidate who entered by the due date and no change in the conduct of the examination is involved;
 - (ii) where the provisions of (i) are not satisfied but the chairman of examiners is willing to consent.

- (f) On admission to the Status of Student for the Degree of DM and for each subsequent year that the name of the student remains on the register of students for the degree.
- (g) On resubmission for the degree of DM.
- (*h*) On resubmission of a thesis for the Degree of MCh.
- (i) On applying for leave to supplicate:
 - (i) for the degree of MCh
 (ii) for the degree of DM
 (iii) for the degrees of DD, DCL, DLitt,
 DSc, and DMus.
- 2. Every person shall pay £10 on supplicating for admission to the degree of MA, provided that:
 - (a) No fee shall be payable by any person on whom a degree has been conferred by special resolution or who incorporates in virtue of having obtained an educational position in the University;
 - (b) No fee shall be payable by a Master of Surgery on supplicating for admission to the Degree of Master of Arts.
- 3. A fee shall be paid by every person accumulating the Degrees of Bachelor and Doctor of Civil Law. The fee for the current academic year is available from www.ox.ac. uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/maxlib/otherfees or from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section.
- **§8.** Fees payable by candidates on registration for courses validated by the University
- 1. A registration fee is payable for the degree of Doctor of Clinical Psychology. The fee for the current academic year is available from www.ox.ac.uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/maxlib/otherfees or from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section.
- **§9.** Fees payable by certain students <u>working</u> in departments or faculties who are not <u>members of the University nor Recognised</u> students nor Visiting Students
- 1. If a person who is not a member of the University is admitted to work, and receive instruction or supervision, in any University department by the head of the department,

he or she shall pay to the Secretary of the Chest such fee or fees as shall be prescribed by the head of the department in accordance with arrangements approved from time to time by Council's Education and Planning and Resource Allocation Committees.

- 2. The head of each department shall have discretion to fix a fee or fees for any member of the University who is working in his or her department, unless that member is liable to pay a composition <u>University</u> fees under the provisions of §1 or §2 cl 1 or would be liable but for the provisions of §1 cl 5 thereof.
- 3. The head of each department shall maintain, and on request send to the Secretary of the Chest not later than the end of the third week of Full Term, or in the case of students working in the vacation only, as soon as may be, a list of the names of the students attending lectures or working in his or her department other than those liable to pay a fee covering that term under §1 or §2.
- 4. No fee shall be payable under the provisions of this subsection by any person who is paying a fee under the provisions of §4, or whose name is on the Register of Recognised Students or the Register of Visiting Students, or by any salaried employee who is receiving instruction or supervision in the department in which he or she is working.
- For the purposes of this subsection the word 'Term' shall include the vacation following.

§10. Fees payable by certain Clinical Students

1. Every person attached to the clinical school under regular instruction for a qualifying medical examination of another university or of a recognised professional institution shall, unless liable to pay a composition University fees under the provisions of §1, pay to the Regius Professor of Medicine a fee of £10 on admission and a composition University fee every three months at the annual rate published at www.ox.ac.uk/feesandfunding/fees/information/universityrates or available from the Planning and Resource Allocation Section which would be applicable to him or her if liable for fees under §1 cl 3.

- 2. The Regius Professor of Medicine shall have discretion to fix fees for persons attached to the clinical school who are not under regular instruction but who would otherwise be liable to pay a fee or fees under cl 1 above.
- 3. Within fourteen days of the last day of every Full Term the Regius Professor of Medicine shall:
 - (a) Send to the Secretary of the Chest a schedule specifying (a) the names of all the persons who were liable to pay any of the fees referred to in cll 1 and 2 above since the preparation of the previous schedule and (b) the particular fees payable by such persons; and
 - (b) Account to the curators for the fees so specified between those at the 'home' and 'overseas' rates, for the remainder of the course then being undertaken.

§11. Fees in respect of certificates, transcripts and personal data

- 1. Every person shall pay the fee prescribed below in each case for certificates issued, on request, to Degree Conferrals Office, Examination Schools, Oxford OX1 4BG:
 - (a) for the first certificate attesting admission to any degree, which shall include a statement of the class obtained: no charge
 - (b) for each replacement certificate attesting admission to any degree (the request must be accompanied by a written statement declaring the original lost, stolen or damaged): £30.
- 2. Every person shall pay the fee prescribed below in each case for transcripts issued, online or by request to University of Oxford, c/o Examination Schools, High Street, Oxford OX1 4BG:
 - (a) for the first transcript provided upon successful completion: no charge
 - (b) for each transcript provided during the course and any subsequent transcripts upon completion: £5.
- 3. Every person making a request to be supplied with personal data under Section 7 of the Data Protection Act 1998 shall pay the fee determined from time to time by

Council. Such requests should be addressed to the Data Protection Officer, University Offices, Wellington Square, Oxford OX12JD, from whom details of the current fee can be obtained. The fee is subject to a maximum prescribed from time to time by the Home Secretary under the Act.'

Committee on Statutes before the Privy Council

JESUS COLLEGE: REVISED STATUTES

The Committee on Statutes before the Privy Council, acting under authority delegated to it by Council, is minded to give consent on behalf of the University to the revised statutes of Jesus College, approved by the Governing Body on 6 November 2013, in so far as such consent is required by section 7 (2) of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923. The consent of the committee to the amendments to the statutes will be effective eleven days after publication of this notice unless written notice of a resolution, signed by at least twenty members of Congregation and calling upon Council to withhold that consent, has been given to the Registrar by noon on Monday, 5 May.

The effect of the amendments is to enable the college to apply a total shareholder return approach to its investments.

Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee

STATEMENT ON THE FOSSIL FUEL DIVESTMENT CAMPAIGN

The Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee (SRIRC) is responsible for considering representations concerning the Socially Responsible Investment Policy¹ and proposals related to the implementation of the policy submitted to it from certain specified bodies within the University, and making recommendations to Council as appropriate². The SRIRC is now making its first statement regarding representations made by Oxford University Student Union (OUSU) regarding the University's investments in fossil fuel-related companies.

The SRIRC received a first representation from OUSU at its meeting on 28 November 2013 requesting that consideration be given to financial transactions involving organisations in the fossil fuel industry. The SRIRC sought clarification from OUSU on the scope of its resolution and the definition and scope of what OUSU meant by 'the fossil fuel industry'. The SRIRC subsequently received a second OUSU representation clarifying its definition of 'fossil fuel companies' (as set out in the penultimate paragraph below) and asking the University to consider divestment from all fossil fuel

investments held by Oxford University Endowment Management (OUem) on behalf of Oxford University. OUSU's resolution can be viewed below³.

The SRIRC welcomes this engagement. We acknowledge the significance and importance of the broad issue of climate change and are grateful to OUSU for formally raising this issue with the SRIRC.

The SRIRC is responsible for forming an opinion on the question of socially responsible investment that the divestment resolution raises and for advising Council accordingly. At its meeting on 6 March 2014, the SRIRC began detailed discussions on this subject. It acknowledged that fossil fuel divestment is a broad issue involving many different University departments and activities, and that any engagement on this issue will need to consider a range of stakeholders across the whole of the University. These include a number of Council's committees, the divisional boards, colleges, benefactors, staff and students (past, present and future), among others. It is recognised that this is a complex and multifaceted issue which requires the collection of evidence and opinions, and time for reflection and informed debate.

Therefore, and in light of the growing global debate and given the University's broad research engagement on the subject, the SRIRC has decided to canvass the opinions of stakeholders. We are therefore requesting evidence and opinions from relevant bodies in the collegiate University, and through the publication of this statement invite interested parties to submit evidence or views that might inform the committee's consideration of the question of possible divestment from companies 'that participate in exploration for and/or extraction of fossil fuel reserves' as per the OUSU representation. We are also interested in evidence or views on whether there are alternative ways in which the University should engage in the debate about climate change. The SRIRC will review submissions at its next meeting on 2 July 2014, and will publish a summary of the views received on its website, ensuring that such views are given proper consideration in the eventual recommendation that is made to Council.

¹University Policy on Socially Responsible Investment

Approved by Council on 2 December 2013

Policy

The University of Oxford is committed to ensuring that it makes investment decisions responsibly and with integrity. The University's Policy is to ensure that its investment decisions (including those taken on its behalf) take into account social, environmental and political issues in order to maintain its ethical standards.

Council has established a Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee (SRIRC) to provide it with advice on this Policy and its delivery. The SRIRC reports directly into Council but also has a mandate to discuss its recommendations with those bodies that have a duty of oversight for the University's investments, in particular the Investment Committee, in so far as those recommendations concern the funds for which each body has responsibility.

Procedures

The University will ensure that Procedures in support of this Policy fulfil the following aims:

- (a) to review regularly this Policy, and practices relating to it, to ensure that social, environmental and political issues are adequately reflected;
- (b) to provide a forum for considering representations to change this Policy and/or practices relating to it on ethical grounds;
- (c) to engage in responsible stewardship with its investment managers and to provide a forum for the review and monitoring of investments in the context of this Policy;
- (d) to engage directly and indirectly with managers (and where possible directly with investments) to make representations concerning social, environmental and political concerns as appropriate.

Delivery of these Procedures is the joint responsibility of the SRIRC (points (a) and (b) above) and those bodies with a duty of oversight for the University's investments, in particular, the Investment Committee (points (c) and (d) above).

³Environment and Ethics - Fossil Fuel Divestment Campaign:

OUSU council notes that:

1. In September 2013 the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) reported that in order to stay below a one-third probability of a devastating global temperature rise of 2°C, cumulative carbon emissions cannot exceed a 'budget' of about 800 gigatons. Over shooting this by just 5% increases the chance

- of exceeding 2°C to 50%. Over 500 gigatons have already been emitted. [IPCC]
- 2. Current fossil fuel reserves amount to nearly four times the remaining carbon budget. Therefore between 60–80% of reserves must stay in the ground. [CarbonTracker.org]
- 3. Despite this, the top 200 coal, oil and gas companies spent almost \$700bn in the last 12 months finding and developing even more reserves. [CarbonTracker.org]
- 4. On average, around 5% of University endowments are invested in fossil fuels this equates to a 2k investment per student. Oxford hasn't released a detailed breakdown and has no specific policy on fossil fuel investment so it is likely to be around the UK average. [350.org]
- 5. There is a growing international campaign for fossil fuel divestment, which has spread to the UK, notably through the Fossil Free UK campaign. There are currently student-led divestment campaigns in 20 UK universities, including Cambridge where in November 2013 the student union passed a motion calling on the university to divest from fossil fuels.

OUSU council believes that:

- 1. The actions of companies that search for new fossil fuel reserves is unethical.
- 2. Investment made by the University into such companies is socially irresponsible.
- 3. Divestment is an effective means of protest against unethical corporate behaviour.
- 4. Actions taken by Oxford University can attract substantial national media coverage, as such a decision in favour of divestment would encourage other UK universities to divest.

OUSU council therefore resolves to:

- 1. Formally request that the University of Oxford, through its investment subsidiary Oxford University Endowment Management:
 - (a) ceases to directly invest in fossil fuel companies
 - (b) puts safeguards in place to ensure the University does not indirectly invest in fossil fuel companies through its 'pooled vehicles' or any other indirect investment channel.
- 2. (In response to a request from the University of Oxford) Offer the following definition for 'fossil fuel companies' as those companies that participate in exploration for and/or extraction of fossil fuel reserves.
- 3. Request that the University of Oxford releases a policy statement before the start of the new academic year setting out its view whether or not investment in fossil fuel companies can be considered 'socially responsible' as well as the stance that it takes with respect to the financial risks of investing in these companies.
- 4. Mandate the Vice-President (Charities and Community) to inform the Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee and other relevant staff members within the University of the resolutions of OUSU Council.

Proposals for Honorary Degrees to be conferred at the Encaenia in 2015, and for Degrees by Diploma

Members of Congregation are encouraged to suggest the names of people on whom such degrees might be conferred. Encaenia honorary degrees are conferred at the University's annual ceremonial event and degrees by diploma are conferred on heads of state and royalty. When considering possible honorands, the Honorary Degrees Committee will focus on individuals in the following categories:

- 1 those of high academic distinction in the fields of research and scholarship of specific interest to the University of Oxford
- **2** those distinguished in the visual, literary, musical and performing arts
- **3** those distinguished in business and industry
- **4** those who have played a distinguished role in public life, for example in contributing to progress and change in society
- **5** those who have made a significant contribution to the activities of the University of Oxford such individuals would normally also fall into one of the categories above.

Within those categories, the Honorary Degrees Committee will aim to produce a balanced list, which takes account of the global dimension that characterises this University's activities. The Honorary Degrees Committee therefore encourages the nomination of individuals of conspicuous distinction with particular reference to diversity.

Honorary degrees will not be conferred on anyone who holds, or who has retired from, a resident teaching, research or administrative post within the University or in any college or other society, except in exceptional circumstances such as distinguished service outside the terms of his or her paid service.

All nominations will be considered in strict confidence by the Honorary Degrees Committee, which submits its report to Council at the beginning of Michaelmas term. After discussion, Council will report back to the Honorary Degrees Committee, which will arrive at a list of honorands to put to Congregation.

Candidates registered for one of these doctoral training programmes, who are admitted by the University of Warwick, Bristol or Nottingham, and who hold the status of Probationer Research Student at Oxford, shall not normally pay more than three termly University fees while at Oxford;

(f) the number of termly University fees payable by candidates registered for a DPhil through one of the following doctoral training programmes shall not exceed twelve: Diamond Science and Technology; Gas Turbine Aerodynamics; Renewable Energy Marine Structures; Science and Application of Plastic Electronic Materials. Candidates for these programmes may count towards this figure up to the equivalent of three termly University fees paid to the relevant partner university;

(g) the number of termly University fees payable by candidates registered for a DPhil through the doctoral training programme in Theory and Modelling in Chemical Sciences shall not exceed twelve. Candidates registered for a DPhil through this doctoral training programme may count up to three termly University fees paid while working for the MSc in Theoretical and Computational Chemistry towards this figure;'.

Proposals for Honorary Degrees to be conferred at the Encaenia in 2015, and for Degrees by Diploma

Members of Congregation are encouraged to suggest the names of people on whom such degrees might be conferred. Encaenia honorary degrees are conferred at the University's annual ceremonial event and degrees by diploma are conferred on heads of state and royalty. When considering possible honorands, the Honorary Degrees Committee will focus on individuals in the following categories:

- 1 those of high academic distinction in the fields of research and scholarship of specific interest to the University of Oxford
- **2** those distinguished in the visual, literary, musical and performing arts
- **3** those distinguished in business and industry
- **4** those who have played a distinguished role in public life, for example in contributing to progress and change in society
- **5** those who have made a significant contribution to the activities of the University of Oxford such individuals would normally also fall into one of the categories above.

Within those categories, the Honorary Degrees Committee will aim to produce a balanced list, which takes account of the global dimension that characterises this University's activities. The Honorary Degrees Committee therefore encourages the nomination of individuals of conspicuous distinction with particular reference to diversity.

Honorary degrees will not be conferred on anyone who holds, or who has retired from, a resident teaching, research or administrative post within the University or in any college or other society, except in exceptional circumstances such as distinguished service outside the terms of his or her paid service.

Nominations should be sent on the approved application form, which is available from the Secretary to the Honorary Degrees Committee (tel: (2)80199, email: felicity.burchett@admin.ox.ac.uk) or can be downloaded by staff logging into the University of Oxford Single Sign-On system (www1.admin.ox.ac.uk/councilsec/governance/committees/hondegs). The completed form should be sent to the Secretary to the Honorary Degrees Committee, University Offices, Wellington Square, or by email to felicity.burchett@admin.ox.ac.uk by **9 May**, under 'Strictly Confidential' cover.

While informal soundings within the University will often be desirable, every effort should be made to ensure that publicity is not at any stage given to any specific proposal for the conferral of an honorary degree. All nominations will be considered in strict confidence by the Honorary Degrees Committee, which submits its report to Council at the beginning of Michaelmas term. After discussion, Council will report back to the Honorary Degrees Committee, which will arrive at a list of honorands to put to Congregation.

Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **30 May**.

Andreas Idreos Professor of Science and Religion Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations record the governing terms of the Andreas Idreos Professor of Science and Religion Fund, established in 1998, and introduce a power to enable accumulation of income for a defined period. They incorporate and replace the existing regulations for the Andreas Idreos Professor of Science and Religion.

Text of Regulations

In Sect III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning academic and other posts, delete existing §301 and substitute as follows:

'§301. Andreas Idreos Professor of Science and Religion Fund

- 1. The University receives with gratitude a benefaction from the late Dr Andreas Idreos to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Andreas Idreos Professor of Science and Religion Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund (if any), towards the salary and expenses of the holder of the Andreas Idreos Professor of Science and Religion. The Professor shall engage in advanced study and research and shall lecture and give instruction in questions raised for Theology by the Natural and Human and Social Sciences, and the

impact of Theology on the Natural and Human and Social Sciences.

- 4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Humanities Divisional Roard
- 5. The Professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this regulation is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;
 - (2) the head of the college to which the professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any regulation in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college:
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this regulation;
 - (4), (5) two persons appointed by Council:
 - (6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or his or her nominee;
 - (7)-(9) three persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.
- 6. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 7. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Professorship.
- 8. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those

powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

- 9. Regulations 1-4 and 6-11 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 10. Subject to regulation 11, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 11. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

Renaming of the Professor of Trauma Surgery

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Medical Sciences Division and the Nuffield Department of Orthopaedics, Rheumatology and Musculoskeletal Sciences, rename the Professor of Trauma Surgery to better reflect the domain of the post in the development of trauma and orthopaedic teaching and research programmes in the department, especially within the broad area of musculoskeletal sciences.

Text of Regulations

1 In SCHEDULE C of Council Regulations 3 of 2004, concerning statutory professorships, delete 'Professor of Trauma Surgery' and substitute 'Professor of Orthopaedic Trauma Surgery'.

Congregation

2 In Sect III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, delete existing §319 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

`§319. Professor of <u>Orthopaedic</u> Trauma Surgery

- 1. The Professor of <u>Orthopaedic</u> Trauma Surgery shall undertake research in <u>Orthopaedic</u> Trauma Surgery and shall lecture and give instruction in that subject.
- 2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;
 - (2) the head of the college to which the Professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any regulation in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;
 - (4), (5) two persons appointed by Council:
 - (6)-(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board;
 - (10) a person appointed by the body or bodies which may issue an honorary clinical contract or contracts to the professor.
- 3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the decree regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same decree regulations which are applicable to this chair.'

Committee on Statutes before the Privy Council

CHRIST CHURCH: REVISED STATUTES

The Committee on Statutes before the Privy Council, acting under authority delegated to it by Council, is minded to give consent on behalf of the University to the revised statutes of Christ Church, approved by the Governing Body on 17 October 2012 and 12 March 2014, in so far as such consent is required by section 7 (2) of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act. 1923. The consent of the committee to the amendments to the statutes will be effective eleven days after publication of this notice unless written notice of a resolution, signed by at least twenty members of Congregation, calling upon Council to withhold that consent, has been given to the Registrar by noon on Monday, 26 May.

The effects of the amendments are to (i) enable the person appointed to the Lady Margaret Professorship of Divinity to hold either a Residentiary Canonry or a Lay Canonry (the professorship is currently annexed to a Residentiary Canonry); (ii) delete provisions concerning the age limits for the tenure of the Dean, Students, Officers of the House and Lecturers which were rendered non-compliant by changes in employment legislation (Christ Church has introduced an Employer Justified Retirement Age for the Dean, Students and Lecturers which are set out in Christ Church's by-laws and its associated procedures); (iii) clarify that Christ Church's by-laws bind Lecturers. Research Fellows and Senior Scholars; (iv) transfer the provisions for the Glass-Williams Bursary Fund from the by-laws to the statutes in order to simplify the legislation and reduce duplication; and (v) remove a redundant clause relating to the membership of Congregation which is provided for under University legislation.

On 27 February 2014 the Personnel Committee launched a consultation of individuals and bodies within the collegiate University on the desirability of possible revisions to Statute XII, which governs the employment of academic and academic related staff. (a) Regulations for Divisional Boards

Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **6 June**.

