DENYER AND JOHNSON THEOLOGICAL SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Board of Theological Studies have appointed the following subjects of examination for the Denyer and Johnson Theological Scholarships in 1880:—

4. Church History. The History of the Ante-Nicene Church, to be studied in connexion with Eusebius, Books IV–VI, and the *Patres Apostolici* (ed. Funk).

5. Dr. W. H. Mill, *On the Mythical Interpretation of the Gospels*.

DAVIS CHINESE SCHOLARSHIP.

An Election to the Scholarship founded by Sir John Francis Davis, Bart., will be held in October. The Examination will begin on Tuesday, October 14, at 10 A.M., in the Schools.

The Scholarship is open to all Members of the University who, on the day of election, shall not have exceeded the twenty-eighth Term from their Matriculation.

Every Candidate must present a certificate of his Matriculation and also a certificate of the consent of the Head or Vicegerent of his College or Hall, or of the Censors of Students not attached to any College or Hall, to the Professor of Chinese, on or before October 13.

The subjects of examination will be the text of the first five Books of the Confucian Analects; the text and com-

mentary of the eleventh book of the Analects, and of the sixth book of Mencius; the eleventh chapter of St. John's Gospel and the Epistle to Philemon, in what is called "the Delegates' Version;" principles of composition in Chinese; and the history and topography of the Chinese Empire.

The Scholarship is of the annual value of £50, payable terminally, and tenable for two years from the day of election, provided that the Scholar shall keep a statutable residence of not less than seven weeks in each Term, Easter and Trinity Terms being reckoned as one, and shall pursue his studies in the Chinese language and literature under the advice and supervision of the Professor of Chinese, who shall report at the end of each Term to the Vice-Chancellor in writing whether the Scholar be worthy to receive his stipend. In case of illness or other urgent cause duly certified to and approved by the Electors, they have power to dispense with the residence of the Scholar.

In the event of an election being postponed because the Electors shall not think any of the Candidates worthy of the Scholarship, the Electors have power, if they think fit, to grant the stipend of £50, or any less sum, under the name of an Exhibition, to any person who shall be certified to them as desirous of pursuing the study of Chinese. They have power to make such grant with or without examination, and with or without giving public notice of their intention to do so. Every Exhibition so created shall be tenable during the period for which the election to the Scholarship shall have been postponed, and under the same conditions of residence and study as are applicable to the Scholarship.

TRAVELLING STUDENTSHIP IN ARCHÆOLOGY.

The University having accepted the offer made by a Fellow of All Souls' College of £300 yearly for three years, for the purpose of a Travelling Studentship in Archæology, the Board constituted to elect a Student give notice that they will proceed to such election in the month of January, 1880.

Candidates must be members of the University who have taken the degree of B.A., and have not exceeded the age of thirty years. They will be expected to produce evidence of adequate knowledge of the Greek and Latin languages, and of Ancient History and Literature, as well as of practical acquaintance with the elements of Archæology and Epigraphy. In case the Board thinks it expedient to examine Candidates in these subjects, due notice will be given of the time and place of examination. Candidates may also offer as optional subjects, Numismatics, Modern Greek, Turkish, or Freehand Drawing. It will be considered desirable that they should have some command of colloquial French.

Candidates must send in their applications on or before the 30th of November next, to the Vice-Provost of Oriel College. But all those who desire to offer themselves are recommended to communicate their intention *as soon as possible* to Mr. C. T. Newton, Keeper of the Greek and Roman Antiquities at the British Museum, who will be ready to give further information, and to afford facilities for practical study of Archæology and Epigraphy.

The Student elected will be required to reside during not less than nine months of each year at Athens, or at some other place in Greece, Italy, or the Levant (as the Board shall determine from time to time), and to occupy himself in study and research under their direction. He will be expected to

make periodical reports of his work in such manner as the Board shall prescribe. The tenure of the Studentship will depend upon the Board being satisfied with the reports so submitted to them, and generally with the industry and conduct of the Student.

BALLIOL COLLEGE.

In the month of November there will be the following elections at Balliol College:—

I. To THREE SCHOLARSHIPS, tenable for five years during residence, worth £80 a year (i.e. £55 and tuition free), open to all such candidates as shall not have completed their nineteenth year on the twenty-ninth day of November.

II. To THREE EXHIBITIONS, tenable for five years during residence, worth £70 a year, open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from their Matriculation. These Exhibitions are not tenable with a Scholarship, or with a Snell Exhibition.

The examination for these Scholarships and Exhibitions will begin on Friday morning, November 21, at Ten o'clock. Candidates who do not write verses have the option of original Composition in Greek or Latin; or they may offer some subject or subjects of Classical Literature for further examination: notice of such subjects to be sent to the Master for approval at least a month before the examination begins.

Candidates for these Scholarships and Exhibitions are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on the evening of Thursday, November 20, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools; also, for the Scholarships, certificates of the date of their birth; and for the Exhibitions (if Members of the University), certificates of their Matriculation.

III. To a SCHOLARSHIP on the foundation of Miss Hannah Brakenbury, "for the encouragement of the Study of Natural Science;" worth £80 a year (£55 and tuition free), tenable during residence for four years: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday, November 21, at Ten o'clock.

Papers will be set in the following subjects:—(1) Mechanical Philosophy and Physics; (2) Chemistry; (3) Physiology. But candidates will not be expected to offer themselves in more than two of these.

There will also be a Practical Examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention to the Master of Balliol *by letter*, on or before Friday, Nov. 14, enclosing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation; and stating the subjects in which they offer themselves for examination.

IV. To a SCHOLARSHIP on the foundation of Miss Hannah Brakenbury, "for the encouragement of the Study of Law and History;" worth £80 a year (£55 and tuition free), tenable during residence for four years: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday morning, November 14, at Ten o'clock.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention to the Master of Balliol *by letter*, on or before Friday, Nov. 7, enclosing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

Papers will be set in English History, and in Foreign History down to 1688. The knowledge required can be obtained from such standard books as the following:—

Papers will also be set to all candidates in Political Economy and in the first two Books of the *Institutes* of Justinian (with Sandars' Introduction), and in Maine's *Ancient Law*.

V. To a MATHEMATICAL SCHOLARSHIP, tenable during residence for four years; worth about £80 a year (£55 a year and free tuition): open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded four Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday, November 28, at Ten o'clock, and will comprise Pure Mathematics, including the Differential Calculus; and Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

Candidates are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 27, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VI. To TWO EXHIBITIONS, worth £40 a year; tenable during residence for four years; but not tenable with a Scholarship, or any other Exhibition of the College: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded one year from Matriculation.

The examination for these Exhibitions will comprise Pure Mathematics so far as to include Conic Sections; the Elements of Mechanics and Hydrostatics; translations from Greek and from Latin, and into Latin Prose; and English History.

Candidates may also offer, as optional subjects, any two of the following: viz. (1) a higher examination in Classics; (2) Moral Philosophy; (3) any of the higher branches of Pure and Mixed Mathematics; (4) the Elements of Physics, Chemistry, or Physiology; (5) some portion of Ancient History. This examination will begin on Saturday morning, November 28.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention *by letter* to the Master of Balliol on or before Tuesday,

November 25, mentioning any of the optional subjects which they may offer for examination; and enclosing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VII. A HEBREW SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £80 a year (£55 a year and tuition free), open to all such candidates as have not exceeded two years from their Matriculation, and is tenable during residence for three years, to be continued for a fourth if the Scholar study at a foreign University with the consent of the College. Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of Latin and Greek as is sufficient for the requirements of the University.

The examination will begin on Friday, November 21, at Ten o'clock. Candidates are requested to call upon the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 20, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges and Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation.

The examination papers will embrace Hebrew grammar, pointing, translation of English into Hebrew and Hebrew into English. Special questions will be set in the Hebrew Text of Genesis, 1 Kings, and Isaiah i-xxxix or xl-lxvi. Two at least of these books must be offered by the Candidates. Candidates are at liberty to offer either Chaldee and Syriac, or the elements of Arabic, as an extra subject.

The holders of any of the above Scholarships or Exhibitions will be allowed to reside either within or without the walls of the College. If resident within the College, they will be subject to the usual College payments: if residing out of College, they will pay to the College a deposit of £5, instead of £21, for Caution Money; and, yearly, a sum of £25 for Tuition, £1 for University Dues, £1 to the College Library, and 8s. for College Dues.

MERTON COLLEGE.

The following Case and Opinions are published for the information of Members of Convocation.

CASE CONCERNING DEGREES IN NATURAL SCIENCE FOR OPINION OF COUNSEL.

Of the origin and early growth of the University of Oxford nothing is known. Perhaps the first mention of it made by a contemporary writer is found in the Autobiography of Giraldus Cambrensis, who about the year 1187 publicly recited at Oxford his work called "*Topographia Hibernica*" by sections on three successive days, and on the second day entertained at a banquet "*doctores diversarum facultatum omnes et discipulos famæ majoris et notitiæ*," and on the third day "*reliquos Scholares cum militibus oppidanis et burgensibus multis*." (Girald. Cambr. de Rebus a se Gestis, ii. 16.)

Many Royal Charters or letters patent under the Great Seal of England are extant from the reign of Henry the Third downwards in favour of the University, in almost all of which the word "*Magistri*" is used to denote a constituent and important portion of the Academical Body. By an Act of Parliament passed in the thirteenth year of the reign of Elizabeth the University was formally incorporated by the name of "*The Chancellor Masters and Scholars of the University of Oxford*," and all liberties, privileges, and franchises theretofore granted by the Crown to the University were ratified and confirmed.

From early records and writings it is plain that the title "*Magister*" was not then limited, as in modern usage it is, to the higher Degree in the faculty of Arts, but was employed also in relation to the other faculties. It is plain too that the "*Chancellor and Masters*" were the Governing Body of the University.

The beginning of Degrees as distinctions in the University can no more be traced than the beginning of the University itself. About the year 1250 the University attempted by a statute of its own making to remedy abuses which had grown up in regard to some of them; and neither in the account of what was done on that occasion, nor (as is believed) in any other record or writing, is there any assertion or hint that the right of granting Degrees was originally conferred upon the University by any Sovereign or Pope or other external authority. In process of time they were recognised by the State, as when Acts of Parliament for restraining excess of apparel

made exceptions in favour of academical costume in respect of the wearing of silk or fur, or as when Graduates in Medicine were permitted to practise without being subject to further examination, or as when Doctors of Divinity were allowed to hold benefices in plurality.

Degrees have in former times been granted in Oxford to proficiency in single Arts, as in Grammar, Rhetoric, and the like; but such Degrees were never thought to be of much importance, and none of them remain except in Music. The Degrees of high value and of immemorial usage were those of Bachelor and Master or Doctor in Divinity, in Civil Law, in Canon Law, and in Medicine, and of Bachelor and Master in Arts; but no degree in Canon Law has been conferred since the year 1535. The Royal Statute or Mandate is extant by which Henry VIII in that year prohibited the reading of Lectures and the granting of Degrees in that faculty at Cambridge (Statt. Acad. Cantabr. in 4to. ed. 1785, p. 137); and it is highly probable, though no record of the fact appears to exist, that a similar prohibition was given at Oxford during the visitation of the University which was held in that same year. This appears to be the only instance of external interference with the granting of Degrees by the University, if we except those Acts of Parliament which formerly required the Oaths of Supremacy and of Allegiance to be taken by every one who was proceeding to a Degree. Degrees in the other faculties remain to the present day; and the Governing Body of the University, called in its Statutes "*Magna Congregatio sive Convocatio*" and commonly known as Convocation, consists now of Masters of Arts and Doctors of Civil Law, Medicine, and Divinity. That also was the constitution of the Governing Body when the Act of Incorporation was passed in the thirteenth year of Elizabeth, and likewise when the privilege of sending two Members to Parliament was conferred upon the University by King James the First.

There is now a proposal that the University should by Statute establish a new faculty under the name of "*The Faculty of Natural Science*," should grant Degrees of Bachelor and Master in that faculty, and should give to Masters of Natural Science all the rights and privileges which are now enjoyed by Masters of Arts, so making them Members of Convocation and thereby enabling them to vote for the Members sent to Parliament by the University.

It may be pertinent to observe that faculties corresponding to the proposed faculty already exist in other Universities.

For instance, in the new University of Strasburg there is a faculty of Mathematics and Natural Science; at Tübingen a faculty of Natural Science; at Dorpat a faculty of Physic and Mathematics: in the University of Dublin also a faculty of Engineering has recently been established, and the Degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred by the University of Durham.

You are requested to advise the Hebdomadal Council—

1. Whether the University is competent to add any new faculty to those which alone have been recognised in Oxford for many centuries and to grant Degrees therein.

2. Whether the University, if competent to institute a new faculty and to grant Degrees in it, is also competent to assign to any such new Degree all the rights which now belong to the Degree of Master of Arts.

Opinion on evidence required for determining the questions as to the power of the University to grant Degrees in new faculties and to assign to such new Degrees the rights formerly belonging to the older faculties.

As was arranged between Mr. Davey and myself at our Consultation on this matter, I have considered the nature of the evidence which should be procured on the part of the University for the purpose of determining the questions raised in this Case. I think that this evidence should consist in the first place of the various Charters and Statutes made under the authority of Letters Patent (as the Laudian Statutes) or under the authority of an Act of Parliament (including the recent Statutes by which the effect of the Laudian Statutes has been altered) by which the original constitution and powers of the University have been modified from time to time. (See the Cases and Opinions of Counsel mentioned in the Commissioners' Report of 1852, p. 5, and App. D, and the references there made to analyses of Charters granted to the University.) With special reference to the question concerning the Parliamentary Franchise the exact words of the Letters Patent of 1604 should be considered (and see references made in the same Report, App. D, to printed accounts of the dispute of 1759 as to a proposed Statute affecting the franchise). In the next place it is of the utmost importance for the determination of these questions that the best evidence should be procured of the ancient usage with respect to the granting of Degrees in Arts and in the separate Arts of Music, Grammar, Rhetoric, &c., and generally with regard to the constitution of the governing body, e.g. with regard to the privileges of "magistri," "magistri scholarum," "magistri artium," "magistri legum," "non-graduate teachers in grammar," Doctors of Music, &c. (See the recently published *Munimenta Academica* by Anstey, and the references to Degrees in single Arts in Wood's *Athenæ Oxonienses*, and to passages among the University Records cited by him as confirmatory of his statements; and see also among Wood's MSS. "Admissions to Degrees 1565-1690, Ashm. Lib. Wood MSS. 8506-8511; Admissiones ad informandum in gram-

matica et rhetorica 1508-1567, *ibid.* 8511; and *Nomina omnium inceptorum in quavis facultate 1502-1680, ibid.* 8476.) The nature of the usage will show what were the original powers of the Corporation so far as it has not been limited by modern enactments. Most of the evidence which I have mentioned is already published, and the whole of it can no doubt be readily procured. With a copy of the older Statutes a copy of all recent Statutes affecting the course of instruction in the University should be forwarded.

ADDITIONAL CASE CONCERNING DEGREES IN NATURAL SCIENCE.

An attempt to supply the evidence required by Mr. Elton on the Case respecting the proposed establishment of Degrees in Natural Science at Oxford.

1. **Charters.** Of the extant Charters (commonly so called), beginning from the reign of Henry III, not one seems to affect or modify in any way the constitution of the University or its power of making Statutes or Byelaws for its own governance. Most, if not all, of them are grants of privileges intended to protect gownsmen against extortion and wrong from the townspeople. The University is called in them "Universitas studentium Oxon.," "Magistri et Scholares Universitatis Oxon.," "Cancellarius et Universitas Oxon.," "Cancellarius et Scholares Universitatis Oxon.," "Cancellarius Magistri Scholares et Universitas," "Cancellarius Magistri et Scholares Universitatis Oxon."

2. **Laudian Code.** From the middle of the last century opinions were expressed from time to time by various persons that the Letters Patent of Charles I which were sent to the University together with the Laudian Code of Statutes, taken in combination with the Laudian Code, were in fact a Royal Charter, and that consequently the University had no power to alter or repeal any portion of the Laudian Statutes without the license of the Crown. A Charter however has been obtained from Her present Majesty, made on the 10th of July in the 20th year of her reign, whereby the University is empowered to alter or repeal any portion of those Statutes except only *Titulus XIII De Hebdomadali et Ordinario Conventu Præfectorum Collegiorum et Aularum.*

There is no printed or manuscript transcript of the Laudian Code in its original form clear of all addition or alteration. In 1768 was published for the first time a 4to. volume, entitled "*Corpus Statutorum Universitatis Oxoniensis*," a copy of which is sent herewith. The first 205 pages of this volume represent the Laudian Code; but they contain two notable additions to it, namely, at p. 61 the last sub-section of Tit. VII added after the completion of the Sheldonian Theatre in 1669, and at p. 115 "Sectio I" of Tit. X, which seems to have been passed about 1760 after the rejection of that statute to which Appendix D in the Commissioners' Report of 1852 relates. The volume contains an Appendix of 87 pages; and "Addenda" have been issued from time to time beginning in 1825.

With this is sent an 8vo. volume, "Statuta Universitatis Oxoniensis," containing those Statutes only which were in force at the date of its publication, October 1878.

3. **Letters patent of 1604.** A transcript is sent herewith.

4. **Magistri, &c.** A copy of Anstey's "Munimenta Academica" is sent herewith. It contains all the ancient Statutes of the University now extant, and extracts from University Registers to the reign of Henry VIII. The statements hereunder made are supported by references to Anstey's pages.

The title "Magister" was given to every person admitted to the highest degree in any faculty, "in quacunq[ue] facultate," not in Arts only, but in those also which are now commonly called "the higher faculties": pp. 382, 383; see also pp. 389 (for Theology), 398 (for Canon Law), 403 (for Civil Law), 406 (for Medicine). Every Magister was required to give instruction, "legere," in the subjects of his own faculty for a year or more after admission to his degree: p. 287. During that time he was said "regere scholam," and was styled Magister "Regens." Magistri who were not so engaged in giving instruction were styled "Non-Regentes." These words occur *passim* in Anstey's book, and remain to the present day. For certain purposes of the University there was and still is a Meeting of Regent Masters only, "Congregatio Magistrorum Regentium"; for other purposes there was, and still is, a Meeting of Regents and Non-Regents together, "Plena (or Magna) Congregatio [now called Convocatio] Magistrorum Regentium et Non-Regentium": p. 117, and *passim*. It was, and is, to this latter Meeting (Convocation) that the making of Statutes and the final decision of all important questions belonged: this was, and is, the governing body of the University. Each of these Meetings, both the smaller and the larger, consisted of Masters of the five faculties already named, and of those only, namely, Theology, Canon Law, Civil Law, Medicine, and Arts: compare pp. 479, 234 and 235, 482.

The faculty of Arts had at one time a privilege, which has long ceased, the right of being consulted by itself, apart from the other faculties, upon matters which were afterwards to be considered in full Convocation: pp. 117, 331, 491. But the "Artistae" so convened were "Magistri artium liberalium," not Masters of one Art only; p. 128: they were Masters of the seven liberal arts or sciences and three philosophies (pp. 327, 390), and were qualified and required to teach the same, namely, Grammar, Rhetoric, Logic, Arithmetic, Music, Geometry, Astronomy, Natural Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Metaphysical Philosophy: pp. 285-8. It is to be noted that one of the ten subjects which constitute the faculty of Arts is Natural Philosophy.

From a time earlier than the year 1306 two Masters of Arts were elected every year to be "scholis grammaticalibus superintendentes," and acquired the name of "Magistri scholarum grammaticalium": pp. 85, 86, 485.

Masters in Grammar were not Members of the governing body of the University; were first examined by one Doctor and four Masters of Arts, and then licensed by the Chancellor

to teach; and were bound to obey the two Masters of Arts last mentioned, who were appointed yearly "ad regulandas scholas grammaticales:" pp. 436-442. They ranked with Bachelors: p. 264.

Masters in Rhetoric and Graduates in Music are not mentioned in Anstey's volumes. They never were Members of the governing body of the University. Wood's MSS. "Admissions to Degrees" &c. are only lists of persons admitted to the several Degrees with dates of the admissions taken from the Registers in which such admissions are recorded; and the Registers themselves record simply the admissions of the individuals, saying nothing of their subsequent status.

Further Opinion.

I have perused the further evidence submitted to me on the part of the University, and I am of opinion as follows:—

1. That the University is a Corporation by prescription to which appertains the power of making new Statutes or Byelaws respecting academical matters according to the methods which have hitherto been used for making the existing Statutes or Byelaws.

2. That the University has power to institute a new "faculty" in the sense of a new department of learning (see Munim. Acad. p. 287, "facultates seu scientias"), and this whether the new department has or has not hitherto been included in the "faculty of Arts;" and also has power to grant Degrees in such new faculty similar in "style" to the ancient Degrees, and that the proposed "style" or title of Bachelors and Masters of Natural Science might properly be adopted.

3. That the Governing Body of the Corporation, besides its head and certain officers who need not be mentioned separately, consists of several ancient members, or "bodies of graduates," called Faculties in another sense of that word, their status, powers, and priorities being regulated partly by statute and partly by ancient custom having the force of a statute and being supposed to represent the provisions of the original charter according to the meaning of the "founder's mind." (See Muniment. Academ. pp. 238, 321, 331, 429, 490.)