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Social Sciences Divisional Board, amend the membership of the Social Sciences Board to include the Associate Head of the Social Sciences Division (Education) and the Associate Head of the Social Sciences Division (Research) with effect from 1 October 2014.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Council Regulations 17 of 2002 (Regulations for Divisional Boards) amend existing regulation 15 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):
- '15. The Social Sciences Board shall consist of:
 - (1) the Head of the Social Sciences Division, who shall be chairman;
 - (2)-(15) the head of department/chair of faculty board for each of the 14 constituent units of the division *ex officio*;
 - (16)-(18) three persons elected on a rotational basis by and from academic members of the following units of the division, with each person serving a two-year period:
 - (a) the Department of Economics;
 - (b) the Department of Education;
 - (c) the Faculty of Law;
 - (d) the Department of Politics and International Relations;
 - (e) the School of Geography and the Environment:
 - (f) the Saïd Business School;
 - (19)-(20) two persons elected on a rotational basis by and from academic members of the following units of the

division, with each person serving a twoyear period of office:

- (a) the Department for International Development;
- (b) the School for Interdisciplinary Area Studies;
- (c) the Department of Sociology;
- (d) the Oxford Internet Institute;
- (e) the Department of Social Policy and Intervention;
- (f) the School of Anthropology;
- (g) the Institute of Archaeology and Research Laboratory for Archaeology and the History of Art;
- (*h*) the Blavatnik School of Government;
- (21), (22) the Associate Head of the Social Sciences Division (Education) and the Associate Head of the Social Sciences Division (Research) *ex officio*;
- (2123), (2224) two persons appointed, for a three-year term, under the procedures of the Conference of Colleges. They shall have appropriate experience and understanding of academic policy and finance and be familiar with the subject areas concerned, but should not hold a salaried teaching or research post within the division;
- (2325) any member of University Council elected by and from among members of the faculties and sub-faculties in the Social Sciences Division.'
- **2** This regulation shall be effective from 1 October 2014.

(b) Student Appeal Panel: corrigendum

Explanatory Note

When changes were made to Statute XI (University Discipline) in 2009 (*Gazette* Vol 139, p1165, 28 May 2009), a cross-reference in the regulations for the Student Appeal Panel was overlooked.

Text of Regulations

In regulation 1.1 of Council Regulations 4 of 2006 concerning the Student Appeal Panel, delete 'as specified in section 17 (1) of Statute

XI' and substitute 'as specified in section 16 (1) of Statute XI'.

(c) Regulations for the Employment of University Staff: corrigendum

Explanatory Note

When changes were made to Statute XIV concerning the employment of academic and support staff by the University (*Gazette* Vol 144, p160, 28 November 2013), the cross-references in the associated regulations were not updated.

Text of Regulations

General Purposes Committee of Council

Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **6 June**.

Establishment of Medical School Prize and Scholarship Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish the 'Medical School Prize and Scholarship Fund' for the advancement of education and learning at, or in connection with, the Medical Sciences Division, through the award of prizes and scholarships.

It is intended that by resolution of Council, on behalf of the University as trustee, under the Charities Act 2011, the Martin Wronker Prizes Fund for Medicine, Medical Scholarships Fund, George Herbert Hunt Travelling Scholarship Fund, John Pearce Prizes in Surgery Fund, Meakins McClaran Medal Fund, Sidney Truelove Prize in Gastroenterology Fund, Sir Roger Bannister Neurology Prize Fund, Geoffrey

Spray Prize in Clinical Biochemistry Fund, Tizard Prize in Paediatrics Fund, Duthie Prize in Orthopaedic Surgery Fund, Mallam Memorial Prize in Clinical Medicine Fund, Eoin Hodgson Memorial Fund, John Potter Essay Prize Fund, Brian Ingram Johnson Prize in Pathology Fund, John Stallworthy Prizes in Obstetrics Fund, Witts Prize in Haematology or Gastroenterology Fund, Lovel Prize Fund, Renwick Vickers Dermatology Prize Fund, John Friend Prize in Medical History Fund, and Pre-Clinical Adviser's Medical Scholarships Fund, shall be transferred and administered as part of this new trust fund.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, insert new §233¹ as follows, and renumber existing §§233–393 as §§234–394:

'§233. Medical School Prize and Scholarship Fund

- 1. Ten pounds and such further money or property as may be paid or transferred to be held by the University on the same trusts shall be held together as part of the Medical School Prize and Scholarship Fund ("the Fund"), which shall be held on the trusts declared in this regulation.
- 2. The Fund includes transfers from the Martin Wronker Prizes Fund for Medicine. Medical Scholarships Fund, George Herbert Hunt Travelling Scholarship Fund, John Pearce Prizes in Surgery Fund, Meakins McClaran Medal Fund, Sidney Truelove Prize in Gastroenterology Fund, Sir Roger Bannister Neurology Prize Fund, Geoffrey Spray Prize in Clinical Biochemistry Fund, Tizard Prize in Paediatrics Fund, Duthie Prize in Orthopaedic Surgery Fund, Mallam Memorial Prize in Clinical Medicine Fund, Eoin Hodgson Memorial Fund, John Potter Essay Prize Fund, Brian Ingram Johnson Prize in Pathology Fund, John Stallworthy Prizes in Obstetrics Fund, Witts Prize in Haematology or Gastroenterology Fund, Lovel Prize Fund, Renwick Vickers Dermatology Prize Fund, John Friend Prize in Medical History Fund, and Pre-Clinical Adviser's Medical Scholarships Fund².
- 3. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 4. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the

- advancement of education and learning at, or in connection with, the Medical Sciences Division through the award of prizes and scholarships.
- 5. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Medical Sciences Divisional Board, which may make and amend Standing Orders consistent with these regulations governing the administration of the Fund and the application of its income.
- 6. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 7. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund.
- 8. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 10. Any amendment to regulation 4 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

STATEMENT ON THE FOSSIL FUEL DIVESTMENT CAMPAIGN

The Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee (SRIRC) is considering a representation from Oxford University Student Union (OUSU) for divestment from all fossil fuel investments held by Oxford University Endowment Management (OUem) on behalf of Oxford University. For the text of the SRIRC's full notice and OUSU's resolution, see www. admin.ox.ac.uk/councilsec/governance/committees/srirc/srircstatementonthe fossilfueldivestmentcampaign or *Gazette* No 5057, 24 April 2014.

The SRIRC is responsible for forming an opinion on the question of socially responsible investment that the divestment resolution raises and for advising Council accordingly. At its meeting on 6 March 2014, the SRIRC began detailed discussions on this subject and invites interested parties to submit evidence or views:

- that might inform the committee's consideration of the question of possible divestment from companies 'that participate in exploration for and/or extraction of fossil fuel reserves'; and/or
- on whether there are alternative ways in which the University should engage in the debate about climate change.

The SRIRC will review submissions at its next meeting on 2 July 2014, and will publish a summary of the views received on its website, ensuring that such views are given proper consideration in the eventual recommendation that is made to Council.

(1) Voting approving the deprivation of a graduate of a degree

Explanatory Note

The Special Disciplinary Panel has found that a member of the University, Dr George Osei (Mansfield College), breached the Proctors' Disciplinary Regulations Concerning Conduct at Examinations by committing plagiarism in a thesis submitted for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Michaelmas term 2001. The Panel has decided to recommend that the degree of DPhil be removed from Dr Osei.

Under Part 3 of Council Regulations 22 of 2002 only Congregation may deprive a graduate of the University of his or her degree or degrees, and Council accordingly submits to Congregation the following resolution to effect the de-gradation in this case. Under those regulations the procedure to be followed in each case shall be determined by Council, and the procedure so determined is set out at item 3 in the resolution.

Text of Resolution

That this House:

1 (a) take note of the finding of the Special Disciplinary Panel that a member of the

University, Dr George Osei (Mansfield College), breached the Proctors' Disciplinary Regulations Concerning Conduct at Examinations by committing plagiarism in a thesis submitted for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Michaelmas term 2001; and

(b) accept the Special Disciplinary Panel's conclusion that one of the appropriate penalties in this case is deprivation of the degree; and

2 therefore agree to deprive Dr Osei of the degree of Doctor of Philosophy; and

3 take note of Council's determination that the procedure to be followed in this case should be for a notice to be published in the University *Gazette*, which should consist of this resolution.

(2) Voting on Resolutions authorising the use of space at the Old Road Campus

Explanatory Note

The original Old Road Campus was acquired by the University from the NHS in 1996. The site has developed as a location for University medical research and, in 2013, was extended through the acquisition of the Park Hospital site. The location of the site adjacent or close to Oxford's main hospitals has seen the strengthening of links between cutting-edge research and clinical treatment.

Two new buildings are now proposed for construction on the Old Road Campus: the Big Data Institute and an amenities building.

The Big Data Institute (BDI) forms Phase II of the Li Ka Shing Centre for Technology and Health Informatics, Phase I being the Target Discovery Institute. The BDI sets out to be an international centre of excellence for the analysis of very large and complex biomedical data sets. The Institute will combine world-class academic leadership with a core infrastructure of cutting-edge technology and high-calibre scientists. Built upon Oxford's internationally leading expertise in epidemiology, genomics, imaging, computer science, and infectious disease surveillance, the BDI will be a national resource for the development of new analytical methods to facilitate the

generation, storage, analysis and sharing of data in very large clinical studies.

The amenities building is an essential enabling project for the site. The building will incorporate central catering space to replace those currently provided in the Rosemary Rue Building, teaching space and other facilities (such as a shop, a gym, central goods inwards and storage). The site will also house the City Deal Bioescalator facility, designed to provide high-quality affordable bioincubator space to the region, and 459 car parking spaces.

Text of Resolution

(i) That Plot B5 of the Old Road Campus be allocated to the Medical Sciences Division as the site of a building currently estimated at 7,760 sqm gross internal areal for the Big Data Institute. This allocation is to be effective from 25 June 2014 for 30 years.

(ii) That 15,400 sqm gross internal area on Plot B4 of the Old Road Campus be allocated to University Administration and Services for the construction of an amenities building. This allocation is to be effective from 25 June 2014.

(3) Voting on a Resolution authorising the temporary use of space in Beaver House (Hythe Bridge Street)

Explanatory Note

The School of Geography and the Environment requires temporary accommodation while refurbishment works are carried out in the Dyson Perrins building. Space on the second floor of Beaver House has been identified as suitable for this purpose.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 810 sqm net usable area on the second floor of Beaver House be allocated to the School of Geography and the Environment as temporary decant space from 17 June 2014 until 3 October 2014.

(4) Voting on Resolutions authorising expenditure from the Higher Studies Fund

Text of Resolutions

(i) That the University be authorised to expend, from the element of the Higher Studies Fund earmarked for Social Studies, funding in the amount of £200,000 over the three-year period 2014/15 to 2016/17, to support new professors coming into the Social Sciences Division.

(ii) That the University be authorised to expend, from the element of the Higher Studies Fund earmarked for Social Studies, funding in the amount of £100,000 over the three-year period 2014/15 to 2016/17, to support new professors coming into the Humanities Division.

STATEMENT ON THE FOSSIL FUEL DIVESTMENT CAMPAIGN

The Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee (SRIRC) is considering a representation from Oxford University Student Union (OUSU) for divestment from all fossil fuel investments held by Oxford University Endowment Management (OUem) on behalf of Oxford University. For the text of the SRIRC's full notice and OUSU's resolution, see www.admin.ox.ac.uk/ councilsec/governance/committees/srirc/ srircstatementonthefossilfueldivestment campaign or *Gazette* No 5057, 24 April 2014.

The SRIRC is responsible for forming an opinion on the question of socially responsible investment that the divestment resolution raises and for advising Council accordingly. At its meeting on 6 March 2014, the SRIRC began detailed discussions on this subject and invites interested parties to submit evidence or views:

- that might inform the committee's consideration of the question of possible divestment from companies 'that participate in exploration for and/or extraction of fossil fuel reserves'; and/or
- on whether there are alternative ways in which the University should engage in the debate about climate change.

The SRIRC will review submissions at its next meeting on 2 July 2014, and will publish a summary of the views received on its website, ensuring that such views are given proper consideration in the eventual recommendation that is made to Council.

I was formerly a Visitor of the Ashmolean in 2012-13 when I served as Assessor. It was a great privilege to become familiar with the workings of this great museum and to be able to contribute to the discussions taking place in a time of change. This was the year in which the museum established

its subsidiary at Broadway, as part of a wideranging programme of outreach activities, including open evenings and other events to encourage students and local residents to become familiar with what the Ashmolean has to offer; it was also the year of massive fund-raising to purchase Monet's 'Mlle. Klaus', along with other significant acquisitions. There was also an exciting programme of exhibitions. The museum was also beginning to explore ways in which it could enhance its holdings of C20th and C21st visual art, and display more of this material.

If elected as a Visitor, I would do my part to encourage these and other initiatives. I am especially concerned that the Ashmolean, in common with the other museums in Oxford, lacks the high-quality storage facility which is urgently needed to preserve its important collections, and provide extra space for teaching and conservation. I would hope to be able to encourage further initiatives in using the museum's materials for teaching within the university across different subjects. As a medievalist, I am keenly aware of the benefits of dialogue between literature and the arts; I am also a practising painter who has exhibited in Oxford and elsewhere.

(1) Voting approving the deprivation of a graduate of a degree

Explanatory Note

The Special Disciplinary Panel has found that a member of the University, Dr George Osei (Mansfield College), breached the Proctors' Disciplinary Regulations Concerning Conduct at Examinations by committing plagiarism in a thesis submitted for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Michaelmas term 2001. The Panel has decided to recommend that the degree of DPhil be removed from Dr Osei.

Under Part 3 of Council Regulations 22 of 2002 only Congregation may deprive a graduate of the University of his or her degree or degrees, and Council accordingly submits to Congregation the following resolution to effect the de-gradation in this case. Under those regulations the procedure to be followed in each case shall be determined by Council, and the procedure so determined is set out at item 3 in the resolution.

Text of Resolution

That this House:

1 (a) take note of the finding of the Special Disciplinary Panel that a member of the University, Dr George Osei (Mansfield College), breached the Proctors' Disciplinary Regulations Concerning Conduct at Examinations by committing plagiarism in a thesis submitted for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Michaelmas term 2001; and

(b) accept the Special Disciplinary Panel's conclusion that one of the appropriate penalties in this case is deprivation of the degree; and

2 therefore agree to deprive Dr Osei of the degree of Doctor of Philosophy; and

3 take note of Council's determination that the procedure to be followed in this case should be for a notice to be published in the University *Gazette*, which should consist of this resolution.

(2) Voting on Resolutions authorising the use of space at the Old Road Campus

Explanatory Note

The original Old Road Campus was acquired by the University from the NHS in 1996. The site has developed as a location for University medical research and, in 2013, was extended through the acquisition of the Park Hospital site. The location of the site adjacent or close to Oxford's main hospitals has seen the strengthening of links

between cutting-edge research and clinical treatment.

Two new buildings are now proposed for construction on the Old Road Campus: the Big Data Institute and an amenities building.

The Big Data Institute (BDI) forms Phase II of the Li Ka Shing Centre for Technology and Health Informatics, Phase I being the Target Discovery Institute. The BDI sets out to be an international centre of excellence for the analysis of very large and complex biomedical data sets. The Institute will combine world-class academic leadership with a core infrastructure of cutting-edge technology and high-calibre scientists. Built upon Oxford's internationally leading expertise in epidemiology, genomics, imaging, computer science, and infectious disease surveillance, the BDI will be a national resource for the development of new analytical methods to facilitate the generation, storage, analysis and sharing of data in very large clinical studies.

The amenities building is an essential enabling project for the site. The building will incorporate central catering space to replace those currently provided in the Rosemary Rue Building, teaching space and other facilities (such as a shop, a gym, central goods inwards and storage). The site will also house the City Deal Bioescalator facility, designed to provide high-quality affordable bioincubator space to the region, and 459 car parking spaces.

Text of Resolution

- (i) That Plot B5 of the Old Road Campus be allocated to the Medical Sciences Division as the site of a building currently estimated at 7,760 sqm gross internal area for the Big Data Institute. This allocation is to be effective from 25 June 2014 for 30 years.
- (ii) That 15,400 sqm gross internal area on Plot B4 of the Old Road Campus be allocated to University Administration and Services for the construction of an amenities building. This allocation is to be effective from 25 June 2014.

(3) Voting on a Resolution authorising the temporary use of space in Beaver House (Hythe Bridge Street)

Explanatory Note

The School of Geography and the Environment requires temporary accommodation while refurbishment works are carried out in the Dyson Perrins building. Space on the second floor of Beaver House has been identified as suitable for this purpose.

Text of Resolution

That approximately 810 sqm net usable area on the second floor of Beaver House be allocated to the School of Geography and the Environment as temporary decant space from 17 June 2014 until 3 October 2014.

(4) Voting on Resolutions authorising expenditure from the Higher Studies Fund

Text of Resolutions

- (i) That the University be authorised to expend, from the element of the Higher Studies Fund earmarked for Social Studies, funding in the amount of £200,000 over the three-year period 2014/15 to 2016/17, to support new professors coming into the Social Sciences Division.
- (ii) That the University be authorised to expend, from the element of the Higher Studies Fund earmarked for Social Studies, funding in the amount of £100,000 over the three-year period 2014/15 to 2016/17, to support new professors coming into the Humanities Division.
- (iii) That the University be authorised to expend, from the unearmarked element of the Higher Studies Fund, funding in the amount of £100,000 over the three-year period 2014/15 to 2016/17, to support new professors coming into the Humanities Division.
- (iv) That the University be authorised to expend, from the unearmarked element of the Higher Studies Fund, £100,000 over the three-year period 2014/15 to 2016/17, to support new professors coming into the Medical Sciences Division.
- (v) That the University be authorised to expend, from the unearmarked element of the Higher Studies Fund, £100,000 over the three-year period 2014/15 to 2016/17, to support new professors coming into the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division

'Exceptionally, GIA, rather than NUA, is used for these site allocations as each project is at too early a stage for net usable area to be defined.

STATEMENT ON THE FOSSIL FUEL DIVESTMENT CAMPAIGN

The Socially Responsible Investment Review Committee (SRIRC) is considering a representation from Oxford University Student Union (OUSU) for divestment from all fossil fuel investments held by Oxford University Endowment Management (OUem) on behalf of Oxford University. For the text of the SRIRC's full notice and OUSU's resolution, see www.admin.ox.ac.uk/ councilsec/governance/ committees/srirc/ srircstatementonthefossilfueldivestment campaign or *Gazette* No 5057, 24 April 2014.

The SRIRC is responsible for forming an opinion on the question of socially responsible investment that the divestment resolution raises and for advising Council accordingly. At its meeting on 6 March 2014, the SRIRC began detailed discussions on this subject and invites interested parties to submit evidence or views:

- that might inform the committee's consideration of the question of possible divestment from companies 'that participate in exploration for and/or extraction of fossil fuel reserves'; and/or
- on whether there are alternative ways in which the University should engage in the debate about climate change.

The SRIRC will review submissions at its next meeting on 2 July 2014, and will publish a summary of the views received on its website, ensuring that such views are given proper consideration in the eventual recommendation that is made to Council.

MOVES OF SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

The Bodleian Libraries are completing their renovation of the New Bodleian building, which will reopen to readers and researchers as the Weston Library - the new home for the Bodleian's special collections. The facility will open in phases from late September 2014.

- Special collections materials will begin moving into the restored building from early September.
- The reading room in Rhodes House (Commonwealth and African collections) will close on Friday 12 September.
 The services for Commonwealth and African collections will reopen in the Charles Wendell David Reading Room together with services for Oriental manuscripts and rare books on Monday 22 September.
- The special collections services currently delivered from the temporary Special Collections Reading Room at the Radcliffe Science Library and the maps and music service (currently in Duke Humfrey's Library) will close on Friday 19 September.
- The services for western manuscripts and rare books and for maps will open in the Rare Books and Manuscripts Reading Room and for music in the Sir Charles Mackerras Reading Room on Monday 29 September.
- Duke Humfrey's Library will close on Friday 19 September and reopen on Monday 13 October, maintaining its current opening hours. It will continue to function as an invigilated reading room supporting higher-level studies in the Humanities. Historic open-shelf material will remain in situ and be transferred for consultation in the Weston Library as required, along with other special collections materials.

When the reading rooms transfer, many collections will take longer to reach reading rooms than normal. Readers intending to visit the Bodleian to consult special collections should plan carefully to ensure relevant material is made available for their visit.

 During the moves, some items may be temporarily unavailable. We do not anticipate that any holdings from our collection will be out of circulation for more than two weeks at a time.

Candidate statement:

For the last 13 years I have led a research group in the University, currently consisting of 20 people, combining basic immunology and the development of new vaccines against tuberculosis. This has translated basic science to address a major global public health problem. For this research I initiated and maintained international collaborations in Europe, the US, and Africa. From 2008 I led a consortium of funders,

universities and industry, which tested one of our new vaccines in a trial of 3000 South African infants, with a budget of US\$30m.

I would hope that the skills I have developed in leading such collaborations: an ability to engage with ethical, financial and regulatory issues and frameworks, the judgement to identify where trade-offs are needed, and the ability to focus the skills of many disciplines and partner organisations on a common goal, would also be helpful for the work of Council.

Balancing the strengths of a University where pooling skills and resources may achieve the greatest research impact, with maintaining the strengths of independent Colleges and disciplines, is essential. Maintaining excellence in teaching whilst being one of the world's leading research universities is a balance Council has to help optimise. A Fellow of Harris Manchester College, I lecture and supervise undergraduates, MSc students and DPhil students and am a consultant HIV physician.

I am committed to the principles of transparency of process, fairness and consistency. I would be delighted to have the privilege of serving the wider collegiate University by sitting on Council.

Candidate statement:

I am a Professor of Computer Science, and a Fellow of Hertford College. My research area is artificial intelligence, and my main research interests could be described as building computers that can collectively solve problems, in much the same way that human teams do. I joined Oxford with an ERC Advanced Grant that funds my research for five years. Before Oxford, I was a Professor at the University of Liverpool for 12 years, where I was Head of Department and then Head of School. I served on University Council at Liverpool for six years. I will be Head of the Department of Computer Science with effect from October 2014, and I serve on MPLS Divisional Board. I was lead author of Liverpool's Computer Science RAE submissions in 2001 and 2008; at Oxford, I wrote the REF-2014 environment statement for my Department.

Serving on Council is an enormous responsibility for an institution of Oxford's international standing, and a huge challenge given the size, diversity, and byzantine complexity of the collegiate university. If elected, I would aim to challenge thinking that does not respect or advance our core academic values. The SRIRC is responsible for forming an opinion on the question of socially responsible investment that the divestment resolution raises and for advising Council accordingly. The Centre creates an environment where interdisciplinary collaborations can flourish, and which stimulates the synergy of discipline research questions and technology innovations, allowing us to consider questions that are beyond the reach of any one discipline. This leads directly to engagement with - and therefore attracts funding from - all the research

councils (AHRC, BBSRC, EPSRC, ESRC, MRC) and JISC, as well as industry and the EU.

While Director of OeRCI became a member of the University Research Committee and I am now also a Curator of University Libraries.

In 2012 I was appointed Chief Information Officer (CIO) for the University. This has proved a challenging but rewarding role where I have worked with colleagues to facilitate significant organisational change and a new approach to IT. I have led the development of the University IT Strategic Plan, and since IT now touches almost everything we do, this has meant engagement with colleges, departments, and administration.

If elected, I would bring to Council a leadership style that is consultative and collaborative, with a focus on clear decision-making. I believe my experience in a diversity of roles will prove valuable in determining approaches to the challenges we face

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Curators of the University Libraries Bodleian Libraries: Annual Report 2012/13

The Curators of the University Libraries have considered and approved the annual report of the Bodleian Libraries for the year 2012/13.

The Bodleian Libraries form an essential part of the University, with an important role in delivering the University strategy in research, teaching and wider engagement. Not only do the Libraries provide access to the research literature and teaching materials, they also support activities such as the REF, Open Access and research outputs through the Oxford University Research Archive (ORA). ORA will now include archiving of and access to research data.

Students continue to make extensive use of the Libraries. The Bodleian has received the top satisfaction rating for a university library in the National Student Survey this year, as in the past three years. And external use of the library by scholars worldwide remains at a very high level.

This is facilitated by the digital strategy now being implemented by the Libraries, including not only the digitisation of collections to enable wider access to them, but also the change to electronic legal deposit, and the enhancement of digital capabilities in support of research and teaching.

The Libraries continue to be very successful in attracting external support through gifts and donations, building on the support provided by the University for library operations.

A major theme for the Curators during the past year has been communication. Following the question asked of Council in Trinity term 2012, Curators reported twice to Council and also, following extensive consultation with the academic divisions, published a paper on Communication and Library Committees: these are all available at https://www1.admin.ox.ac.uk/lib/papers.

As a consequence of this consultation, revisions were made to the terms of the Divisional Committees on Library Provision and Strategy. These form a critical means by which Curators can assess the needs of the academic community in regard to library provision and the effectiveness and efficiency with which it is being delivered.

Further, a reader survey was carried out in Michaelmas term 2013, which attracted over 3,500 responses, from which a set of actions has been distilled for implementation in the current year. The outcomes of these will be reported in future Annual Reports.

In the coming months we look forward to beginning a new phase for the Bodleian Libraries, as the Weston Library opens to the University community and the wider public, continuing to provide a world-leading infrastructure for research, teaching and engagement.

Introduction

The 2012/13 academic year was a significant one for the Bodleian Libraries. At the end of the year we said farewell to Dr Sarah E Thomas, who had served as Bodley's Librarian since February 2007. Her many achievements in the post included leading a successful application for the Queen's Anniversary Prize, four successive years with the top satisfaction rating for a university library in the National Student Surveys (including the year covered by this report), the construction of the Swindon Book Storage Facility and the progression of the Weston Library from scheme design to near completion of the construction phase. Dr Thomas left to become the inaugural vice president for the Harvard Library, returning to the institution that launched her career in librarianship.

Use of the Libraries' services showed a healthy year-on-year rise. Physical loans and visits to library premises both showed increases, while journal article downloads, electronic book chapters, SOLO searches and database use all showed significant and sustained increases. User education and information skills training sessions were also popular, especially those related to the RCUK's new Open Access policies. The summer 2012 exhibition and 2013's *Magical Books* both attracted successive record visitor numbers.

During 2012/13 the Libraries progressed a number of major initiatives and maintained an extremely busy and complex set of library services, while simultaneously grappling with the final year of a threeyear budget reduction of 8.7% in the income received from the University. This reduction was compounded during the year by a further reduction of the special grant received from HEFCE in respect of the Bodleian's status as a National Research Library. Staff worked intensively to develop creative ways of maintaining services and protecting the acquisitions budget in the face of these reductions, while complying with the need to maintain fiscal probity.

The Libraries' ability to cope with the severe budget situation was in part thanks to the strong support shown by our community of donors and by grant-giving bodies. Endowment funding was received from Dr Ebadollah Bahari for the Bahari Curator of Persian Studies and from the Tolkien Trust to guarantee the post of Tolkien Curator of Medieval Manuscripts. The Polonsky Foundation continued to fund the joint Bodleian-Vatican digitisation project as well as a number of smaller-scale digital projects. Other important work to enhance access and deliver services through digital means was supported by Jisc, the Andrew W Mellon Foundation, the European Research Council, the Wellcome Trust and the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The Libraries continued to develop their digital collections and services during the year: a major enhancement to the online catalogue, SOLO, brought added search functionality and the vital support that is provided by the Libraries for activities such as the REF, Open Access and research outputs through the Oxford University Research Archive (ORA) was improved by enhancements to that service. Groundwork continued to be laid for the Libraries to support the preservation, management and provision of access to research data. The many University research projects that are underway in partnership with the Libraries through digital developments are a testament to the importance of this aspect of our work.

Major research collections continued to be added to our holdings by gift and purchase, and April 2013 saw landmark legislation passed to extend Legal Deposit to electronic publications. Working with the other Legal Deposit Libraries, we were able to provide access to this important class of research material, preserved through the collective action of the libraries. In addition, major special collections were also acquired during the year: the most significant being the archive of Oxfam. Further political papers were also acquired: those of Jack Straw and Lord Heseltine being of particular note.

The redevelopment of the New Bodleian Library, to be reopened as the Weston Library in the academic year 2014/15, continued apace throughout the year with no major obstacles to progress being encountered. The process of organisation planning for the redevelopment also continued in parallel with work to complete the funding for the building. Significant support from the Helen Hamlyn Trust towards a new exhibition gallery was the highlight of recent Weston funding.

1 Building for the future

Weston Library

During 2012/13 the refurbishment of the New Bodleian Library entered its final phase. Renamed the Weston Library, it will be reopened for readers in October 2014 as a state-of-the-art library for special collections. There will be new and improved facilities for researchers, highly secure and carefully controlled conditions for over a million rare book and manuscript volumes and, from March 2015, greatly improved access for the public.

The interior of the building was transformed over the course of the year. Following the end of the initial demolition phase,

the central section of the building was rebuilt to a new configuration. The two new service cores carrying stairs, lifts and building services were completed, rising up through all thirteen levels of the building. Above ground floor, a huge new floating stack was constructed to span, bridge-like, between these towers. In three storeys below ground, three vast new book storage compartments were created to replace the old central stacks. In addition, work was undertaken to divide the old open basement stacks into four further fire compartments enclosed in concrete. This will provide a minimum of four hours of protection against fire in compliance with accepted standards. Reconstruction also extended to the roof: the original south face of the stack tower, carefully deconstructed in 2011, was painstakingly rebuilt, stone by stone.

Internally, new office layouts were created and partition walls and new doorways installed. Original fittings and finishes, such as door architraves and skirting, were carefully reinstated. Rapid progress was made with installing building services including cable trays and piping.

Away from the building site, 2012/13 has seen Libraries staff intensively planning for the re-occupation of the building in 2014. A coordinating project group, the Weston Team, met monthly and sub-teams progressed the practical planning required to draw up the new policies, operating practices and staffing structures required for the new library. A catering contract was put out to tender, and planning for way-finding and signage moved forward.

Bodleian Libraries staff members are looking forward to moving back into the building and opening up new and enhanced services to readers and the wider public, showcasing what this major project will have achieved.

History Faculty Library relocation and Radcliffe Camera

During the early part of 2012/13 the History Faculty Library (HFL) moved into the Radcliffe Camera and Gladstone Link. Some slight alterations to the Radcliffe Camera were undertaken, including the creation of a glazed office for HFL staff and a consultation space for readers. A great deal of library material was moved, with less-used material weeded if duplicate or moved to the Book Storage Facility to be available by request if unique. Early feedback suggested that readers studying history found the consolidation of all their open-shelf resources and the book delivery service to be very useful.

Planning for a third and final phase of alterations to the Radcliffe Camera involving the moving of the entrance, a number of security improvements and creation of an approach that will be accessible to disabled readers was undertaken in preparation for later work.

Bodleian Library reading rooms

At the end of the year, work began on replacing light fittings in the Bodleian Library's Lower Reading Room. The new fittings will resolve an issue with noise caused by the old fittings, improve the quality of the light and reduce energy consumption. Alongside this, the carpeting of the Upper Reading Room got under way and readers quickly began to enjoy a much quieter space in which to work.

China Centre Library

Planning began in earnest for the Library in the new University of Oxford China Centre to be built in the Dickson Poon Building at St Hugh's College. Work on the Library started in early 2013 and should be complete by the end of March 2014. The Library provides an exciting opportunity to review services and open-shelf collections in support of the study of China and to coordinate library services closely with this major crossdivisional development.

Philosophy and Theology Faculties Library

The new Philosophy and Theology Faculties Library completed its first year of operation. Merging the Philosophy Faculty Library and Theology Faculty Library has meant that users now enjoy book deliveries from the Book Storage Facility, improved study space and extended opening hours.

Window on Korea

With support from the National Library of Korea (NLK), the Window on Korea 2013 project created a new Korean Studies Library in the Oriental Institute Library together with a fully equipped seminar room. The NLK generously presented 3,000 books to the Library, adding to the existing collection of 33,000 Korean-language titles, 700 Japanese-language titles and 12,000 other titles in Korean Studies - the largest collection in the UK and one of the most important in Europe.

'The Window on Korea project brings together books on Korea from disparate parts of the Bodleian system and augments these with substantial numbers of recent publications given by the National Library of Korea. Having historical, literary and reference works together with contemporary commentary and all within arm's reach in one location will change the way we teach and research. Instead of describing something to a student, we can pull a volume from the shelf and show them.' (Dr James Lewis, Oxford Lecturer in Korean Studies)

Storage and logistics

In preparation for the opening of the Weston Library a series of storage and logistics projects commenced. In the last months of 2012 detailed planning work was undertaken for the barcoding and transfer of the printed book collections from the Bodleian Library of Commonwealth and African Studies at Rhodes House. The first six months of 2013 saw the barcoding plan implemented on time and considerably under budget.

The moving of the Rhodes House collection to the Book Storage Facility began in January 2013 and will continue to July 2014. With much of the book stack located in the basement, there have been many logistical challenges in removing material from the building. An ingenious solution was found with the installation of a cellar lift - typically used to carry beer barrels in public houses - in a former coal chute, allowing books to be carefully lifted out of the basement and into a waiting van. Rhodes House also houses some very large, bound newspapers weighing over 25 kg each. Special book trolleys were designed to ship these volumes to the Book Storage Facility. All of the design work and moving was undertaken by the Libraries' skilled, inhouse book moving team.

2 Service provision

Gathering and responding to reader feedback

The Bodleian Libraries ran a reader survey during Michaelmas term in 2012 that was open to all members of the Libraries. The survey tool used was LibQUAL+ (Lite) - a standardised web-based survey used extensively in academic libraries internationally and across the UK. In total 3,611 valid responses were received along with 1,653 comments. Responses showed a higher-than-average satisfaction with Bodleian Libraries services and cited a number of areas of strength. Some concerns were also raised, including the library catalogue SOLO and opening hours. Work is underway across the Libraries to address these issues. Developing shared services across the Bodleian Libraries

During 2012/13 a new Research and Learning Support (R&LS) unit was created to bring together a range of shared services such as lending support and information skills training, led by the Head of Social Sciences Libraries and Research and Learning Support. The creation of this unit was a step towards joining up the development of common services across the Bodleian Libraries with the provision of subject-based library services for academic divisions. A new document delivery section was established within R&LS to coordinate printing, copying and scanning (PCAS), inter-library loans and 'just-intime' activities. Document delivery service improvements over the period included the extension of Scan and Deliver to include all Bodleian Libraries Card holders. Improvements to lending services allowed students to make overdue book payments at any Bodleian library that charges fines and, in some cases, pay online. Self-issue machines were installed in the Social Science Library and after-hours book drops added to the Radcliffe Science and Latin American Centre libraries.

Also part of R&LS, the Libraries' Admissions Office issued over 13,000 library cards during 2012/13 and provided a wide range of support and advice to new and renewing readers.

Open Access

Bodleian librarians were quick to respond to new Open Access requirements for researchers funded by Research Councils UK (RCUK). Open Access refers to the provision of unrestricted and free access to scholarly research online. An Open Access helpline was created to provide support to researchers via email or live chat. In addition, workshops were run across the University to keep researchers and research support abreast of the changing situation and new requirements. These popular initiatives were awarded a University of Oxford Teaching and Learning Award.

Teaching and training in the effective use of library resources

Students and researchers were well supported in their use of library and information resources by a rich programme of information skills courses and one-to-one research support appointments. Subject librarians provided discipline-specific sessions embedded in academic timetables and hands-on workshops for the Doctoral Training Centres. Interdisciplinary needs were also supported through the Bodleian Libraries' WISER programme. Newly designed and updated sessions from the Science and Medical librarians included Mendeley, e-books, bibliometrics and altmetrics. The Social Sciences Libraries' Graduate Search Clinics programme offered workshops on literature searches, current awareness, reference management and statistical data. In addition, librarians ran

classes on materials in specialist formats, including maps and GIS, images, archives and special collections. During the year library training courses attracted 6,352 participants.

The Research Skills Toolkit

The Libraries worked collaboratively with the University's IT Services on a project to introduce postgraduate students to important information tools for their research. The Research Skills Toolkit project was shortlisted as an example of best practice in information skills training by the UK Research Information and Digital Literacies Coalition. 763 postgraduate students took advantage of the Skills Toolkit in 2012/13.

Online library induction with Library Assistant

The Bodleian Libraries run extensive induction programmes designed to familiarise thousands of new students and researchers with key services, facilities, collections and online resources. To supplement face-to-face induction, the Libraries worked with colleagues in college libraries to develop an online induction called Library Assistant. This new service, aimed at undergraduate students, was designed primarily for delivery through mobile devices (www.bodleian.ox.ac.uk/ assistant). Feedback from students during focus-group sessions and usability testing was extremely positive. The project was supported by the Jisc Transformations Programme.

The Accessible Resources Acquisitions and Creation Unit

The Accessible Resources Acquisitions and Creation Unit (ARACU) provides essential support to a diverse range of students. In 2012/13, strong relationships with publishers enabled a 73% success rate in requests for materials in electronic format. In addition 112,500 pages were scanned, 331 audio pages recorded and a further 1,342 items identified as existing Bodleian Libraries e-materials. ARACU also continued its support for students by demonstrating how to use equipment and software applications to make the most of the Bodleian Libraries' e-resources, as well as providing advice and training to librarians and other members of staff. Service improvements in 2012 included

the introduction of the Oxfile system as the default means of delivering materials to readers (unless CDs are specifically requested), which improved supply times and reduced costs.

Saturday book deliveries and selfcollect

Saturday book deliveries were trialled during Trinity term 2013. These deliveries were made to the Bodleian Library, Radcliffe Camera, Radcliffe Science Library and Social Science Library. In the summer it was agreed to extend this trial through 2013/14.

In July, the option to self-collect reserved items was introduced in the Bodleian Library's Lower Reading Room. Self-collect in the Taylor Institution Library and the Philosophy and Theology Faculties Library had received positive feedback and reduced waiting times for reserved material.

E-readings and e-books

There is an increasing expectation from students that reading list materials for taught courses will be available in electronic format for quick, 24-hour access from mobile devices. To address this, a range of libraries including the History Faculty Library, Social Science Library, Law Library and Education Library continued to offer scanning services under the terms of the CLA Licence, making extracts available to appropriate users through WebLearn. During 2012/13, in collaboration with academic staff, the Education Library also extended its online reading list provision to include pre-induction materials and enhanced the service by enabling readers to upload their reading lists into their reference management system of choice.

Significant new collections of e-books were purchased (online access is now provided to over 50% of the books on clinical student reading lists, for example) with access to e-books substantially increased for a range of disciplines, including computer science, physics and mathematics. To help promote social science e-book collections, the Social Science Library introduced a NOOK e-reader lending scheme. The NOOKs were preloaded with a number of freely available books relevant to Philosophy, Politics and Economics reading lists, and readers were able to transfer e-books to the NOOK borrowed from a range of platforms.

The Sainsbury Library at the Saïd Business School arranged for the digitisation of 1,500 student projects and made them accessible and searchable through a restricted website. Another new website, along with a small special collection, was created for the Law Library's Notable Works project in which faculty members nominated works that had particularly influenced them.

Improving study spaces

Libraries play an essential role in offering a conducive environment for study and research, providing a range of spaces for intellectual and quiet study and interaction. During 2012/13, the Continuing Education Library was rewired, which greatly improved lighting over the book stacks and lower floor, increasing use of these spaces for study. Additional power points also allowed wider use of laptops and a reconfiguration of the desk area improved services to readers. The Radcliffe Science Library improved access to wifi by making Eduroam available throughout the library and created two new collaborative spaces featuring 'whiteboard' tables and comfortable seating. Final touches to the refurbishment of the Cairns Library included the installation of medical and health-related images from Libraries collections as well as some of the 2012 Frith Photography Prize entries.

Support for the Research Excellence Framework

Support for the Research Excellence Framework (REF) 2014 continued throughout the year in support of all academic divisions. Activity included identifying and checking references and citations, identifying and quantifying the impact of research outputs, supplying information for environment statements and providing a wide range of online research tools. Science librarians, for example, worked closely with staff in the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division and contributed to 24 impact case studies. They also delivered evidence of further impact in newspapers and other media.

Improving communications

During 2012/13 many libraries also reviewed their communications with readers. These reviews resulted in a number of new initiatives and also developments within existing channels, including the Science and Medicine Dispatch e-newsletter: a monthly newsletter that provides news on library events, new resources and other items of interest to the science and medical community. Highly tailored support for research students and undergraduates was introduced in the Law Library through their Link Programme, which was developed to provide a named librarian for one-to-one communication and support.

3 Digital Bodleian

Digital priorities

2012/13 saw great progress in the development of digital library services, from both a strategic and an operational perspective.

Much work went into creating an innovative 'Digital Shift' strategy, outlining a systematic approach to digital activities that will firmly establish the Bodleian Libraries as a leading twenty-first-century organisation. The Digital Shift will build on existing relationships with academic divisions, IT Services, the Oxford e-Research Centre in e-Science and Digital Humanities projects and services. It was developed partly as a response to the University of Oxford's Strategic Plan for 2013-18, which promises 'to invest in information technologies that enhance the capacity of Oxford's academic communities to collaborate with each other and with global partners, and that support the student experience'. It will also support the IT Strategic Plan and a wider ambition to develop a 'Digital Oxford'.

Aleph and Aleph Reporting Centre upgrade

Aleph, the integrated library system supporting many front-line services, was updated in August 2013. This moved the Libraries onto the latest supported version of the software, allowing access to the latest fixes and enhancements from Ex Libris, which supplies the software. The upgrade also delivered a number of improvements for Libraries staff using Aleph and the welcome opportunity to upgrade the Aleph Reporting Centre (ARC).

SOLO (Primo) upgrade

Primo, the software underpinning SOLO, the Oxford libraries' catalogue, was upgraded. The upgrade delivered a number of new features that had been requested by readers.

Digital developments to support Open Access at Oxford

In March 2013 an approved statement on Open Access (OA) at the University of Oxford was released, reiterating its strong commitment to ensuring the widest possible access to its research for the benefit of both the international research community and wider society (http:// openaccess.ox.ac.uk/wp-uploads/2013/03/ Statement-on-Open-Access-at-the-University-of-Oxford-Approved-by-Councilon-11-March-2013.pdf). An Oxford Open Access Project Group, reporting to the Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Research), was created to develop OA systems and services, and to assist staff and students in understanding and meeting research funders' requirements in relation to OA.