4. That the Faculty of Arts, in the latter sense of the word "faculty," consists of a class of graduates who represent and retain the status of an ancient class of persons who were once qualified and compelled to teach certain subjects, including Natural Science: and that any of those subjects might be erected into a separate faculty, as has been done at different times with grammar, rhetoric, music, and poetry, but that such separate faculty would not have and could not be given the status and qualities which belong to the ancient faculty of arts, of which the duties and qualifications have become gradually altered by lapse of time. A legal anachronism can only be effected by the authority of Parliament, being, according to a well-known maxim, "beyond the compass of the king's prerogative," and beyond the powers of any private person: for instance, the maxim applies to the creation of a copyhold, which is supposed to have actually grown out of villeinage; to

the creation of a new court, for all courts are supposed to have existed from time immemorial, excepting those which have been created by known Acts of Parliament; to the creation of a burgage-tenure by royal charter in land which is known to be outside the historical limits of an ancient borough; and to the like creation of a tenure with the qualities of Ancient Demesne in land which is historically known not to have been in the king's possession at the date of the Domesday Survey.

5. That (apart from the question whether the status of a Master of Arts could be given to the Master of one art or of one philosophy) the admission of a completely new Faculty (in the sense of a body of graduates of a particular kind) into the governing body of the corporation would be an alteration of the constitution of the corporation which cannot be done by means of a byelaw. The nearest approach to allowing corporations to make alterations of their constitution or to change the relations of their "definite integral parts," such as are the Faculties in the case of this Governing Body, was made by the Case of Corporations, 4 Co. 77 b, see *Rex v. Spencer*, 3 Burr. 1833; but the Courts will not extend the principle or enlarge the precedent, see *Rex v. Tunwell*, 3 Doug. 207.

6. That, inasmuch as the status of the ancient body of Masters of Arts cannot now be imitated or altered and the mutual relations of the constituent parts of the Governing Body cannot be unsettled by means of a new statute or byelaw, the nearest approach to the proposed measure which could be recommended to the University would be the enactment of a new Statute creating the new faculty of Natural Science and new Degrees in that faculty, and providing that such new Degrees should only be conferred on persons who had already become Masters of Arts.

Opinion.

I am of opinion that the University may create a new Faculty or (to speak more accurately) may sever one of the sciences or philosophies anciently comprised in the Faculty of Arts (such as Natural Philosophy) from that Faculty and make it into a new Faculty and grant Degrees therein, as was formerly done in the case of Grammar, Rhetoric, and Music. But I am of opinion that the graduates in such new faculty would not be members of Convocation, and that the University has no power to confer upon them the rights which now belong to Masters of Arts whether by prescription or statute.

The University (prior to its incorporation by 13 Eliz. c. 29) was an ancient Corporation by prescription, and Convocation is by prescription the Governing Body of the Corporation. The constitution of Convocation appears to have remained unaltered in form from the earliest times of which there is any record, except by the suppression of the Faculty of Canon Law, and must therefore be deemed to have been fixed before the time of legal memory. It is spoken of throughout the Books of the Chancellor and Proctors (which are reprinted in the *Munimenta Academica*) as an ancient body with customary rights and privileges. And it may be remarked that the Faculty of Arts in particular enjoyed the privilege that every grace must be submitted to that Faculty before being proposed in Convocation (see *Munim. Acad.* p. 332), though there seems to have been some doubt whether it was necessary that the *Artistæ* should first approve the grace (cf. *Munim. Acad.* pp. 148, 429). The *Laudian Code* (which I assume to have had the force of a Royal Charter) treats Convocation as the existing ancient Governing Body of the University: "*Statutum est ut in Convocatione Doctorum Magistrorum Regentium et non Regentium (prout de antiquo fieri consuevit) de majoribus negotiis ac totum Universitatis corpus tangentibus deliberetur et determinetur.*" (*Tit. X. Sect. II. ed. 1768.*) The rest of the title relates to procedure. *Tit. X. Sect. I.* was added in 1760, and seems to have been only declaratory for the purpose of settling internal disputes. None of the Acts of Parliament passed during the present reign respecting the University appear to affect the question except so far forth as they contain a saving of the powers of Convocation (see ex. gr. 17 and 18 Vict. c. 81, s. 22).

Under these circumstances I am of opinion that Convocation cannot under its power of making Statutes for the government of the University alter its own ancient constitution, or extend to a new class of Corporators the privileges enjoyed by the Graduates of the ancient Faculties as Members of Convocation.

I may observe that the University, having always exercised the right (as a matter of internal government) of fixing and varying the conditions upon which the Degrees in the ancient Faculties shall be granted, might (I think) by Statute provide that the Degree of M.A. should be conferred on any person obtaining the corresponding Degree in the proposed new Faculty.

TRAVELLING STUDENTSHIP IN ARCHÆOLOGY.

The University having accepted the offer made by a Fellow of All Souls' College of £300 yearly for three years, for the purpose of a Travelling Studentship in Archæology, the Board constituted to elect a Student give notice that they will proceed to such election in the month of January, 1880.

He will be expected to make periodical reports of his work in such manner as the Board shall prescribe. The tenure of the Studentship will depend upon the Board being satisfied with the reports so submitted to them, and generally with the industry and conduct of the Student.

Papers will be set in the following subjects:—(1) Mechanical Philosophy and Physics; (2) Chemistry; (3) Physiology. But candidates will not be expected to offer themselves in more than two of these.

The following is the form of Statute to which the foregoing amendments refer:—

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—*On Affiliated Colleges.*

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute *De Examinazione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis* shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate

or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges, and they shall be authorised to grant Certificates, or, if a Joint Board be constituted, to concur in granting Certificates, to students in such Colleges who shall have been examined under their direction.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such Affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and shall be deemed to have kept Statutable Residence and to have employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for four Terms before the Term in which he shall have been matriculated, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of Members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

II. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. B. § 2, cl. 2 (p. 79, ed. 1878), at the end of the clause there shall be added the words—

"or that he has completed a course of three years and has obtained honours in the Second (or final) Examination at a College admitted under the provisions of the Statute on Affiliated Colleges."

TRAVELLING STUDENTSHIP IN ARCHÆOLOGY.

Repeated Notice.

The University having accepted the offer made by a Fellow of All Souls' College of £300 yearly for three years, for the purpose of a Travelling Studentship in Archæology, the Board constituted to elect a Student give notice that they will proceed to such election in the month of January, 1880.

Candidates must be members of the University who have taken the degree of B.A., and have not exceeded the age of thirty years. They will be expected to produce evidence of adequate knowledge of the Greek and Latin languages, and of Ancient History and Literature, as well as of practical acquaintance with the elements of Archæology and Epigraphy. In case the Board thinks it expedient to examine Candidates in these subjects, due notice will be given of the time and place of examination. Candidates may also offer as optional subjects, Numismatics, Modern Greek, Turkish, or Freehand Drawing. It will be considered desirable that they should have some command of colloquial French.

Candidates must send in their applications on or before the 30th of November next, to the Vice-Provost of Oriel College. But all those who desire to offer themselves are recommended to communicate their intention *as soon as possible* to Mr. C. T. Newton, Keeper of the Greek and Roman Antiquities at the British Museum, who will be ready to give further information, and to afford facilities for practical study of Archæology and Epigraphy.

The Student elected will be required to reside during not less than nine months of each year at Athens, or at some other place in Greece, Italy, or the Levant (as the Board shall determine from time to time), and to occupy himself in study and research under their direction. He will be expected to make periodical reports of his work in such manner as the Board shall prescribe. The tenure of the Studentship will depend upon the Board being satisfied with the reports so submitted to them, and generally with the industry and conduct of the Student.

This examination will begin on Friday, November 28, at Ten o'clock, and will comprise Pure Mathematics, including the Differential Calculus; and Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

Candidates are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 27, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VI. To TWO EXHIBITIONS, worth £40 a year; tenable during residence for four years; but not tenable with a Scholarship, or any other Exhibition of the College: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded one year from Matriculation.

The examination for these Exhibitions will comprise Pure Mathematics so far as to include Conic Sections; the Elements of Mechanics and Hydrostatics; translations from Greek and from Latin, and into Latin Prose; and English History.

Candidates may also offer, as optional subjects, any two of the following: viz. (1) a higher examination in Classics; (2) Moral Philosophy; (3) any of the higher branches of Pure and Mixed Mathematics; (4) the Elements of Physics, Chemistry, or Physiology; (5) some portion of Ancient History. This examination will begin on Saturday morning, November 28.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention *by letter* to the Master of Balliol on or before Tuesday, November 25, mentioning any of the optional subjects which they may offer for examination; and enclosing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VII. A HEBREW SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £80 a year (£55 a year and tuition free), open to all such candidates as have not exceeded two years from their Matriculation, and is tenable during residence for three years, to be continued for a fourth if the Scholar study at a foreign University with the consent of the College. Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of Latin and Greek as is sufficient for the requirements of the University.

The examination will begin on Friday, November 21, at Ten o'clock. Candidates are requested to call upon the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 20, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges and Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation.

The examination papers will embrace Hebrew grammar, pointing, translation of English into Hebrew and Hebrew into English. Special questions will be set in the Hebrew Text of Genesis, 1 Kings, and Isaiah i-xxxix or xl-lxvi. Two at least of these books must be offered by the Candidates. Candidates are at liberty to offer either Chaldee and Syriac, or the elements of Arabic, as an extra subject.

The holders of any of the above Scholarships or Exhibitions will be allowed to reside either within or without the walls of the College. If resident within the College, they will be subject to the usual College payments: if residing out of College, they will pay to the College a deposit of £5, instead of £21, for Caution Money; and, yearly, a sum of £25 for Tuition, £1 for University Dues, £1 to the College Library, and 8s. for College Dues.

IN PREPARATION.

A DICTIONARY OF THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE, founded mainly on the materials collected by the Philological Society. Edited by DR. J. A. H. MURRAY, President of the Philological Society. In 4 vols., large 4to.

The materials upon which this Dictionary will be founded have been in course of collection by the Philological Society for more than twenty years. Since these materials were made over to the Clarendon Press for the completion and publication of the Dictionary, an Appeal has been made for a renewal of the volunteer help formerly given in reading and extracting books for the illustrative quotations. In response to this Appeal about five hundred Readers in England and America are already giving their assistance, and further help is wanted. Many of the earliest printed books—those of Caxton and his successors—are still to be read, and much remains to be done in more recent periods, especially in the Dramatic literature of the early 18th and later 17th centuries. But the works which are now of greatest importance are early treatises in any of the Sciences, which may show the first appearance of scientific words.

The Dictionary is intended to illustrate fully the history of

all English words that have been in use since 1100, to give their first appearance in the language, the changes both of form and meaning which they have undergone since, and the date of the last use of words now obsolete,—for all which purposes illustrative quotations are needed. Any one can help, especially with modern books. For books before the present century it is important to read the first or early editions to get the author's spelling, which is of course part of the history of the language; and here those who have access to the University Libraries can help greatly.

BALLIOL COLLEGE.

In the month of November there will be the following elections at Balliol College:—

I. To THREE SCHOLARSHIPS, tenable for five years during residence, worth £80 a year (i.e. £55 and tuition free), open to all such candidates as shall not have completed their nineteenth year on the twenty-ninth day of November.

II. To THREE EXHIBITIONS, tenable for five years during residence, worth £70 a year, open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from their Matriculation. These Exhibitions are not tenable with a Scholarship, or with a Snell Exhibition.

The examination for these Scholarships and Exhibitions will begin on Friday morning, November 21, at Ten o'clock. Candidates who do not write verses have the option of original Composition in Greek or Latin; or they may offer some subject or subjects of Classical Literature for further examination: notice of such subjects to be sent to the Master for approval at least a month before the examination begins.

Candidates for these Scholarships and Exhibitions are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on the evening of Thursday, November 20, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools; also, for the Scholarships, certificates of the date of their birth; and for the Exhibitions (if Members of the University), certificates of their Matriculation.

III. To a SCHOLARSHIP on the foundation of Miss Hannah Brakenbury, "for the encouragement of the Study of Natural

Science;" worth £80 a year (£55 and tuition free), tenable during residence for four years: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday, November 21, at Ten o'clock.

Papers will be set in the following subjects:—(1) Mechanical Philosophy and Physics; (2) Chemistry; (3) Physiology. But candidates will not be expected to offer themselves in more than two of these.

There will also be a Practical Examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention to the Master of Balliol *by letter*, on or before Friday, Nov. 14, enclosing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation; and stating the subjects in which they offer themselves for examination.

IV. To a SCHOLARSHIP on the foundation of Miss Hannah Brakenbury, "for the encouragement of the Study of Law and History;" worth £80 a year (£55 and tuition free), tenable during residence for four years: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday morning, November 14, at Ten o'clock.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention to the Master of Balliol *by letter*, on or before Friday, Nov. 7, enclosing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

Papers will be set in English History, and in Foreign History down to 1688. The knowledge required can be obtained from such standard books as the following:—

Papers will also be set to all candidates in Political Economy and in the first two Books of the *Institutes* of Justinian (with Sanders' Introduction), and in Maine's *Ancient Law*.

V. To a MATHEMATICAL SCHOLARSHIP, tenable during residence for four years; worth about £80 a year (£55 a year and free tuition): open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded four Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday, November 28, at Ten o'clock, and will comprise Pure Mathematics, including the Differential Calculus; and Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

Candidates are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 27, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VI. To TWO EXHIBITIONS, worth £40 a year; tenable during residence for four years; but not tenable with a Scholarship, or any other Exhibition of the College: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded one year from Matriculation.

The examination for these Exhibitions will comprise Pure Mathematics so far as to include Conic Sections; the Elements of Mechanics and Hydrostatics; translations from Greek and from Latin, and into Latin Prose; and English History.

Candidates may also offer, as optional subjects, any two of the following: viz. (1) a higher examination in Classics; (2) Moral Philosophy; (3) any of the higher branches of Pure and

Mixed Mathematics; (4) the Elements of Physics, Chemistry, or Physiology; (5) some portion of Ancient History. This examination will begin on Saturday morning, November 28.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention *by letter* to the Master of Balliol on or before Tuesday, November 25, mentioning any of the optional subjects which they may offer for examination; and enclosing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VII. A HEBREW SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £80 a year (£55 a year and tuition free), open to all such candidates as have not exceeded two years from their Matriculation, and is tenable during residence for three years, to be continued for a fourth if the Scholar study at a foreign University with the consent of the College. Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of Latin and Greek as is sufficient for the requirements of the University.

The examination will begin on Friday, November 21, at Ten o'clock. Candidates are requested to call upon the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 20, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges and Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation.

The examination papers will embrace Hebrew grammar, pointing, translation of English into Hebrew and Hebrew into English. Special questions will be set in the Hebrew Text of Genesis, 1 Kings, and Isaiah i-xxxix or xl-lxvi. Two at least of these books must be offered by the Candidates. Candidates are at liberty to offer either Chaldee and Syriac, or the elements of Arabic, as an extra subject.

The holders of any of the above Scholarships or Exhibitions will be allowed to reside either within or without the walls of the College. If resident within the College, they will be subject to the usual College payments: if residing out of College, they will pay to the College a deposit of £5, instead of £21, for Caution Money; and, yearly, a sum of £25 for Tuition, £1 for University Dues, £1 to the College Library, and 8s. for College Dues.

3. ONE BIBLE CLERKSHIP, tenable for three years (which period may be extended by the College to four years), of the annual value (including allowances) of about £110, open to Candidates who shall have satisfied the Vice-Provost of their need of support at the University. The person elected will be required to enter upon his duties at the beginning of Lent Term, 1880.

4. TWO EXHIBITIONS on the Duke of Beaufort's Foundation, open *pro hac vice* to competition among natives of the counties of Gloucester, Monmouth, and Glamorgan. These Exhibitions are of the value of about £25 a year, and are tenable for seven years during residence.

Candidates are to call on the Vice-Provost on Saturday, November 29, bringing with them testimonials of good character and proof of their time of birth; and, if members of the University, proof of standing.

It has been arranged that Candidates for this Scholarship, &c. at Oriel College shall be examined at the same time and in the same papers as the Candidates for Classical Scholarships at Wadham College. and in the election to one of the Scholarships much weight will be given to proficiency in that branch of knowledge.

In case of Candidates of sufficient attainments not presenting themselves for Scholarships 4, 5, 7, such Scholarship may be filled up from among the Candidates for the open Scholarships.

Any of the Scholarships 4, 5, 6, 7 may be awarded for proficiency either in Classics or in Mathematics. Candidates in Mathematics will be required to exhibit such Classical knowledge as will give reasonable promise of their passing the University Examinations in due course.

Candidates (except such as are qualified under the limitations for Scholarship 4) if members of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, or London, must not have exceeded two years from their Matriculation. There is no limit of age for any of the Scholarships, but married persons are not eligible.

The examination will begin on Tuesday, November 11. Candidates are requested to call on the Principal, with testimonials of good conduct from their respective Schools or Colleges, on Monday, November 10, between 8 and 10 P.M.

KEBLE COLLEGE.

There will be an Election in this College on Saturday, December 13, to the following Scholarships :—

TWO CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIPS, on the Field-Marshal Gomm Foundation, of the value of £80 per annum, tenable for four years.

ONE CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £60 per annum, tenable for four years.

ONE MATHEMATICAL SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £80 per annum, tenable for four years.

The College reserves the power of giving one of the Classical Scholarships for Mathematics, or the Mathematical Scholarship for Classics, failing Candidates of sufficient excellence in the subjects for which the Scholarships are primarily offered.

By the Will of Lady Gomm preference is to be given in the case of the Gomm Scholarships to Candidates who are related to the Marquis of Lothian, and who reach the standard ordinarily required for Matriculation at Keble College. In case one of these Scholarships should be obtained by any such Candidate, a third Gomm Scholarship of £80 for four years will be given.

The competition will be open to all persons not members of the University, and to such members of Keble College and to such Students Unattached as have not exceeded one year from the Term of their Matriculation, and to any members of the University who have not exceeded one Term from their Matriculation. But no Candidate will be allowed to hold a Scholarship when out of residence, except by permission of the College; unless he shall be a Bachelor of Arts of the College.

No Candidate will be eligible who, on December 12, 1879, shall have exceeded the age of twenty years.

Pass papers of the Responsions standard will be set in Mathematics to Candidates for the Classical Scholarships, and in Classics to Candidates for the Mathematical Scholarships.

A paper of miscellaneous Historical Questions in Ancient and Modern History will be offered to Candidates for the Classical Scholarships as an alternative for Verse Composition.

Candidates who may distinguish themselves in the examination, besides the Scholars, will be offered admission in October, 1880, as Commoners, without being required to pass the ordinary Matriculation examination.

The examination will commence on Tuesday, December 9, and Candidates are requested to call on the Warden after 4 P.M. on the previous day.

The necessary College expenses, against which the amount of the Scholarships is to be set, are £81 per annum. CLAUSES OF THE PROPOSED FORM OF STATUTE TO WHICH
THE AMENDMENTS REFER.

§ 2. *How many years passed in the study of Natural Science and what exercises are required for the Degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.*

1. Any Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science may supplicate for the Degree of Bachelor in that Faculty so soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Natural Science and in hearing lectures for twelve Terms and shall have passed three Examinations, namely Responsions and the First and Second Public Examinations, at the several times and subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth.

2. No Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science shall be required to pass Responsions who has passed the Previous Examination at Cambridge, or has satisfied the Examiners appointed under the authority of the Delegates of the Examination of Schools in Greek and in Latin and in Elementary Mathematics or in two of the following languages, Greek, Latin, French, German (one of such languages being either Greek or Latin), and in Elementary and Additional Mathematics, or has obtained a Certificate from the Delegates under the Statute De Examineatione Candidatorum qui non sunt de corpore Universitatis that he has shown sufficient merit to be excused from Responsions.

§ 3. *Of Responsions.*

1. Any Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science shall be permitted to offer himself for examination by the Masters of the Schools at any time of holding Responsions provided that his name shall have been duly given in to the Junior Proctor, and every Candidate so offering himself shall be examined in the same manner as Scholars in the Faculty of Arts, except in so far as it is otherwise provided by this section of the Statutes.

2. The subjects of examination of Scholars in the Faculty of Natural Science shall be the Greek, Latin, French, and German languages, Arithmetic, Algebra, and Geometry.

Candidates who offer the French language shall be examined therein in such manner as to test especially their knowledge of the grammar of that language. They shall be required to offer some book or books in the French language, and to show a competent knowledge both of the text and of the contents of such book or books. They shall also be required to translate passages from French authors not specially offered by them.

Candidates who offer the German language shall be examined therein in such manner as to test especially their knowledge of the grammar of that language. They shall be required to offer some book or books in the German language, and to show a competent knowledge both of the text and of the contents of such book or books. They shall also be required to translate passages from German authors not specially offered by them.

Every Candidate shall also be examined in Arithmetic, in the Elements of Plane Geometry, including the doctrine of similar triangles, and in Algebra as far as the Binomial Theorem inclusively.

4. The Board of Studies for Responsions shall have power to regulate the amount of each subject which shall be required of Candidates admitted to examination as Scholars in the Faculty of Natural Science, and shall from time to time publish lists of books in the French and German languages which may be offered by such Candidates.

5. The Masters of the Schools may request other persons selected by them and approved by the Vice-Chancellor to act as Assessors with them in the examination of Candidates. The persons so acting as Assessors shall be subject to such of the provisions of *Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. 1. E. § 6* as shall be applicable to them.

§ 4. *Of the First Public Examination.*

1. Any Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science who has satisfied the Masters of the Schools either in the manner required by the provisions of this Section or in the manner required by the provisions of Section II of this Statute, or who has passed any examination which is allowed by the provisions of either of these Sections to excuse from Responsions, shall, if he has attained the fourth Term from his Matriculation, be permitted to offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination, provided that his name shall have been duly given in to the Junior Proctor: and every Candidate so offering himself shall be examined in the same manner as Scholars in the Faculty of Arts, excepting in so far as it is otherwise provided by this Section.

2. The subjects of examination of Scholars in the Faculty of Natural Science shall be the Holy Gospels, Greek, Latin, French, and German literature, Algebra, Geometry, and Mechanics.

3. Candidates shall be examined in—

(a) Three books, either being books which might be offered under the provisions of *Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. 1. B. § 1, cl. 6* by any Candidate not seeking Honours, or one of them at least being a book which might be part of the books so offered, and one at least being some portion either of a French or of a German author.

(b) Algebra: the Theory and Use of Logarithms; the Elements of Plane Geometry, including the doctrine of Similar Triangles: Trigonometry as far as the solution of Plane Triangles inclusively; the Elements of Plane Co-ordinate Geometry; and the Mechanics of solid and fluid bodies, treated by elementary methods.

4. Candidates who offer any portion of a French or of a German author shall be required to show a competent knowledge both of the text and of the contents of the book or books which they offer, and to answer not only questions relating to Grammar and Literature, but also any questions directly arising out of the matters treated of in such book or books.

But any Candidate who shall either not appear for examination in the first Term in which he is of sufficient standing to do so, or shall fail to satisfy the Moderators, as the case may be, shall be permitted to offer at any future Examination the same books and subjects which he then offered or might have offered.

The Moderators appointed for the examination of Candidates who do not seek Honours may request other persons, selected by them and approved by the Vice-Chancellor, to act as Assessors with them in the examination of Candidates in the French and German languages. The value of the Scholarships, including the use of rooms rent free, is £80 a year. They are tenable for five years, but only on the condition of residence, and of the Scholar going through the whole course of study required by the University or the College.

The Warden and Fellows have the power to give Exhibitions of £30 or £40 a year, tenable for three years on the same conditions, to Candidates who do well in the examination.

Candidates are requested to call on the Warden on Saturday, November 29, at 4 P.M., bringing testimonials of good conduct, and certificates of the date of their birth. The examination will begin in the College Hall on Monday, December 1, at 9 A.M.

It has been arranged that Candidates for these Scholarships shall be examined at the same time and in the same papers as the Candidates for the Scholarship and Exhibitions at Oriel College. Each Candidate will be considered as standing in the first instance at the College at which he has put down his name, and, unless he has then given notice to the contrary, will be regarded as standing at the other College also.

The materials upon which this Dictionary will be founded have been in course of collection by the Philological Society for more than twenty years. Since these materials were made over to the Clarendon Press for the completion and publication of the Dictionary, an Appeal has been made for a renewal of the volunteer help formerly given in reading and extracting books for the illustrative quotations. In response to this Appeal about five hundred Readers in England and America are already giving their assistance, and further help is wanted. III. Congregation of the University.

Amended Statute.

In a CONGREGATION holden on Tuesday, October 28, the following form of Statute was amended.

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges.

They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such Affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have passed that Examination with Honours in Greek and Latin Literature, or shall have passed that Examination and obtained Honours in the same Term in Mathematics, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and shall be deemed to have kept Statutable Residence and to have employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for four Terms before the Term in which he shall have been matriculated, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of Members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

II. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. B. § 2, cl. 2 (p. 79, ed. 1878), at the end of the clause there shall be added the words—

“or that he has completed a course of three years and has obtained honours in the Second (or final) Examination at a College admitted under the provisions of the Statute on Affiliated Colleges.”

§ 2. *How many years passed in the study of Natural Science and what exercises are required for the Degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.*

1. Any Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science may supplicate for the Degree of Bachelor in that Faculty so soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Natural Science and in hearing lectures for twelve Terms and shall have passed three Examinations, namely Responsions and the First and Second Public Examinations, at the several times and subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth.

2. No Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science shall be required to pass Responsions who has passed the Previous Examination at Cambridge, or has satisfied the Examiners appointed under the authority of the Delegates of the Examination of Schools in Greek and in Latin and in Elementary Mathematics or in two of the following languages, Greek, Latin, French, German (one of such languages being either Greek or Latin), and in Elementary and Additional Mathematics, or has obtained a Certificate from the Delegates under the Statute De Examineatione Candidatorum qui non sunt de corpore Universitatis that he has shown sufficient merit to be excused from Responsions.

§ 3. *Of Responsions.*

1. Any Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science shall be permitted to offer himself for examination by the Masters of the Schools at any time of holding Responsions provided that his name shall have been duly given in to the Junior Proctor, and every Candidate so offering himself shall be examined in the same manner as Scholars in the Faculty of Arts, except in so far as it is otherwise provided by this section of the Statutes.

2. The subjects of examination of Scholars in the Faculty of Natural Science shall be the Greek, Latin, French, and German languages, Arithmetic, Algebra, and Geometry.

Every Candidate shall also be examined in Arithmetic, in the Elements of Plane Geometry, including the doctrine of similar triangles, and in Algebra as far as the Binomial Theorem inclusively.

4. The Board of Studies for Responsions shall have power to regulate the amount of each subject which shall be required of Candidates admitted to examination as Scholars in the Faculty of Natural Science, and shall from time to time publish lists of books in the French and German languages which may be offered by such Candidates.

5. The Masters of the Schools may request other persons selected by them and approved by the Vice-Chancellor to act as Assessors with them in the examination of Candidates. The persons so acting as Assessors shall be subject to such of the provisions of *Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. 1. E. § 6* as shall be applicable to them.

(b) Algebra: the Theory and Use of Logarithms; the Elements of Plane Geometry, including the doctrine of Similar Triangles; Trigonometry as far as the solution of Plane Triangles inclusively; the Elements of Plane Co-ordinate Geometry; and the Mechanics of solid and fluid bodies, treated by elementary methods.

4. Candidates who offer any portion of a French or of a German author shall be required to show a competent knowledge both of the text and of the contents of the book or books which they offer, and to answer not only questions relating to Grammar and Literature, but also any questions directly arising out of the matters treated of in such book or books.

Candidates who offer a French book or books shall be required to translate from English into French, and also to translate passages from French authors not specially offered by them.

They shall specify, where necessary, whether the whole, and if not the whole what portion, of each author or subject shall be offered as a book or subject.

But any Candidate who shall either not appear for examination in the first Term in which he is of sufficient standing to do so, or shall fail to satisfy the Moderators, as the case may be, shall be permitted to offer at any future Examination the same books and subjects which he then offered or might have offered.

9. The Moderators appointed for the examination of Candidates who do not seek Honours may request other persons, selected by them and approved by the Vice-Chancellor, to act as Assessors with them in the examination of Candidates in the French and German languages. The persons so acting as Assessors shall be subject to such of the provisions of Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. 1. E. § 6 as shall be applicable to them.

The Certificates granted to Candidates who shall have satisfied the Moderators in the manner required by the provisions of this Section shall be signed by two of the Moderators appointed to examine in Greek and Latin Literature those Candidates who do not seek Honours, and also by two of the Moderators appointed to examine in Mathematics.

DEGREES IN NATURAL SCIENCE.

It has, from time to time, been represented to the Hebdomadal Council that the amount of classical attainment, and more especially of Greek, which is known to be demanded as a minimum at the Oxford examinations for Responsions and Moderations, is a deterrent to the entrance at the University of a considerable number of youths well-qualified to take advantage of an University education, and more especially to distinguish themselves in one or other of the Mathematical and Natural Science Schools, or in both of these Schools. With a view to meet the case of such youths,—and having regard to the very moderate advantage accruing to the Mathematical and Natural Science student, either in the way of intellectual discipline or as an aid to the prosecution of his special studies, from the mere getting up of this compulsory minimum of Greek in order to pass his preliminary examinations; and also having regard to the small proportion which this minimum of Greek bears to the sum-total of training he must have undergone, and of knowledge he must have acquired, in order to qualify for his Arts degree,—it has further been represented that this requirement of a minimum of Greek at the preliminary examinations for the Arts degree might well be dispensed with in certain cases; as in the case, for instance, of students in the Honour School of Mathematics who are able to show at their preliminary examinations a considerable proficiency in Natural Science and modern languages, and in the case of students in the Honour School of Natural Science who are able to show at their preliminary examinations a considerable proficiency in Mathematics and modern languages. And it has been further urged that a special remission of this kind would not prejudicially affect the study of Greek, and certainly not its mature and beneficial study; since the remission would be extended only to the students of certain Schools, and to those students only of these certain Schools who more than compensated for

inability to furnish the minimum of Greek by ability to furnish a largely excessive amount of other knowledge which would, for the majority of students, be far more difficult to acquire than would the minimum of Greek, even if it were, as in the event of these remissions being allowed, it well might be, extended beyond its present narrow limits.

But to representations of this kind, which had moreover failed to win the concurrence of several prominent members as well of the Natural Science as of the Mathematical School, the Council in the exercise of their judgment have never thought it right to accede. But neither did they, on the last occasion, see fit to meet these representations with a direct negative. But they made a proposition which is in effect this—that students in the Mathematical and Natural Science Schools shall henceforth be allowed the option of offering some substitute for Greek at their preliminary examinations; provided only, that if they offer this substitute, they shall be precluded from acquiring the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and shall receive instead a degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, however little, as in the case of some Mathematical students, may be their acquaintance with Natural Science; whereas, if they bring up the present minimum of Greek in preference to the substituted subjects, they shall be precluded from acquiring the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, however eminent may be their attainments in Natural Science, and shall receive instead the present degree of Bachelor of Arts.

This proposal, when it came before Congregation last Term, having been put forward as a measure framed with a view to meet the wishes and promote the interests of the Natural Science School, it is thought desirable, now that the whole subject will have to be reconsidered (the provisions of the form of statute, the preamble of which was approved by Congregation, having been declared by Counsel to be *ultra vires*), to acquaint members of Congregation, by means of the following memorandum, with the large extent of opinion, adverse to the proposal, which prevails among members of the University who are specially interested in the advancement of Natural Science.

Memorandum.

The undersigned members of the University engaged in teaching or otherwise interested in the progress of Natural Science, and differing some of them from one another in respect to the advisability of retaining Greek as a compulsory subject for the Arts degree in the Mathematical and Natural Science Schools, hereby express their disapproval of the scheme for the institution of a Natural Science degree brought forward last Term, and now, with certain proposed amendments, about to be reconsidered; and their conviction that the carrying out of this scheme, or of any scheme of the same nature, will not be for the interests of Natural Science within the University.

DEGREES IN NATURAL SCIENCE.

THE Council proposes, very reasonably, to omit from the Form of Statute respecting Degrees in Natural Science those clauses which appear to be beyond the powers of the University.

But the Council also promises, in case Convocation accepts the Statute whether with or without other amendments, to take steps for procuring the requisite powers, that is, to try to get an Act of Parliament for the purpose.

Yet surely it is not wise to apply to Parliament for such an Act except under great necessity. Are we sure that, however short and simple the Bill may be when first brought in, it will pass both Houses without changes or additions which we should not like?

But suppose we are content to run that risk, can we feel confident that the Bill will pass in any shape? In each House there are persons sufficiently well acquainted with the constitution of the University to ask why we now wish to grant to proficiency in a single department of the faculty of Arts the honours and privileges for which some attainment in all the departments of that faculty, at least in the major part of them, has hitherto been required. Graduates in Grammar or Rhetoric or Music have never been honoured as graduates in Arts: and, although Natural Science is one of the higher subjects in the course of Arts, it is but a single subject, and why should graduates in any single subject be so honoured?

If such a question should be asked in a Select Committee or in either House, the true answer (at least as the Form of Statute now stands) will be, that the persons for whose benefit the Act of Parliament is desired will not have limited their study of Natural Science, but will have shewn a knowledge of the ancient subjects of Grammar, Rhetoric, Arithmetic, Geometry, of Logic as embodied in mathematical reasoning, of two Languages, whereof Greek or Latin must be one, and of advanced portions of Mathematics, as well as of their own special subject, formerly called Natural Philosophy. To which may be expected this rejoinder: You make them pass an Examination in Arts; only give them then their proper title, and you want no Act of Parliament.

Here is the true solution of the difficulty. The attainments and exercises required by the University for a Degree in Arts have necessarily varied in the course of centuries: it would not be unreasonable to allow them to vary, to allow a choice between equivalent groups of attainments and exercises, at any one time. To some extent indeed we do allow a choice even now. Let the Form of Statute then be recast in this sense: let us adhere to the immemorial titles of Bachelor and Master of Arts, taking care that alternative courses of study for these Degrees shall be really of equal value, but not bringing in a misleading appellation, which will fall far short of the amount of attainment actually reached.

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such Affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and *if he shall have passed that Examination with Honours in Greek and Latin Literature, or shall have passed that Examination and obtained Honours in the same Term in Mathematics*, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and shall be deemed to have kept Statutable Residence and to have employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for four Terms before the Term in which he shall have been matriculated, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of Members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

WHEREAS it is expedient to establish Degrees for students in Natural Science, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examineatione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such Affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and *if he shall have passed that Examination with Honours in Greek and Latin Literature, or shall have passed that Examination and obtained Honours in the same Term in Mathematics*, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and shall be deemed to have kept Statutable Residence and to have employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for four Terms before the Term in which he shall have been matriculated, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of Members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

II. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. B. § 2, cl. 2 (p. 79, ed. 1878), at the end of the clause there shall be added the words—

“or that he has completed a course of three years and has obtained honours in the Second (or final) Examination at a College admitted under the provisions of the Statute on Affiliated Colleges.”

After the words “in the School of Mathematics in” the word “Michaelmas” shall be struck out, and the word “Hilary” shall be substituted: Also the words “5th nor later than the 10th day of December.” shall be struck out, and the words “8th nor later than the 15th day of March.” shall be substituted.

. If both these Statutes are rejected, the Examination will be held in Michaelmas Term, as at present provided.

The object of the Council in proposing these alternative forms of Statute is to give Congregation an opportunity of deciding on the Term in which the Examination in the Honour School of Mathematics in the Second Public Examination shall be held.

An Examination will be held in this College on Tuesday, February 10, 1880, and following days, for the purpose of filling up the following Scholarships and Exhibitions.

1. TWO SCHOLARSHIPS, tenable for five years, unless a Scholar shall, after his election, accept any appointment interfering with the full course of academical studies. No one will be eligible who shall have attained the age of twenty years, or who, being a member of the University, shall have exceeded two years from his Matriculation.

2. ONE ADAM DE BROME EXHIBITION, tenable till the end of the twentieth Term from Matriculation, unless the Exhibitioner shall, after his election, accept any appointment interfering with the full course of academical studies. It will be open to all Candidates, without restriction of age or standing, whom the electors shall have ascertained to be in need of support at the University.

N.B.—The above-mentioned Scholarships and Exhibition are of the annual value, during residence, of £80. The holders will be allowed to reside either within or without the walls of the College. If resident within the College, they will be subject to the usual College charges; if resident out of College, they will pay, as Caution Money, a deposit of £10; and, as yearly charges, Tuition Fees £21, University Dues £1, and College Dues £1.

Candidates are to call on the Vice-Provost on Monday, February 9, bringing with them testimonials of good character

and proof of their time of birth; and, if members of the University, proof of standing.

It has been arranged that Candidates for Classical Scholarships at Oriel and Brasenose Colleges shall this year be examined at the same time and in the same papers. Each Candidate will be considered as standing in the first instance at the College at which he has put down his name, and unless he has then given notice to the contrary, will be regarded as standing at the other College also. But all Candidates for the Adam de Brome Exhibition (whether standing in the first instance for the Scholarships at Oriel or at Brasenose) should call on the Vice-Provost of Oriel College, with evidence of their need of support at the University.

QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

An Examination will be holden on Tuesday, April 6, and following days, for the purpose of filling up—

1. FIVE OPEN SCHOLARSHIPS, of the yearly value of £90, tenable for five years. Candidates must not have attained the age of twenty years.

2. An EGLESFIELD EXHIBITION, of £81 a year, tenable for four years. Candidates must be natives of Cumberland or Westmoreland, and not have attained the age of twenty years.

3. FIVE HASTINGS EXHIBITIONS, of £90 a year, tenable for five years, open to certain Schools in Cumberland, Westmoreland, and Yorkshire.

4. The FITZGERALD EXHIBITION, of £66 a year, tenable for seven years. Candidates must be natives of Middlesex.

5. The FOX EXHIBITION, of £37 10s. a year, tenable for four years. Candidates must be at least sixteen and not more than twenty-one years old, natives of Cumberland or Westmoreland, educated for the four years last preceding election at St. Bees School.

6. A WILSON EXHIBITION, of £24 a year, tenable for five years. Candidates must have been educated for the two years last preceding election or matriculation at Kirby Lonsdale School, and must not have exceeded the eighth Term from their matriculation.

There are also small Exhibitions, tenable by Candidates from St. Bees and from Kendal School.

One at least of the Open Scholarships will be awarded for Mathematics, and one at least for Natural Science, in case competent Candidates offer themselves.

Any close Exhibition (except the Fox) for which no eligible Candidate presents himself will be thrown open for the turn to general competition.

In the examination in Natural Science, papers will be set in Physics, Chemistry, and Biology (Comparative Anatomy and Physiology, the study of the Animal Kingdom). No Candidate will be expected to offer more than two of these subjects. There will also be a practical examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient. These Candidates are requested to signify by letter to the Provost, *not later than the 1st of March*, their intention of standing, and to state at the same time the subjects they propose to offer.

All Candidates are to call on the Provost in the College Hall, on Monday, April 5, at 8.30 P.M., bringing with them satisfactory evidence of date and (where necessary) place of birth, and testimonials of good conduct from their school-masters or tutors.

Any Candidate who has matriculated or accepted any emolument from any College or Hall must bring the written

permission of the Head of his College or Hall, or of one of the Censors of Unattached Students in case he has matriculated as an Unattached Student.

Candidates who offer Mathematics or Natural Science will be expected to show such proficiency in Classics as will warrant the examiners in supposing that they will be able to pass the ordinary Examinations for the degree of B.A.

With a view to encouraging students to commence their residence at an earlier age than is becoming usual, allowance will be made for the age of Candidates in appraising the value of their work in the examination.

NEW COLLEGE.

There will be an Election in Lent Term, 1880, to TWO OPEN CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIPS.

These Scholarships are tenable for five years; and during residence are of the annual value of about £100 (i.e. £80, with tuition free).

No person is eligible who on the day of election has exceeded his twentieth year.

In the examination for these Scholarship the same papers will be set as in the examination for Classical Scholarships at University College, and it will be assumed that the Candidates are standing for the Scholarships at both Colleges, unless they state the contrary.

The examination will begin on Tuesday, February 3, at 9.30 A.M., in the Hall of New College.

Candidates are desired to call on the Warden of New College (or on the Master of University) on Monday, February 2, between 8 and 9 P.M. All Candidates must bring with them certificates of age and testimonials to character.

There will be a few vacancies for early admission as Commoners to be offered to those who do well in the examination.

BRASENOSE COLLEGE.

Repeated Notice.

There will be an Election at this College in the ensuing Lent Term to at least THREE OPEN SCHOLARSHIPS, of the value of £80 a year; one of which will be awarded for proficiency in Mathematics; but Candidates for that Scholarship will be expected to show such an amount of Classical knowledge as will warrant the examiners in supposing that they will be able to pass Responsions in due course.

These Scholarships are tenable for five years, during residence and good conduct, unless a Scholar shall, after his election, have accepted any appointment interfering with the full course of academical studies.

Candidates must be under twenty years of age. They are to present themselves to the Principal, with testimonials of good character, and with satisfactory evidence of age, on Monday, February 9, between 8 and 9 P.M., or on Tuesday, February 10, between 9 and 10 A.M. The examination will begin at the last-named hour.

It has been arranged that Candidates for Classical Scholarships at Oriel and Brasenose Colleges shall be examined at the same time and in the same papers.

Each Candidate will be considered as standing, in the first instance, at the College at which he has put down his name

and, unless he has given notice, in writing, to the contrary, will be regarded as standing at the other College also.

Unsuccessful Candidates, who have distinguished themselves in the examination and whose testimonials of moral character are thoroughly satisfactory, may on application be admitted as Commoners to early residence in College.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

Amended Notice.

An Examination will commence in this College on Tuesday, January 20, 1880, at 9.30 A.M., for the purpose of filling up THREE SCHOLARSHIPS and some EXHIBITIONS.

PROPOSED STATUTE OF THE UNIVERSITY COMMISSIONERS.

The Vice-Chancellor notifies to the University, according to the provisions of clause xxxi of the Oxford and Cambridge Universities Act 1877, the receipt by the Hebdomadal Council of a proposed form of Statute from the University Commissioners :—

UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD COMMISSION,

SIR,

I am instructed by the University of Oxford Commissioners to communicate to you as President of the Hebdomadal Council, to be laid before that body, a proposed Statute, which is hereunto annexed, and which the Commissioners contemplate making, subject to any representations which they may receive from the Council before the lapse of the time limited by the 31st clause of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877; any final resolution being of course suspended until that time shall have elapsed.

THE REV. THE VICE-CHANCELLOR
OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD.

A Statute, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners, for the University of Oxford and also for the College of the Souls of All Faithful People Deceased of Oxford, commonly called All Souls' College, every part whereof is to be deemed a Statute both of the University and of the College.

Inasmuch as the Warden and Fellows of All Souls' College have offered to pay annually the sum of £400, so long as the Regius Professorship of Civil Law is held upon its present conditions, to be applied by the University to the endowment of a Readership in Roman Law, it is hereby provided that—

1. Until the Regius Professorship of Civil Law shall fall vacant, or until the existing Regius Professor shall, by his own consent, become subject to any Statutes for the future regulation of that Professorship and the duties of the Professor which may be made by the University of Oxford Commissioners, a Reader in Roman Law shall be appointed from time to time for successive periods of three years.