As part of the Oxford Open Access Project, the Bodleian Libraries worked to enhance the Oxford University Research Archive (ORA). ORA is vital in supporting openaccess distribution of research publications using author self-archiving for free public use. It also acts as an important and freely

available online listing of Oxford research. Over 96,000 records were imported into ORA from Symplectic (the University's system for gathering publication data) and made freely available online. Work also started on accurate author identification for publications recorded in ORA and on managing standard terminology. Members of staff were appointed to review and enhance submissions to ORA, ensuring that they could be easily found and were legally compliant. Thanks to the generosity of the Polonsky Foundation, around 2,000 theses were also scanned during 2012/13 for adding to ORA

In addition, the Bodleian Libraries continued to collaborate with colleagues in Research Services and IT Services to plan and provide systems and services to support management of, storage of and access to research data generated by Oxford scholars. The Libraries built a demonstrator catalogue for Oxford research data and an early-stage archival data-storage system.

The Bodleian Libraries' Collection Support team developed procedures for processing and managing article processing charges (APCs) in line with the University's policy. Requests for APC funding started to come in from the launch of the service.

Expanding access to collections through digitisation

In March 2012, the Libraries completed a project to make over 330,000 scanned books (with over 100 million pages of the Bodleian's collections) available as downloadable PDF files through SOLO, the Oxford libraries' online catalogue. These copies were the result of a partnership with Google. Use of the new digital books began immediately and there was a very positive response from readers and the media when the project was announced. The average number of monthly downloads has remained above 15,000 and the collection continues to see increased usage.

The Bodleian Digital Library Systems and Services (BDLSS) team is committed to maintaining the service, increasing the number and quality of available books and seeking new and innovative ways of presenting them as part of an overall strategy for digitised books from Bodleian Libraries collections.

2012/13 digital projects

SPRINT FOR SHAKESPEARE AND THE BODLEIAN FIRST FOLIO

'Sprint for Shakespeare' (http:// shakespeare.bodleian.ox.ac.uk) was an innovative campaign created to pay for the conservation, digital imaging and free online publication of the Libraries' First Folio of Shakespeare's plays. A blog was used to sustain interest in and provide information about the campaign (http://shakespeare.bodleian.ox.ac.uk/blog).

SUSTAINING THE EEBO-TCP CORPUS IN TRANSITION

The Sustaining the EEBO-TCP Corpus in Transition (SECT) project ran from February 2012 until July 2013. It was funded by Jisc and run as a collaboration between the Bodleian Libraries and the Oxford Internet Institute. The goal of the project was to shape the future of the Early English Books Online Text Creation Partnership (EEBO-TCP) body of online content and identify areas for future development. A study was undertaken to allow a better understanding of the use and impact of EEBO-TCP and the results showed it to be an important resource for the study of the early modern period, with an extremely active user community.

QUEEN VICTORIA'S JOURNALS

24 May 2013 (the bicentenary of Queen Victoria's birth) saw the final content additions to the Queen Victoria's Journals website and marked a year since it was first launched by HM The Queen at Buckingham Palace. The project saw the Bodleian Libraries collaborate with the Royal Archives and an electronic publisher, ProQuest. The completed resource made available all 141 surviving volumes of Queen Victoria's diaries, fully searchable online and accompanied by essays from specialists; galleries of Victoria's own sketches; an interactive timeline; a gazetteer of featured places; and biographical information on featured people. The occasion was celebrated with a number of activities, including a Wikipedia Editathon and a social media campaign. Feedback from the public and the academic community was extremely positive.

EARLY MODERN LETTERS ONLINE

After several years of collaborative development with the Cultures of Knowledge Project, the beta version of Early Modern Letters Online (EMLO) was launched (http://emlo.bodleian.ox.ac.uk).

Supported by generous funding from the Andrew W Mellon Foundation, EMLO aims to be both a finding aid and an editorial tool for basic descriptions of early modern correspondence. The beta version combined material from eight contributing collections. The continuing addition of metadata information on letters – manuscript, printed and digital – by other individuals, projects and organisations will support EMLO in its aim to become the first freely available joint catalogue for this type of often hard-to-access material.

Further funding from the Andrew W Mellon Foundation will allow the development of this project to continue.

INTEGRATING BROADSIDE BALLADS ARCHIVES (IBBA)

Broadside Ballads Online (http://ballads.bodleian.ox.ac.uk), funded by Jisc, presented a digital collection of English printed ballad sheets from the 16th century to the 20th, supported by links to the English Broadside Ballad Archive's digital versions of pre-1800 ballads from other libraries, and to the folk song scholarship of the Roud Broadside Index, hosted by the English Folk Dance and Song Society.

Collaborations

Over 300 paintings in Bodleian Libraries' collections, principally portraits, can now be viewed online on the BBC's Your Paintings website (www.bbc.co.uk/arts/yourpaintings/galleries/locations/bodleian-libraries-university-of-oxford-7493). The digital images were made in collaboration with the Public Catalogue Foundation, a charity dedicated to making the art owned and held in public collections more accessible.

The Libraries' collaboration with the Vatican Library, Biblioteca Apostolica Vaticana, has continued with the generous support of the Polonsky Foundation. Work on this project has provided many opportunities for the Libraries to increase the rate at which rare collections can be digitised. In response, new digitisation workflow software was implemented to allow better management of large-scale projects and a means to standardise the way digitised materials are displayed online. This development was complemented by work on software that will allow the delivery of high-quality images online, giving users across the world access to some of the Libraries' rarest collections.

Digital outreach and teaching

DIGITAL HUMANITIES @ OXFORD SUMMER SCHOOL

The Libraries are increasingly involved in delivering the Digital Humanities @ Oxford Summer School (DHOxSS) (http://digital.

humanities.ox.ac.uk/dhoxss), one of the leading international training events in digital humanities. Members of Libraries staff sit on the organisational committee and in 2012/13 provided four speakers for the DHoXSS event, led the Cultural Connections workshop and presented two projects at the Poster Reception (SECT and Sprint for Shakespeare).

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

Cultural Connections was a week-long workshop on knowledge exchange in the humanities, held as part of the Digital Humanities @ Oxford Summer School (http://digital.humanities. ox.ac.uk/dhoxss/2013/workshops. html#culturalconnections). Following consultation within and beyond the University of Oxford, public engagement was identified as the most pressing topic for the workshop and a necessary starting point for much knowledge exchange work in the humanities. 38 speakers were drawn from universities and related professions to run sessions over the course of the week and participants rated the content very highly. Developed over seven months, the workshop was conceived as a pilot for future knowledge exchange and public engagement training and development courses for members of humanities faculties. Video and audio podcasts of the workshops were made available through iTunes U (http://podcasts.ox.ac.uk/ series/cultural-connections-exchangingknowledge-and-widening-participationhumanities).

4 Special Collections

Special Collections had a strong 2012/13, providing unique research materials to scholars and the wider public both physically and virtually. Almost 30,000 visits were made to its reading rooms, while its online catalogues of Western manuscripts alone were visited over 100,000 times.

There were several major additions to the collections over the course of the year, including the archives of Jack Straw and Lord (Michael) Heseltine. The Saving Oxford Medicine initiative continued to gather many notable archives and oral history recordings to document and preserve the research records of key Oxford medical scientists. Other scientific collections acquired include papers relating to the World Meteorological Organisation and a large collection of astronomical photographic images from the Greenwich and Radcliffe observatories, gifted by the Science & Technology Facilities Council. Among literary papers acquired were Cecil

Day-Lewis papers and a manuscript draft of Gerard Manley Hopkins's famous poem 'Binsey Poplars'. Musical additions included further manuscripts of Mendelssohn and Finzi and a comprehensive collection of late-19th- and early-20th-century Russian musical scores.

Within the Conservative Party Archive, work continued on cataloguing the Conservative Overseas Bureau papers, c1948–2000. Major additions to the archive included the papers of the Conservative Party's trade unionist organisation, c1920s–60s (thought to have been lost) as well as a digital collection of Conservative Future material. Interest in the Conservative Party continues to run high and 2012/13 was the second busiest year on record in terms of usage.

Several major catalogues were completed over the course of the year and the Wellcome Trust awarded a £360,000 grant to catalogue the vast and recently donated Oxfam archive. 2012/13 also saw the launch of the Rediscovering Rycote project website, which gives access to a rich source of materials from the Tudor period and includes an interactive palaeography course. Online access to the Catalogue of Books Printed in the Fifteenth Century now in the Bodleian Library was also made available.

The Bodleian Library of Commonwealth and African Studies at Rhodes House acquired several important collections, including candid letters from Herbert Gladstone during his time as home secretary and first governor general of the Union of South Africa. Among projects designed to enhance access to the collections, the Anti-Apartheid Movement Archives Committee obtained a Heritage Lottery Fund grant to create a website and to conduct oral history interviews with figures from the national campaign and from local groups in London.

The Maps section worked with the other Legal Deposit Libraries to set up a system for the capture and presentation of digital cartographic records. These digital deposits will build upon the Libraries' extensive collections of Ordnance Survey mapping on paper and microform dating back over two centuries. As part of an ongoing project supported by the Andrew W Mellon Foundation, the Maps and Music card catalogues were made available online for the first time, allowing readers to browse through a virtual version of the cards without having to visit the Library.

The Oriental section received important gifts, including a collection on Japanese medicine donated by the Tsumura company. The Serica Chinese reached a milestone with over half of the pre-modern Chinese collection fully catalogued. The generosity of the Friends of the Bodleian

enabled the acquisition of a unique Chinese printing block produced by the Protestant mission in Batavia in the early 19th century, and 29 issues of the late-19th-century lithographic pictorials *Dianshizhai huabao* and *Feiyinggehuabao*.

The Libraries' winter 2012 exhibition, *Love and Devotion: From Persia and Beyond*, allowed an impressive show of the Libraries' Islamic and Middle Eastern manuscripts. During 2012/13, 1,000 online catalogue records for manuscripts in the Libraries' Persian collections were added to the Fihrist database, with further additions planned. The Libraries also won a grant from the National Manuscripts Conservation Trust to undertake the conservation and digitisation of MS Huntington 212, a 12th-century copy of the *Book of the Constellations of the Fixed Stars*.

Research and administrative use of the University Archives continued to increase, with reader visits and document issues reaching their highest ever levels. The University Archives Subcommittee of the Curators considered the issues surrounding the administration and preservation of electronic records and decided that efforts in this area should initially be concentrated on University websites, the email records of the most senior University officers, and digital copies of the papers of major University committees and other bodies.

The Centre for the Study of the Book (CSB) presented a rich programme of academic outreach to promote wider access to items from the Special Collections of the Bodleian Libraries, and to encourage an understanding of the history of these collections, their origins and their current value to scholarship. It hosted four visiting scholars, and five scholars from Oxford were supported by the Polonsky Foundation in making research trips to the Vatican Library as part of a Bodleian-Vatican scholars scheme. There were symposia on the poet Cecil Day-Lewis and the Shakespearean scholar Edmond Malone (1741-1812) and nine masterclasses featuring objects from special collections. Public lectures included the Annual DF McKenzie Lecture, given on 28 February 2013 by book artist Xu Bing. The 2012 CSB Summer School was on the subject of paper. Ten students gained an in-depth appreciation of the history of papermaking and the use of paper in early books and in manuscripts.

Curatorial staff continued to support and initiate teaching within the University and beyond and to serve as advisers to significant national bodies, including Art Council England's Reviewing Committee on the Export of Works of Art.

5 The collections

Acquisitions

In 2013, the Acquisitions team took on added responsibility, including the deduplication of journal titles, as part of the United Kingdom Research Reserve (UKRR). This presented a huge challenge as it coincided with a substantial move of the Mathematics Institute, which generated 900 boxes of material to be processed; a need to manage Open Access Gold payments; work on the Po Chung Collection; and the development of the Libraries' e-book processes.

Following a successful trial in Trinity term 2013, library users were given access to 84,000 extra e-books in the Ebrary Academic Complete collection. The books come from 500 prestigious academic publishers and cover all disciplines. They were all made available through SOLO and the ProQuest platform with multi-user access and 14-day downloads to mobile devices (for University members). The package will be updated regularly. A reader's comment during the trial described the resource as 'incredibly awesome'.

In addition, progress was made on the processing of the Mack Smith collection of materials and other donations, particularly the Window on Korea Collection at the Oriental Institute Library.

Testing continues on an Electronic Data Interchange (EDI), and the Libraries are talking to suppliers who may be able to support this project.

The work of Acquisitions staff was recognised with a Bodleian Libraries Impact award, particularly for the work to test Patron-Driven Acquisitions, which has allowed the Libraries to buy new material based on reader demand.

Legal Deposit

The Legal Deposit Libraries Act of 2003 updated the Copyright Act of 1911 to make provision for non-print publications (excluding audio-visual materials). As a result, a lot of work was undertaken by legal deposit libraries (including the Bodleian Libraries), representatives of the publishing industries and the Department of Culture, Media and Sport to shape the regulations that will underpin legal deposit operations for non-print publications. Following a series of public consultations, the regulations finally came into force at midnight on 6 April 2013.

The regulations will ensure that the legal deposit libraries can provide a national archive of the UK's non-print published material, such as websites, blogs,

e-journals and e-books, in addition to its print collection. In doing so, they address the important challenge of preserving the nation's digital heritage for future generations and will ensure that researchers of the future will be able to study and analyse a comprehensive collection of material which accurately reflects UK society.

The legal deposit libraries worked together to agree a shared approach to handling electronic materials. The British Library's Digital Library System, where the materials will be held, has been extended to the National Library of Wales and the National Library of Scotland. The national libraries will have responsibility for acquiring and storing the materials and for providing access to them in both their own reading rooms and those of the university libraries (Bodleian Libraries, Cambridge University Library and Trinity College Dublin).

This work marked the beginning of what will become an invaluable, comprehensive and extensive collection, contributing to an organised archive of the country's published output.

Resource description

Over 1.5 million records were uploaded to improve the consistency of names, titles and subject headings in SOLO and provide crossreferences to help readers find what they are looking for. In addition, more than 2,000 new records for British authors, institutions and titles were created and added to the international authority file maintained by the Library of Congress. The Libraries also contributed over 50 new subject headings for concepts not currently represented in the Library of Congress Subject Headings (LCSH) list. Both of these Library of Congress resources are widely used by libraries across the globe in their online catalogues to improve access to the materials in their collections.

Conservation and collection care

Throughout 2012/13, the Conservation and Collection Care team looked after Bodleian Libraries' collections and met the exacting standards of work set out by the Institute of Conservation (ICON).

PHILANTHROPICALLY SUPPORTED PROJECTS

Thanks to generous gifts from a number of donors, conservation treatment was possible on a broad selection of materials, including Shelley's notebook; the manuscript of the first opera in English, *Erismena*; and a large guard book relating to Richard Gough's *Sepulchral Monuments of Great Britain*, which features drawings by William Blake. The conservation of a

series of drawings of Blenheim Palace by Sir John Vanbrugh was also completed. Several longer-term projects got under way, including work on a number of Kafka's papers. Work on the Book of the Constellations of the Fixed Stars by 'Abd al-Rahmān al-Sūfī (1170) was progressed after securing funds from Duke Humfrey's Night and the National Manuscripts Conservation Trust, and progress was also made on a number of items from the Chinese collections, including a 19thcentury Chinese board game printed on paper. In addition, several major gifts from the Clothworkers' Foundation, the JP Getty Jnr Charitable Trust, the Friends of the Bodleian, and a number of private donors allowed the start of conservation treatment on the Bodleian's Sheldon Tapestry Maps: a project commissioned to the National Trust.

CONSERVATION-LED PROGRAMMES

Several long-term programmes designed to preserve the Bodleian Libraries' collections continued throughout 2012/13, including the treatment of 1,457 items from the Oxford University Archives. The online service for requesting urgent conservation treatment remained popular and 400 such requests were dealt with, including a repair to a Rhodes House visitors' book containing the signatures of Alice Pleasance Liddel (the inspiration for *Alice in Wonderland*) and Mohandas Gandhi. A major milestone was achieved in 2012/13 with the fasciculing of more than half of the Libraries' 36,000 Anti-Slavery Papers.

PREVENTIVE CONSERVATION

Preventive conservation operations are crucial to prolonging the life of Bodleian Libraries' collections. 2012/13 saw the continuation of an intensive environmental control programme across a number of buildings and work to support the design of the new Weston Library radio telemetry system for both storage and display areas. The preventive conservation team also responded to 30 incidents where assessment and treatment of collections was required after an emergency situation, as well as undertaking assessment work on new acquisitions and loans in order to detect any potential hazards such as nitrates or pests.

SUPPORTING THE LIBRARIES' DIGITISATION PROGRAMME

An essential aspect of digitising the Libraries' collections is to ensure that they are safe during the digitisation process. Conservation contributed to the Bodleian Libraries' digitisation programmes by assessing and repairing hundreds of items prior to their safe scanning or photography. In 2012/13 pre-digitisation assessment and

work were undertaken on Shakespeare's First Folio and 422 volumes of manuscripts and early printed books for the Polonsky Foundation Digitisation Project.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT AND TEACHING

As an academic-related service, the Conservation team share their work and new findings with other specialists and the wider public, steadily strengthening their links to both national and international conservation programmes and contributing to conservation education. In 2012/13 a paper was delivered at the Institute of Conservation's conference in Glasgow and a practical session at their 'Stationery Bindings' seminar. Two conference papers on the Libraries' Jane Austen manuscripts were presented at the Folger Shakespeare Library and the British Association for Romantic Studies International Conference. Seminars were also delivered for colleagues in the Libraries. Internships for students on conservation-related Masters' programmes at Northumbria University and University College London were run again in 2012/13, and a new yearly internship was established with the Institut National du Patrimoine, Paris. Additionally, an agreement was reached which will see Conservation staff teach regularly at the Camberwell College of Arts and West Dean College.

The Libraries' Conservation team were also awarded a grant from the Cultural Heritage Advanced Research Infrastructures, Synergy for a Multidisciplinary Approach to Conservation/Restoration (CHARISMA). The grant enabled the team to use a mobile laboratory for instrumental analysis (MOLAB) to characterise the colours present in the Libraries' five pre-Columbian and early colonial Mexican codices, in order to support scholarly research and inform preservation approaches for such unique treasures. Other treasures analysed by the MOLAB include the Book of Kells and Codex Zouche-Nuttal.

Special Collections boxing programme

In 2012/13, a programme of work to box the special collections in the Radcliffe Science Library stack began, led by the Packaging and Display team. Over the course of the year 35,883 books were measured, cleaned and fitted with purpose-made conservationgrade boxes. This work was undertaken to help protect the collections when they move to the Weston Library and preserve them for future generations of scholars.

Electronic resources

SUBSCRIPTIONS

The Bodleian Libraries reached a new subscription agreement with Elsevier for their Science Direct journals package, which started in January 2013. Pricing is no longer based on historic print spend, so libraries throughout the University no longer pay a charge for print journals cancelled where the electronic version is included in the package.

NEW ELECTRONIC RESOURCES

A number of electronic resources were purchased in 2012/13, including:

- State Literary Manuscripts (Berg); Medieval Family Life; Romanticism: Life, Literature and Landscape; First World War: Personal Experiences; London Low Life; Popular Culture in Britain and America, 1950–1975; Victorian Popular Culture; Confidential Print: Africa, 1834–1966; Confidential Print: Middle East, 1839–1969.
- Irish Newspaper Archive: an important resource providing access to the archive of twenty-three Irish national and regional newspapers. It includes, for instance, Irish Independent (1905–2001), Leitrim Observer (1904–1998), Munster Express (1908–2004), but also historic newspapers such as the Freeman's Journal (1763–1924), Nation (1840–1900) and Leinster Journal (1767–1828).
- DigiZeitschriften: offers electronic access to historical scholarly German periodical literature covering many humanities subjects (Egyptology, Archaeology, History, History of the Book, Art, German studies, Oriental studies, Law, Philosophy, Religion, Modern Languages).
- The Diaries of Joseph Goebbels Online; The Economy and War in the Third Reich, 1933-1944; Cold War: Voices of Confrontation and Conciliation; State Papers Online III and IV (Stuart and Commonwealth; Domestic and Foreign; 1603-1714).
- *Dictionnaires des XVIe et XVIIe siècles*: a database of 10 historical French dictionaries of the 16th and 17th centuries.
- Stalin Digital Archive: the web-based repository of archival and secondary research presents documents that have previously only been available at the RGASPI archive in Russia. Digital versions of Yale's Annals of Communism series supplement the RGASPI collection with additional scholarly commentary on selected documents concerning the history of Soviet and international communism from Russian state archives spanning the 75-year history of the USSR.

The University of Oxford remained the heaviest user of JSTOR in the world in 2012/13.