2. Any such Reader shall retain his office and be entitled to his stipend (unless he shall sooner resign the same) until the end of the period of three years for which he shall have been appointed, although in the meantime the Regius Professorship of Civil Law may have become vacant, or subject to any such Statutes to be hereafter made as aforesaid. And if any Statute shall be hereafter made by the University of Oxford Commissioners inconsistent with the continuance of such Readership, no further appointment thereto shall be made after such Statute shall come into operation.

3. The Reader shall be elected by—

The Regius Professor of Civil Law;

The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy;

The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence;

The Chairman for the time being of the Council of Legal Education appointed by the Inns of Court in London;
A person to be nominated by the Warden and Fellows of All Souls' College, with a view to each election.

No election shall be invalidated on account of any of the Professorships, the holders of which are Electors to the Readership, being vacant at the time of the election. Those Professors shall be Electors, notwithstanding any change in their titles or duties to be hereafter made by Statute.

4. Subject to any general Statute to be hereafter made by or for the University as to the residence of University Readers, the Reader shall be required to reside within the precincts of the University for six months in each year between the 10th day of October and the 1st day of July next following.

5. Subject to any such Statute as aforesaid, as to the Lectures to be given by University Readers, the Reader shall lecture during seven weeks of each Term (Easter and Trinity Terms being counted as one), twice at least in each week, on separate days. He shall take as the subject of his Lectures, Roman Law and the Sources and History thereof. He shall also during the period in each Term over which his Lectures shall extend be ready to give private instruction to the students attending his Lectures.

6. If any general Statute, applying to all Readers, shall be hereafter made by or for the University on the subjects provided for by the two last preceding clauses, or either of them, the Reader shall be subject thereto.

7. The Reader shall receive annually the sum of £400, to be paid to him by the Warden and Fellows of All Souls' College.

8. In case of misconduct or neglect of duty on the part of the Reader, the Vice-Chancellor and the Delegates of Appeals in Congregation, or the majority of them, shall have power to admonish him, or, if need be, to remove him from his office.

TRIENNIAL ELECTION OF THE SCHOOL BOARD FOR THE DISTRICT OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF OXFORD.

NOTICE is hereby given—

6. That the voting for Members to be elected by the University will take place at some place or places to be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor, of which notice will be given.

7. That the poll will be open from 2 to 3.30 P.M.

8. That every Member of Congregation is entitled to vote in this Election.

9. The voting shall be by ballot.

10. That each Member of Congregation has three votes, all or some of which he may distribute among the candidates as he thinks fit.

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make *or approve* regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed *or approved* from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall

have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

CHANCELLOR'S.

The following Subjects are proposed for the CHANCELLOR'S PRIZES for the present year: viz.

For Latin Verse . . . *Elizabetha Regina, post cladem Hispanorum, copias victrices alloquitur.*

For a Latin Essay . . . *Puerorum institutio apud Romanos.*

For an English Essay *Under what conditions is naval supremacy acquired and maintained by nations?*

The first of the above subjects is intended for those Members of the University who, on the thirty-first day of March, 1880, shall not have exceeded *four* Years, and the other two for such as shall then have exceeded four, but not completed *seven*, years from their Matriculation.

SIR ROGER NEWDIGATE'S.

For the best composition in English Verse, *not limited to Fifty Lines*, by any Undergraduate who, on the day above specified, shall not have exceeded *four* years from his Matriculation:—

Sir Walter Raleigh.

It is required that the poem shall be in Heroic Couplets.

In every case the time is to be computed by *Calendar*, not *Academical Years*, and *strictly*, from the day of Matriculation to the day above specified, without reference to any *intervening circumstances whatever*.

No person who has already obtained a Prize will be deemed entitled to a second Prize of the same description.

The Exercises are all to be sent in under a sealed Cover to the Registrar of the University on or before THE THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF MARCH, 1880. Each Author is required to conceal his Name, and to distinguish his composition by what Motto he pleases; sending at the same time his Name, and the date of his Matriculation, sealed up under another Cover, with the same Motto inscribed upon it.

Such portions of the successful compositions will be recited in the Theatre upon the Commemoration-Day as the Public Orator and the Professor of Poetry shall appoint.

THE MARQUIS OF LOTHIAN'S HISTORICAL PRIZE ESSAY.

The subject proposed for the present year is—

Queen Christina of Sweden.

This Prize (£40 in value) is open to all Members of the University who at the time of sending in their composition shall not have exceeded the 27th Term from their Matriculation.

The Essays are to be sent, under a sealed cover marked "Lord Lothian's Prize," to the Registrar of the University on or before MARCH 31, 1880. Each author is desired to conceal his name, and to distinguish his composition by what Motto he pleases, sending at the same time his name and the date of his Matriculation sealed up under another cover, with the same Motto inscribed upon it.

A copy of the Essay, to which the Prize has been awarded, is to be sent to the Marquis of Lothian.

ELLERTON THEOLOGICAL PRIZE.

The subject proposed for the present year is—

The Power and Influence of Paganism, as illustrated from St. Augustine's Treatise "De Civitate Dei."

This Prize is open to all Members of the University who shall have passed their Examination for the degree of B.A. or B.C.L., and shall have commenced their Sixteenth Term from Matriculation, eight weeks previous to the first day of Easter Term, 1880; and who on June 16, 1879, had not exceeded their Twenty-eighth Term from Matriculation.

The Exercises are to be sent under a sealed cover to the Registrar of the University on or before the first day of Easter Term next. Each Author is desired to conceal his Name, and to distinguish his composition by what Motto he pleases; sending at the same time his Name, and the date of his Matriculation, sealed up under another cover, with the same Motto inscribed upon it.

The Essay to which the Prize shall have been adjudged will be read before the University in the Divinity School on some day in the week next before the Commemoration; and it is expected that no Essay will be sent in which exceeds in length the ordinary limits of recitation.

. It is not to be published, except in cases where the Judges shall unanimously approve of the publication.

GAISFORD PRIZES.

The subjects proposed for the present year are—

1. FOR TRAGIC IAMBICS.

Milton's "Paradise Lost," Book iv. lines 32-113, "O thou that — new world shall know."

2. FOR A PLATONIC DIALOGUE.

"De Œconomia quam vocant Politica."

The Prizes are open to all Undergraduates who, on the first Saturday of Easter Term, 1880, shall have already commenced Residence and shall not have completed their Seventeenth Term.

The exercises are to be sent under a sealed cover to the Registrar of the University on or before Saturday, April 3, 1880. Each Author is required to conceal his Name, and to distinguish his composition by what Motto he pleases; sending at the same time his Name, and the dates of his Matriculation and of his commencement of Residence, sealed up under another cover, with the same Motto inscribed upon it.

The Composition in Verse is to be recited at the Encænæia.

EARL STANHOPE'S PRIZE.

The subject proposed for the present year is—

The Possibility of a Stewart Restoration on the Death of Anne.

This Prize is open to all Undergraduates who, in Act Term 1880, shall not have exceeded the Sixteenth Term from their Matriculation.

The exercises are to be sent under a sealed cover to the Registrar of the University on or before SATURDAY, APRIL 3, 1880. Each Author is required to conceal his Name, and to distinguish his composition by what Motto he pleases; sending at the same time his name, and the date of his Matriculation, sealed up under another cover, with the same Motto inscribed upon it.

The Prize Essay is to be read publicly at such time and place as the Vice-Chancellor shall appoint.

COBDEN PRIZE.

The following subject has been appointed for 1880:

"What is the value of Political Economy to mankind?"

The competing Essays must be sent in to the Registrar of the University on or before Saturday, May 1, 1880.

The Competitors must be members of the University of Oxford who, on the 1st day of May, 1880, shall not have exceeded twenty-eight Terms' standing from their Matriculation.

Each writer is required to conceal his Name and to distinguish his composition by what motto he pleases; sending at the same time his Name and the date of his Matriculation sealed up under another cover, with the same motto inscribed upon it.

ENGLISH POEM ON A SACRED SUBJECT.

The subject for 1880 will be "Elijah, the Tishbite."

The poem must be written in decasyllabic verse: which may be rhymed in couplets or in stanzas, or may be blank verse.

A dramatic form of composition is not admissible.

This Prize is open to all members of the University who at the time the subject is announced shall have passed the Examinations for the degree of B.A.

The compositions are to be sent to the Registrar of the University on or before December 1, 1880.

CONINGTON PRIZE, 1882.

"The manner in which the writings attributed to Aristotle have received their present form, to be illustrated especially from the Nicomachean Ethics, the Politics, and the De Anima."

Without wishing to interfere with the judgment of candidates in treating this subject, it is suggested that the following topics, or some of them, may with advantage be discussed :—

The nature of the revision or redaction which the writings of Aristotle have undergone, as far as it can be gathered from internal evidence of thought and language (including the different kinds of repetitions), and from the comparison of Aristotle's works with one another.

The division into books.

The combination of smaller treatises into larger wholes.

The relation of the Nicomachean Ethics to the Eudemian, and to the *Magna Moralia*.

The order of the books of the Politics.

The hypothesis of two recensions of the *De Anima*.

The supposed loss of certain of the works of Aristotle in the third and second centuries B.C.

The value and origin of the ancient catalogues.

A comparison of the works of Aristotle with those of Hippocrates or any other great teacher, in respect of the form in which they have been preserved.

The degree of acquaintance with the writings of Aristotle possessed by Cicero, Sextus Empiricus, and other Greek and Roman authors.

The competing dissertations must be sent in to the Registrar on or before the first Saturday in Easter Term 1882. The author of a dissertation is at liberty to conceal his name, distinguishing his dissertation by a motto, and sending at the same time his name within a cover with the same motto written upon it.

Candidates must at the time appointed for sending in the dissertations have passed all the Examinations required for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and must have completed three years, but not exceeded fifteen years, from their Matriculation.

DENYER AND JOHNSON THEOLOGICAL SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Board of Theological Studies have appointed the following subjects of examination for the Denyer and Johnson Theological Scholarships in 1880 :—

1. The Old Testament. Questions involving a knowledge of the original language will be given on the Books of Joshua, Judges, and the two Books of Samuel. Reference will also be made to the Septuagint Version.

2. The New Testament, in the Original : especial attention to be given to the Gospel according to St. Luke and the two Epistles of St. Paul to the Corinthians.

3. Dogmatic Theology. The Doctrine of Grace, to be studied in St. Augustine's Treatises, *de Spiritu et Litera*, *de Natura et Gratia*, and *de Gestis Pelagii*. The Canons of the Second Council of Orange, A.D. 529. Pearson on the Creed, Articles IX–XII.

4. Church History. The History of the Ante-Nicene Church, to be studied in connexion with Eusebius, Books IV–VI, and the *Patres Apostolici* (ed. Funk).

5. Dr. W. H. Mill, *On the Mythical Interpretation of the Gospels*.

HALL AND HALL-HOUGHTON PRIZES.

The special subjects appointed by the Trustees for the Senior Septuagint Prize, for the Junior Septuagint Prize, and for the Syriac Prize, for the present year, are as follows :—

Senior Septuagint Prize :—

- (1) The two Books of Chronicles, and Ezra ;

Junior Septuagint Prize :—

The two Books of Chronicles, and Ezra.

Candidates for both Prizes will be examined in the Septuagint Version in its relation to the Hebrew Bible and the Greek Testament.

Syriac Prize :—

- (1) The Gospel according to St. Luke ;
- (2) The Epistles to the Ephesians, Philippians, and Colossians ;
- (3) Genesis XII–XXIV ;

all according to the Peschito Version.

3. ONE IRELAND EXHIBITION, open to members of Oriel College who have not exceeded the tenth Term from their Matriculation. This Exhibition is of the annual value of £30, and is tenable to the end of the sixteenth Term from Matriculation.

Candidates are to call on the Vice-Provost on Monday, February 9, bringing with them testimonials of good character and proof of their time of birth; and, if members of the University, proof of standing.

It has been arranged that Candidates for Classical Scholarships at Oriel and Brasenose Colleges shall this year be examined at the same time and in the same papers. No Candidate will be expected to offer more than two of these subjects. There will also be a practical examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient. These Candidates are requested to signify by letter to the Provost, *not later than the 1st of March*, their intention of standing, and to state at the same time the subjects they propose to offer.

All Candidates are to call on the Provost in the College Hall, on Monday, April 5, at 8.30 P.M., bringing with them satisfactory evidence of date and (where necessary) place of birth, and testimonials of good conduct from their schoolmasters or tutors.

Any Candidate who has matriculated or accepted any emolument from any College or Hall must bring the written permission of the Head of his College or Hall, or of one of the Censors of Unattached Students in case he has matriculated as an Unattached Student.

Candidates who offer Mathematics or Natural Science will be expected to show such proficiency in Classics as will warrant the examiners in supposing that they will be able to pass the ordinary Examinations for the degree of B.A.

With a view to encouraging students to commence their residence at an earlier age than is becoming usual, allowance will be made for the age of Candidates in appraising the value of their work in the examination.

For the Natural Science Studentships papers will be set in Chemistry, Biology, and Physics; but no Candidate will be allowed to offer himself for examination in more than two of these subjects.

Candidates for the Natural Science Studentships who make Physics their principal subject are recommended to offer themselves for examination in Mathematics, at least in Algebra, Plane Trigonometry, and Pure Geometry, as great weight will be attached in their case to a knowledge of these subjects.

Candidates for the Mathematical Studentships who wish to offer themselves also for the Natural Science Studentships will be able to do so.

Candidates for the Mathematical or for the Natural Science Studentships will also have to show that they possess such a knowledge of Classics as will enable them to pass Responsions.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide that honours may be obtained at the Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law by Candidates who have not exceeded the twenty-fifth Term from their Matriculation, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. IV, § 2, cl. 6 (p. 119, ed. 1879), the word "twenty-fourth" shall be struck out and the word "twenty-fifth" shall be substituted in its place.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the Examination in the Honour School of Mathematics in the Second Public Examination should be held in Easter or Trinity Term, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. C, § 10, cl. 1, as it is to come into operation in Michaelmas Term, 1883 (pp. 35, 36 of the Examination Statutes, Ed. of 1879),

The words "the Examination of Candidates for Honours in the School of Mathematics in Michaelmas Term," shall be struck out: Before the words "Modern History" the word "Mathematics" shall be inserted: And the words "The Examination in the School of Mathematics shall begin not earlier than the 5th nor later than the 10th day of December." shall be struck out.

III.

Voting on Statute.

In the same CONGREGATION the following form of Statute, the Preamble of which was approved by Congregation on Tuesday, December 5, 1879, and to which no Amendment had been offered, was submitted to the House and approved (*nemine contradicente*).

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the provisions of the Statute relating to the appointment of Examiners for the Pass School, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. D, § 3, cl. 1 (p. 104, ed. 1879), the word "twenty-nine" shall be struck out, and the word "thirty-two" shall be substituted; and the word "six" shall be struck out, and the word "nine" shall be substituted.

Ibid., for clause 2 shall be substituted the following clause:

"2. Of the nine Examiners appointed for the Pass School three shall be nominated for Group A, three for Group B, and three for Group C."

Ibid., clause 3 shall be struck out.

Also in Statt. Tit. XV (XIX), § 1, cl. 10 (pp. 222 and 223, ed. 1879), the words and figures "si eos qui nullum, . . . 60 o o" (where they occur for the second time) shall be struck out, and for the words and figures "Unicuique examinatori in Schola Scientiarum Mathematicarum aut in Schola . . . 20 o o" shall be substituted the following:

"To each of the Examiners appointed for the Pass School—
if nominated for Group A or for Group B . 60 o o
if nominated for Group C 20 o o"

IV.

Voting on Amended Clauses.

In the same CONGREGATION the amended clauses of the following form of Statute were submitted to the House and approved (*nemine contradicente*).

[*The Amendments are printed in Italics.*]

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make *or approve* regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed *or approved* from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. *Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall*

have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

IT seems desirable to call attention to the circumstance that while Congregation has thus far affirmed formally that it is expedient to establish Degrees in Natural Science, it has not, as many members of Congregation appear erroneously to suppose, decided in any way whether Greek shall or shall not be a necessary qualification for these Degrees.

The attention of members of Congregation is further directed to the following considerations:—

‘That the primary object of an undergraduate education should be to train the mind; and that the earliest degree conferred, whatever its name, should be a certificate that the holder of the degree is a person of general cultivation and of developed intelligence, and should not be a mere certificate that he is a person of special technical or professional attainment.

‘That either some acquaintance with Greek is, or it is not, substantially essential to this training and cultivation and development; and that the question whether or not it is so essential is one which ought to be decided definitely on its own merits, and not upon a side issue arising out of a proposal to institute Degrees in Natural Science.

‘That assuming it should be held, after discussion, that Greek is essential to all this, there would be then no occasion for any change in our present degrees or arrangements; while assuming it to be held,

on the other hand, that Greek is not essential to all this, then would come the proper time for considering what particular change it might be desirable to make in order to afford to some students the relief from Greek which is asked for on their behalf.

‘That by the particular change so made, be it what it might, the Mathematical and Natural Science Schools would necessarily be chiefly affected, and would almost unavoidably be dealt with on much the same footing. Further, that it would be preposterous to accord to students whose studies and examinations, whether in Mathematics or whether in Natural Science, had been mainly the same, one or other of two different degrees, a degree in Arts or a degree in Science, accordingly as their preliminary examinations had or had not included a little Greek,—anyhow a very small element, and *ex hypothesi* a non-essential element of their University education.

‘That whether the one degree to be conferred on Mathematical students, and the one degree to be conferred on Natural Science students (still bringing up Latin, either with some little Greek or with a literary substitute for this Greek) should be styled a degree in Arts or a degree in Science is not a matter of much real consequence, and would not be a matter of any consequence at all but for the circumstance that an University education based mainly on Mathematics or on Natural Science, equally with an education based mainly on the ancient Classics, has by long custom, both here and elsewhere, been certified to by a degree in Arts,—Mathematics and Natural Science being moreover the modern representatives of the studies which from time immemorial have constituted a major proportion of the recognised liberal Arts.’

AN APPEAL
TO
MEMBERS OF THE UNIVERSITY.

Two great and noble acts of gallantry in rescuing their fellow-men from drowning on the part of

THE HONOURABLE EDMUND FREMANTLE, the Captain of Her Majesty's ship *Invincible*; and

JOHN ROBERT BAXTER, a young apprentice in the city of Oxford.

HON. CAPTAIN EDMUND FREMANTLE.

"To congratulate a Captain of Her Majesty's Navy upon his courage might seem almost as gratuitous as to compliment a Bishop's wife upon her virtue. The fact 'goes without saying' that an officer who wears the blue uniform of the Queen must be 'without fear and without reproach' in all that concerns manliness and self-devotion. Yet a good example helps to hold up a grand standard of character; and we must therefore take leave, without regarding the modesty of one of the most distinguished commanders of the Mediterranean fleet, to draw public attention to an act of fearless humanity lately performed by the Captain of Her Majesty's ship *Invincible*, the Honourable Edmund Fremantle, C.B. Of late this man-of-war lay in the harbour of Alexandria, where her fine appearance and

perfect order contrasted well with the Russian frigate *Minine* lying alongside, and threw into the shade even the *Mahroussa*, the splendid steam-yacht of the Khedive, one of the very handsomest vessels afloat. From Alexandria the *Invincible* was ordered to Aboukir Bay, a passage which leads across the Nile mouths, in a shallow and often turbulent sea. Our ironclad was steaming about seven knots to the hour, the lead going in the chains, when one of the leadsmen, as would appear, slipped out from his brace, and fell into the rolling waves. At once the cry of 'man overboard' rang through the ship, and all the necessary measures were taken which good discipline and maritime knowledge prescribe. The engines were stopped and reversed, the life-buoys loosed from bridge and taff-rail, while the boats were called away, manned, and lowered with the utmost promptitude. But the poor fellow who had slipped overboard still held, or had managed to lay hold of, the lead-line, the consequence being that although kept up in the water, he was dragged below its surface by the vessel's motion. This would be the natural effect of a line made fast; for every sailor is aware that a rope must be paid out from a craft under way when a drowning man has hold of it. After a very little while of this submersion, the unlucky blue-jacket became choked by the sea, and, letting go his grasp, floated, insensible and already half-dead, astern of the *Invincible*, with his head drooping under the water. Captain Fremantle, who was watching what was going on from the bridge, understood in a moment that any delay must cost his poor seaman's life. The boats were not quite clear of the falls; the ship's momentum would take her farther and farther from him, while another minute of that helpless suffocation must give them back only a dead body. Without an instant's hesitation, therefore, the gallant officer sprang into the waves—just as he stood, in cap, coat, sea-boots, and all—and, striking out hard and straight for his object, reached the spot to find his man slowly sinking away from sight.

He caught him up, got his head clear of the sea, and so, with great difficulty, held the drowning blue-jacket during the interval occupied in the arrival of assistance. Help, of course, soon came. Sub-Lieutenant Moore and the blacksmith's mate, Cunningham, were the first two whose brave hearts sent them overboard to lend the Captain a hand. These gallant fellows, nevertheless, only just swam up in time, for the Captain's boots and heavy clothes were dragging him hard, and it was a glad moment when the boat flew near and took all four safe from the water. Captain Edmund Fremantle had won his prize. The life, for which that noble rescue had been dared, was soon brought back with careful treatment, and the Captain, after a little rest, was quickly himself again. Thus was Her Majesty on a stormy day last month spared the loss of a good sailor, and thus did Captain Fremantle, of the *Invincible*, show himself best man of the ship, as he was already her first and greatest.

"When the Captain came safely back with his prize, the crew of the *Invincible* swarmed into her chains and lower rigging, and cheered him as if an enemy had just struck or the Queen were going past in state at Spithead. On behalf of such a Captain what would not British sailors do? Where would they not go; how many and what enemies would they not face? Blow high, blow low, come war or continue peace, Captain the Honourable Edmund Fremantle, C.B. and C.M.G.—the scion of a right good stock, and himself an honour to his name and breed—will never want for willing fore-mast hands and faithful officers whenever he hoists his flag on any Queen's ship." [EXTRACT FROM *Daily Telegraph*.]

JOHN ROBERT BAXTER.

This young man was skating on Blenheim Lake on January 24th, 1880, when an alarm was given that two Undergraduates of Magdalen College had fallen through

the ice. On making the best of his way to the spot, he found that one had already disappeared under the water, but that the other was still holding on to the edge of the ice, though nearly exhausted; some 50 or 60 members of the University and others standing by helpless and appalled. He at once, at his own extreme peril, ventured upon the dangerous ice, which gave way with him, but by a wonderful union of skill, courage, perseverance, and presence of mind, he contrived not only to get upon the ice again, but to draw the drowning man out of the water.

It would be invidious to raise the question which of these two noble actions was the greatest, that of Captain Fremantle or John Robert Baxter; but it may be asked, What have members of the University done by way of acknowledgment of this great service on the part of this young apprentice to one of their own body? and, if as yet they have done nothing, What is it they mean to do?

In a CONGREGATION to be holden on Tuesday, February 10, at Two o'clock, the following form of Statute, the amended clauses of which were approved by the House on Tuesday, January 27, will be submitted to the House.

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examineatione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make or approve regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed or approved from

time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

II. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. i. B. § 2, cl. 2 (p. 79, ed. 1878), at the end of the clause there shall be added the words—

“or that he has completed a course of three years and has obtained honours in the Second (or final) Examination at a College admitted under the provisions of the Statute on Affiliated Colleges.”

In Statt. Tit. XIX (p. 298, ed. 1879), the following new section shall be inserted:—

XVI. Of Certificates of Efficiency in Teaching.

1. The Delegates appointed to superintend the inspection and examination of Schools (under Statt. Tit. XIX, Sect. xv) shall have power to grant Certificates of efficiency in Teaching to Teachers in Schools other than elementary; provided that—

(1) The Candidates for Certificates shall be graduates of some University in the United Kingdom, or shall have passed such an Examination conducted by some suitable Examining Body as the Delegates may consider sufficient.

(2) They shall have taught a class in some School other than an elementary School for six months at the least.

(3) They shall have given such evidence of acquaintance with the theory and history of Education, and methods of Teaching, as shall be satisfactory to the Delegates.

(4) They shall have given such practical proof of their ability in Teaching as the Delegates may require.

2. The Delegates shall have power to provide lectures from time to time on the Theory, History, or Practice of Education, and on subjects connected therewith, to be given by such persons and at such places as they may appoint.

3. All expenses incurred by the Delegates in carrying out the provisions of this section of the Statute shall be covered by fees charged for attendance at the Lectures provided by

the Delegates, or paid by Candidates for Certificates of Efficiency in Teaching.

4. This Statute shall remain in force until December 31, 1885.

III. Congregation of the University.**I. ACTS.***Voting on Statute.*

In a CONGREGATION holden on Tuesday, February 10, the following form of Statute, the amended clauses of which were approved by the House on Tuesday, January 27, was submitted to the House and approved on a division (*placets* 49, *non-placets* 33).

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section :—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely :

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make or approve regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed or approved from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

(3) They shall have given such evidence of acquaintance with the theory and history of Education, and methods of Teaching, as shall be satisfactory to the Delegates.

(4) They shall have given such practical proof of their ability in Teaching as the Delegates may require.

2. The Delegates shall have power to provide lectures from time to time on the Theory, History, or Practice of Education, and on subjects connected therewith, to be given by such persons and at such places as they may appoint.

3. All expenses incurred by the Delegates in carrying out the provisions of this section of the Statute shall be covered by fees charged for attendance at the Lectures provided by the Delegates, or paid by Candidates for Certificates of Efficiency in Teaching.

4. This Statute shall remain in force until December 31, 1885.

TEACHERSHIPS OF HINDUSTANI AND PERSIAN.

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make or approve regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed or approved from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

II. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. 1. B. § 2, cl. 2 (p. 79, ed. 1878), at the end of the clause there shall be added the words—

“or that he has completed a course of three years and has obtained honours in the Second (or final) Examination at a College admitted under the provisions of the Statute on Affiliated Colleges.”

I.

Promulgation of Statute.

In a CONGREGATION holden on Tuesday, February 17, the following form of Statute was promulgated and the Preamble thereof rejected on a division (*placets* 41, *non-placets* 42).

WHEREAS it is expedient that Certificates of efficiency in Teaching should be granted by the University to Teachers of Schools other than elementary, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. XIX (p. 298, ed. 1879), the following new section shall be inserted :—

XVI. Of Certificates of Efficiency in Teaching.

1. The Delegates appointed to superintend the inspection and examination of Schools (under Statt. Tit. XIX, Sect. xv) shall have power to grant Certificates of efficiency in Teaching to Teachers in Schools other than elementary; provided that—

(1) The Candidates for Certificates shall be graduates of some University in the United Kingdom, or shall have passed such an Examination conducted by some suitable Examining Body as the Delegates may consider sufficient.

(2) They shall have taught a class in some School other than an elementary School for six months at the least.

(3) They shall have given such evidence of acquaintance with the theory and history of Education, and methods of Teaching, as shall be satisfactory to the Delegates.

(4) They shall have given such practical proof of their ability in Teaching as the Delegates may require.

2. The Delegates shall have power to provide lectures from time to time on the Theory, History, or Practice of Education, and on subjects connected therewith, to be given by such persons and at such places as they may appoint.

3. All expenses incurred by the Delegates in carrying out the provisions of this section of the Statute shall be covered by fees charged for attendance at the Lectures provided by the Delegates, or paid by Candidates for Certificates of Efficiency in Teaching.

4. This Statute shall remain in force until December 31, 1885.

II.

Promulgation of Statute.

In the same CONGREGATION the following form of Statute was promulgated and the Preamble thereof approved on a division (*placets* 55, *non-placets* 18):—

WHEREAS it is expedient to prevent the publication of MSS. in the Bodleian Library without due authorisation, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. XVI (XX), Sect. III, at the end of § 9 (p. 239, ed. 1879) the following new clause shall be inserted :—

“6. Nemini liceat librum aliquem manu scriptum vel ipsi vel per alium transcribere et eundem publici juris facere, nisi venia vel Bibliothecarii vel Curatorum prius impetrata.”

Promulgation of Statute.

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In *Statt. Tit. II*, after *Sectio VI* (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make or approve regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed or approved from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

II. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. B. § 2, cl. 2 (p. 79, ed. 1878), at the end of the clause there shall be added the words—

“or that he has completed a course of three years and has obtained honours in the Second (or final) Examination at a College admitted under the provisions of the Statute on Affiliated Colleges.”

PROPOSED STATUTE OF THE UNIVERSITY COMMISSIONERS.

The Vice-Chancellor has duly received from the Oxford University Commissioners the following form of Statute.

PEMBROKE COLLEGE,
Feb. 23, 1880.

A Statute, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners, for the University of Oxford and also for the College of the

Souls of All Faithful People Deceased of Oxford, commonly called All Souls' College, every part whereof is to be deemed a Statute both of the University and of the College.

Inasmuch as the Warden and Fellows of All Souls' College have offered to pay annually the sum of £400, so long as the Regius Professorship of Civil Law is held upon its present conditions, to be applied by the University to the endowment of a Readership in Roman Law, it is hereby provided that—

1. Until the Regius Professorship of Civil Law shall fall vacant, or until the existing Regius Professor shall, by his own consent, become subject to any Statutes for the future regulation of that Professorship and the duties of the Professor which may be made by the University of Oxford Commissioners, a Reader in Roman Law shall be appointed from time to time for successive periods of three years.

2. Any such Reader shall retain his office and be entitled to his stipend (unless he shall sooner resign the same) until the end of the period of three years for which he shall have been appointed, although in the meantime the Regius Professorship of Civil Law may have become vacant, or subject to any such Statutes to be hereafter made as aforesaid. And if any Statute shall be hereafter made by the University of Oxford Commissioners inconsistent with the continuance of such Readership, no further appointment thereto shall be made after such Statute shall come into operation.

3. The Reader shall be elected by—

The Regius Professor of Civil Law;

The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy;

The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence;

The Chairman for the time being of the Council of Legal Education appointed by the Inns of Court in London;

A person to be nominated by the Warden and Fellows of All Souls' College, with a view to each election.

No election shall be invalidated on account of any of the Professorships, the holders of which are Electors to the Readership, being vacant at the time of the election. Those Professors shall be Electors, notwithstanding any change in their titles or duties to be hereafter made by Statute.

4. Subject to any general Statute to be hereafter made by or for the University as to the residence of University Readers, the Reader shall be required to reside within the precincts of the University for six months in each year between the 10th day of October and the 1st day of July next following.

5. Subject to any such Statute as aforesaid, as to the Lectures to be given by University Readers, the Reader shall lecture during seven weeks of each Term (Easter and Trinity Terms being counted as one), twice at least in each week, on separate days. He shall take as the subject of his Lectures, Roman Law and the Sources and History thereof. He shall also during the period in each Term over which his Lectures shall extend be ready to give private instruction to the students attending his Lectures.

6. If any general Statute, applying to all Readers, shall be hereafter made by or for the University on the subjects provided for by the two last preceding clauses, or either of them, the Reader shall be subject thereto.

7. The Reader shall receive annually the sum of £400, to be paid to him by the Warden and Fellows of All Souls' College.

8. In case of misconduct or neglect of duty on the part of the Reader, the Vice-Chancellor and the Delegates of Appeals in Congregation, or the majority of them, shall have power to admonish him, or, if need be, to remove him from his office.

I. Convocation.

I. ACTS.

I.

Voting on Statute.

In a CONVOCATION holden on Tuesday, March 2, the following form of Statute, which was approved by Congregation on Tuesday, February 10, was submitted to the House and approved on a division (*placets* 42, *non-placets* 10).

WHEREAS it is expedient to connect Local Colleges and Institutions with the University by way of Affiliation and to make special provisions as to the conditions under which persons who have been students in such Colleges or Institutions shall be permitted to supplicate for Degrees, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

I. In Statt. Tit. II, after Sectio VI (p. 6, ed. 1878) shall be inserted the following section:—

Sectio VII.—On Affiliated Colleges.

1. Any College or Institution within the United Kingdom or in any part of the British Dominions, being a place of education in which the majority of the students are of the age of seventeen at least, may be admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College on the following conditions, namely:

(a) That its members shall be incorporated by Royal Charter, or that provision shall have been otherwise made for its establishment on a permanent and efficient footing and for its government.

(b) That it shall allow the University to be represented on its Governing Body and to take such part in its Examinations as shall from time to time be determined by or under the authority of the University.

(c) That it shall have been admitted to the privileges of an Affiliated College by a vote of Convocation.

(d) That the connexion between the University and an Affiliated College shall be terminable either by a vote of Convocation, or by a resolution of the Governing Body of the College.

2. The Delegates under the Statute De Examinacione Candidatorum qui non sunt de Corpore Universitatis shall be also the Delegates for the Affiliation of Local Colleges. They shall have power to confer with members of any Syndicate or Board appointed for the like purpose by the University of Cambridge, and to make arrangements with such Syndicate or Board for forming a Joint Board with a view to combined action.

3. The Delegates shall receive proposals for the Affiliation of Colleges or other Institutions, and shall be authorised to appoint persons to serve on their Governing Bodies, or to take part in their Examinations.

4. The Delegates shall have power to make or approve regulations respecting the Examinations to be held at Affiliated Colleges.

5. Any person who shall have completed a course of three years at least at an Affiliated College, and who shall have passed the Examinations connected with that course in accordance with regulations to be prescribed or approved from time to time by the Delegates, shall be entitled to receive a Certificate from the University indicating that such person has completed at an Affiliated College a systematic course of study and examinations approved by the University.

6. Any person who shall have received such a Certificate may, if he shall have obtained Honours in the Second (or final) Examination at such affiliated College, be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination, and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall have been matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination.

7. No person already matriculated shall offer himself as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

8. The remuneration of Examiners and all other expenses incurred by the Delegates under the provisions of this section shall be covered by fees charged upon the Affiliated Colleges, or the Students examined therein.

II. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. B. § 2, cl. 2 (p. 79, ed. 1878), at the end of the clause there shall be added the words—

“or that he has completed a course of three years and has obtained honours in the Second (or final) Examination at a College admitted under the provisions of the Statute on Affiliated Colleges.”

II.

Voting on Statute.

In the same CONVOCATION the following form of Statute, which was approved by Congregation on Tuesday, February 17, was submitted to the House and approved (*nemine contradicente*):—

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the provisions of the Statutes relating to the days for entering the names of Candidates in the First and Second Public Examinations, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. B. § 2 (p. 80, ed. 1879), clause 4 shall be struck out and the following clause shall be substituted:—

“4. The days for entering names shall be fixed by the Junior Proctor and shall be published in the usual manner, provided that these days shall be so arranged as to allow an interval of not less than ten nor more than fourteen days before the commencement of the Examination.”

And in Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. C. § 10 (p. 98, ed. 1879), clause 4 shall be struck out and the following clause shall be substituted:—

“4. The days for entering names shall be fixed by the Senior Proctor and shall be published in the usual manner, provided that these days shall be so arranged as to allow an interval of not less than ten nor more than fourteen days before the commencement of the Examination.”

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. IV, § 2 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 118, 119),

1. Clauses 2, 3 shall be struck out.

2. Clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted :

"4. The Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law shall be conducted by the Regius Professor of Civil Law, or some other Professor or Reader in the Faculty of Law deputed by him, together with not less than three, nor more than four, other Examiners, to be annually selected out of their own body, except as hereinafter provided, by the following persons, viz. the Regius Professor of Civil Law, the Vinerian Professor of English Law, the Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy, the Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence, the Vinerian Reader in English Law, the Reader in Indian Law, the holder of any Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law, and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence: Provided that one of the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence shall always be among the Examiners so selected. The said persons may, instead of selecting all the Examiners from their own body, nominate one person not of their own body to be one of the Examiners, such nomination being subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor."

3. Clause 5 shall be struck out, and the following clauses shall be substituted :

"5. The Board of Studies for this Examination shall consist of—

The Regius Professor of Civil Law,
The Vinerian Professor of English Law,
The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy,

The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence,
The Vinerian Reader in English Law,
The Reader in Indian Law, and the holder of any other Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law,
The Examiners for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence, and all persons who have served in either of those capacities within the three years preceding.

The Members of the Board may from time to time (if they shall think fit) add by co-optation not more than three persons. Every person so added shall retire at the end of two years, but shall be re-eligible.

"6. The Board shall every year elect one of its Members to be Chairman. In case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote. The Board shall meet each year in the first fortnight of Michaelmas Term, and at other times when summoned by the Chairman. The Chairman shall always summon a meeting when requested to do so by two Members of the Board.

"7. The Board shall exercise a general supervision over the subjects of Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, and shall from time to time issue lists of books and subjects, and shall have power to make such further regulations as it shall deem necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Statute."

4. In § 3, cl. 2 of the same Statute (p. 120, ed. of 1879), the words "and if the Board" down to "such certificate" inclusive shall be struck out.

6. A WILSON EXHIBITION, of £24 a year, tenable for five years. Candidates must have been educated for the two years last preceding election or matriculation at Kirby Lonsdale School, and must not have exceeded the eighth Term from their matriculation.

There are also small Exhibitions, tenable by Candidates from St. Bees and from Kendal School.

One at least of the Open Scholarships will be awarded for Mathematics, and one at least for Natural Science, in case competent Candidates offer themselves.

Any close Exhibition (except the Fox) for which no eligible Candidate presents himself will be thrown open for the turn to general competition.

In the examination in Natural Science, papers will be set in Physics, Chemistry, and Biology (Comparative Anatomy and Physiology, the study of the Animal Kingdom). No Candidate will be expected to offer more than two of these subjects. There will also be a practical examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient. These Candidates are requested to signify by letter to the Provost, *not later than the 1st of March*, their intention of standing, and to state at the same time the subjects they propose to offer.

All Candidates are to call on the Provost in the College Hall, on Monday, April 5, at 8.30 P.M., bringing with them satisfactory evidence of date and (where necessary) place of birth, and testimonials of good conduct from their school-masters or tutors.

Any Candidate who has matriculated or accepted any emolument from any College or Hall must bring the written permission of the Head of his College or Hall, or of one of the Censors of Unattached Students in case he has matriculated as an Unattached Student.

Candidates who offer Mathematics or Natural Science will be expected to show such proficiency in Classics as will warrant the examiners in supposing that they will be able to pass the ordinary Examinations for the degree of B.A.

The Scholarships are of the value of £80 per annum, and the Exhibitions £40.

Elementary Mathematical papers in Arithmetic, Euclid i. ii, and Algebra to Equations, will be set to all Classical Candidates, and elementary Classical papers in Latin Prose, Latin and Greek Grammar, and Latin and Greek Translation to other Candidates, in order to secure sufficient proficiency for University requirements. Candidates who hold Certificates which are accepted in lieu of Responsions will be excused the elementary papers; while those who fail in them will not be allowed to continue their examination.

WHEREAS it is expedient to complete the Statute for establishing degrees in Natural Science, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

1. In Statt. Tit. V (VI), the new Sectio III, after § 1 the following new paragraphs shall be inserted:—

§ 2. *How many years passed in the study of Natural Science and what exercises are required for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.*

1. Any Scholar in the Faculty of Natural Science may supplicate for the degree of Bachelor in that Faculty so soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Natural Science and in hearing lectures for twelve Terms and shall have passed three Examinations, namely, the Responsions and the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, and the Second Public Examination, at the several times and subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth.

2. Candidates shall be deemed to have passed the Second Public Examination for the purpose of proceeding to the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science who shall have satisfied the Examiners in the Rudiments of Faith and Religion or in the matter offered instead thereof, and shall have passed the Preliminary Honour Examination in the School of Natural Science, and shall have obtained Honours either in the School of Mathematics or in the School of Natural Science.

3. No person shall be required to pass the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science who has passed Responsions under the regulations respecting the Examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Arts; or has passed the Previous Examination at Cambridge; or has satisfied the Examiners appointed under the authority of the Delegates of the Examination of Schools in Greek and in Latin and in Elementary Mathematics, or in Elementary and Additional Mathematics together with either Greek and French, or Greek and German, or Latin and German, or Latin and French; or has obtained a Certificate from the Delegates under the Statute De Examineatione Candidatorum qui non sunt de corpore Universitatis that he has shown sufficient merit to be excused from Responsions. No person shall be required to pass the First

Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science who has passed the First Public Examination under the Regulations respecting the Examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and has either obtained Honours in Mathematics in that Examination or has satisfied the Examiners in the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science in Mathematics.

4. The regulations respecting the Examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, so far as regards the publication of the names of Candidates, the lists to be sent to the Senior Examiner, the change of days and hours, the place of examination and the notice to be given to Candidates, the conduct of Examinations, Boards of Studies, the registration of certificates, the proctorial authority of Examiners, the interpretation of certain terms, the supply of casual vacancies, the declarations to be made by Examiners, and the removal of Examiners for misconduct, shall apply *mutatis mutandis* to the Responsions and the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science. Every Examiner shall hold his office during three Examinations. No one who shall have served the office of Examiner for the full period shall be nominated again until the expiration of one year from the termination of his former service. No two persons who are members of the same College or Hall shall be nominated to serve at the same time as Examiners in the Responsions or in the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.

5. The lists of the names of Candidates shall be headed as follows:—

For the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science,

§ 3. *Of the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.*

1. The Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science shall be conducted by three Examiners, and the subjects of the Examination shall be the Greek, Latin, French and German Languages, Arithmetic, Algebra, and Geometry.

2. Every Candidate shall offer either (1) one Greek and one Latin Book, or (2) one Greek and one German Book, or (3) one Greek and one French Book, or (4) one Latin and one German Book, or (5) one Latin and one French Book; and shall be examined therein in such manner as to test especially his knowledge of the grammar of the languages in which the books he offers are written. He shall also be required to translate from English into Latin if he offers a Latin Book, and to translate one or more passages from a German author or authors not specially offered by him if he offers a German Book, and one or more passages from a French author or authors not specially offered by him if he offers a French Book. Every Candidate shall also be examined in Arithmetic; in the Elements of Plane Geometry, including the doctrine of Similar Triangles; and in Algebra, including Quadratic Equations, Ratio, Proportion, Variation, and the Arithmetical and Geometrical Progressions.

3. The Examiners shall, if members of the University, be Masters of Arts or of Natural Science, or at least Bachelors of

Civil Law or of Medicine. One of them but not more than one may be a person not a member of the University. They shall be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor and Proctors in the manner following. The first nomination shall be made by the Vice-Chancellor, the second by the Senior Proctor, and the third by the Junior Proctor, and this order of nomination shall always be preserved.

4. The nomination of the Examiners shall take place as early as may be in Hilary, Easter, and Michaelmas Terms; and the names shall be submitted to Congregation in the second Congregation for conferring degrees holden in Hilary Term, on the first day of Trinity Term, and in the second Congregation for conferring degrees holden in Michaelmas Term respectively. The names shall be submitted to Congregation and to Convocation after like notice and in like manner as has been provided with respect to Moderators. Every Examiner so appointed shall enter upon his office on the first day of the Term after that in which his name shall have been approved in Convocation.