DVDs

The DVD collections continued to grow in 2012/13, with over 650 feature films and 14 collections of short films added at the Taylor Institution and English Faculty Libraries. Films from 38 countries and with production dates ranging from 1901 to 2013 were acquired, with particularly significant additions being made to holdings in French, American, Italian and German cinema.

Shuinjo

The Shuinjo, an original document issued by Shogun Ieyasu to the captain of the East India Company, is the first agreement allowing the UK to trade with Japan and permitting British citizens to reside in Japan. This makes it an extremely important document, marking the start of bilateral relations and trade.

The year 2013 was the 400th anniversary of Japanese-British relations (http://japan400.com), which was celebrated with a series of events across the UK. The Libraries took part by introducing *Shuinjo* to the public and the academic community through a display and a small symposium, helping to raise the profile of Japan in the UK and further a relationship that began four centuries ago.

Ishinpo: donation of Japanese medicine literature

The Libraries were delighted to receive a collection of rare books on Japanese medicine from the Tsumura company, a leading pharmaceuticals firm in Japan. A presentation ceremony took place at the Bodleian Japanese Library on 19 February. The donation included two sets of Ishinpo, a compendium of the oldest surviving Japanese medical texts written by Yasuyori Tamba in 984, and other titles on Japanese medical history. Ishinpo is a national treasure in Japan, and provides invaluable source material for Professor Denis Noble's collaborative research project on systems biology and herbal remedies. The Libraries are grateful to the Tsumura company for their generous support and also to Professor Noble, who has been instrumental in arranging this donation.

Books of Memory: Leningrad Blockade 1941-1944

In November 2012 the Libraries received a special gift from the Association of Survivors of the Leningrad blockade: a set of 35 volumes of the *Knigi pamiati: Blokada Leningrad 1941–1944* (Books of Memory: Leningrad Blockade 1941–1944). After the Holocaust, the Leningrad siege was the greatest act of genocide during the Second World War, which resulted in the death of over a million Soviet citizens.

This remarkable historical document provides essential biographical data about the victims of the 872-day siege and is an important archival source for the study of Soviet history.

6 Outreach and widening access

Exhibitions

In 2012/13, the Bodleian Libraries Exhibitions Section and curators worked with academics from the University of Oxford and other institutions to mount three temporary exhibitions to engage new audiences while continuing to attract regular visitors. Over 250 items from the collection were displayed alongside loans from private lenders and UK national collections. Each of these exhibitions was supported by an accompanying publication, web pages and public lecture series.

Dickens and His World (June–October 2012) celebrated the 19th-century world inhabited by Charles Dickens and brought to life in his novels. It attracted 59,687 visitors.

Love and Devotion: From Persia and Beyond (December 2012-April 2013) was a collaboration with the State Library of Victoria, Australia. It welcomed 36,128 visitors.

The family-friendly Magical Books: From the Middle Ages to Middle-earth (May-October 2013) put the work of five modern writers of children's fantasy alongside the sources that inspired them, such as medieval bestiaries, early maps and spell books. Copies of many of the modern books were available in the exhibition room to browse and read, encouraging visitors to re-read old favourites or meet new authors. The exhibition proved extremely popular and final visitor numbers broke all previous records at 104,161.

The exhibition programme also included a changing programme of short, themed displays in the entrance to the Bodleian Library. These showcased recent academic research, celebrated significant anniversaries and displayed new acquisitions. In 2012/13 eight diverse displays were mounted, allowing curators to show rarely seen material from the

collections. This space was also the venue for an exhibition of 70 highly commended book bindings from the second international bookbinding competition organised by the Bodleian Library in association with Designer Bookbinders and Mark Getty.

Frequent one-day displays of material from the Libraries' Special Collections supported Library, University and community events with 21 different displays showing around 139 books, manuscripts and objects. The acquisition of the Oxfam and Shirley Hughes archives and the personal archive of W H Fox Talbot was celebrated in this way, as was the purchase of the Gerard Manley Hopkins manuscript of 'Binsey Poplars'.

As part of their commitment to extend access to their collections, the Bodleian Libraries support local, national and international exhibitions through a programme of loans. In 2012/13, 140 items were lent to 18 exhibitions in the UK and overseas. This included the loan of the entire 2011 Bodleian exhibition *Crossing Borders: Hebrew Manuscripts as a Meeting-place of Cultures* to the Jewish Museum, New York.

Sharing collections in print

Books published by the Bodleian Library are a way of opening its collections to readers around the world. Some titles published in the financial year 2012/13 brought texts long out of print back to life, such as the *Victorian Dictionary of Slang*, which shone a light on hidden aspects of the language. Others, such as *Illuminating the Life of the Buddha*, illustrated important manuscripts and the traditions they embody.

In addition, each of the major temporary exhibitions was accompanied by a publication, which allowed readers everywhere to see images of all the items in the exhibition and read their story in greater depth and detail.

The Bodleian's publications reflect the vast diversity of the collections. In 2012/13, *Menswear* and *Fantasy Travel* illustrated the fashions of former generations as recorded in photo postcards of the early 20th century and *Can Onions Cure Ear-ache?* revealed the medical advice given to the public in the first English-language medical self-help book (originally entitled *Domestic Medicine*, 1769). Some books remain as relevant today as when they were first published, such as those by Edward Lear, who continues to delight readers. Bodleian Publishing celebrated his centenary in 2013 by compiling *Edward Lear's Nonsense Birds*.

Events and public engagement

Exhibitions and temporary displays continued to offer an excellent opportunity to promote the Libraries' collections through a series of related lunchtime

lectures and gallery talks. In 2012/13, attendance for the lectures regularly reached full capacity. Additionally, during the *Dickens and His World* exhibition, visitors were offered a chance to enter the world of Dickens in the company of his great-great-grandson, Gerald Dickens, as he performed dramatised readings from Dickens' works. The final day of the exhibition was marked with a miniature theatre performance of *Great Expectations* by Peter Baldwin and Mary Pegler.

To celebrate the gift of the Cecil Day-Lewis papers in October 2012, a symposium was held, which featured lectures, poetry readings and recordings, and a panel discussion with Tamasin Day-Lewis.

During the year, other events included a lecture by Mr David Vaisey CBE (Bodley's Librarian Emeritus) to mark the 400th anniversary of Sir Thomas Bodley's death, a talk by Dr Paul Coones (with musical accompaniment) to celebrate the 200th birthday of Richard Wagner, and a talk by Mr Clive Hurst on 'Early Children's Books in the Opie and Other Collections in the Bodleian Library' for World Book Day 2013. The programme also included a special seminar titled 'Jim Callaghan Remembered: Centenary Reflections on Callaghan, Labour and Britain since 1912'. The stellar panel comprised Baroness Jay, Lord Morgan and Andrew Smith MP. The Bodleian's enhanced status as a 2013 Oxford Literary Festival partner meant that many of the year's lectures were held in the Divinity School.

For the sixth year running, the Bodleian Libraries collaborated with the Oxford Playhouse in hosting the Globe on Tour, who performed *The Taming of the Shrew* to capacity audiences.

Communications

The Communications team continued to support and promote the work of the Libraries through timely communications to staff, readers, the University and the wider public via a diverse range of publications and communication channels.

2012/13 saw the completion of a major web redevelopment project, which focused on the www.bodleian.ox.ac.uk family of websites and resulted in a much-improved experience for users. The programme saw the relaunch of more than 30 websites over a period of several months in collaboration with colleagues from across the Libraries. The Libraries' digital presence was also expanded through the adoption of additional social media channels and digital support for online exhibitions.

The Weston Library project required extensive and complex communications activity throughout 2012/13 in order

to keep staff, readers, the academic community and the public informed of changes, progress and developments. The A-Z 'Treasures' hoardings developed by the Communications team to surround the building and the Weston chair design competition both received a great deal of public attention.

Alongside projects such as these, the Communications team continued to generate both national and international press coverage on Bodleian Libraries activities, from the appeal for the personal archive of W H Fox Talbot to the announcement of the joint acquisition with Cambridge of the Lewis-Gibson Genizah fragments, from digital activity like the Google Books project to the news that Oxford Libraries were ranked first in the country by the 2013 National Student Survey.

Transforming the Bodleian

Transforming the Bodleian was published in 2012 by De Gruyter Saur. Edited by Michael Heaney and Catríona Cannon, and written by Bodleian Libraries staff, it describes the major projects undertaken between 2008 and 2011 to modernise the Libraries' infrastructure.

7 Enterprises

The 2012/13 financial year was the first year that the trading activities of the Bodleian Libraries were brought together under single management, with the aim of generating profits while fostering the Libraries' public and scholarly objectives of widening access to its collections. All profit from these trading activities was returned to the Libraries to support their work. During the year the businesses also participated significantly in the core work of the Libraries and are a fundamental part of the Libraries' outreach, development and digitisation programmes.

Events, filming and tours

2012/13 was a superb trading year, with turnover from events, filming and tours totalling £468,000. Hire income from events was particularly strong, up 59% on the previous year, and the Libraries' collections were featured in a number of documentaries.

These successes were recognised when, for the second year running, the Libraries

were awarded the Excellence category by Visit England's Visitor Attraction Quality Assurance Scheme.

Retail and e-commerce

Despite adverse weather conditions affecting the number of shoppers in early 2013, 2012/13 retail sales totalled £496,000 and, with tightened cost controls, returned an increased profit. The latter half of the year was aided by strong attendance at the *Magical Books* exhibition, which inspired innovative exhibition-related product.

The Libraries were the proud runner-up of an Association for Cultural Enterprises award for children's product design, a new category for the retail team. A competition to name a new dragon grotesque generated much enthusiasm and an overwhelming response.

Publishing

Bodleian Library Publishing launched fifteen new titles in the UK. distributed worldwide with sales of £328,000, an increase of 8% on last year, double the average of 4% growth in the UK book trade. Three book awards shortlisted Bodleian titles: the Krasna-Krausz Book Awards (Sarah Angelina Acland: First Lady of Colour Photography), the Council on Botanical and Horticultural Libraries' annual award (Planting Paradise: Cultivating the Garden 1501-1900) and the HRF Keating Award (for PD James's *Talking about Detective Fiction*). One of the highlights of the year was the publication of Roy Strong's Self-Portrait as a Young Man (memoirs), which was extracted in the Mail on Sunday and very widely reviewed to almost universal acclaim. Most of the new titles were also widely reviewed, with The Tradescants' Orchard singled out for its 'beautiful prose' (Daily Telegraph) and 'beautifully reproduced' images (Country Life).

Imaging studio

Throughout 2012/13, the Imaging Studio added images of a large collection of fragile materials to the Libraries' digital assets, supporting their preservation for future generations. Projects included: 20 manuscripts for the virtual reconstitution of the medieval monastic library of Abbey Lorsch; 77,000 images of Hebrew, Greek and Latin manuscripts as part of the Polonsky Foundation Digitisation Project; and new photography of many of the Bodleian Libraries' treasures for the forthcoming *Marks of Genius* exhibition.

The Studio scanned nearly 100,000 images over the course of the year, a 22% increase on the previous year.

Licensing and academic resources

Licensing - whether of images, books, product design or academic resources - goes from strength to strength, generating royalties of £192,000 in 2012/13.

Electronic Enlightenment: Letters and Lives Online

Electronic Enlightenment (EE), the most wide-ranging online collection of edited correspondence of the early modern period, continues to be developed by the Bodleian Libraries. It reconnects the first global social network through the digitisation of existing scholarly editions of correspondence and the commissioning of entirely new digital editions, while hundreds of thousands of annotations provide increasing numbers of additional details and cross-references. The summer 2013 update added a further 3,300 documents and 520 new people, bringing EE's total offering to 63,967 historical documents in a social network of 8,002 historical figures who discuss everything from religious tolerance to animal rights, vulcanology to classical archaeology, economic modelling to celebrity culture.

In 2012/13, a further 17 institutions and individuals worldwide acquired EE as part of their key library resources, increasing sales to £182,000, enabling the resource to be sustained into the future.

'The appearance of Electronic Enlightenment is a major breakthrough for anyone wishing to exploit the rich resources offered by the correspondence of major Enlightenment figures such as Voltaire and Rousseau, as well as many lesser-known figures. Given that epistolary exchange constituted the life blood of the Republic of Letters, Electronic Enlightenment is absolutely essential for any serious researcher of the Enlightenment.' 8 Leadership and staff talent

Staff development

Throughout 2012/13, the Bodleian Libraries provided a wide range of training and development opportunities for staff. A total of 196 development events were held, with 2,400 places filled by Libraries staff and 340 by college staff. 588 members of staff attended one or more training events. In addition, 33 people completed an online Health & Safety training course. In total 57 staff were supported in attending external conferences and courses in the UK and overseas, with a commitment of £23,300 towards this training. 2012/13 also saw the successful training of 20 library trainees (including those from the colleges) and saw the recruitment of 12 for 2013/14.

Personnel

Sarah Thomas, Bodley's Librarian, left the Bodleian Libraries to become vice president for the Harvard Library at Harvard University, and Richard Ovenden stepped up to act as Interim Bodley's Librarian. Catriona Cannon stepped up to act as Deputy Librarian and the Enterprises function became part of the Administration and Finance section of the Libraries, headed by Laura How.

After very long service in some cases, the following senior staff retired: Mike Heaney, Executive Secretary; Clive Hurst, Head of Rare Books; Dave Price, Head of BDLSS; Geoff Neate, Database Applications & Project Manager; Anneke Bambery, Head of Venue Services.

A new post was created and filled: Frankie Wilson, Head of Assessment. Other newcomers included: Alice Ogilvie, Head of Venue Services; Ashleigh King, Head of Retail Operations; Catherine Scutt, Education Librarian. Internal promotions included Louise Clarke, now Head of Social Sciences Libraries and Head of Research & Learning.

During the year the Libraries continued to implement the action plan developed following a staff survey in 2012, and augmented both the Personnel and the Health & Safety teams to enable more timely support from these services. The implementation of the University of Oxford's human resources database in the Libraries was also consolidated, and a health and safety planning exercise took place in preparation for the opening of the Weston Library.

9 Finance and development

Finance

The Bodleian Libraries' operational budget for 2012/13 was £38.36 million, with a further budget of £2 million for the departmental and research projects. The operational budget included £645,000 of savings, being the final year of the three-year savings exercise that has seen a total reduction of £1.788 million. Throughout the year the Libraries' Executive closely monitored and reviewed the budget and for the second half of the year a number of nonfrontline posts were left vacant as a means of achieving part of the savings required. The principles of protecting the materials budget and sustaining staffing levels in

digital library services were maintained. The Libraries ended the year with a small deficit of £85,000, equating to 0.2% of budget, which had been anticipated and forecast.

There was a noticeable increase in donation income (non-Weston Library) in 2012/13: £4.7 million compared to £1.7 million in the previous year. Donation income in 2012/13 funded a number of purchases, including £276,000 for the papers of the Earl of Clarendon. Income and expenditure on departmental and research projects totalled £1.2 million and included Open Access, the Polonsky Foundation Digitisation Project, as well as barcoding and book moving as part of the Weston project. £1.6 million of trust fund dividend income was spent during the year, funding some salaries as well as buying over £600,000 of additional library material, with just over £300,000 of that figure attributable to rare books/special collections and £200,000 in respect of the humanities.

Development

The 2012/13 financial year began with the launch of the Sprint for Shakespeare campaign in August, seeking to raise £20,000 to digitise the Bodleian Libraries' copy of Shakespeare's First Folio. Supported by champions from the worlds of theatre, television and literature the appeal was picked up globally and hundreds of supporters made donations to the project. The Dallas Shakespeare Trust generously pledged US\$7,000, which took the appeal target to its goal and allowed digitisation to begin. A second phase is under way, supported by a generous donation.

The New Year saw announcements of several major acquisitions by the Bodleian Libraries. Along with Cambridge University Library the Libraries purchased the Lewis-Gibson Genizah Collection and received a gift of £250,000 from the Polonsky Foundation in addition to other donations in support. A public appeal was launched in an effort to secure the personal archive of WHFox Talbot, which was supported by a generous gift of £1.2 million from the National Heritage Memorial Fund and £200,000 from the Art Fund, as well as many other individual and foundation supporters. Following on from this, generous supporters assisted the Libraries with the acquisition of the manuscript of Gerard Manley Hopkins's 'Binsey Poplars', which went on display after its purchase.

Fundraising for the Weston Library project continued throughout the year, and the

Libraries were pleased to announce the support of the Helen Hamlyn Trust through a pledge of £2 million to the project. The opening exhibition in the Library in 2015 also received a pledge of support from an individual donor. Support towards Visiting Fellowships was received from several benefactors, including the Royal Bank of Canada Foundation.

Other projects that were supported through philanthropic donations included the cataloguing of the Dalingridge Archive and of the Townesend Archive, the latter having been acquired earlier in the year through the support of benefactors including the Oxford Preservation Trust and Friends of the Bodleian. Support to help train future Digital Archivists was received from the Heritage Lottery Fund, which pledged £280,400 through its Skills for the Future programme.

The Bodleian Libraries are grateful to all of the supporters whose generosity have enabled many projects to be undertaken in 2012/13 and would like to thank all of its benefactors.

Friends of the Bodleian

The Friends of the Bodleian not only raise funds for the Bodleian Library to support the cost of acquiring and conserving materials but also help to bring the collections and work of the Library to the public more widely.

2012/13 activities organised by the Friends included six public lectures on topics such as 'The British as Art Collectors' and '18th-Century Children's Books'. The Friends' annual general meeting included a talk from Professor John Carey on 'Dickens and Murder'.

Other events organised by the Friends included a concert performed by Alamire in the Divinity School entitled *Via Anglica*, generously sponsored by a donor. Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* was also presented in the Divinity School by Sovereign Arts as part of the Royal Shakespeare Company's Open Stages project. The event celebrated the success of the Sprint for Shakespeare campaign. In gratitude for the Friends' support during this campaign, members were invited to watch Bodleian Libraries conservators at work.

Members also took part in hand-printing sessions on the Library presses and the first family event, which included a quest and arts activities inspired by the *Magical Books* exhibition.

1 Conferment of Honorary Degrees

The Public Orator made the following speeches in presenting the recipients of Honorary Degrees at the Encaenia held in the Sheldonian Theatre on Wednesday, 25 June:

Degree of Doctor of Divinity

Paraphrase

The lady who leads the line of honorands today is both the first woman to have headed the American Episcopal Church and the first scientist. For she was not always a priest, but began her career as an oceanographer. Later she learnt how to fly and acquired her pilot's licence. But in the words of the psalm, 'If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, even there will thy hand lead me and thy right hand hold me.' Even so she sought for truth, it seems, in the depths of the sea and in the heights of the sky, and found God there. It is small surprise then that her preaching stresses God's presence in complex organic systems and in every part of nature from the greatest to the least. She affirms that we men and women should act as good stewards of the

earth entrusted to us, and accordingly she combines her concern for domestic poverty with opposition to development that is environmentally unsustainable.

An indefatigable pastor, she spends the greater part of her time on travel within the church. The Episcopal Church comprises more than a hundred dioceses, and she is the first of its primates to have visited all of them. She has written four books and consecrated more than sixty bishops; and yet however heavy the burden of business she goes running daily, and when she can find the time (which cannot be often) she takes her harp and sweeps her fingers across the strings. She is admired for keeping a level head and a calm presence in even the most trying circumstances. It is common knowledge that many provinces of the Anglican Communion are troubled by disagreements, some of them acute. But she listens to the disputants sympathetically, attends to the forgotten, and guides her flock heavenward not in an aeroplane but through setting an example of faith and devotion.

I present a shepherd of the shepherds, servant of the servants of God, the Most Reverend Katharine Jefferts Schori, Presiding Bishop and Primate of the Episcopal Church of the United States of America, to be admitted to the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Paraphrase

Near the lake in Chicago there is a piazza where locals and tourists stroll and children play. Every day a cluster of passers-by can be seen lingering fascinatedly by a huge gleaming object. I now present the man who devised it and called it Cloud Gate. It is not only the grandeur of the structure that impresses these spectators; their gaze is also drawn to its surface of polished metal sheets, which like a looking-glass reflect clouds and sky and the surrounding skyscrapers. But the work's curved form means that the reflections are distorted, so that familiar things are made strange and we look upon them with freshened eyes. Our honorand is used to thinking big: for Middlesbrough he has devised Temenos, said to be the largest work of sculpture in the country. But even his vastest creations display grace and even elegance. Thus in Temenos he has woven metal wires together with such delicacy as to make some people think of butterfly nets. Often he aims for a kind of simplicity; sometimes, though, he has made involved and complicated constructions, such is the range of his imagination. Commissioned to design a monument to mark the London Olympic Games, he built a tower of steel, calling it Orbit. That name implies motion, and indeed he has put such dynamism into the very metal that it seems to surge up, bend, and twist energetically. In the past sculptors were praised, as in Virgil's Aeneid, for making bronzes so realistic that they appeared to breathe, or for drawing living faces out of marble; but here is one who represents neither people nor animals nor objects, revealing instead the beauty of pure form and sheen. Indian born, he has long lived among us, but his art speaks a language that knows no borders, one that all nations can equally understand and enjoy.