5. Every Candidate shall be examined *viva voce* in some part at least of the subjects offered by him.

6. The Examination shall be under the supervision of a Board of Studies constituted as follows:—

The Regius Professor of Greek;
The Corpus Professor of Latin;
The Professor of Comparative Philology;
The Savilian Professor of Geometry;
The Sedleian Professor of Natural Philosophy;
The Examiners in the Responsions and in the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, and all persons who shall have served in either of those capacities within the two years preceding.

The Board of Studies shall from time to time publish lists of authors which may be offered under the provisions of the Statute. They shall specify when necessary whether the whole, and, if not the whole, what portion, of each author shall be offered as a book.

But any Candidate who shall either not appear for examination in his first Term, or shall fail to satisfy the Examiners, as the case may be, shall be permitted to offer at any future Examination the same books and subjects which he then offered or might have offered.

7. The Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science shall be held at the times and begin on the days appointed for Responsions in the Regulations respecting the Examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. The Examiners may, if they shall think fit, by arrangement with the Masters of the Schools, conduct that part of the Examination in such subjects as are common to the two Examinations which is conducted in writing by means of the same papers and at the same time. They shall also confer with the Masters of the Schools with a view to the maintenance in the two Examinations of the same standard as regards those subjects which are common to the two Examinations.

8. The Masters of the Schools, or any of them, shall, if requested by the Vice-Chancellor on the application of the Examiners in the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, assist in the examination of Candidates in the Greek and Latin languages; and such Masters of the Schools shall in that case receive such remuneration for their

assistance as shall be fixed by the Vice-Chancellor and Proctors.

9. No Candidate shall be admitted to the Examination unless previously in the same Term his name has been either given in by himself in person or transmitted through his Tutor to the Junior Proctor, together with his matriculation paper, and a list of the books which he offers for Examination.

10. The names shall be given in at least ten days before the beginning of the Examination.

11. The Examiners shall determine as they shall think fit the order in which the *viva voce* Examination shall be conducted.

12. At the close of each day of *viva voce* Examination, the Examiners shall determine on the merits of each Candidate examined by them on that day, and shall give or refuse Certificates accordingly. The Certificates shall specify in each case the books offered by the Candidate. The form of Certificate shall be:—

13. After all the Candidates shall have been examined, the Senior Examiner shall direct the Clerk of the Schools to prepare an alphabetical list of the names of all Candidates who shall have received Certificates, and such list shall be printed and distributed in the usual manner.

§ 4. *Of the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.*

1. The First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science shall be conducted by three Examiners, and the subjects of the Examination shall be the Holy Gospels, Greek, Latin, French, German, and Mathematics.

2. The Examiners shall, if members of the University, be Masters of Arts or of Natural Science, or at least Bachelors of Civil Law or of Medicine. One of them but not more than one may be a person not a member of the University. They shall be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor and Proctors in the manner following. The first nomination shall be made by the Vice-Chancellor, the second by the Senior Proctor, and the third by the Junior Proctor, and this order of nomination shall always be preserved.

3. The nomination of the Examiners shall take place at the same times and the names shall be submitted to Congregation and to Convocation after like notice and in like manner as has been provided with respect to Moderators. Every Examiner so appointed shall enter upon his office on the first day of the Term after that in which his name shall have been approved in Convocation.

4. Candidates may offer themselves for examination in the fourth Term from their matriculation.

5. Except as hereinafter provided, all Candidates shall be examined in such manner as to test their knowledge of the Greek text and also of the contents of the Holy Gospels; and no Candidate shall receive a certificate of having passed who shall not have satisfied the Examiners in this part of the Examination.

6. Candidates who do not offer any Greek book shall not be required to show knowledge of the Greek text of the Holy Gospels, but may offer instead thereof the Vulgate Version.

7. Candidates shall be examined in—

(a) Three books at least, being portions of Greek, Latin, French, or German authors of the best age, one of them at least being some portion of a Greek or Latin historical or philosophical work.

(b) Algebra including the Theory and Use of Logarithms, the Elements of Plane Geometry including the doctrine of Similar Triangles, Trigonometry as far as the solution of Plane Triangles inclusively, the Rudiments of Plane Co-ordinate Geometry, and the Mechanics of Solid and Fluid Bodies treated by elementary methods.

8. Every Candidate shall be examined in such manner as to test his accurate knowledge of the grammatical principles of the languages in which the books offered by him are written, and his ability to render into English from such languages passages of books not specially offered by him. He shall also be required to show a competent knowledge both of the text and of the contents of the books which he offers, and to answer not only questions relating to grammar and literature, but also any questions directly arising out of the matters treated of in those books. He shall also be required to translate from English into Latin if he offers a Latin book or books, from English into German if he offers a German book or books, and from English into French if he offers a French book or books.

9. No Candidate shall be allowed to offer any of the same books, or (except in cases specially excepted by the Board of Studies for directing the Examination of those who in the first Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Arts do not seek Honours) a portion of any of the same authors in which he satisfied the Examiners in the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science or the Masters of the Schools as the case may be, or in which he satisfied the Examiners appointed under the authority of the Delegates of the Examination of Schools or of the Delegates of the Examination of Candidates qui non sunt de corpore Universitatis.

10. Any Candidate who, being of full age, shall object on religious grounds, or for whom, not being of full age, his parent or guardian shall object on religious grounds to an examination in the Holy Gospels, shall be permitted to offer instead thereof an additional Greek book or (in case he do not offer any Greek book) an additional Latin book, provided that such book is not a portion of any of the same authors which he is offering in the course of the same Examination, nor such a book as he would be precluded by the preceding clause from offering.

11. Every Candidate shall be examined *viva voce* in the Holy Gospels or in the books offered instead thereof as the case may be, and in one at least of the other books which he offers.

12. The Board of Studies constituted for the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science shall be a Board of Studies for the purposes of the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, and shall have powers in relation to the books offered in this Examination similar to those given to it in relation to the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.

But any Candidate who shall not appear for examination in the first Term in which he is of sufficient standing to

do so, or shall fail to satisfy the Examiners, as the case may be, shall be permitted to offer at any future Examination the same books and subjects which he then offered or might have offered.

13. The First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science shall be held in the same Terms and begin on the same days as the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Arts for those who do not seek Honours. The Examiners may, if they shall think fit, by arrangement with the Moderators, conduct that part of the Examination in such subjects as are common to the two Examinations which is conducted in writing by means of the same papers and at the same time. They shall also confer with the Moderators with a view to the maintenance in the two Examinations of the same standard as regards those subjects which are common to the two Examinations.

14. The Moderators appointed for the examination of those who do not seek Honours, or any of them, shall, if requested by the Vice-Chancellor on the application of the Examiners in the First Public Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, assist in the examination of Candidates in the Latin and Greek Languages; and the Moderators appointed to examine in Mathematics, or any of them, shall, if so requested on such application, assist in the examination of Candidates in Mathematics; and such Moderators shall in that case receive such remuneration for their assistance as shall be fixed by the Vice-Chancellor and Proctors.

15. No Candidate shall be admitted to examination unless his name shall have been previously in the same Term either given in by himself in person or transmitted through his Tutor to the Junior Proctor, together with a list of the books and subjects which he offers for examination, and a certificate either that he has satisfied the Masters of the Schools or that he has satisfied the Examiners in the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science, or that he has passed an Examination which is allowed under the provisions of § 2, clause 3 of this Statute to excuse from the Responsions for the degree of Bachelor of Natural Science.

16. Every Candidate who desires to be excused from examination in the Holy Gospels shall deliver or transmit through his Tutor to the Proctor a statement signed, if he be of full age, by himself, or, if he be not of full age, by his parent or guardian, that he or his parent or guardian for him, as the case may be, objects on religious grounds to such an examination. The book which such Candidate offers in place of the Holy Gospels shall be specified on the list of subjects given in by him to the Proctor.

17. The names of all Candidates shall be given in at least ten days before the day of examination.

18. The Examiners shall determine as they shall think fit the order in which the *viva voce* examination shall be conducted.

19. At the close of each day of *viva voce* examination the Examiners shall give a certificate to each of the Candidates who shall have satisfied them. The certificates shall specify the books and subjects offered by the Candidate, and also in the case of each Candidate who offers a book instead of the Holy Gospels the book offered by him instead thereof.

The form of Certificate shall be—

Any Candidate who shall have passed the First Public Examination under the regulations respecting the Examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Arts may offer himself for examination in Mathematics only, and every such Candidate shall be examined under the provisions of this Statute respecting that part of the Examination, and if he shall satisfy the Examiners shall receive a certificate which shall be in the following form :—

21. After all the Candidates shall have been examined the Senior Examiner shall direct the Clerk of the Schools to prepare an alphabetical list of the names of all Candidates who shall have received certificates, and such list shall be printed and distributed in the usual manner.

V. University Examinations.

SECOND PUBLIC EXAMINATION.

The SENIOR PROCTOR will receive the Names of Candidates for the Second Public Examination, from themselves or, *if necessary*, through their Tutors, at University College, on Friday, April 30, and Saturday, May 1; each day from Eleven o'clock till Twelve, and from Two o'clock till Four.

N.B.—*No one Matriculated after Michaelmas Term, 1877, can be received as a Candidate in any Honour School, except in the Preliminary Honour School of Natural Science.*

Each Candidate must either bring in person, or transmit through his Tutor—

1. His Matriculation Paper;
2. The Testamur of the Moderators, and if he has passed in the Holy Gospels or in the matter substituted at a separate time, then also the Testamur of his having so passed; *or*, a Certificate that he has passed the General Examination at Cambridge, together with a Certificate of Incorporation;
3. A List of the Subjects and Books in which he offers himself to be examined, *written upon one of the printed Forms issued for that purpose.*

Candidates in the Pass School who offer TWO SUBJECTS out of the same Group are required to enter each on a separate Form.

All who desire to be Candidates for the Exhibition must send either to J. S. Lockhart, Esq., Hertford College, Oxford, or to E. J. Gross, Esq., Caius College, Cambridge, notice of their names and ages, with certificates of character, on or before the first day of June, for examination in July. Arrangements will be subsequently made as to the place of examination for each Candidate.

The successful Candidate for the Exhibition must on election be admitted, if not already a member of either University, as an Unattached or Non-Collegiate Student, and begin his residence in the following Michaelmas Term. The Exhibition is tenable only so long as the holder's name is on the books of the Delegacy of Students not attached to any College or Hall at Oxford or of the corresponding Board at Cambridge.

The stipend of the Exhibitioner will accrue from the Michaelmas Day after the election.

Each Oxford Exhibitioner must pass, or have passed, Responsions, or one of the equivalent Examinations, in his first year, as a condition of holding the Exhibition for a second year, and the First Public Examination in his second year, as a condition of holding the Exhibition for a third year. Before each instalment of an Exhibition is paid, a certificate must be obtained from the Censors to the effect that the holder has kept such residence as is required of Students in

full residence in the University during the period for which it is payable, that he has fulfilled the above requirement as to Examinations, and that his moral conduct and attention to his duties as a member of the University have been satisfactory.

In the event of no Candidate appearing to be of sufficient merit to satisfy the Examiners, the Exhibition may be awarded for proficiency in Mathematics, according to the results of an examination afterwards to be held.

Each Candidate for this Exhibition only will have to pay a fee of £1 to the Joint Board on entering his name; if however he offers himself also as a Candidate for a Certificate, the fee will be £2.

Amended Statutes.

In a CONGREGATION holden on Wednesday, April 14, the following forms of Statute were amended.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Statute on the Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, by striking out certain provisions, and by amending the provisions respecting the Board of Studies and the appointment of Examiners, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. IV, § 2 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 118, 119),

1. Clauses 2, 3 shall be struck out.

2. Clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted :

"4. The Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law shall be conducted by the Regius Professor of Civil Law, or some other Professor or Reader in the Faculty of Law deputed by him, together with not less than three, nor more than four, other Examiners, to be annually selected out of their own body, except as hereinafter provided, by the following persons, viz. the Regius Professor of Civil Law, the Vinerian Professor of English Law, the Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy, the Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence, the Vinerian Reader in English Law, the Reader in Indian Law, the holder of any Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law, and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence : Provided that one of the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence shall always be among the Examiners so selected. The said persons may, instead of selecting all the Examiners from their own body, nominate one person not of their own body to be one of the Examiners, such nomination being subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor."

3. Clause 5 shall be struck out, and the following clauses shall be substituted :

"5. *There shall be a Board of Legal Studies consisting of—*

The Regius Professor of Civil Law,
The Vinerian Professor of English Law,
The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy,
The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence,
The Vinerian Reader in English Law,
The Reader in Indian Law, and the holder of any other Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law,
The Examiners for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence, and all persons who have served in either of those capacities within the three years preceding.

The Members of the Board may from time to time (if they shall think fit) add by co-optation not more than three persons. Every person so added shall retire at the end of two years, but shall be re-eligible.

"6. The Board shall every year elect one of its Members to be Chairman. In case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote. The Board shall meet each year in the first fortnight of Michaelmas Term, and at other times when summoned by the Chairman. The Chairman shall always summon a meeting when requested to do so by two Members of the Board.

"7. The Board shall exercise a general supervision over the subjects of Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, and shall from time to time issue lists of books and subjects, and shall have power to make such further regulations as it shall deem necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Statute."

4. In § 3, cl. 2 of the same Statute (p. 120, ed. of 1879), the words "and if the Board" down to "such certificate" inclusive shall be struck out.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the constitution of the Board of Studies for the Honour School of Jurisprudence, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. C. § 7 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 93, 94), clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted :

"4. *The Board of Legal Studies shall be the Board of Studies for this School.*"

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Statute on the Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, by striking out certain provisions, and by amending the provisions respecting the Board of Studies and the appointment of Examiners, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. IV, § 2 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 118, 119),

1. Clauses 2, 3 shall be struck out.

2. Clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted :

"4. The Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law shall be conducted by the Regius Professor of Civil Law, or some other Professor or Reader in the Faculty of Law deputed by him, together with not less than three, nor more than four, other Examiners, to be annually selected out of their own body, except as hereinafter provided, by the following persons, viz. the Regius Professor of Civil Law, the Vinerian Professor of English Law, the Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy, the Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence, the Vinerian Reader in English Law, the Reader in Indian Law, the holder of any Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law, and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence : Provided that one of the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence shall always be among the Examiners so selected. The said persons may, instead of selecting all the Examiners from their own body, nominate one person not of their own body to be one of the Examiners, such nomination being subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor."

3. Clause 5 shall be struck out, and the following clauses shall be substituted :

"5. *There shall be a Board of Legal Studies consisting of—*
The Regius Professor of Civil Law,
The Vinerian Professor of English Law,
The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy,

The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence,
The Vinerian Reader in English Law,
The Reader in Indian Law, and the holder of any other Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law,

The Examiners for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence, and all persons who have served in either of those capacities within the three years preceding.

The Members of the Board may from time to time (if they shall think fit) add by co-optation not more than three persons. Every person so added shall retire at the end of two years, but shall be re-eligible.

"6. The Board shall every year elect one of its Members to be Chairman. In case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote. The Board shall meet each year in the first fortnight of Michaelmas Term, and at other times when summoned by the Chairman. The Chairman shall always summon a meeting when requested to do so by two Members of the Board.

"7. The Board shall exercise a general supervision over the subjects of Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, and shall from time to time issue lists of books and subjects, and shall have power to make such further regulations as it shall deem necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Statute."

AN APPEAL TO THE MEMBERS OF THE OXFORD UNION SOCIETY,
ON THE
PROPOSED OPENING OF THE SOCIETY'S ROOMS ON
SUNDAY MORNINGS.

1. A POLL of the Society is to be held on SATURDAY next, the 24th inst., to decide upon a proposal to open the Society's Premises on Sunday Mornings.

2. For many years the Rooms were closed throughout the whole of Sunday. Very much against the wishes of a large number of Members, it was at last agreed that the Premises should be open during a *part* of Sunday Afternoon. Subsequently a further concession was made, and they were opened for the *whole* Afternoon. *There is now a renewed agitation for opening the Society's Rooms at 10.30 o'clock ON SUNDAY MORNINGS.*

3. The Union includes men of various schools of thought; and hence it is only in a spirit of mutual concession that its affairs can be satisfactorily conducted. The question of Sunday Opening is, and always has been, one upon which great differences of opinion have existed amongst the Members. The present arrangement is accordingly the result of a *compromise*.

4. It has been alleged, in favour of the proposed change, that the existing Rule *concedes the whole principle* of Sunday Opening; and that to refuse Sunday Opening in the morning, whilst permitting it in the afternoon, is illogical and inconsistent. To this it is sufficient to reply:—

(1.) That *all* compromise is avowedly a partial abandonment of principle by each of the parties concerned.

(2.) That those who dislike Sunday Opening are thankful for the existing arrangement, which does draw some kind of distinction between the Lord's Day and a week-day.

(3.) That, even if the present Rule were as illogical as it is said to be, the *fact* would remain, that the religious feelings of many Members would be shocked by a course of action which, in their belief, is calculated to weaken reverence for the Lord's Day. Surely even mere *sentiments*, as some may think them, deserve to be respected, when they are based upon deep and earnest convictions.

5. The supporters of this proposal urge that those Members who object to it are at liberty to stay away; but it is obvious that each individual Member of a Society is responsible for its corporate acts.

6. The effect of carrying out this change would unquestionably be to produce a painful impression in many quarters, that a serious blow had been aimed at Religion by a large and influential body of University men.

7. Is it well to overthrow a fair compromise, and to incur the responsibility of setting a bad example, merely for the sake of what is at best a very doubtful advantage, and one which the experience of many years shews can very well be dispensed with?

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Statute on the Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, by striking out certain provisions, and by amending the provisions respecting the Board of Studies and the appointment of Examiners, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. IV, § 2 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 118, 119),

1. Clauses 2, 3 shall be struck out.

2. Clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted:

"4. The Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law shall be conducted by the Regius Professor of Civil Law, or some other Professor or Reader in the Faculty of Law deputed by him, together with not less than three, nor more than four, other Examiners, to be annually selected out of their own body, except as hereinafter provided, by the following persons, viz. the Regius Professor of Civil Law, the Vinerian Professor of English Law, the Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy, the Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence, the Vinerian Reader in English Law, the Reader in Indian Law, the holder of any Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law, and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence: Provided that one of

the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence shall always be among the Examiners so selected. The said persons may, instead of selecting all the Examiners from their own body, nominate one person not of their own body to be one of the Examiners, such nomination being subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor."

3. Clause 5 shall be struck out, and the following clauses shall be substituted :

"5. There shall be a Board of Legal Studies consisting of—

The Regius Professor of Civil Law,
The Vinerian Professor of English Law,
The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy,
The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence,
The Vinerian Reader in English Law,
The Reader in Indian Law, and the holder of any other Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law,
The Examiners for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence, and all persons who have served in either of those capacities within the three years preceding.

The Members of the Board may from time to time (if they shall think fit) add by co-optation not more than three persons. Every person so added shall retire at the end of two years, but shall be re-eligible.

"6. The Board shall every year elect one of its Members to be Chairman. In case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote. The Board shall meet each year in the first fortnight of Michaelmas Term, and at other times when summoned by the Chairman. The Chairman shall always summon a meeting when requested to do so by two Members of the Board.

"7. The Board shall exercise a general supervision over the subjects of Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, and shall from time to time issue lists of books and subjects, and shall have power to make such further regulations as it shall deem necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Statute."

4. In § 3, cl. 2 of the same Statute (p. 120, ed. of 1879), the words "and if the Board" down to "such certificate" inclusive shall be struck out.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the constitution of the Board of Studies for the Honour School of Jurisprudence, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. C. § 7 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 93, 94), clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted :

ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE.

The subjects will be Classical, and Candidates must be under twenty years of age on June 19.

The Scholarship is of the annual value of £80, tenable for four years.

The examination will be held in common with Magdalen and Worcester Colleges. Every Candidate will be considered as standing at the other Colleges as well as that at which he puts down his name, unless he makes a statement to the contrary, and will be requested to state which College or Colleges he would prefer in the event of his being elected to more than one.

"The Exhibitions shall be filled up by the election of deserving persons, being natives of Wales or Monmouthshire, whom the Principal and Fellows shall have ascertained to be in need of support at the University."

The Scholarships are of the value of £80 per annum, and the Exhibitions £40.

Elementary Mathematical papers in Arithmetic, Euclid i. ii, and Algebra to Equations, will be set to all Classical Candidates, and elementary Classical papers in Latin Prose, Latin and Greek Grammar, and Latin and Greek Translation to other Candidates, in order to secure sufficient proficiency for University requirements. Candidates who hold Certificates which are accepted in lieu of Responsions will be excused the elementary papers; while those who fail in them will not be allowed to continue their examination.

Candidates can be accommodated with rooms, and be allowed to battel in College, upon conditions of their conforming to College regulations. Applications for rooms must be made to the Bursar on or before June 7.

WORCESTER COLLEGE.

There will be an Election at this College, in June to the following SCHOLARSHIPS and EXHIBITIONS.

1, 2, 3. THREE SCHOLARSHIPS, on the foundation of Dr. Clarke, are entirely open. They are of the annual value of £75 (including rooms rent free), and are tenable for five years from Matriculation.

The Mathematical examination will begin on Thursday,

June 10, at 10 A.M. Candidates are to call on the Provost on Friday, June 11, between 5 and 6 P.M.

If there should be no Mathematical candidate of sufficient merit the College may elect to this Scholarship for Classics.