I present a brilliant shape-maker, whose works delight the people and impress the cognoscenti, Sir Anish Kapoor, to be admitted to the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters.

Paraphrase

Despite the fair number of distinguished people whom we have honoured at Encaenia, it is rare to find one whose achievement has been truly unique - who has done something which no one has done before, and which is unlikely ever to be done again. How am I adequately to praise the present honorand, who has founded a journal, sustained it almost single-handed

for more than half a century, and built it up with such shrewdness of judgement that it has for many years now held the first place among intellectual publications in the English-speaking world? The art of the critic is to assess books, but no less important is the art of picking the critic. It is one which our honorand learnt as a young man in Paris, and then displayed to full effect back in his native land. The New York Review has the flavour of the nation, and indeed of the city, from which it comes, but the range of its editor's curiosity knows no boundaries, and he draws his reviewers and the books for review alike from almost every corner of the world. He has an apparently magic gift for finding the critic best suited to each book, nor has he forgotten Oxford; it may well be the case that no one honoured at this annual event has paid so many of his audience so well. Indeed, I remember one number which featured three Balliol men, of whom two quoted from the same poem by WH Auden (himself a Christ Church man). This is an editor who guides his hirelings with a gentle hand (as I can testify from experience); he raises only a few points about the copy, but those very sharp. An Oxonian author wrote that good Americans go to Paris when they die, but we have here one whose French period is long past, who now enjoys an evergreen maturity in his own country, and who will always live in that Elysium which is the memory of great achievement.

I present a prince of editors, an indefatigable champion of letters, Robert Silvers, founder and guiding spirit of *The New York Review of Books*, to be admitted to the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters.

Paraphrase

We have already awarded a degree today to a sculptor, and shall shortly award another to a composer. Here is a chemist who has compared his own subject to both their arts. He is himself an excellent pianist, and is said to be an especial admirer of Berg and Schoenberg; from which one may readily deduce both that he enjoys complex structures and that he readily encounters difficulties that most people shun. He argues that chemists are artists because their task is not only to discover and analyse but also to create. And thus he compares chemistry to a musical score which the player reads and interprets but which must also be composed.

Even the layman knows that from the time of the big bang atoms have coalesced into molecules, and molecules have developed into more diverse and complex structures. But many chemicals of great benefit to humanity are not found in nature, and chemists are accordingly needed to understand material phenomena and to change and control them. Lucretius declared that his own master was 'a god, a god, I say', for having understood the nature of matter; all the more do those who possess the art of making new matter seem to have a kind of godlike power. Our honorand excels in this art, and yet he describes it as less a matter of organising molecules than of persuading them to organise themselves into new structures. He has built 'cages' (as the scientists call them), not however to imprison his molecules but to protect them by keeping external forces out. Deserving in himself of the highest praise, he praises his subject for interrogating the past, exploring the present, and working toward the future.

I present a keen-eyed investigator of small things, Jean-Marie Lehn, Emeritus Professor of Chemistry at the University of Strasbourg, Emeritus Professor at the Collège de France, Nobel Laureate, to be admitted to the honorary degree of Doctor of Science.

Paraphrase

Virgil tells in the Georgics that Orpheus descended to the realm of Hades to bring his lost Eurydice back to life again; but after he had enchanted Hell and its denizens by the beauty of his singing, he was overcome by his passion and looked back at his wife (which Proserpina had forbidden), and she was drawn down again to the underworld. Through this story the poet seems to express the power of both music and love over the human spirit. It is appropriate, then, that the man whom I now present has put on *The Mask of Orpheus*, for his musical craftsmanship is consummate, and he applies this skill to the depiction of human emotion. He has recurrently found inspiration in Greek myth, for example in his opera The Minotaur, in which the role of Ariadne was created by an Oxford graduate. Here he gives powerful expression to the agony of one who is a half-man enclosed in the form of a beast and a half-beast with the feelings of a man. He does not shrink from representing cruelty and violence: thus in Punch and Judy he takes what might seem to be a comic theme, the quarrels of puppets, and excites pity and terror from them; and he has been known to inspire Panic in listeners of conservative disposition. His sound world is difficult, angular and complex, but at times he strikes a gentler note. He has turned *The Last Supper* into the subject of an opera, one that was glowingly reviewed when it was performed in this city. Besides, however much the experts praise the anger conveyed by his music, there is a streak of melancholy in him too. He has recently composed a *Moth* Requiem, for twelve female voices, three harps and one flute; his own instrument, the clarinet, almost always has some flavour of plangency. It is no surprise that he greatly admires the Jacobean lutenist Dowland, who described himself as 'semper dolens' (ever grieving). But whether he is challenging, disturbing or moving his audience, he combines craft and inspiration in the highest degree. We hail him with gratitude in this his eightieth birthday year.

I present an Orpheus of our time, a most skilled priest of Melpomene, Sir Harrison Birtwistle, CH, to be admitted to the honorary degree of Doctor of Music.

The Public Orator delivered the Creweian Oration 'in commemoration of the Benefactors of the University according to the intention of the Right Honourable Nathaniel, Lord Crewe, Bishop of Durham'.

Orator: Honoratissime Domine Cancellarie, licetne anglice loqui?

Chancellor: Licet.

Orator:

Mr Eliot of Merton didn't think much of the spring. 'April is the cruellest month,' he famously observed, a curious opinion from one who has endured an English February. In another poem he described 'the juvescence of the year... depraved May, dogwood and chestnut, flowering judas'. Luckily he never got round to telling us what he thought of June. But June is surely a good time for celebration, as we bring the academic year to a colourful conclusion. Mr Eliot opened yet another of his bracing ditties with the words, 'In my beginning is my end.' They seem to be a bit down in the mouth south of the High. Coming as it does from North Oxford, this helpful and empowering oration would like to turn that round: in our end is our beginning. For today, as we remember the benefactions of the past, we also express our thanks for the benefactions of the present time, and look forward to the future that they will make possible. Encaenia means renewal, as your programme books explain; indeed this useful and educative oration hastens to point out that it is in fact a plural noun: renewals. We think of the many, many new graduates and undergraduates who will soon be coming up for the first time, and the multiplicity of fresh things always happening here, like the countless flamelike shoots of green that prickle the surface of ploughland in the spring.

When I was an undergraduate, at the end of the sixties, my college's JCR subscribed to China Pictorial and China Reconstructs, magazines supplied free by the legation of the People's Republic, which explained how guided by the principles of Mao Tse-Tung thought the workers were creating an earthly paradise. The point at which I realised that it couldn't all be true was when they printed a photograph of some smiling people in boiler suits with the caption, 'The peasants are joyously paying their taxes.' That has not been true since the creation of the world. But we have it on good authority that 'God loveth a cheerful giver', and substantial rewards are offered for compliance. You can check with the Presiding Bishop, but I think you'll find that the offer is still available. Terms

and conditions apply. At all events, our benefactors give cheerfully and indeed joyously. Dr James Martin, the James Martin 21st Century Foundation and the James Martin 21st Century Research Foundation have made another grand gift for the continued support of the Oxford Martin School. Dr Martin himself died a year and a day ago, on Midsummer's Day, but Mrs Lillian Martin remains closely involved with the school that he founded, and we remember him gratefully as one of the largest benefactors to the University in its history. The Institute for Strategic Dialogue has made a generous donation for the Weidenfeld Scholarship and Leadership Programme and the Humanitas Visiting Professorship Programme. Lord Weidenfeld himself will celebrate his 95th birthday in September.

You may have noticed that the number of honorands is smaller than usual. Readers of that Oxford classic, Max Beerbohm's Zuleika Dobson, may recall the Junta Club, which was so exclusive that it became reduced to only one member, and at its meetings the Duke of Dorset dined alone. Occasionally he proposed a new member, but when he mulled the idea over, honesty compelled him to recognise that the candidate in question was not as brilliant, handsome and aristocratic as himself, and he had to drop - with what regret - a blackball into the urn. You may think that we have brought a similar spirit to honorary degrees, and that the world has only produced five people who meet our exacting standards. In fact, we were intending to honour Professor Wally Broecker, the eminent earth and climate scientist; but where's Wally? The reason is a sad one: a family illness has kept him at home. But we hope to celebrate his achievement next year. It is a shame that he is not present to hear about the generous gift to the Department of Earth Sciences from Schlumberger Limited of multiple licences of its interpretation software. The department explains that this will transform its researchers' work in understanding how matter is trapped in conventional and unconventional accumulations in basins. That tends to happen in student digs.

Meanwhile our students continue to accumulate conventional and unconventional matter in their heads. We take pride in our tutorial method of teaching (perhaps a little complacently at times). But I can offer a tribute from across the ocean. An American friend has told me that she used to wonder why there were so many Limeys in the *New York Review of Books*, Oxford people especially. Then she found the explanation: it was the essay crisis. The weekly tutorial makes one assimilate

material quickly and assess it fluently with some superficial appearance of plausibility. Believe that or not, as you choose; but what we do believe in is teaching and learning. The Kai Feng Foundation has made a liberal donation for the Oxford-Kaifeng Scholarships, the first fully endowed scholarship scheme for Chinese students here. The Pershing Square Foundation has munificently endowed up to five Saïd Business School Scholarships for the MBA component of the 1+1 programme, designed to help outstanding young people from across the world to develop their potential as leaders. It is not only the brilliant students who matter - perhaps it is not even the brilliant ones who matter most - but of course we delight to celebrate exceptional success. A few of our prizewinners are on show for this day only at a theatre very near you. Their achievements are described in your programmes. I ask them to stand now to receive your applause.

Your applause has shown its usual warmth. There will be no need to emulate the family values of President Kim Jong Un, who executed his uncle last autumn for clapping half-heartedly - and for putting the President's portrait in a shady corner. We have a fine portrait of the Chancellor in the University Offices, and come to think of it, it isn't very well lit. Back in Wellington Square some revanchist running dog is trembling even as I speak.

As usual, league tables of universities have appeared, and as usual, they differ. Connoisseurs of the subtly modulated insult may have appreciated the news that one of them has found Eton College to be the sixthbest school in Berkshire. It happens to all of us. In the last year one table has made us the best university outside California, another the best university outside Massachusetts, and another the fourth best within 70 miles of Charing Cross. But accentuating the positive, as this manly and uplifting oration always does, we note that we have beaten every university in the world in at least one of these leagues. Of course, the differences between leading institutions are in fractions of a percentage point, well inside the limits of statistical error, but it may be worth mentioning that the QS rankings put our humanities first in the world by an unusually large margin. It is also pleasing to note that another British university took the second place.

Statistics also show that a majority of the audience are still awake at the end of Encaenia. But for the benefit of an important minority I hasten now to celebrate the munificent gift from the Sir Jules Thorn Charitable Trust for the Sir Jules Thorn Sleep and Circadian Neuroscience Institute, the work of which promises to have important consequences for health and the treatment of disease. If you fancy a summer afternoon snooze, we have lovely places in which you can enjoy it. Now some people think that Cambridge is more beautiful than Oxford. The Cambridge architects who designed Wellington Square, the Zoology Building and the Sacher Building on Longwall were no doubt under instructions to keep it that way. But there is no doubting that we have the best Botanic Garden, and it is a pleasure to note the bequest from the late Mrs Mary Alexander to set up an endowment for the Garden and the Harcourt Arboretum.

The Rhodes Trust has celebrated the 110th anniversary of the Rhodes Scholarships in fine style, with an event that drew 900 scholars and their guests back to this city. And the greatest cause for celebration has been the immensely generous, indeed transformational, gift to the Trust from John and Marcy McCall MacBain and the McCall MacBain Foundation. It is fitting in this commemorative year that another Rhodes Scholar should have risen to lead his country, Mr Tony Abbott of Queen's winning a general election to become Prime Minister of Australia. He is best known over here for observing that a top education doesn't make you the suppository of all wisdom. When I studied philosophy, I was taught that a proposition could not validate itself, but I think I may have found the exception. At least he didn't read English. Mr Abbott is not the first or even the second Oxonian to have reached the Australian premiership: Mr Fraser of Magdalen and Mr Hawke of Univ, another Rhodes Scholar, were before him. Mr Hawke indeed told his nation that Mr Fraser had gone soft through spending time among the Poms, and then ruined the whole effect by adding that he, Mr Hawke, had got a better degree here than Mr Fraser had. Statesmen are competitive that way. Jeremy Paxman, educated in another place but at one time resident in this city, has just retired from Newsnight, and it was recalled that he once asked Mr Johnson of Balliol if it rankled that he had only managed a 2:1, while Mr Cameron of Brasenose had got a first. 'Well, it would,' he replied, 'if it wasn't that his first was in PPE.

The European Elections were described by the media as historic. It is indeed that rarity, a national election won by a party not under Oxford leadership. In general elections, that has happened only twice since the 1930s. Mr Farage was educated in the University of Life. Life – always our most dangerous competitor. At least Oxford-led parties took the second and third places. And it would be ungracious not to mention the sterling efforts of two parties which have preferred

to put themselves under Cambridge leadership - the Liberal Democrats and the British National Party. We could have told them. Across the Atlantic, a survey of 250 top officials in the Obama administration has found that more of them have graduate degrees from us than from any public university in the USA itself. Obamacare has had a lot of problems, but the President has recently appointed a new health secretary, yet another Rhodes Scholar, Ms Sylvia Mathews Burwell of Worcester, and it now seems to be going rather well. Surely these things must be related.

The Fernside Trust has made a magnificent benefaction to endow Dean Ireland's Professorship of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture in perpetuity. We are sure that the professor's exegesis will be authoritative; not as authoritative, however, as that supplied to the Creationism Museum in Petersburg, Kentucky, last summer, when one of its employees was struck by lightning. Our scientists too look heavenward: Sir Michael Hintze through the Hintze Family Charitable Foundation has made a splendid gift for the creation of the University of Oxford Centre for Astrophysical Surveys. Back on planet Earth Professor Robin Dunbar and Rafael Wlodarski in the Department of Experimental Psychology have been investigating why we kiss. 'Kissing in human sexual relationships is incredibly prevalent,' they exclusively reveal, 'and we are still not exactly sure why it is so widespread or what purpose it serves.' If they would care to send a researchette round to my place, I may be able to help. One theory, they add, is that kissing 'somehow helps to assess the genetic quality of potential mates' (ha, we've all done that in our time), but they also consider the theory that kissing 'is used to increase arousal' (oh, surely not).

Meanwhile, Professor Dawkins has been bidding us not to tell children the story about the girl who kissed a frog and turned it into a prince, on the grounds that the process is statistically too improbable. I've long doubted that frogs turn into princes, but I had never guessed that this was the reason. At least he doesn't teach biology. Oh sorry, he does. Meanwhile, in the past months one Oxford graduate has acquired a throne - King Philippe of Trinity and Belgium - and another, Ms Amal Alamuddin of St Hugh's, has got engaged to George Clooney. I think we can guess which achievement has excited the greater envy. Anyway, however problematic the zoomorphology of batrachian royal metamorphosis, a prince can still turn into a king and a girl can still find her prince.

In another corner of the psychology department Professor Charles Spence studies how the perception of taste can be manipulated, and he has been advising us how to give a good party. If you put gin in a heavy glass, you can get away with serving a cheaper brand. If the crisps are stale, make crunching noises and your guests will believe them to be fresh. When selecting the background music, avoid German techno: it makes people drink more (actually Eine Kleine Nachtmusik was more what I had in mind). Riesling seems classier if the lighting is pink, and Christmas pudding tastier if Winter Wonderland is playing (no, please). So next time you have folks round, take a few tips from the Pippa Middleton of the Science Area - or should that be the Ebenezer Scrooge? But I should be careful with these comparisons. Last year, in praising Professor David Macdonald, the Director of the Wildlife Conservation Research Unit, who made the meerkat famous and is now trying to do the same for the Bornean clouded leopard, I called him the Max Clifford of the animal world. I would not wish to be misunderstood.

The New Year brought the Order of Merit to Professor Martin West, in recognition of his services to Greek scholarship. The last classicist to receive this exceptional honour was Sir Ronald Syme, Camden Professor of Ancient History, in 1976, and the last Hellenist was Gilbert Murray, Regius Professor of Greek, in 1941. We like to keep these things in the family. The New Year Honours also brought a damehood to Professor Frances Kirwan, knighthoods to Professor Paul Collier, Dr Noel Malcolm and Professor Peter Ratcliffe, CBEs to Professors Marian Dawkins and John Kay, the OBE to Ceridwen Roberts, and MBEs to Karen Hewitt and Dr Marios Papadopoulos. In the Birthday Honours Professors Colin Blakemore, John Pethica and Richard Sorabji have been knighted, Professor Martin Biddle has received a CBE, John Simpson an OBE and Dr Damian Jenkins an MBE. The Royal Society has elected to its fellowship Professors Dorothy Bishop, Marian Dawkins, Liam Dolan, Patrik Rorsman, Rajesh Thakker and Anthony Watts, and the British Academy Professors Mary Dalrymple, John Gardner, Vincent Gillespie, John Hawthorne, Julia Lee-Thorp, Colin Mayer, Kevin O'Rourke and Jenny Ogza. We congratulate them all.

Three college heads retire this summer, Frances Cairncross as Rector of Exeter, Christopher Lewis as Dean of Christ Church and Sheila Forbes as Principal of St Hilda's. Their successors are Sir Rick Trainor, Canon Martyn Percy and Sir Gordon Duff. Other farewells are for ever, and as always, I call to mind those friends and colleagues who have died in the past year, among whom were John Albery, Master of University College, Anne Barton, Fellow of New College, Michael Brock, Warden of Nuffield, Marilyn Butler, Rector of Exeter, Lorna Casselton, Fellow of St Cross, Alan Cowey, Fellow of Lincoln, John Enos, Fellow of Magdalen, Ellis Evans, Fellow of Jesus, Seamus Heaney, Fellow of Magdalen, James Martin, benefactor, Borivoje Minakovic, Fellow of Linacre, John Moffatt, Provost of Queen's, James Naughton, Fellow of St Edmund Hall, Ernest Nicholson, Provost of Oriel, Christina Roaf, Fellow of Somerville, Geoffrey Smith, Fellow of St Cross, Michael Sullivan, Fellow of St Catherine's, Joan Thirsk, Fellow of St Hilda's, and Geoffrey Young, Fellow of Jesus. Requiescant in pace et in aeternum luceat eis Dominus Illuminatio Mea.

While mourning the dead, we can also take pleasure in the longevity that our medical researchers have played their part in increasing. At least one of those whom I have just commemorated reached the age of 98, and one of those last year 99. I do not know which Oxford don has lived longest; perhaps someone will tell me in time for next year's oration. Bertrand Hallward, a don at Cambridge and then Vice-Chancellor of Nottingham, reached 102, which shows that not all vice-chancellors are broken by the weight of their labours. When Martin Routh died at the age of 99, having been President of Magdalen for 63 years, he had lived longer than any other college head. That record, established in 1854, stood until last autumn, when it was broken by Sally Chilver, former Principal of LMH, whose centenary falls early in August. Next year we look forward to celebrating the moment at which the Visitor of University College, Oriel and Christ Church surpasses her great-greatgrandmother Queen Victoria as the longestserving occupant of the visitorial office. But all of these must yield to an alumna of LMH, Margaret Wileman, former Principal of Hughes Hall, Cambridge, who is 105, at least until her next birthday in four weeks' time. So Cambridge wins this competition, with a little help from ourselves.

Even the longest life, however, is short set against the history of this university and, as we hope, with the yet longer story still to come. That brings me back to TS Eliot. Why did he think April the cruellest month? Because it mixes desire and memory, he said; the birth of the new is the death of the old. Yet desire and memory are both good things: we remember our past with gratitude, and we look forward desiringly to the adventure which is the future. And how wise Mr Eliot was, after all: for in my beginning, as you see, is my end.

Notes on the nominated external member of Council

David Norgrove graduated in Modern History (Exeter College, 1971) and has a diploma in Economics from Cambridge and an MSc in Economics from the London School of Economics. He joined the Treasury as an economist in 1972 and subsequently worked on relations with the IMF, in the Central Policy Unit and on a review of public expenditure accounting. He took leave from the Treasury to spend two years working for First National Bank of Chicago. Mr Norgrove was Private Secretary to the Prime Minister. Mrs Thatcher. between 1985 and 1988, before moving to Marks and Spencer in 1988. At Marks and Spencer he held a number of roles including as Divisional Director for Europe and of Menswear, reviewing the business strategy, and in Executive Director roles between 2000 and 2004. He was the first Chair of the Pensions Regulator 2005-10, and chaired the government review of the family justice system 2010-11. He has been a Trustee, Chair of the Audit Committee and Deputy Chair at the British Museum and carried out a review of governance of the Arts Council in 2012. He has chaired the Low Pay Commission since 2009 and has chaired the Family Justice Board, which is charged with the implementation of the Family Justice Review, since 2011. He was chairman of Pensions First, a company offering risk management solutions and analytics to pension schemes, banks and insurance companies in the UK and US, between 2011 and May 2014.