With this exception, the examination for all the Scholarships and Exhibitions will be in the usual Classical subjects.

It has been arranged to hold the Classical examination in common with Magdalen and St. John's Colleges. Every Candidate will be considered as standing at the other Colleges as well as at that at which he puts down his name, unless he makes a statement to the contrary, and will be requested to state which College or Colleges he would prefer in the event of his being elected at more than one.

Candidates for the Finney Scholarship are to call on the Provost of Worcester College, and present their certificates of being duly qualified, on Monday, June 14, between 4 and 6 P.M. Candidates for the other Classical Scholarships and the Exhibitions may call at these hours, or between 4 and 6 P.M. on Tuesday, June 15.

The Examination will take place on Monday and Tuesday, July 12 and 13.

Candidates for the Exhibition may be, but are not required to be, at the same time Candidates for the Certificates granted by the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board; and may either be Unattached or Non-Collegiate Students of one Term's standing (the Easter and Act Terms counting for this purpose as one Term), or persons not yet members of either University. All who desire to be Candidates for the Exhibition must send either to J. S. Lockhart, Esq., Hertford College, Oxford, or to E. J. Gross, Esq., Caius College, Cambridge, notice of their names and ages, with

certificates of character, on or before the first day of June, for examination in July. Arrangements will be subsequently made as to the place of examination for each Candidate.

The successful Candidate for the Exhibition must on election be admitted, if not already a member of either University, as an Unattached or Non-Collegiate Student, and begin his residence in the following Michaelmas Term. The Exhibition is tenable only so long as the holder's name is on the books of the Delegacy of Students not attached to any College or Hall at Oxford or of the corresponding Board at Cambridge.

The stipend of the Exhibitioner will accrue from the Michaelmas Day after the election.

Each Oxford Exhibitioner must pass, or have passed, Responsions, or one of the equivalent Examinations, in his first year, as a condition of holding the Exhibition for a second year, and the First Public Examination in his second year, as a condition of holding the Exhibition for a third year. Before each instalment of an Exhibition is paid, a certificate must be obtained from the Censors to the effect that the holder has kept such residence as is required of Students in full residence in the University during the period for which it is payable, that he has fulfilled the above requirement as to Examinations, and that his moral conduct and attention to his duties as a member of the University have been satisfactory.

In the event of no Candidate appearing to be of sufficient merit to satisfy the Examiners, the Exhibition may be awarded for proficiency in Mathematics, according to the results of an examination afterwards to be held.

Each Candidate for this Exhibition only will have to pay a fee of £1 to the Joint Board on entering his name; if however he offers himself also as a Candidate for a Certificate, the fee will be £2.

2. CLOTHWORKERS' EXHIBITIONS.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Statute on the Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, by striking out certain provisions, and by amending the provisions respecting the Board of Studies and the appointment of Examiners, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. IV, § 2 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 118, 119),

1. Clauses 2, 3 shall be struck out.

2. Clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted :

"4. The Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law shall be conducted by the Regius Professor of Civil Law, or some other Professor or Reader in the Faculty of Law deputed by him, together with not less than three, nor more than four, other Examiners, to be annually selected out of their own body, except as hereinafter provided, by the following persons, viz. the Regius Professor of Civil Law, the Vinerian Professor of English Law, the Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy, the Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence, the Vinerian Reader in English Law, the Reader in Indian Law, the holder of any Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law, and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence: Provided that one of the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence shall always be among the Examiners so selected. The said persons may, instead of selecting all the Examiners from their own body, nominate one person not of their own body to be one of the Examiners, such nomination being subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor."

3. Clause 5 shall be struck out, and the following clauses shall be substituted :

"5. There shall be a Board of Legal Studies consisting of—
The Regius Professor of Civil Law,
The Vinerian Professor of English Law,
The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy,
The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence,
The Vinerian Reader in English Law,
The Reader in Indian Law, and the holder of any other Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law,
The Examiners for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence, and all persons who have served in either of those capacities within the three years preceding.

The Members of the Board may from time to time (if they shall think fit) add by co-optation not more than three persons. Every person so added shall retire at the end of two years, but shall be re-eligible.

"6. The Board shall every year elect one of its Members to be Chairman. In case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote. The Board shall meet each year in the first fortnight of Michaelmas Term, and at other times when summoned by the Chairman. The Chairman shall always summon a meeting when requested to do so by two Members of the Board.

"7. The Board shall exercise a general supervision over the subjects of Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil

Law, and shall from time to time issue lists of books and subjects, and shall have power to make such further regulations as it shall deem necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Statute."

4. In § 3, cl. 2 of the same Statute (p. 120, ed. of 1879), the words "and if the Board" down to "such certificate" inclusive shall be struck out.

The Scholarships are of the value of £80 per annum, and the Exhibitions £40.

Elementary Mathematical papers in Arithmetic, Euclid i. ii, and Algebra to Equations, will be set to all Classical Candidates, and elementary Classical papers in Latin Prose, Latin and Greek Grammar, and Latin and Greek Translation to other Candidates, in order to secure sufficient proficiency for University requirements. Candidates who hold Certificates which are accepted in lieu of Responsions will be excused the elementary papers; while those who fail in them will not be allowed to continue their examination.

Candidates can be accommodated with rooms, and be allowed to bathe in College, upon conditions of their conforming to College regulations. Applications for rooms must be made to the Bursar on or before June 7.

With this exception, the examination for all the Scholarships and Exhibitions will be in the usual Classical subjects.

It has been arranged to hold the Classical examination in common with Magdalen and St. John's Colleges. Every Candidate will be considered as standing at the other Colleges as well as at that at which he puts down his name, unless he makes a statement to the contrary, and will be requested to state which College or Colleges he would prefer in the event of his being elected at more than one.

Candidates for the Finney Scholarship are to call on the Provost of Worcester College, and present their certificates of being duly qualified, on Monday, June 14, between 4 and 6 P.M. Candidates for the other Classical Scholarships and the Exhibitions may call at these hours, or between 4 and 6 P.M. on Tuesday, June 15.

All Candidates will be required to produce certificates of good character.

The Classical examination will begin on Tuesday, June 15, at 9.30 A.M.

A certain number of Candidates can have rooms in College during the examination, on application to the Bursar, with a recommendation from their Master or Tutor.

 9. ONE SCHOLARSHIP, on the Lucy foundation. This Scholarship is of the value of £40 for three years, and is limited, in the first instance, to persons educated at the Hampton Lucy Grammar School.

In case of Candidates of sufficient attainments not presenting themselves for Scholarships 4, 5, 7, 9, such Scholarship may be filled up from among the Candidates for the open Scholarships.

Any of the Scholarships 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 may be awarded for proficiency either in Classics or Mathematics. Candidates in Mathematics will be required to exhibit such Classical knowledge as will give reasonable promise of their passing the University Examinations in due course.

Candidates, if members of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, or London, must not have exceeded two years from their Matriculation. There is no limit of age for any of the Scholarships, but married persons are not eligible.

The examination will begin on Tuesday, December 7. Candidates are requested to call on the Principal, with testimonials of good conduct from their respective Schools or Colleges, on Monday, December 6, between 8 and 10 P.M.

IV.**Voting on Statutes.**

In the same CONVOCATION the following forms of Statute, which were approved by Congregation on Tuesday, May 4, were submitted to the House and approved (*nemine contradicente*).

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Statute on the Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, by striking out certain provisions, and by amending the provisions respecting the Board of Studies and the appointment of Examiners, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. IV, § 2 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 118, 119),

1. Clauses 2, 3 shall be struck out.

2. Clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted:

“4. The Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law shall be conducted by the Regius Professor of Civil Law, or some other Professor or Reader in the Faculty of Law deputed by him, together with not less than three, nor more than four, other Examiners, to be annually selected out of their own body, except as hereinafter provided, by the following persons, viz. the Regius Professor of Civil Law, the Vinerian Professor of English Law, the Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy, the Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence, the Vinerian Reader in English Law, the Reader in Indian Law, the holder of any Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law, and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence: Provided that one of the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence shall always be among the Examiners so selected. The said persons may, instead of selecting all the Examiners from their own body, nominate one person not of their own body to be one of the Examiners, such nomination being subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor.”

3. Clause 5 shall be struck out, and the following clauses shall be substituted:

“5. There shall be a Board of Legal Studies consisting of—
The Regius Professor of Civil Law,
The Vinerian Professor of English Law,
The Chichele Professor of International Law and Diplomacy,
The Corpus Professor of Jurisprudence,
The Vinerian Reader in English Law,

The Reader in Indian Law, and the holder of any other Professorship or Readership which may hereafter be founded in the Faculty of Law,

The Examiners for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law and the Examiners in the Honour School of Jurisprudence, and all persons who have served in either of those capacities within the three years preceding.

The Members of the Board may from time to time (if they shall think fit) add by co-optation not more than three persons. Every person so added shall retire at the end of two years, but shall be re-eligible.

“6. The Board shall every year elect one of its Members to be Chairman. In case of an equality of votes the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote. The Board shall meet each year in the first fortnight of Michaelmas Term, and at other times when summoned by the Chairman. The Chairman shall always summon a meeting when requested to do so by two Members of the Board.

“7. The Board shall exercise a general supervision over the subjects of Examination for the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, and shall from time to time issue lists of books and subjects, and shall have power to make such further regulations as it shall deem necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Statute.”

4. In § 3, cl. 2 of the same Statute (p. 120, ed. of 1879), the words “and if the Board” down to “such certificate” inclusive shall be struck out.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the constitution of the Board of Studies for the Honour School of Jurisprudence, THE UNIVERSITY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

In Statt. Tit. V (VI), Sect. I. C. § 7 (Statutes, ed. of 1879, pp. 93, 94), clause 4 shall be struck out, and the following clause shall be substituted:

4. ONE SCHOLARSHIP, limited, in the first instance, to persons born in the county of Essex, or having been educated for three years at a school in that county.
5. ONE SCHOLARSHIP, limited, in the first instance, to sons of former Fellows of Brasenose College.

Each of the above Scholarships will be of the value of £100 per annum and tenable for five years. No Candidate will be eligible who is not a member of the Church of England or of Ireland, or of one of the Protestant Episcopal Churches of Scotland, the British Colonies, or the United States of America.

6. ONE SCHOLARSHIP, on the Lusby foundation, of the annual value of £60 for four years.

7. ONE SCHOLARSHIP, on the Meeke foundation, of the annual value of £50 for four years. This Scholarship is limited, in the first instance, to persons educated at Worcester Grammar School.

8. ONE SCHOLARSHIP, on the Macbride foundation, of the annual value of £50 for four years.

9. ONE SCHOLARSHIP, on the Lucy foundation. This Scholarship is of the value of £40 for three years, and is limited, in the first instance, to persons educated at the Hampton Lucy Grammar School.

In case of Candidates of sufficient attainments not presenting themselves for Scholarships 4, 5, 7, 9, such Scholarship may be filled up from among the Candidates for the open Scholarships.

Any of the Scholarships 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 may be awarded for proficiency either in Classics or Mathematics. Candidates in Mathematics will be required to exhibit such Classical knowledge as will give reasonable promise of their passing the University Examinations in due course.

Candidates, if members of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, or London, must not have exceeded two years from their Matriculation. There is no limit of age for any of the Scholarships, but married persons are not eligible.

1. CLOTHWORKERS' EXHIBITIONS FOR THE ENCOURAGEMENT OF THE STUDY OF NATURAL SCIENCE.

The Clothworkers' Company having announced that they will henceforward give three Exhibitions of £52 10s. a year each, to be awarded for proficiency in Physical Science, ten-

able for three years, to be held by Unattached Students of the University of Oxford or Non-Collegiate Students of the University of Cambridge, arrangements have been made by which one of these Exhibitions shall be offered yearly for competition among those who may offer themselves in Natural Science at the Examination held in July under the authority of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

The Candidate who shall most distinguish himself in the subjects specified below will, if of sufficient merit, be elected and will have the option of taking the Exhibition either to Oxford or to Cambridge.

The subjects for Examination in 1880 may be learnt from the Regulations of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board, 1880, pp. 14-16; or by enquiry from the Censors of Students not attached to any College or Hall.

The Examination will take place on Monday and Tuesday, July 12 and 13.

Candidates for the Exhibition may be, but are not required to be, at the same time Candidates for the Certificates granted by the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board; and may either be Unattached or Non-Collegiate Students of one Term's standing (the Easter and Act Terms counting for this purpose as one Term), or persons not yet members of either University. All who desire to be Candidates for the Exhibition must send either to J. S. Lockhart, Esq., Hertford College, Oxford, or to E. J. Gross, Esq., Caius College, Cambridge, notice of their names and ages, with certificates of character, on or before the first day of June, for examination in July. Arrangements will be subsequently made as to the place of examination for each Candidate.

The successful Candidate for the Exhibition must on election be admitted, if not already a member of either University, as an Unattached or Non-Collegiate Student, and begin his residence in the following Michaelmas Term. The Exhibition is tenable only so long as the holder's name is on the books of the Delegacy of Students not attached to any College or Hall at Oxford or of the corresponding Board at Cambridge.

The stipend of the Exhibitioner will accrue from the Michaelmas Day after the election.

Each Oxford Exhibitioner must pass, or have passed, Responsions, or one of the equivalent Examinations, in his first year, as a condition of holding the Exhibition for a second year, and the First Public Examination in his second year, as a condition of holding the Exhibition for a third year. Before each instalment of an Exhibition is paid, a certificate must be obtained from the Censors to the effect that the holder has kept such residence as is required of Students in full residence in the University during the period for which it is payable, that he has fulfilled the above requirement as to Examinations, and that his moral conduct and attention to his duties as a member of the University have been satisfactory.

In the event of no Candidate appearing to be of sufficient merit to satisfy the Examiners, the Exhibition may be awarded for proficiency in Mathematics, according to the results of an examination afterwards to be held.

Each Candidate for this Exhibition only will have to pay a fee of £1 to the Joint Board on entering his name; if however he offers himself also as a Candidate for a Certificate, the fee will be £2.

2. CLOTHWORKERS' EXHIBITIONS.

The Delegates desire to give notice that the Worshipful the Master and Court of Assistants of the Clothworkers' Com-

That a site of 120 ft. by 60 ft. be granted for the Indian Institute on the south side of the Park, opposite a projected road east of St. Peter's Vicarage, upon the following conditions:—

(i) That £6000 be invested in the name of the University before the building is commenced, as a maintenance and endowment fund, and that not less than one half of any sums contributed above £18,000 be added to this fund.

(ii) That the plans for the building be laid before the Hebdomadal Council, with a view to their being submitted to Convocation.

. A map of the Park upon which the proposed site is marked is placed in the Office of the Curators of the Chest. It is proposed that the preparation of the plans should be entrusted to Mr. Easil Champneys.

That the Vice-Chancellor be authorised to signify to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners the consent of the University, as patrons of Kirkdale, to the annexation of the hamlet of Beadlam to the parish of Kirkdale for ecclesiastical purposes.

. The Earl of Feversham has offered a site and a contribution of £400 for the erection of a new Church in Beadlam, which will be available for the township of Nawton in Kirkdale, on condition that Beadlam, which contains a population of 140, be detached from Helmsley, of which Lord Feversham is patron, and annexed to Kirkdale.

(2)

That the Delegates of the Press be authorised to contribute a grant of books printed at the Clarendon Press (not exceeding £50 in value) to the Cambridge Free Library.

(3)

That the Delegates of the Press be authorised to contribute a grant of books printed at the Clarendon Press (not exceeding £50 in value) to the Theological Library at Madagascar.

(4)

That as from the 16th day of July, 1879, the present Demonstrator of Anatomy receive yearly £250 out of the income of the funds referred to in *Statt. Tit. IV, Sect. 1, § 12, cl. 3* (p. 30, ed. 1879) as the "emolumenta Tomlinsiano-Aldrichiana;" and that in any year during his tenure of office in which such income falls short of £250 the Curators of the University Chest be authorised to make it up to that sum out of the general fund of the University.

. This Form of Decree is proposed in consequence of a falling off in the rents of the Tomlins Farm.

(5)

That the Curators of the University Chest be authorised to expend a sum not exceeding £140 on providing an approach and erecting gates on the south side of the new Chemical Laboratory.

. A plan may be seen at the Curators' office.

(6)

That St. David's College, in the county of Cardigan (commonly called St. David's College, Lampeter), be admitted to the privileges of an affiliated College.

. 1. St. David's College was incorporated 9 Geo. IV, empowered by Charter 16 Victoria to grant B.D. degree, and by Charter 28 Victoria to grant B.A. degree.

The endowment consists of £1500 a year from Ecclesiastical Commissioners; £224 for Natural Science Professorship; about £500 for Scholarships and Exhibitions; £550 from Tithes; £44 interest of amount from sale of Advowsons. There are 70 students in residence, 54 occupying rooms in College.

2. By Statute II, made by the Visitor under the powers of the Charter, "The general government of the College, subject to the control of the Visitor, shall be vested in a Board consisting of the Principal, Tutors, and Professors of the College, and hereafter termed 'the College Board,' and no meeting of the said Board shall be held to be a lawful meeting, or be competent to do any act, unless three members of the Board at least be present."

To meet the requirements of the University the Visitor has promulgated the additional clause—

"If and as soon as the College shall have been affiliated to the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, or either of them, the College Board constituted by the second of the Statutes made and framed for the good government and general regulation of the said College, and promulgated by us on the

seventh day of May 1879, shall thereafter consist of the Principal, Tutors, and Professors of the said College, together with one representative of each of the said Universities to which the College shall have been affiliated, elected or appointed in accordance with the Statutes of each such University concerning the affiliation thereto of Colleges external to the same."

Note.—The Principal, Tutors, and Professors constitute at present a Board of six members; viz.

Rev. F. J. Jayne, M.A., late Fellow of Jesus College, Oxford;
Rev. W. Harrison Davey, M.A., late Scholar of Lincoln College, Oxford;
Rev. C. G. Edmondson, M.A., late Scholar of Trinity College, Oxford;
A. W. Scott, M.A., late Scholar of Trinity College, Dublin;
J. Owen, M.A., late Scholar of Jesus College, Oxford;
W. A. B. Coolidge, M.A., Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford.

By the Charter of 16 Victoria it is provided that at "every such examination (for the degree of B.D.) the candidates shall be examined by three Examiners, of whom one shall be a member of our University of Oxford, and appointed by the Vice-Chancellor of the said University."

By the Charter of 28 Victoria it is provided that at "every such examination (for the degree of B.A.) the candidates shall be examined by two or more Examiners, being at least of the degree of Master of Arts (not being the said Principal nor any of the said Tutors or Professors), and of whom one or more shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Oxford."

That in Michaelmas Term of the present year only, Examinations be held as heretofore for the degree of Bachelor of Medicine, and that the usual stipend be paid to each of the Examiners.

authorised to contribute a sum not exceeding £2000 for the erection of a Church thereon capable of accommodating not fewer than 500 persons.

* * * The University holds in the parish of Bexley, Kent, about 930 acres of land, being about one-fifth part of the whole parish. A large part of this estate, by reason of its beauty of situation and nearness to the railway station, is well adapted to building purposes, and offers most attractive sites for gentlemen's houses; another part is convenient for the erection of shops and labourers' cottages. Some gentlemen's houses have already been erected, and applications for sites of houses of all the three classes are under consideration. There is however no Church accommodation in the immediate neighbourhood, and the demand for sittings in the Parish Church, which is at a considerable distance, is already much in excess of the available room. It has been proposed to enlarge this Church, and the University has made a grant of £200 for the purpose; but a fuller consideration of the whole requirements of the parish, including those which arise out of the projected houses on the University Estate, has just now (May 12) brought an influential Committee of the parishioners to the conclusion that the old Parish Church cannot be so repaired or enlarged as to provide all the required accommodation, and that the wants can only be supplied by the erection in another part of the parish of a new Church capable of accommodating eventually not fewer than 800 persons. Under these circumstances they propose to defer, at least for the present, the restoration of the old Church, and to concentrate their efforts on the immediate erection of a new Church; or at all events of a part of a Church capable of accommodating in the first instance 500 persons at least, and of enlargement hereafter so as to accommodate 800. The Committee are of opinion that the most convenient site for the new Church, in respect both of existing population and of the prospective residents on the University estate, is a piece of land in Park Wood on that estate, and two Curators of the University Chest who have inspected the place and conferred with the Committee are of the same opinion. If this plan is carried into effect, there would be two Churches conveniently situated for the whole parish, viz. the old Church for the eastern part, and the new Church for the western part of the parish. It may be estimated that not fewer than 400 sittings will be required hereafter for the residents on the University estate in the western part; and it appears that from £10 to £12 is the probable cost of one sitting.

As the Parishioners and Landowners of Bexley are now much interested in the provision of further Church accommodation, and as the demand is urgent, the Committee desire to begin the collection of funds without delay. The Hebdomadal Council having taken into consideration all these circumstances, have resolved to submit to Convocation the above-stated form of Decree.

It may be mentioned that the University grant of £200 for the restoration of the old Church will lapse at the end of the current year.

It is proposed that the new Church should be a Chapel of Ease to the old Church, so that the whole parish will continue as heretofore in the charge of the Vicar of Bexley.

The Secretary to the Curators of the University Chest will be in attendance at the office of the Curators, Old Clarendon Building, on Saturday and Monday next, June 5 and 7, from 2 to 3 P.M., for the purpose of giving to members of Convocation any information that they may desire as to the proposed site and the circumstances of the parish.

This examination will begin on Friday, November 19, at Ten o'clock.

There will also be a Practical Examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient.

This examination will begin on Friday, November 26, at Ten o'clock, and will comprise Pure Mathematics, including the Differential Calculus; and Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

Candidates are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 25, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VI. To TWO EXHIBITIONS, worth £40 a year; tenable during residence for four years; but not tenable with a Scholarship, or any other Exhibition of the College: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded one year from Matriculation.

The examination for these Exhibitions will comprise Pure Mathematics so far as to include Conic Sections; the Elements of Mechanics and Hydrostatics; translations from Greek and from Latin, and into Latin Prose; and English History.

Candidates may also offer, as optional subjects, any two of the following: viz. (1) a higher examination in Classics; (2) Moral Philosophy; (3) any of the higher branches of Pure and Mixed Mathematics; (4) the Elements of Physics, Chemistry, or Physiology; (5) some portion of Ancient History. This examination will begin on Friday morning, November 26.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention *by letter* to the Master of Balliol on or before Tuesday, November 23, mentioning any of the optional subjects which they may offer for examination; and enclosing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VII. A HEBREW SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £80 a year (£55 a year and tuition free), open to all such candidates as have not exceeded two years from their Matriculation, tenable during residence for three years, and to be continued for a fourth if the Scholar study at a foreign University with the consent of the College. Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of Latin and Greek as is sufficient for the requirements of the University.

The examination for this Scholarship will begin on Friday,

November 19, at Ten o'clock. Candidates are requested to call upon the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 18, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges and Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation.

The examination papers will embrace Hebrew grammar, pointing, translation of English into Hebrew and Hebrew into English. Special questions will be set (1) in the Hebrew Text of Deuteronomy, (2) 2 Kings, (3) Isaiah i-xxxix. Two at least of these books must be offered by the Candidates. Candidates are at liberty to offer either Chaldee and Syriac, or the elements of Arabic, as an extra subject.

The holders of any of the above Scholarships or Exhibitions will be allowed to reside either within or without the walls of the College. I. FELLOWSHIP.

An estimate of the scope of the examination may be formed by reference to the following text-books:—Ganot's Physics, Newth's Elements of Natural Philosophy, Roscoe's Chemistry, Huxley and Martin's Biology, Gegenbaur's Elements of Comparative Anatomy, Sach's Handbook of Botany, Books I and II, Spencer's Principles of Biology. The examination will be

to a large extent practical, but special weight will be given to comprehension of general principles.

TWO SCHOLARSHIPS (Stapledon), tenable for five years during residence, and of the annual value of £60, are open to all British subjects who have not on the day of election completed the twentieth year of their age and have been born in the old diocese of Exeter, or have been educated in some school in that diocese for the three years last past. One of the Stapledon Scholars will be expected to reside in October.

One of the Exhibitions is of the value of about £35 per annum, and in default of any Candidate educated at Ashburton School (and it is believed there will be none) is limited, in the first instance, to persons born or educated in the county of Devon.

The second is of the value of £30 per annum, and is open.

Candidates for the Exhibitions should give evidence to the Rector at least ten days before the examination that they are in need of assistance at the University. The age of the Candidates for the Exhibitions is not limited.

The Examination also for Matriculation will take place at the same time, the Candidates for which as well as for the Scholarship and Exhibitions should call on the Rector on Wednesday, October 13, between 5 and 7 or 8 and 9 P.M.

The Electors have power to award a certain number of small Exhibitions to unsuccessful Candidates who do well in the examination and wish to matriculate or to remain as Commoners of the College.

7. ONE HOLFORD EXHIBITION, of the annual value of £20, is open for this turn, tenable, with residence, for five years.

Each Author is desired to conceal his Name, and to distinguish his composition by what Motto he pleases; sending at the same time his Name, *and the date of his Matriculation*, sealed up under another cover, with the same Motto inscribed upon it.

The Essay to which the Prize shall have been adjudged will be read before the University in the Divinity School on some

day in the week next before the Commemoration; *and it is expected that no Essay will be sent in which exceeds in length the ordinary limits of recitation.*

* * It is not to be published, except in cases where the Judges shall unanimously approve of the publication.

CONINGTON PRIZE, 1882.

"The manner in which the writings attributed to Aristotle have received their present form, to be illustrated especially from the Nicomachean Ethics, the Politics, and the De Animâ."

Without wishing to interfere with the judgment of candidates in treating this subject, it is suggested that the following topics, or some of them, may with advantage be discussed:—

The nature of the revision or redaction which the writings of Aristotle have undergone, as far as it can be gathered from internal evidence of thought and language (including the different kinds of repetitions), and from the comparison of Aristotle's works with one another.

The division into books.

The combination of smaller treatises into larger wholes.

The relation of the Nicomachean Ethics to the Eudemian, and to the *Magna Moralia*.

The order of the books of the Politics.

The hypothesis of two recensions of the *De Anima*.

The supposed loss of certain of the works of Aristotle in the third and second centuries B.C.

The value and origin of the ancient catalogues.

A comparison of the works of Aristotle with those of Hippocrates or any other great teacher, in respect of the form in which they have been preserved.

The degree of acquaintance with the writings of Aristotle possessed by Cicero, Sextus Empiricus, and other Greek and Roman authors.

The competing dissertations must be sent in to the Registrar on or before the first Saturday in Easter Term 1882. The author of a dissertation is at liberty to conceal his name, distinguishing his dissertation by a motto, and sending at the same time his name within a cover with the same motto written upon it.

Candidates must at the time appointed for sending in the dissertations have passed all the Examinations required for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and must have completed three years, but not exceeded fifteen years, from their Matriculation.

DENYER AND JOHNSON THEOLOGICAL SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Board of Theological Studies have appointed the following subjects of examination for the Denyer and Johnson Theological Scholarships in 1881:—

1. The Old Testament. Questions involving a knowledge of the original language will be given on the Books of Daniel, Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther. Reference will also be made to the Septuagint Version.

2. The New Testament, in the Original: especial attention to be given to the Gospel according to St. John and the Epistles of St. Paul to the Ephesians, Colossians, and Philemon.

3. Dogmatic Theology. The Doctrine of Grace, to be studied in St. Augustine's Treatises, *de Spiritu et Litera*, *de Natura et Gratia*, and *de Gestis Pelagii*. The Canons of the Second Council of Orange, A.D. 529. Pearson on the Creed, Articles IX–XII.

4. Church History. The History of the Ante-Nicene Church, to be studied in connexion with Eusebius, Books III and IV, and the *Patres Apostolici* (ed. Funk).

5. Professor Flint's Theism (Baird Lecture for 1876, Edinburgh).

TAYLORIAN SCHOLARSHIP AND EXHIBITION.

The Examination for the STOWELL CIVIL LAW FELLOWSHIP will commence on Tuesday, October 12, at 10 A.M.

In addition to papers on Jurisprudence and Roman and English Law historically and scientifically treated, the Examination will include an equal proportion of papers on other and more general subjects. Papers will be set in the following subjects:—(1) Mechanical Philosophy and Physics; (2) Chemistry; (3) Physiology. But candidates will not be expected to offer themselves in more than two of these.

There will also be a Practical Examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient.

Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation; and stating the subjects in which they offer themselves for examination.

IV. To a MATHEMATICAL SCHOLARSHIP, tenable during residence for four years; worth about £80 a year (£55 a year and free tuition): open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded four Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday, November 26, at Ten o'clock, and will comprise Pure Mathematics, including the Differential Calculus; and Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

Candidates are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 25, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VI. To TWO EXHIBITIONS, worth £40 a year; tenable during residence for four years; but not tenable with a Scholarship, or any other Exhibition of the College: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded one year from Matriculation.

The examination for these Exhibitions will comprise Pure Mathematics so far as to include Conic Sections; the Elements of Mechanics and Hydrostatics; translations from Greek and from Latin, and into Latin Prose; and English History.

Candidates may also offer, as optional subjects, any two of the following: viz. (1) a higher examination in Classics; (2) Moral Philosophy; (3) any of the higher branches of Pure and Mixed Mathematics; (4) the Elements of Physics, Chemistry, or Physiology; (5) some portion of Ancient History. This examination will begin on Friday morning, November 26.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention *by letter* to the Master of Balliol on or before Tuesday, November 23, mentioning any of the optional subjects which they may offer for examination; and enclosing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VII. A HEBREW SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £80 a year (£55 a year and tuition free), open to all such candidates as have not exceeded two years from their Matriculation, tenable during residence for three years, and to be continued

for a fourth if the Scholar study at a foreign University with the consent of the College. Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of Latin and Greek as is sufficient for the requirements of the University.

The examination for this Scholarship will begin on Friday, November 19, at Ten o'clock. Candidates are requested to call upon the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 18, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges and Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation.

The examination papers will embrace Hebrew grammar, pointing, translation of English into Hebrew and Hebrew into English. Special questions will be set (1) in the Hebrew Text of Deuteronomy, (2) 2 Kings, (3) Isaiah i-xxxix. Two at least of these books must be offered by the Candidates. Candidates are at liberty to offer either Chaldee and Syriac, or the elements of Arabic, as an extra subject.

The holders of any of the above Scholarships or Exhibitions will be allowed to reside either within or without the walls of the College. If resident within the College, they will be subject to the usual College payments: if residing out of College, they will pay to the College a deposit of £5, instead of £21, for Caution Money; and, yearly, a sum of £25 for Tuition, £1 for University Dues, £1 to the College Library, and 8s. for College Dues.

The Examination will be in Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. Candidates will be expected to show proficiency in at least two subjects, and the Scholar will be required to read for Honours in Biology in the Natural Science School. An estimate of the scope of the examination may be formed

by reference to the following text-books :—Ganot's Physics, Newth's Elements of Natural Philosophy, Roscoe's Chemistry, Huxley and Martin's Biology, Gegenbaur's Elements of Comparative Anatomy, Sach's Handbook of Botany, Books I and II, Spencer's Principles of Biology. The examination will be to a large extent practical, but special weight will be given to comprehension of general principles.

TWO SCHOLARSHIPS (Stapledon), tenable for five years during residence, and of the annual value of £60, are open to all British subjects who have not on the day of election completed the twentieth year of their age and have been born in the old diocese of Exeter, or have been educated *in some school* in that diocese for the three years last past. One of the Stapledon Scholars will be expected to reside in October.

One of the Exhibitions is of the value of about £35 per annum, and in default of any Candidate educated at Ashburton School (and it is believed there will be none) is limited, in the first instance, to persons born or educated in the county of Devon.

The second is of the value of £30 per annum, and is open.

Candidates for the *Exhibitions* should give evidence to the Rector at least ten days before the examination that they are in need of assistance at the University. The age of the Candidates for the *Exhibitions* is not limited.

DERBY SCHOLARSHIP.

The Trustees of the Derby University Scholarship, accepted by Decree of Convocation, June 8, 1872, give notice that they will proceed to the Election of a SCHOLAR in the course of the present month of July.

Candidates must be members of the University who shall have completed their twentieth and not completed their twenty-fourth Term, and must have obtained the following Academical distinctions:—

1. A First Class in Literis Græcis et Latinis at the First Public Examination;
2. A First Class in Literis Humanioribus at the Second Public Examination; or,
A Second Class in Literis Humanioribus at the Second Public Examination, together with the Chancellor's Prize for Latin Verse and the Chancellor's Prize either for the English or for the Latin Essay;
3. Two out of the three Classical University Scholarships, that is to say, the Hertford, Ireland, and Craven Scholarships.

Names of Candidates, with statements of their Academical distinctions, must be sent in to the Vice-Chancellor on or before Saturday, July 17.

THE undersigned members of Convocation beg to call the attention of the Curators of the Theatre, the Curators of the Bodleian Library, and the Visitors of the Ashmolean Museum, to a proposal for lighting the Sheldonian Theatre, and any rooms in the neighbourhood, in particular the Camera Radcliffiana, with the Electric Light.

It has long been regretted by many members of the University that the Sheldonian Theatre is not available in the evening for any purposes of public interest however great, for want of lighting. The neighbourhood of the Bodleian Library has however been a bar to any proposal for lighting by means of gas, or any ordinary method. The care with which the heating apparatus of the Theatre has been enclosed within a fire-proof chamber is sufficient evidence of the importance attached by the Curators of the Theatre to absolute security in this respect.

The development of the electric light has now rendered it possible to illuminate public rooms by a process absolutely free from danger of fire. It has been adopted largely in the reading rooms of our public libraries, and notably in the reading room of the British Museum. The security is absolute and unquestionable provided that the motive power is external to the building: the boon to readers in such reading rooms is enormous.

The most convenient source of power for the electric light is the gas engine. The prime cost of a sufficient engine is roughly about the same as that of a steam engine with its boiler and appendages; the subsequent consumption of gas is however trifling in cost.

The most convenient place for a gas engine or other source of power, for electric lights in the neighbourhood of the Schools would appear to be the sunken area in front of the Ashmolean Museum. A small rectangular strip off one end of this area would be sufficient. No use is made at present of this area, and the engine would be at once easily accessible, and so far out of the way that no annoyance or risk could be caused by it. The electric circuits are quite free from risk; and modern gas engines make little or no noise and are easily managed. An alternative site might be found within the enclosure of the Camera Radcliffiana, or possibly on the opposite side of Broad Street.

Many readers in the Camera Radcliffiana, who are dissatisfied with its lighting and ventilation at present and are familiar with the effect of the electric light at the British Museum, would regard it as a great benefit if the electric light could be regularly employed in the reading room of our great Oxford Library.

It is not possible to say with certainty what the total cost of the requisite apparatus would amount to; partly because improvements proceed so rapidly that the older estimates might prove mistaken. But it may be said generally that the outlay would consist of a considerable initial expenditure, with a very small permanent cost comparatively for working and maintenance. The cost of carbons for the electric light is trifling, and the gas engine is by far the most economical source of power that exists.

It is suggested that Dr. Siemens, F.R.S., D.C.L., to whom the electric light owes much of its recent development, might with advantage be consulted in connexion with this proposal. Whether a permanent institution or an experimental trial is in question, all parties concerned can have the most perfect confidence that everything will be done as it should be in his hands.

It is suggested that an experimental trial should be first made, which could be done at comparatively little expense. The memorialists feel confident that, if this is conceded, the permanent adoption of the light will follow.

The memorialists hope that the Curators of the Theatre may see their way to action in this matter. The Curators of the Bodleian may be glad to consent to avail themselves of any opportunities, but the care of the Library will probably remain a first charge on the funds at their disposal.

The consent of the Visitors of the Ashmolean Museum would be required for the use of a portion of the area in front of the Ashmolean Museum.

In every case the time is to be computed by *Calendar*, not *Academical* Years, and *strictly*, from the day of Matriculation to the day above specified, without reference to any *intervening circumstances whatever*.

No person who has already obtained a Prize will be deemed entitled to a second Prize of the same description.

The Exercises are all to be sent in under a sealed Cover to the Registrar of the University on or before THE THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF MARCH, 1881. Each Author is required to conceal his Name, and to distinguish his composition by what Motto he pleases; sending at the same time his Name, and *the date of his Matriculation*, sealed up under another Cover, with the same Motto inscribed upon it.

Such portions of the successful compositions will be recited in the Theatre upon the Commemoration-Day as the Public Orator and the Professor of Poetry shall appoint.

DERBY SCHOLARSHIP.

To a SCHOLARSHIP on the foundation of Miss Hannah Brakenbury, "for the encouragement of the Study of Natural Science;" worth £80 a year (£55 and tuition free), tenable during residence for four years: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday, November 19, at Ten o'clock.

Papers will be set in the following subjects:—(1) Mechanical Philosophy and Physics; (2) Chemistry; (3) Physiology. But candidates will not be expected to offer themselves in more than two of these.

There will also be a Practical Examination in one or more of the above subjects, if the Examiners think it expedient.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention to the Master of Balliol *by letter*, on or before Friday, Nov. 12, enclosing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation; and stating the subjects in which they offer themselves for examination.

IV. To a SCHOLARSHIP on the foundation of Miss Hannah Brakenbury, "for the encouragement of the Study of Law and History;" worth £80 a year (£55 and tuition free), tenable during residence for four years: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded eight Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday morning, November 12, at Ten o'clock.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention to the Master of Balliol *by letter*, on or before Friday, Nov. 5, enclosing testimonials from their Colleges or Schools, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

Papers will be set in English History, and in Foreign History down to 1688. The knowledge required can be obtained from such standard books as the following:—

Papers will also be set to all candidates in Political Economy, and in the first two Books of the *Institutes* of Justinian (with Sandars' Introduction), and in Maine's *Ancient Law*.

V. To a MATHEMATICAL SCHOLARSHIP, tenable during residence for four years; worth about £80 a year (£55 a year and free tuition): open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded four Terms from Matriculation. This examination will begin on Friday, November 26, at Ten o'clock, and will comprise Pure Mathematics, including the Differential Calculus; and Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

Candidates are requested to call on the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 25, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VI. To TWO EXHIBITIONS, worth £40 a year; tenable during residence for four years; but not tenable with a Scholarship, or any other Exhibition of the College: open to all such candidates as shall not have exceeded one year from Matriculation.

The examination for these Exhibitions will comprise Pure Mathematics so far as to include Conic Sections; the Elements of Mechanics and Hydrostatics; translations from Greek and from Latin, and into Latin Prose; and English History.

Candidates may also offer, as optional subjects, any two of the following: viz. (1) a higher examination in Classics; (2) Moral Philosophy; (3) any of the higher branches of Pure and Mixed Mathematics; (4) the Elements of Physics, Chemistry, or Physiology; (5) some portion of Ancient History. This examination will begin on Friday morning, November 26.

Candidates are requested to communicate their intention *by letter* to the Master of Balliol on or before Tuesday, November 23, mentioning any of the optional subjects which they may offer for examination; and enclosing testimonials from their College or School, and (if Members of the University) the certificates of their Matriculation.

VII. A HEBREW SCHOLARSHIP of the value of £80 a year (£55 a year and tuition free), open to all such candidates as have not exceeded two years from their Matriculation, tenable during residence for three years, and to be continued for a fourth if the Scholar study at a foreign University with the consent of the College. Candidates will be expected to show such a knowledge of Latin and Greek as is sufficient for the requirements of the University.

The examination for this Scholarship will begin on Friday, November 19, at Ten o'clock. Candidates are requested to call upon the Master of Balliol on Thursday, November 18, between the hours of Eight and Nine P.M., bringing testimonials from their Colleges and Schools, and (if Members of the University) certificates of their Matriculation.

The examination papers will embrace Hebrew grammar, pointing, translation of English into Hebrew and Hebrew into English. Special questions will be set (1) in the Hebrew Text of Deuteronomy, (2) 2 Kings, (3) Isaiah i-xxxix. Two at least of these books must be offered by the Candidates. Candidates are at liberty to offer either Chaldee and Syriac, or the elements of Arabic, as an extra subject.

The holders of any of the above Scholarships or Exhibitions will be allowed to reside either within or without the walls of the College. If resident within the College, they will be subject to the usual College payments: if residing out of College, they will pay to the College a deposit of £5, instead of £21, for Caution Money; and, yearly, a sum of £25 for Tuition, £1 for University Dues, £1 to the College Library, and 8s. for College Dues.

MERTON COLLEGE.

There will be an Election in October to Two or THREE CLASSICAL POSTMASTERSHIPS, and to ONE PHYSICAL SCIENCE POSTMASTERSHIP.

The examination for the former will begin on Tuesday, October 5, and for the latter on Tuesday, October 12.

The Postmasterships are of the annual value of £80, and are tenable for five years from election, or so long as the holder does not accept any appointment incompatible with the pursuance of the full course of University studies. Further information as to the Postmasterships, if needed, may be obtained from the Principal of the Postmasters.

II. *Physical Science Postmastership.*

Candidates for the Physical Science Postmastership, if members of the University, must not have exceeded six Terms of University standing. Candidates are requested to call on the Warden, with testimonials of character, and, if Members of the University, with certificates of Matriculation, between 4 and 5 P.M. on Monday, October 11, or on Tuesday, October 12, between 9.30 and 10 A.M.

The subjects of examination for the Physical Science Postmastership will be Chemistry and Physics. There will be a practical examination in Chemistry.

Candidates will have opportunities of giving evidence of a knowledge of Biology; but it must be borne in mind that in such cases the examiners will look for evidence of an acquaintance with the principles of Chemistry and Physics equal in extent to that which is required in the Preliminary Honour Examination in the Physical Science School.

A paper will be set in Algebra and Elementary Geometry, and a Classical paper of the standard required by the University for Responsions.

Further information may be obtained from the Tutor in Physical Science.

Candidates unsuccessful in any of the Postmastership examinations may, if recommended by the examiners, be admitted as Commoners of the College.

N.B. Further notice will be issued of a Mathematical Postmastership to be competed for in January, 1881.

comprehension of general principles. The papers in Chemistry and Physics will be set in common with Trinity College.

TWO SCHOLARSHIPS (Stapledon), tenable for five years during residence, and of the annual value of £60, are open to all British subjects who have not on the day of election completed the twentieth year of their age and have been born in the old diocese of Exeter, or have been educated *in some school* in that diocese for the three years last past. One of the Stapledon Scholars will be expected to reside in October.

One of the Exhibitions is of the value of about £35 per annum, and in default of any Candidate educated at Ashburton School (and it is believed there will be none) is limited, in the first instance, to persons born or educated in the county of Devon.

The second is of the value of £30 per annum, and is open.

Candidates for the *Exhibitions* should give evidence to the Rector at least ten days before the examination that they are in need of assistance at the University. The age of the Candidates for the *Exhibitions* is not limited.

The Examination also for Matriculation will take place at the same time, the Candidates for which as well as for the Scholarships and Exhibitions should call on the Rector on Wednesday, October 13, between 5 and 7 or 8 and 9 P.M.