Council of the University

Changes in Regulations

Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **11 July**.

(a) Regulations for University Officers (Vice-Chancellor)

Explanatory Note

In Michaelmas term 2013 the legislation concerning the appointment of future Vice-Chancellors was amended to provide for a fixed term of office of seven years. It also restricts eligibility to those who can serve the full term of seven years before reaching the retirement age as prescribed by the Regulations for the Employment of University Staff (ie the Employer Justified Retirement Age or EJRA). Those over 60 are therefore not eligible because they cannot serve the full term before reaching the retirement age of 67.

It is important that the University considers the provisions of the Equality Act 2010, not only in relation to the age at retirement but also in relation to the age at appointment. The former is dealt with by the EJRA, but, as the legislation currently stands, the latter is not sufficiently covered. Further, the restriction on the age at appointment is undesirable in that it might rule out as ineligible a number of suitably qualified candidates. For both reasons it is therefore proposed to amend the legislation to remove the requirement that an individual needs to be able to serve the full term of seven years before reaching the retirement age.

The opportunity is also taken to amend the legislation to replace the word 'person', where it relates to the Vice-Chancellor, with 'individual'. The word 'person' where not otherwise qualified is now defined in Statute I as referring to 'the resident holder of a teaching, research, or administrative post' in the collegiate University, whereas eligibility for appointment as Vice-Chancellor is not restricted to such people.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 21 of 2002, concerning the office of the Vice-Chancellor, amend regulations 2–6 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through) and renumber existing regulations 7–39 as 8–40 respectively:

'Vice Chancellor

- 2. Subject to regulation 4 below, the The Vice-Chancellor shall hold office for seven years, save that, when a Vice-Chancellor vacates the office before the expiry of his or her full term of office and at a time other than the end of the academic year, his or her successor's period shall consist of the remainder of that academic year and seven further years.
- 3. Any <u>individual person</u> shall be eligible for appointment as Vice-Chancellor.
- 4. The Vice-Chancellor is subject to the provisions concerning retirement age if he or she can serve the full period permitted under regulation 2 above before reaching the retiring age as set out in prescribed by the Regulations for the Employment of University Staff.
- 5.4. Subject to the provisions of regulation 2 above, no No individual person shall be appointed Vice-Chancellor a second time, save that, if a Vice-Chancellor vacates his or her office before the expiry of a full term of office, an individual person who has previously been Vice-Chancellor may be appointed Vice-Chancellor again for one year (or, if the retiring Vice-Chancellor vacates his or her office at a time other than the end of an academic year, for the remainder of that academic year and one further year), and the age-limit in regulation 43 above shall not apply to such a second appointment.

 $\underline{6.5}$. The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed in accordance with the following procedure:

(1) Not less than one year before the period of office of a Vice-Chancellor is due to come to an end by lapse of time, a committee consisting of:

(a) the Chancellor, or, if the Chancellor is unable or unwilling to act, one of the members of Council nominated under the provisions of section 4 (7)-(10) of Statute VI, who shall if possible be appointed by the Chancellor for this purpose, or, if the Chancellor is unable or unwilling to make such an appointment, shall be appointed by Council, and who shall chair the committee;

(*b*)–(*e*) four persons, not also being members of Council, elected by Congregation;

(f)-(h) three persons appointed by Council, of whom, if the Chancellor is to chair the committee personally, one shall be one of the members of Council nominated under the provisions of section 4 (7)-(10) of Statute VI;

(*i*)-(*l*) one person appointed by each of the divisional boards;

(*m*) the Chairman of the Conference of Colleges or his or her nominee;

(n) a person, not also being a member of Council, elected by the Conference of Colleges

shall report to Council with a recommendation that a named <u>individual person</u> be appointed as the next Vice-Chancellor;

(2) (a) The appointed and elected members of the committee at paragraph (1) above shall hold office for seven years and shall not be eligible for a further period of office on the committee in either an appointed or an elected position until the expiry of seven years from the date on which the first period of office expires, except that a member appointed or elected for less than a full period in order to fill a casual vacancy may be appointed or elected for one consecutive period of seven years.

(b) A member of the committee elected under paragraph (1) (b)-(e) or (n) above who becomes a member of Council during his or her period of office shall immediately vacate his or her office; no person shall be appointed or elected under paragraph (1) (b)-(l) or (n) above if the result of his or her appointment or election would be that more than two members of the committee, excluding the chairman, were members of the governing body of any one college, society, or Permanent Private Hall; if this limit is exceeded by reason of persons being appointed or elected simultaneously by different bodies, the person or persons senior in academic standing shall be deemed appointed or elected to the extent permitted by the limit, and the other or others shall be deemed not appointed or elected (in the event of equality in academic standing, appointment or election being made by lot).

(3) When Council has considered the committee's report, and any further report on the appointment which it may have requested the committee to make, Council shall submit to Congregation the name of the <u>individual person</u> proposed for appointment.

(4) (a) Council's proposal for the appointment of a new Vice-Chancellor shall be deemed approved unless it is rejected with at least 125 members voting in favour of rejection.

(b) If a proposal for the appointment of a new Vice-Chancellor is rejected, Council shall, after consultation with the committee, within two months nominate two <u>individuals persons</u> to Congregation (of whom one may be the <u>individual person</u> previously rejected) and offer Congregation the choice between them.

(5) If for any reason there is no Vice-Chancellor-elect able and willing to take up office on the laying down of office by a Vice-Chancellor, an Acting Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed under the provisions of regulation 87 below, until

such time as a new Vice-Chancellor has been appointed under the procedure laid down in paragraphs (1)-(4) above.

<u>7.6</u>: As nearly as possible at the beginning of the academic year in which he or she takes up office, the Vice-Chancellor shall be admitted at a meeting of Congregation.'

(b) Regulations for University Officers (Pro-Vice-Chancellors)

Explanatory Note

The legislation currently provides for the appointment of no more than five Pro-Vice-Chancellors with special responsibility for designated functions. It is proposed to amend this to enable the appointment of no more than the equivalent of five full-time Pro-Vice-Chancellors.

There are at present five Pro-Vice-Chancellors with special responsibility for designated functions: Development and External Affairs, Education, Personnel and Equality, Planning and Resources and Research/ASUC. Since not all hold full-time appointments, the proposed change would enable the appointment of more than five Pro-Vice-Chancellors through fractional appointments. This provision for fractional appointments allows greater flexibility, not only in terms of portfolios covered but in terms of the way in which posts are structured so as to attract a wider and more diverse pool of candidates.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 21 of 2002, concerning Pro-Vice-Chancellors, amend regulation 9(1) as follows (new text underlined):

'Pro-Vice Chancellors

9. (1) There shall be no more than the equivalent of five full-time Pro-Vice-Chancellors who shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor subject to the approval of Council and each of whom shall have special responsibility for designated functions as agreed by Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor.'

(c) Regulations for Divisions (Heads of Division)

Explanatory Note

Two changes are made.

First, the regulations governing the selection committee for Heads of Division currently refers to those appointed by Council and by the divisional board as 'persons' and as 'member'. Since these regulations were drafted, the words 'person' and 'member' where not otherwise qualified have been defined in section 6(11) of Statute I to refer to 'the resident holder of a teaching, research, or administrative post' in the collegiate University, ie an internal. It is proposed to amend the regulations to allow for the appointment of externals to the selection committee by both Council and the divisional board. This amendment would restore the original meaning to the regulations.

Second, it is proposed to increase the number of members appointed by Council and by the divisional board from two each to three each. This is in line with what was done (through suspending the regulation) in the case of the appointment of the Head of the Humanities Division¹. A permanent change is proposed to avoid the need to suspend the regulations on each occasion. Council is the appointing body for a Head of Division and this change preserves the balance on the committee of Council and divisional appointees.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 16 of 2002, concerning Heads of Division, amend regulations 5-7 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

- '5. The head of each division shall be appointed by Council on the recommendation of a selection committee consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor;
 - (2)-(4) three individuals (2), (3) two persons appointed by Council;
 - (5)-(7) three individuals (4), (5) two persons appointed by the divisional board:

save that Council may appoint an additional <u>individual as a</u> member of a selection committee if such an appointment seems to Council to be desirable.

- 6. A selection committee shall be appointed on, or in anticipation of, each vacancy in the headship to act on that occasion.
- 7. (1) A member of a selection committee may resign from that committee in order to offer himself or herself as a candidate for the headship, if he or she does so before the published closing date for the receipt of applications, or if he or she is invited after that date by the other members to do so.
 - (2) If a member resigns in such circumstances, Council shall nominate an individual a person to act in his or her place for the remainder of the proceedings to fill the vacancy.'

(d) Membership of the Value for Money Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC), provide for a representative from Estates Services to be a member of the Value for Money Subcommittee of PRAC, in the light of (a) the decision taken in 2013 to disband the Environment Panel of the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee (from which membership of the Value for Money Subcommittee was formerly drawn) and (b) recent revisions to the Value for Money Subcommittee's terms of reference to reflect an increased focus on measurable objectives in 2013/14 and beyond.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 15 of 2002, Part 34, concerning the Value for Money Committee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, amend regulation 34.1 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

- '34.1. The Value for Money Subcommittee of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee shall consist of:
 - (1) a person appointed by Council as chair of the committee;
 - (2)-(5) a member of Congregation from each of the academic divisions with relevant expertise, appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;
 - (6) a member of Congregation from within the Academic Services and University Collections with relevant expertise, appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;

- (7) a member of Congregation from within the University Administration and Services with relevant expertise, appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;
- (8) the Chairman of the Domestic Bursars' Committee;
- (9) a member of the Environment Panel of the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee, appointed by the chairman of the Buildings and Estates Subcommittee; a person from Estates Services with relevant expertise, appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee;
- (10) one external person appointed by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee who shall have relevant expertise at a senior level within either the public or the private sector.'

The nomination by Council, under the provisions of section 4 (7)–(10) of Statute VI, of **Mr Norgrove** as a member of Council for a four-year period from Michaelmas term 2014 to fill the vacancy left by Ms Alice Perkins standing down after two terms as an external member of Council, is submitted for approval.

Notes on the nominated external member of Council

David Norgrove graduated in Modern History (Exeter College, 1971) and has a diploma in Economics from Cambridge and an MSc in Economics from the London School of Economics. He joined the Treasury as an economist in 1972 and subsequently worked on relations with the IMF, in the Central Policy Unit and on a review of public expenditure accounting. He took leave from the Treasury to spend two years working for First National Bank of Chicago. Mr Norgrove was Private Secretary to the Prime Minister. Mrs Thatcher. between 1985 and 1988, before moving to Marks and Spencer in 1988. At Marks and Spencer he held a number of roles including as Divisional Director for Europe and of Menswear, reviewing the business strategy, and in Executive Director roles between 2000 and 2004. He was the first Chair of the Pensions Regulator 2005-10, and chaired the government review of the family justice system 2010-11. He has been a Trustee, Chair of the Audit Committee and Deputy Chair at the British Museum and carried out a review of governance of the Arts Council in 2012. He has chaired the Low Pay Commission since 2009 and has chaired the Family Justice Board, which is charged with the implementation of the Family Justice Review, since 2011. He was chairman of Pensions First, a company offering risk management solutions and analytics to pension schemes, banks and insurance companies in the UK and US, between 2011 and May 2014.

Changes in Regulations

Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **8 August**.

(a) Regulations relating to the process for the approval of IT capital expenditure

Explanatory Note

It is proposed that a revised approval process be implemented for IT capital expenditure, under which Council, on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee (PRAC), would approve a three-year rolling budget for IT capital (reviewed annually on the recommendation of PRAC) and IT Committee would be responsible for the management of that budget within the limits set out in Financial Regulations. This provides the IT Committee with the flexibility that is needed to manage changes in technology, requirements and priorities while maintaining strict oversight and

accountability. Changes to the Financial Regulations and to the Regulations of PRAC, Capital Steering Group and IT Committee are proposed to put this into effect.

At the same time, the IT Committee is made responsible for any centrally run IT projects that are not funded from the IT capital budget; these are likely to be small in scale but would cover projects funded from, for example, JISC¹.

Text of Regulations

'(2) Financial Limits to Authorise Expenditure Commitments

(7)(6) the development, implementation, refinement, and monitoring of resource allocation procedures to enable annual budgets to be set, and the making of recommendations to Council as appropriate;

(8)(7) the keeping under review of, and the making of recommendations to Council as necessary on, student numbers, the distribution of students between various categories, and levels of student fee:

(9)(8) the monitoring of the work of the academic divisions, the Department for Continuing Education, and the services sector against their approved plans and budgets;

(10)(9) the embedding within the University's processes and culture of greater economy (minimising the cost of an activity), greater efficiency (the relationship between the output of goods and services and the resources used to produce them) and greater effectiveness (the extent to which objectives are met), collectively known as 'value for money';

(14)(13) the consideration of, and the giving of advice to Council on, the use of any resources which are not delegated or allocated to the academic divisions, services, or other bodies (whether trust funds, university reserves, unearmarked benefactions, capital funds, or reserves of any other description);

- (15)(14) as appropriate, the consideration of, and the giving of advice to Council on, all aspects of the financial relationships between the University, HEFCE, and other external funding bodies.'

 - (iii) ensuring business cases in respect of the projects under (i) and (ii) above have been appropriately prepared, signed by the appropriate officers of the University in accordance with the Financial Regulations and are consistent with the University's priorities and plans;
 - (iv) reporting annually to PRAC on the commitment and expenditure of the IT capital budget;
 - (v) reporting annually to PRAC on proposals for updating the IT capital budget; and
 - (vi) accounting for the IT capital envelope on the basis of commitment, rather than actual expenditure.
 - The committee shall publish its procedures for exercising these responsibilities from time to time, subject to the approval of Council;
 - (3) the development and implementation of the University's strategy relating to IT;
 - (4) overseeing the development of key performance indicators, including the delivery of value for money;

- (5) identifying and leading the management of strategic risk in relation to IT;
- (6) developing and maintaining policies and regulations regarding the University's IT operations; and
- (7) all other IT-related matters of an operational or strategic nature.'

(b) Student Health and Welfare Subcommittee of the Education Committee

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of Education Committee, amend the regulations for the Student Health and Welfare Subcommittee of the Education Committee to (i) allow the Chair of the Subcommittee to be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor on the recommendation of Education Committee, so that the Chair can be drawn from a wider pool than members or former members of Education Committee; (ii) remove the requirement that there shall be an Advisory Panel for the Student Counselling Service; (iii) replace the term 'person' with the term 'individual', where necessary, to reflect changes to Statute I whereby the term 'person' is now understood to mean an internal member, unless otherwise specified; and (iv) replace the term 'chairman' with the gender-neutral term 'chair'.

Text of Regulations

- 1 In Part 32 of Council Regulations 15 of 2002, concerning the Student Health and Welfare Subcommittee of the Education Committee, amend existing regulation 32.1 and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):
- '32.1. The Student Health and Welfare Subcommittee of the Education Committee shall consist of:

(c) Oxford University Museums Board and the Visitors of the Botanic Garden

Explanatory Note

Further to recommendations made by the ASUC review of the Botanic Garden and Harcourt Arboretum, it is proposed that the Director and the Chair of the Board of Visitors of the Botanic Garden become members ex officio of the Oxford University Museums Board (OUMB) and that the Director of the Oxford University Museum of Natural History become a member ex officio of the Visitors of the Botanic Garden. It is also proposed that the terms of reference of the Oxford University Museums Board be amended so as to include oversight of the Botanic Garden. The opportunity has also been taken to (i) replace the term 'chairman' with the gender-neutral term 'chair'; (ii) update an outdated reference to the former Committee for the Museums and Scientific Collections; and (iii) replace the term 'person' or 'member' with the term 'individual', where necessary, to reflect changes to Statute I whereby the term 'person' or 'member' is now understood to mean an internal member, unless otherwise specified.

Text of Regulations

1 In Council Regulations 15 of 2002, concerning committees reporting directly to Council, delete existing Part 25 regarding the Oxford University Museums Board and substitute (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'Part 25: Oxford University Museums Board

- 25.1. The Oxford University Museums Board shall consist of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor (in the chair);
 - (2) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor with responsibility for the Academic Services and University Collections (to deputise in the chair);
 - (3) one of the Proctors or the Assessor as may be agreed between them;
 - (4)-(78) the directors of the University museums and of the Botanic Garden;
 - (89)-(113) the chairman of each of the Boards of Visitors of the University museums and of the Botanic Garden or his or her nominee;
 - (124)-(157) one person appointed by each of the academic divisional boards, normally to be a member of that board;
 - (168) one person appointed by the Conference of Colleges:
 - (179) one member of the Council of the Oxford University Student Union chosen by that Council.
- 25.2. The <u>board</u> committee may co-opt up to three additional members individuals, preferably with significant collections experience.
- 25.3. Members shall be appointed for four years in the first instance and are eligible for reappointment. Co-opted members shall be appointed for one year and shall be eligible for reappointment.
- 25.4. The board shall be responsible for the delivery of the University's strategic plan insofar as it refers to museums <u>and the Botanic Garden</u> and for the fulfilment of the University's vision of its museums <u>and Botanic Garden</u>, including:
 - (1) oversight of teaching and research;
 - (2) oversight of collections care, including reviews and inspections;
 - (3) delivery of shared services;
 - (4) cross-museum policies;
 - (5) advocacy on behalf of the University museums <u>and Botanic Garden</u>, both within and outside the University.'
- **2** In Council Regulations 2 of 2003, concerning the Botanic Garden, delete existing regulation 2 and substitute (deleted text scored through, new text underlined):

'Governance

- 2. The Visitors of the Botanic Garden shall be:
 - (1) a chairman who shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor;
 - (2) the Pro-Vice-Chancellor with responsibility for Academic Services and University Collections;
 - (3) one of the Proctors or the Assessor as may be agreed between them;
 - (4) the Sherardian Professor of Botany, who shall be called Keeper of the Botanic Garden:
 - (5) a person appointed by the Department of Plant Sciences;
 - (6) a member of Congregation elected by Congregation;
 - (7), (8) two persons <u>individuals</u> appointed by Council, who need not be members of Congregation;
 - (9) the Director of the Oxford University Museum of Natural History.'

(d) Income grants and loan from the College Contributions Fund: 2014 application round

Explanatory Note

This regulation authorises the income grants and a loan which Council has decided to make from the Oxford College Contributions Fund, on the recommendations of the College Contributions Committee following that Committee's consideration of new applications submitted in 2014.

Text of Regulations

(1) The following amounts shall be paid as income grants to the college named, in each case under the provisions of section 5 of Statute XV, for application in the financial year shown:

(2) A sum of £225,000 shall be provided to Mansfield College in the 2014-15 financial year as a loan, under the provisions of section 5 of Statute XV, for maintenance and refurbishment expenditure in that year. The loan shall be repayable on terms set by the College Contributions Committee.

(e) Income grants from the College Contributions Fund: further consideration of an application submitted in 2012

Explanatory Note

This regulation authorises the income grants which Council has decided to make from the Oxford College Contributions Fund, on the recommendations of the College Contributions Committee following reconsideration of an application submitted in 2012.

Text of Regulations

A sum of £360,000 shall be paid in the 2014-15 financial year as an income grant to Worcester College under the provisions of section 5 of Statute XV. The grant is provided for the following purposes:

(i) for maintenance and refurbishment expenditure, a sum of £320,000 (of which £20,000 is to be used as a contribution to the cost of employing an Assistant Bursar); and

(ii) for development office expenditure, a sum of £40,000.

The sums listed are maxima. The payment of this grant shall be dependent on the success with which the college meets certain conditions laid down by Council on the recommendation of the College Contributions Committee.

General Purposes Committee of Council

Changes in Regulations

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes in regulations, to come into effect on **8 August**.

(a) Sinclair and Rachel Hood Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations record the governing terms of the Sinclair and Rachel Hood Fund, established in 2012. Following recent clarification from the donor an amendment is being made to record the gift as permanent rather than expendable endowment.

Text of Regulations

In Section III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning academic and other posts, amend existing §127 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'§127. Sinclair and Rachel Hood Trust Fund for a Research and Administrative Assistant to the Lecturer in Aegean Prehistory

- 1. The University receives with gratitude the sum of £100,000 from The Malcolm Hewitt Wiener Foundation to be held as expendable permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Sinclair and Rachel Hood Trust Fund for a Research and Administrative Assistant to the Lecturer in Aegean Prehistory ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (ifany) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 3. The University shall (1) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and

(2) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the salary and expenses of a Research and Administrative Assistant for the Sinclair and Rachel Hood Lecturer in Aegean Prehistory and associated overheads. The Assistant shall undertake research, administrative and other tasks at the direction of the Sinclair and Rachel Hood Lecturer in Aegean Prehistory. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Assistant are wholly or partly covered from other sources, there are further funds available or the post of Assistant becomes redundant, there shall be discretion to apply the income and/or capital of the Fund to support the Lecturer's research.

- 4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Social Sciences Divisional Board.
- 5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund and the post of Assistant.
- 7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 8. Regulations 1-10 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

- 9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 10. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

(b) Establishment of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages Prize and Scholarship Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish the 'Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages Prize and Scholarship Fund' for the advancement of education and learning at, or in connection with, the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages, principally but not exclusively through the award of prizes, bursaries and scholarships. It is intended that by resolution of Council (GPC), as trustee, under the Charities Act 2011, the Musgrave Fund, Paget Toynbee Prize Fund, Gerard Davis Prize Fund, Kolkhorst Bequest, Drake Fund for Italian Studies, Marjorie Countess of Warwick Travelling Bursary Fund, Levens Travel Bursary Fund. Arteaga Prize Fund. Fred Hodcroft Prize Fund, Cyril Jones Memorial Prize Fund, Colin Prize Fund, Massart Prize Fund in French Literature, Ramon Silva Memorial Prize Fund in Spoken Spanish, and Beddington Prizes (Modern Languages) Fund shall be transferred and administered as part of this new trust fund.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, insert new §233 as follows, and renumber existing §§233–391 as §§234–392^{1.}

- **'§233.** Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages Prize and Scholarship Fund
- 1. Ten pounds and such further money or property as may be paid or transferred to be held by the University on the same trusts shall be held together as part of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages Prize

- and Scholarship Fund ("the Fund"), which shall be held on the trusts declared in this regulation.
- 2. The Fund includes transfers from the Musgrave Fund, Paget Toynbee Prize Fund, Gerard Davis Prize Fund, Kolkhorst Bequest, Drake Fund for Italian Studies, Marjorie Countess of Warwick Travelling Bursary Fund, Levens Travel Bursary Fund, Arteaga Prize Fund, Fred Hodcroft Prize Fund, Cyril Jones Memorial Prize Fund, Colin Prize Fund, Massart Prize Fund in French Literature, Ramon Silva Memorial Prize Fund in Spoken Spanish, and Beddington Prizes (Modern Languages) Fund².
- 3. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 4. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund (if any), towards the advancement of education and learning at, or in connection with, the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages, principally but not exclusively through the award of prizes, bursaries and scholarships.
- 5. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Board of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages, which may make and amend Standing Orders consistent with these Regulations governing the administration of the Fund and the application of its income.
- 6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund.
- 7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 8. Subject to regulation 9, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

- (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
- (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 9. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

(c) Establishment of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages General Purposes Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish the 'Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages General Purposes Fund' for the advancement of education and learning at, or in connection with, the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages. It is intended that by resolution of Council (GPC), as trustee, under the Charities Act 2011, the Mendel Friedman Yiddish Conference Fund, Fiedler Memorial Fund, Malcolm Memorial Fund, Gerrans Fund, Gerrans Memorial Fund, Taylorian Special Reserve Fund (MML), McLintock Fund, Harold Lister Sunderland Fund (MML), and Taylorian Special Lectures Fund shall be transferred and administered as part of this new trust fund.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, insert new §232 as follows, and renumber existing §§232–390 as §§233–391¹:

- **'§232.** Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages General Purposes Fund
- 1. Ten pounds and such further money or property as may be paid or transferred to be held by the University on the same trusts shall be held together as part of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages General Purposes Fund ("the Fund"), which shall be held on the trusts declared in this regulation.
- 2. The Fund includes transfers from the Mendel Friedman Yiddish Conference Fund, Fiedler Memorial Fund, Malcolm Memorial Fund, Gerrans Fund, Gerrans Memorial Fund, Taylorian Special Reserve Fund (MML), McLintock Fund, Harold Lister Sunderland Fund (MML), and Taylorian Special Lectures Fund³.

- 4. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the advancement of education and learning at, or in connection with, the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages.
- 5. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Board of the Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages, which may make and amend Standing Orders consistent with these Regulations governing the administration of the Fund and the application of its income.
- 6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund.
- 7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 8. Subject to regulation 9, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 9. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

(d) Alexander Library in the Edward Grey Institute of Field Ornithology

Explanatory Note

These changes record the delegation of managerial responsibility for the trust fund relating to the Alexander Library in the Edward Grey Institute of Field Ornithology from the Life and Environmental Sciences Board (now the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board) to the Department of Zoology.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, in §6 relating to the Alexander Library in the Edward Grey Institute of Field Ornithology, amend regulation 3 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

'3. The bequests of W B Alexander of certain articles of furniture and paintings for the Edward Grey Institute of Field Ornithology and of the residue of his estate for the purposes of the Alexander Library, in the institute, shall be administered by the Life and Environmental Sciences Board Department of Zoology under delegated authority from the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board, on the recommendation of the Advisory Council of the Edward Grey Institute of Field Ornithology.'

(e) Establishment of a Barclay-Williams Professorship of Molecular Immunology in the Sir William Dunn School of Pathology

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Medical Sciences Board and approved by the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee of Council, establish a new Barclay-Williams Professorship of Molecular Immunology.

Text of Regulations

- **1** In SCHEDULE C of Council Regulations 3 of 2004, concerning statutory professorships, after 'Professor of Neuroimmunology' insert 'Barclay-Williams Professor of Molecular Immunology'.
- **2** In Section III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, insert new §242 and renumber existing §§242–333 as §§243–334:
- **'§242.** Barclay-Williams Professor of Molecular Immunology
- 1. The University receives with gratitude the sum of £2,400,000 from the CIU Trust and the E P Abraham Research Fund to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Barclay-Williams Professorship of Molecular Immunology Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express

- understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment ("the Permanent Endowment").
- 3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the salary and expenses of the holder of the Barclay-Williams Professorship of Molecular Immunology ("the Professor") and associated overheads. The Professor shall undertake research, lecture and give instruction in Immunology. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Professor are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the income and/or capital of the Fund to support the Professor's research, or other academic activity in the field of Immunology.
- 4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Medical Sciences Board.
- 5. The Professor shall be based in the Sir William Dunn School of Pathology and elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or if the head of the college specified in paragraph (2) below is the Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;
 - (2) the head of the college to which the Chair may be allocated by Council from time to time; or if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;
 - (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college;
 - (4)–(5) two persons appointed by Council;
 - (6)-(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board.
- 6. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 7. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund and the Professorship.

- 8. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 9. Regulations 1-4 and 6-11 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 10. Subject to regulation 11, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 11. Any amendment to regulation 3 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

(f) Establishment of the Ismene Fitch Endowment Fund

Explanatory Note

These regulations establish the Ismene Fitch Endowment Fund for the purpose of providing scholarships to graduate students of Wolfson College or St Antony's College who are ordinarily resident in Greece.

Text of Regulations

In Part 2 of Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning trusts, insert new §177 as follows, and renumber existing §§177–391 as §§178–3924:

- '§177. Ismene Fitch Endowment Fund
- 1. Upon receipt of a gift of approximately £150,000 from The Ismene Charitable Trust expected shortly after the making of this regulation, the University shall hold such sum as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as expendable endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Ismene Fitch Endowment Fund ("the Fund").
- 2. The University shall apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the Fund, towards providing scholarships to graduate

- students of Wolfson College or St Antony's College who are ordinarily resident in Greece.
- 3. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Board of Management of the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Fund.
- 4. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.
- 5. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund.
- 6. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.
- 7. Regulations 1–9 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.
- 8. Subject to regulation 9, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:
 - (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
 - (2) be outside the objects of the University.
- 9. Any amendment to regulation 2 is an amendment to the main objects of the Fund for the purposes of Part D of Statute XVI and must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by Her Majesty in Council.'

Planning and Resource Allocation Committee of Council

(a) Establishment of the Richard Doll Professorship of Epidemiology

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, establish a new Richard Doll Professorship of Epidemiology.

The Richard Doll Professorship of Epidemiology in the Nuffield Department of Population Health shall replace the ICRF Readership of Cancer Studies on the retirement of the present incumbent.

Text of Regulations

- 1. The University accepts with deep gratitude the endowment provided by Cancer Research UK for the establishment of a Cancer Research UK Readership in Cancer Studies Richard Doll Professorship of Epidemiology and for the provision of supporting expenditure for the readership professorship.
- 2. The reader professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in (2) of this clause is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council:
 - (2) the head of the college to which the Professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council under any regulation in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

- (3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in (2) of this clause;
- (4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;
- (6)-(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board;
- (10) a person holding a clinical appointment appointed by the relevant NHS body with which the post-holder will hold an honorary contract.
- 3. The reader professor shall engage in advanced study or research in the epidemiology of cancer or such other field of cancer studies as the Medical Sciences Board, after consultation with the Council of Cancer Research UK, shall determine, under the direction of a professor to be designated from time to time by the Medical Sciences Board. The reader professor shall give or hold such number of lectures or classes as the Medical Sciences Board shall determine.
- 4. Such part of the endowment as Council shall determine is not required to meet the costs of the readership professorship shall be applied to the provision of supporting expenditure for the reader professor in such manner as Council, after consultation with the Medical Sciences Board, shall direct.
- 5. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.
- <u>6.</u> Council shall have power, subject to the consent of the Council of Cancer Research UK, to amend this regulation, provided that the main object of the endowment, namely the establishment of a senior post in Cancer Studies and the provision of supporting expenditure, is always kept in view.'

(b) Dean Ireland's Professor of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture

Explanatory Note

A substantial donation was pledged in 2014 to endow the Dean Ireland's Professorship in the Exegesis of Holy Scripture. The proposed changes to the regulations acknowledge the original bequest and the recent pledge.

Text of Regulations

In Section III of Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, amend existing §150 as follows (new text underlined, deleted text scored through):

- 2. The Dean Ireland's Professor of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture shall lecture and give instruction in the Exegesis of the New Testament Scriptures.
- 2.3. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:
 - (1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the Warden of Keble College is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;
 - (2) the Warden of Keble College, or, if the Warden should be unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the Governing Body of Keble College on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;
 - (3) a person appointed by the Governing Body of Keble College;
 - (4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;
 - (6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or his or her nominee;
 - (7)-(9) three persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.
- 3.4. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the decree regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same decree regulations which are applicable to this chair.'

(c) Renaming of the Professorship of Orthopaedic Engineering

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Medical Sciences Division and the Nuffield Department of Orthopaedics, Rheumatology and Musculoskeletal Sciences, and the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division and the Department of Engineering Science, rename the Professor of Orthopaedic Engineering as the Professor of Biomaterials to better reflect the research domain of the post, and to fit better with nomenclature now used in medicine and biomedical engineering.

Professorial Distinction Awards

Between March and October 2013 a gathered field exercise was conducted to consider new or enhanced professorial distinction awards for statutory professors and readers. This was the first such exercise since the scheme was suspended in 2007.

Awards were made solely on the grounds of the perceived merit of the applications. More awards were made in the 2013 exercise than in 2007, which was largely the result of a higher success rate. The success rate was indistinguishable between women and men, and the average award given to women was higher by a small margin.

TRAINING FOR ADMISSIONS INTERVIEWING

The Oxford Learning Institute will offer the following training opportunities to those responsible for leading or assisting with undergraduate admissions interviewing in 2014.

- a tutored online course for those who expect to take a leading role in admissions interviewing will be available from 4 August to 5 December (with new enrolments being taken until 28 November);
- a non-tutored online course, for those assisting with admissions (eg graduate student 'helpers' or note-takers) and experienced tutors who need an update, will be available from 4 August to 19 December;
- an admissions interviewing practice sessions, for new interviewers who have completed the tutored online course, will take place on two half days (30 September and 21 November).

The collegiate University expects all those involved in interviewing candidates for admission to receive appropriate briefings on the process. The compulsory element of these briefings for new staff takes the form of an online course which takes about six hours to complete. New appointees may complete this online course before arriving in Oxford, if they wish to do so. The aim of the course is to show interviewers good practice in order to help them both to make better selections and to avoid claims of unfair treatment from disappointed candidates.

Practice interviews are also offered as an optional extra learning opportunity. To qualify to take part in practice interviews, participants must complete the online course by a deadline three weeks beforehand

We advise all teaching staff in colleges who have not been involved in interviewing, or have not previously taken this course, to ask senior colleagues whether they will be expected to interview this year and should

therefore enrol. Departmental teaching staff may also wish to seek advice from line managers or mentors on whether they are likely to be invited to become involved in admissions this year. Many who do not have a formal college association are nonetheless frequently invited to take part in college admissions processes because of their specific disciplinary expertise.

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Changes to Examination Regulations

Education Committee and Planning and Resource Allocation Committee

(1) REMOVAL FROM THE REGISTER OF STUDENTS FOLLOWING SUSPENSION FOR NON-PAYMENT OF FEES

Explanatory Note

The following change makes provision for students who have been suspended as a result of non-payment of University fees to be removed from the Register of Students two terms after the date on which the suspension was imposed. This period is intended to allow the student sufficient

time to resolve any financial difficulties that have arisen during their studies, whilst not being so long that a student is suspended indefinitely. It would also allow for an application to be made to the Fees Panel for relief from the suspension in exceptional circumstances. A student who paid their University fees in full during the two-term period would be able to return to their studies following the usual procedures for return to study after a period of suspension. In the case of taught-course students, it may be necessary for a further period of suspension, on a voluntary basis, if too much of the course has been missed. Students who are removed from the Register of Students and who wish to return to study would need to have paid outstanding University fees and would need to apply to Education Committee through their college for reinstatement.

Students who are currently suspended for non-payment of University tuition fees will be contacted and informed of this change in regulation. They will be given two terms from the date of notification of the sanction of removal from the Register of Students rather than two terms from the date of the original suspension in which to pay outstanding University fees.

Text of Regulations

With immediate effect

In *Examination Regulations* 2013, p1127, l14-19, as amended by *Gazette*, Vol 144, No 5056, 27 March 2014, amend as follows (deleted text scored through, new text underlined):

(b) In the event that any fee or continuation charge pavable by the student, or the relevant instalment towards such a fee, remains unpaid after the due date of payment it shall be the duty of the Bursar of the student's college, or the Registrar for programmes where fees or charges are usually paid directly to the University, or the Head of the student's department for programmes where fees or charges are usually paid directly to the department, to notify the student concerned that, in the event that the fees or charges due have not been paid in full within four weeks from the date of such notification, the student shall ordinarily be liable for suspension

from access to the premises and facilities of the University (including the Examination Schools and other places of examination). The student shall be informed that, apart from in exceptional circumstances, they will be suspended from the end of such fourweek period until such time as outstanding fees or charges have been paid, at which point they may apply for reinstatement, or until two terms have elapsed, at which point they will be removed from the Register of Students. The Bursar or Head shall also inform the Registrar that he or she has so notified the student concerned: and if the fees or charges due have not been paid in full within the specified four-week period, the Bursar or Head shall inform the Registrar of the position, whereupon, subject to the other provisions of this clause, the University shall have the right, having considered the circumstances of the case, forthwith to suspend the student concerned from access to the premises and facilities of the University. If the fees or charges due have not been paid in full within two terms of the date of any suspension imposed under this clause, the University shall have the right, having first considered the circumstances of the case, to remove the student from the Register of Students. A student may apply to Education Committee for reinstatement to the Register of Students. Any such reinstatement, which is not automatic, will be conditional upon payment of all outstanding fees.'

(2) REFUND OF FEES POLICY IN THE MATHEMATICAL INSTITUTE

Explanatory Note

The general arrangement in relation to refund of fees is that, if a student withdraws or suspends their status on or before Monday of Week 4 of any term, the fees payable in respect of that term will normally be reimbursed to the student. The regulations currently allow for different refund policies to apply in the Saïd Business School and in Continuing Education, in respect of programmes for which these departments, rather than the colleges, collect fees. The present change makes provision for the Mathematical Institute, also, to operate different refund policies: that department collects fees for certain

MScs, and for the MSc in Mathematical Finance in particular, which is a part-time, modular, two-year professional Master's course targeted at people working in international financial institutions, for which a high proportion of students are funded by City institutions. Education Committee and the Planning and Resource Allocation Committee have agreed that it is reasonable for special refund policies to apply.

Text of Regulations

With immediate effect

In *Examination Regulations* 2013, p1127, l120–26, as amended by *Gazette*, Vol 144, No 5056, 27 March 2014, substitute (new text underlined):

'(b) On application by their society, or by the Head of the student's department for programmes where fees are usually paid directly to the department, and subject to the approval of Council's Education Committee, some part of the fee for an academic year may subsequently be returned to those who do not work in Oxford as a result of suspension or withdrawal, for the whole of that year. The general rule agreed by Council is that, for each complete term not spent working in Oxford, one third of the annual fee shall be returned. In addition, if a student withdraws or suspends their status on or before Monday of Week 4 of any term the fees payable in respect of that term will generally be reimbursed to the student. Certain programmes which have been granted permission to charge non-refundable deposits and programmes within the Department for Continuing Education, the Mathematical Institute, and the Saïd Business School may operate different refund policies.'

(3) DOCTORAL TRAINING PROGRAMME IN CARDIOVASCULAR MEDICINAL CHEMISTRY

Explanatory Note

The following change makes provision for a new four-year doctoral training programme in Cardiovascular Medicinal Chemistry, which is funded by the British Heart Foundation, to charge fees for up to 12 terms. This is in line with the arrangements for other four-year doctoral progammes of this type.

Text of Regulations

With effect from 1 October 2014

1 In *Examination Regulations* 2013, p907, ll16-22, as amended by *Gazette*, Vol 144, No 5055, 20 March 2014, substitute (deleted text scored through, new text underlined):

'7. DOCTORAL TRAINING PROGRAMMES

1. Programmes covered by these regulations

These regulations shall apply to all research students registered on the following programmes, irrespective of the division or department they are based within for their research project:

- (i) Centres for Doctoral Training in: Autonomous Intelligent Machines and Systems; Biomedical Imaging; Cyber security; Diamond Science and Technology; Gas Turbine Aerodynamics; Healthcare Innovation; Industrially Focused Mathematical Modelling; New and Sustainable Photovoltaics; Oil and Gas; Partial Differential Equations: Analysis and Applications; Renewable Energy Marine Structures; Science and Application of Plastic Electronic Materials; Science and Technology of Fusion Energy; Statistical Science; Systems Approaches to Biomedical Science; Synthesis for Biology and Medicine; Synthetic Biology; and Theory and Modelling in Chemical Sciences;
- (ii) Doctoral Training Centres in: Life Sciences Interface; and Systems Biology;
- (iii) Doctoral Training Partnership in Environmental Research;
- (iv) Doctoral Training Partnership in Interdisciplinary Bioscience;
- (v) Students for the DPhil in Cardiovascular Medicinal Chemistry.

The programmes listed in (i), and (ii) and (v) shall be under the supervision of the Board of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division.'

'(d) the number of termly University fees payable by candidates registered for a DPhil through one of the following doctoral training programmes shall not exceed twelve: Autonomous Intelligent Machines and Systems; Cardiovascular Medicinal Chemistry; Cyber Security; Environmental Research; Healthcare Innovation; Industrially Focused Mathematical Modelling; Interdisciplinary Bioscience; Life Sciences Interface; New and Sustainable Photovoltaics: Oil and Gas: Partial Differential Equations: Analysis and Applications; Science and Technology of Fusion Energy; Synthesis for Biology and Medicine; Systems Approaches to Biomedical Science; Systems Biology;

(e) the number of termly University fees payable by candidates registered for a DPhil through one of the following doctoral training programmes shall not exceed twelve: Biomedical Imaging; Statistical Science; Synthetic Biology. Candidates registered for one of these doctoral training programmes, who are admitted by the University of Warwick, Bristol or Nottingham, and who hold the status of Probationer Research Student at Oxford shall not normally pay more than three termly University fees while at Oxford;

(f) the number of termly University fees payable by candidates registered for a DPhil through one of the following doctoral training programmes shall not exceed twelve: Diamond Science and Technology; Gas Turbine Aerodynamics; Renewable Energy Marine Structures; Science and Application of Plastic Electronic Materials. Candidates for these programmes may count towards this figure up to the equivalent of three termly University fees paid to the relevant partner university;

(g) the number of termly University fees payable by candidates registered for a DPhil through the doctoral training programme in Theory and Modelling in Chemical Sciences shall not exceed twelve. Candidates registered for a DPhil through this doctoral training programme may count up to three termly University fees paid while working for the MSc in Theoretical and Computational Chemistry towards this figure;'.

(4) ADDITIONAL COURSE COSTS

Explanatory Note

The following regulations make formal provision for additional charges to be made for fieldwork on certain courses, and for students to be required to keep statutory residence and pursue their studies in Oxford during extended terms in subjects where this is not already provided for. (ii) where the provisions of (i) are not satisfied but the chair of examiners is willing to consent.
